

# President's message

Dear fellow Rotarians and members of the family of Rotary,

Rotary's long-term, sustained battle against polio has defined our organization for decades. We have a right to be proud of all that we have accomplished through the years.

Our progress is real and noteworthy. In 1988, polio was endemic in 125 countries, with more than 350,000 new cases a year worldwide. Since then, Rotary and our Global Polio Eradication Initiative partners have reduced the incidence of polio by more than 99.9 percent, vaccinated more than 2.5 billion children against

the virus, and prevented 18 million cases of paralysis. Over the years, Rotary has helped country after country move into the polio-free column. This includes India, which some considered impossible not long ago. Of the three types of poliovirus, type 2 has been eradicated and type 3 could soon be certified as eradicated. Nigeria has not reported a case of wild poliovirus in nearly three years. If this trend holds, we will be down to just one type of wild poliovirus in only one section of the world, Afghanistan and Pakistan.

There are major challenges in that region. But it is crucial that we remain optimistic. Look at all that we have accomplished so far. This is no time to get discouraged or to think that the task is impossible. We will end polio forever, but only if we remain steadfast and vigilant. World Polio Day is a time for Rotarians from all over the globe to come together, recognize the progress we have made in our fight against polio, and plan the action we must take to end polio forever. The key word is action, because we still have important work to do.

Remember, every dollar raised is matched 2-to-1 by the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation.

Once you have created an event, register it at **endpolio.org/register-your-event.** Then promote it using the World Polio Day toolkit, available at **endpolio.org/world-polio-day.** 

Mark your calendar to tune in to Rotary's World Polio Day Online Global Update on 24 October. This year we will stream our program on Facebook in multiple time zones around the world. Visit the Rotary International Facebook page to RSVP to your region's program. And do not forget to follow the event on social media and share it with your network.

When we reach our goal, polio will become only the second human disease eradicated on the planet, and Rotary will receive international acclaim. But what matters most is the children who will never again have to face this terrible, disabling virus. Rotary must continue to connect the world in the effort toward polio eradication. It is up to us. Let us finish the job.

# Vocational Training Team helps with Autism By Sandra L. Espina,

Restless, finicky, speech delay ... these are just some of the common adjectives used to describe people with autism. I am a mother of a 21-year-old boy who has autism. Zachary is a typical child with autism (CWA) who struggles to develop language skills and has restrictive, repetitive behavior. It has been a process of realization:

My special boy has never rushed home from school to tell me a story of what silly thoughts transpired from the day or asked endless "why" questions.

There are no loads of homework to manage at night nor report cards to gauge learning skills; unlike his two older siblings.

Instead, he flaps, rocks back and forth, and smiles when he is happy

In the course of this, we veered away from traditional education and focused more on what really matters to him – special school, therapy that suits his special needs, and activities that are purposeful and foremost to his well being.

I have been a volunteer of a parents foundation that manages the Responsive Education for Autistic Children center. I have been a shoulder for parents to lean on and have witnessed how these special kids struggle each day to lessen their deficits in social communication and behavior.

During the 1970's, the Treatment and Education of Autistic and Communication Handicapped Children (TEACCH) researched program was formed at the University of North Carolina. In August of 2017, I had the opportunity to be a part of the TEACCH training program through a vocational training team sponsored by Rotary District 3860 (Cebu, Philippines) and District 7600 (Virginia, USA). In addition to myself, the team included another mother of a child with autism who is a medical specialist and our Rotarian team leader.

The TEACCH Method has helped children at our center and their families learn how to become functional in life and experience progress in their daily activities. It promotes meaningful engagement in activities, flexibility, independence and self-efficacy. And it helps children with autism have a better understanding of their surroundings.

This vocational training experience has helped me as a mother, a volunteer, and as a program director at the center to apply what I have learned from TEACCH in our center and to thousands of public school teachers, therapists, parents, and government health workers in our city.

I am forever grateful for Rotary and their efforts to help those with autism.





Our new strategy to end polio

The Global Polio Eradication Initiative's (GPEI's) previous strategic plan was from 2013 to 2018. We achieved many important things: Wild poliovirus type 2 was declared eradicated in 2015; wild poliovirus type 3 was last seen in 2012, giving us high confidence that it's no longer circulating; no wild poliovirus has been detected outside Afghanistan and Pakistan since 2016. But the clear factor in creating the new Polio Endgame Strategy 2019–2023 is that we have not yet achieved complete eradication.

The new plan has three goals. The first goal is eradication. Second, integration — collaboration with other public health actors beyond the GPEI to strengthen health systems to help achieve and sustain eradication. Then, certification and containment — we have to prove through surveillance that we have interrupted the transmission of the poliovirus, and we have to be able to show that the virus in laboratories either has been destroyed or is appropriately contained.

# The GPEI's five-year budget to execute this is \$4.2 billion. Why does it cost so much?

Every year, we have to vaccinate more than 450 million children in up to 50 countries to prevent the spread of polio from the endemic areas. In addition to the children in Pakistan

and Afghanistan, we are immunizing children all over Africa and Asia. So we have to have a lot of people out there to help immunize, and that costs money. We have to have the vaccine, and that costs money. And we have to maintain and pay for sizable quantities of vaccine in case of an outbreak, and that costs money. Then we have to investigate about 100,000 cases of paralysis each year to rule out polio. We have to continue surveillance looking for cases of polio to be sure we are not missing cases in certain areas. We need to test sewage samples in 34 countries to ensure that the poliovirus is not circulating undetected. And all of those things cost money. It's a significant expense every year to maintain that level of performance.

# What strategies are in this plan?

One key element is establishing a regional hub for Afghanistan and Pakistan to consolidate our efforts and increase technical support. We're also focusing on mobile and hard-to-reach children — children who are crossing borders, riding on trains, and coming out of areas where our access has been restricted. We are developing rapid-response teams and surge capacity so if the virus is detected, our response can be swift and intense. We're working with other actors such as Gavi, the Vaccine Alliance, to help

strengthen immunization systems. And we're delivering additional services such as clean water, nutrition, health, and sanitation, because often the local people say we're always coming back to immunize against polio, but what about their other problems?

# What can Rotarians do to ensure that the plan is successful?

The No. 1 thing is to continue to support the program. We have a \$3.27 billion funding gap. We will need Rotarians to make direct donations as well as to advocate with their governments and other groups for their support so that we can continue to do all of the immunizations and surveillance we've been talking about. Rotarians in countries where active polio eradication efforts are underway need to continue helping with these efforts and immunizing children. They need to keep advocating with their governments to continue to support polio eradication.




# TOP 5 REASONS TO ERADICATE POLICE

- IT'S A GOOD INVESTMENT: An independent study published in the medical journal Vaccine estimates that the return on the global investment in a polio-free world will reach \$40 to \$50 billion within the next 20 years.
- IT STRENGTHENS THE SYSTEM: Our polio eradication efforts have established an active global disease surveillance network that is being used for other health interventions, such as measles vaccinations, deworming tablets, and mosquito bed nets.
