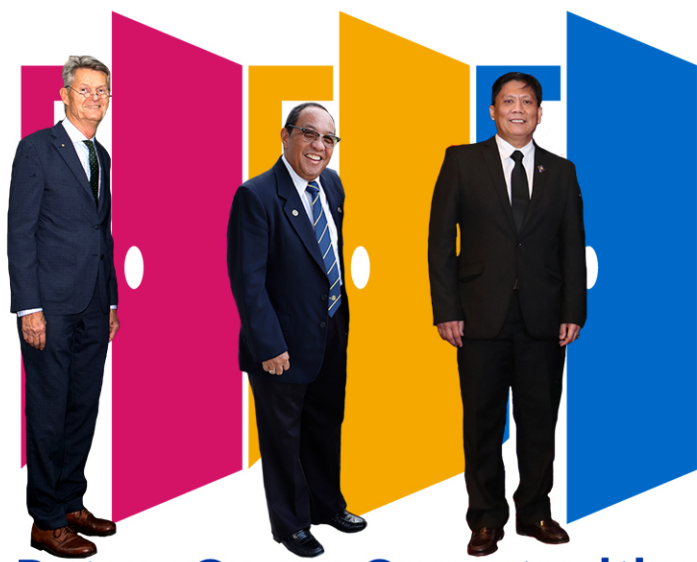

Dear Rotarians, Rotaractors, and friends,

The year 2020 has brought monumental changes that have already included a global pandemic and a renewed call for social justice. We are reminded that we live in a constantly changing world, and Rotary is a reflection of that world.

We must be ready to listen and adapt, always drawing upon our core values of service, fellowship, diversity, integrity, and leadership. If we live these values and apply The Four-Way Test to all aspects of our lives, we will be prepared to lead at all times.

I am proud of how we have proven our ability to adapt. Faced with a pandemic, Rotary has not stopped. We moved meetings online and found new ways to serve. We turned the canceled 2020 Rotary International Convention in Honolulu into our first virtual convention. Each week, we are proving that Rotary is a flexible gathering that happens anywhere — in traditional meetings, on cellphones, and on computers. Rotary offers a way to connect for everyone who wants to, at any time, and will continue to do so.

Some have even told me that they enjoy Rotary's mix of online and in-person meetings more now than before! How can we build on this momentum and seize the opportunity to embrace change so that Rotary keeps thriving?

For me, supporting new types of clubs is key. They are no longer just experiments but a real part of Rotary today. In addition to traditional clubs, we have e-clubs, Rotaract clubs, cause-based clubs, and passport clubs. These help make Rotary more inclusive, more flexible, and more attractive to new members. Visit these clubs, exchange ideas and partner with them, and promote them to one another and to our communities.

We all agree that we need to grow Rotary, but sometimes we can get caught up in the numbers game and lose sight of the bigger picture. After all, an increase in membership is meaningless if next year, those new members leave our clubs. Let's grow Rotary sustainably. Rotary's flexible options for participation will engage members and show the community how we're different from any other club. Let's celebrate that Rotary is now less about rules and more about joining together in a variety of ways besides traditional meetings.

I recommend that each club hold an annual strategy meeting to ask — and honestly answer — if we are doing all we can for our members and if our club reflects the community we serve. We are taking this approach at the international level, too. I am proud that six women are serving with me on the RI Board of Directors this year, the most we have ever had. Let's keep Rotary moving in this direction at every level. We need more perspectives, more diversity, for Rotary to thrive.

It's fascinating to imagine how we will find new ways to adapt and stay nimble this year and beyond. But I am also inspired about what hasn't changed and never will in Rotary: the friendships, the networking, the ethics, and the service. Indeed, these are the values that make Rotary attractive to all.

As Rotary's founder, Paul Harris, said, we have to be revolutionary from time to time. Now is such a time. *Rotary Opens Opportunities* — countless ones — for us to embrace change that will strengthen us even as we remain true to our core values.

A message from
Foundation Trustee Chair

There is a world of difference between a problem and a challenge.

If a honeybee faces a giant hornet alone, the bee has a problem. But if the honeybee faces the hornet with a swarm of other bees, then it is the hornet that has a problem.

This is true in nature, but it is also the human predicament. So when the situation I confront is greater than the resources I have, then it can be termed as a problem. However, if the resources I have are greater than the situation I am faced with, then it is just a challenge. Sometimes we overestimate our problems and underestimate our ability to overcome them.

The COVID-19 pandemic seemed like a situation that might overwhelm The Rotary Foundation. But as things have progressed, we have not allowed it to do so. As of 4 June, we have funded 208 disaster response grants for \$5.2 million and 169 new global grants at \$13.8 million — all in three months. We have leveraged individual Rotarians' generosity with Foundation funds and in many cases other corporate funds to make projects larger and more impactful.

