5 WAYS OUR WORK AGAINST POLIO FIGHTS OTHER DISEASES

Since Rotary and its partners in the Global Polio Eradication Initiative took on the fight against polio, they have developed systems to facilitate both immunizations and eradication of the disease. This infrastructure helps get us closer to a polio-free world. But did you know that it's used to fight and protect against other diseases, too? Here are five examples of that infrastructure at work.

The cold chain

The polio vaccine must be kept cool, or it risks losing its effectiveness. The cold chain system — made up of freezers, refrigerators, and cold boxes — was developed to allow polio workers to store the vaccine and transport it over long distances in extremely hot weather. In Pakistan, a measles immunization program now relies on the same system. With the help of the cold chain, Sindh province recently reached its goal of immunizing more than 7.3 million children against measles.

Microplanning

A critical component in immunizing more children against polio, especially in remote regions, is microplanning. A microplan allows health workers to identify priority communities, address potential barriers, and develop a plan for a successful immunization campaign. The workers collect as many details as possible about communities to help them reach and vaccinate all of the children, and this strategy has helped keep India polio-free for five years. Now the Mewat district of India is using microplanning to increase its rates of vaccination against measles and rubella.

Surveillance

The polio surveillance system helps detect new cases of polio and determines where and how these cases originated. In Borno state in Nigeria, the surveillance system is now being used to find people with symptoms of yellow fever. Surveillance was one of many tactics used during a 2018 yellow fever outbreak that prompted vaccinations of more than 8 million people.

Contact tracing

Because polio is a transmittable disease, health workers use contact tracing to learn who has had contact with people who might be infected. Contact tracing was also critical to containing an Ebola outbreak in Nigeria in 2014. When a traveler from Liberia was diagnosed with Ebola, Nigerian officials were able to quickly trace and isolate the traveler's contacts, helping prevent the disease from spreading further.

Emergency operations centers

An important part of the polio infrastructure that Rotary and its partners have built is the emergency operations centers network. These centers provide a centralized location where health workers and government officials can work collaboratively and generate a faster, more effective emergency response. The emergency operations center in Lagos, Nigeria, which was originally set up to address polio, was adapted to handle Ebola, and it ultimately helped the country respond quickly to an Ebola outbreak. Only 19 Ebola cases were reported, and the country was declared Ebola-free within three months.

HOW TO AVOID COPYRIGHT INFRINGEMENT

You're putting together your club or district newsletter, and you want to liven it up. It's tempting to go online and grab a cartoon or image to use. But if the material is protected under copyright law and you don't have permission to use it, you could face legal troubles and the costs that go with them.

A Rotary club in New Zealand recently used several cartoons from an online stock image company based in England. The club had not secured a license for the images, however, and soon received a notice from the company and a demand for licensing fees.

Rotary International staff members have noted an increase in the number of clubs that say they've been contacted about copyright infringement issues. The consequences of using images or other items without permission — even just seeking legal advice — can consume time and resources that clubs would rather devote to other activities.

Knowing some important points about copyright law can help you avoid problems and protect your club:

- When your club or district wants to use items such as songs, poems, illustrations, photographs, videos, charts, or graphs, you need to get a license or permission from the author beforehand. This applies to items that are on the web or were created by a Rotary member.
- It's worth spending some time trying to identify the copyright owner for any item you want to use for a presentation, newsletter, or club or district website. If you don't have permission from the owner, don't use it. Consult an attorney for help determining copyright ownership.
- Some organizations provide public copyright licenses (such as Creative Commons, which offers international licenses), open access images, or royalty-free licenses. Paying a small fee to use an image is preferable to receiving a copyright infringement letter.
- Fair use generally refers to using some copyright material for a limited and "transformative" purpose, such as to comment upon, criticize, or parody the work. Fair use is decided case by case and would not apply to Rotary club activities and promotions.
- If you are using a photograph, video, or other recording that includes a recognizable person or any personal data, you need written permission from each person (or the parent or guardian of each child) before you use the material. Arts and copyright organizations have posted standard releases online that you can use as templates for a model release.
- Some insurance policies may provide coverage for copyright infringement. If you are concerned, check with your liability insurance provider to see if your policy includes this coverage.

CELEBRATE ROTARY, UN AT 5 SPECIAL EVENTS

Attendees will have the opportunity to network with fellow leaders and take away ideas and strategies to put into action. At the Rotary International Convention in Hamburg, Germany, Maloney talked about the common goals of the two organizations. "There are so many parallels between the work we already do through our areas of focus and the work of the **UN Sustainable Development Goals**," he said. "While those goals are indeed incredibly ambitious, they are like any other ambitious goals we have undertaken, in Rotary or an where else." He added, "This relationship with the UN is but one example of how, together, we can serve the world."

The following events are open to all.

9 November 2019 — Rotary Day at the United Nations, New York, New York, USA. Theme: Connection for Good. This year's Rotary Day at the UN will focus on community-based solutions to the refugee crisis.

28 February 2020 — Rotary Day at the UN Economic Commission for Latin America and the Caribbean, Santiago, Chile. Theme: Sustainable Cities and Communities. This presidential conference will focus on the 11th of the UN Sustainable Development Goals, which aims for a future in which cities and communities provide opportunities for all and access to basic services, energy, housing, transportation, and more.

28 March 2020 — Rotary Day at UNESCO, Paris, France. Theme: Toward Peaceful Societies. This presidential conference will focus on peace, justice, and strong institutions as well as Positive Peace initiatives.

7-8 May 2020 — Rotary Day at the Food and Agriculture Organization, Rome, Italy. Theme: Uniting for Global Impact. This presidential conference will focus on forced migration and food insecurity.

5 June 2020 — Rotary/United Nations Celebration, Honolulu, Hawaii, USA. Theme: Celebrating 75 years of connecting to do good in the world. The final event will honor the relationship between Rotary and the UN. Topics will include environmental sustainability and water, sanitation, and hygiene.

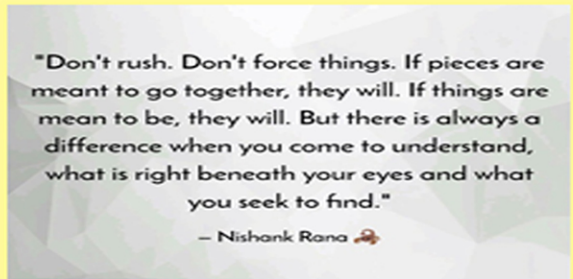
A Dose of Positive Thoughts