We never allowed the pandemic to overpower us. Indeed, history shows that Rotarians are a curious breed. We are visionaries, an idealistic lot that dreams big dreams of a better world. At the same time, we are resilient and able to withstand challenges that others might succumb to.

We were not idle during the pandemic lockdowns. We raised funds and did projects just as we would have if there had been no lockdown. We remembered that it's the same business that we always do — reaching out to people in distress — except the methodology by which we did it changed.

Our process of preparing and delivering the projects changed.

The way we communicated what we did changed.

The Rotary Foundation is more than 100 years old and has already weathered many storms — some of them mild and others devastating to the world. Thanks to the strength, sacrifice, and compassion of Rotarians and the level to which they have extended themselves, I believe the Foundation will continue to face the future with renewed hope and inspiration.

Our Foundation will emerge from this pandemic much stronger and more resilient as long as you continue to have trust and faith in it.

The pride at what we have accomplished is exceeded only by our profound gratitude for having the opportunity to help lead this historic endeavor—to help fulfill the world's hope of a polio-free world. And we should all be proud that the Zone 10-A Coordinator of the END POLIO NOW Campaign is from our District most especially from your Club. That's the power of influence PDG Me'anne has as far as Polio fund raising and advocacy is concerned.

We all know that we are now living in times of important change. But this is not really new with us Rotarians. What is new is the speed at which it takes place. We are suddenly catapulted into this virtual platform imprisoned in our virtual screen so to speak.

We are now faced with a complete reversal of social, economic and even religious systems. We are now in the age of "New Normal". In the small town of Mulanay, Quezon Province, along with the changing of the year on 31 December 1956, comes the first cry of a boy born to Arturo and Veneranda. The eldest in the brood of five (5), he spent most of his childhood in his hometown and later on moved to Manila for his high school education.

He graduated college 1979 at the University of Santo Tomas with a degree in Liberal Arts/Commerce Major in Accounting and having poured much sweat and determination, passed the grueling and exacting standards of the CPA Board

Examinations.

He became the Accounting Assistant at the Makati Branch of then Banco Filipino (August 1979 to March 1981) where he met Tess, who was then working in the Trust Department of the head office. You can truly say that it was love at first sound – my mother had a Trust transaction with the Makati branch, and had to talk to a representative of the said branch. After that fateful first call, this confident guy kept calling back the Head Office to talk to my mother, because there were supposedly some hold-ups on the transaction. However, he later on admitted that the many calls were just a ruse just so he could talk with my mother because he was so enamored with her voice. Upon mutual prodding, they shared destiny and as the cliché goes...the rest was history.

Emmy is a banker through and through...that much of the milestones of his personal life also marked a cornerstone in his banking career.

Emmy and Tess were both taking up their Master's Degree in Business Administration at the De La Salle University as part of their banking career growth when their eldest daughter, Anne Margaret, was born on July 1982. The second daughter, Mary Josephine was born a year later, when Emmy became the branch manager of Republic Planters Bank in Lucena City.

In 1987, Maria Corinne, the third daughter was born, just a year before Emmy became the branch manager of South Harbor Manila of Land Bank of the Philippines. Then, on 1989, the youngest and most charming daughter,



Jaime Marie, was born. No change in his banking career in my year of birth but Emmy became luckier henceforth.

Two years later, on 1991, Emmy transferred to Cebu to act as the Vice President/Area Head of the Land Bank of the Philippines and supervised the operations of Visayas branches in regions 7 and 8. He later transitioned to become the Vice President/Area Head of Security Bank Corporation in 1994, which was also the year the whole family decided to finally relocate to Cebu. Emmy then became the Vice President/Area Head of Planters Development Bank on 1996.

Because running a bank is just not enough, Emmy showcased his leadership skills by serving as President of the Cebu Bankers Club and President of Financial Executives (FINEX) Cebu Chapter.

Realizing that he has counted and managed enough other people's money, Emmy retired from the banking world and donned the cap of a self-employed businessman. He

ventured on precious metal trading, customs brokerage, and even lechon roasting. Indeed, Emmy works very hard for his family and for that, we will forever be grateful.

While we love him so much, we have to share him to the world because Emmy always felt the need to serve his community. His Rotary journey started with the Rotary Club of Cebu West where he once served as a club treasurer.

But as fate would have it, he found his way to the Rotary Club of Cebu Fuente upon the invitation of a good friend, Tito Rady Abarintos. For the last five (5) years, he has devoted time, effort, and resources to extend the RCCF brand of service to those in need and he could not be proud enough to have done so.
