Even as we share the gift of Rotary with others, let us be sure to engage these new members, because an

engaged Rotarian is an asset forever. And remember that engaging our current members and keeping them in our clubs is just as important as bringing in newcomers. Let us also be ready to form new clubs, especially flexible ones. I am very bullish on clubs that hold virtual or hybrid meetings, and satellite clubs and cause-based clubs can also be very effective ways of growing Rotary.

As you *grow more*, you will be able to *do more*. Let us keep *empowering girls* through our work in each of the areas of focus. Scholarships for girls, toilets in schools, health and hygiene education — there is so much we can do. Projects focused on the environment are also attracting interest the world over. Do participate in these projects locally and internationally to make this world a better place for us and for all species.

Each of you is a Rotary brand ambassador, and all of the wonderful work done by Rotarians around the world needs to be shared outside the Rotary community. Use social media to tell your friends, colleagues, and relatives the stories of Service Above Self.

Finally, I'm challenging every club, during the coming year, to plan at least one Rotary Day of Service that will bring together volunteers from inside and outside Rotary and will celebrate and showcase the work of your club in your community. TRUSTEE CHAIR'S MESSAGE

With more members and support, we'll do more good in the world

In August, we focus on membership — exploring ways we can expand Rotary's ranks and reach. As we form new clubs and answer RI President Shekhar Mehta's call of Each One, Bring One, let's consider how these efforts will have a positive impact at every level of our organization.

Rotary's two greatest assets are its members and The Rotary Foundation, and they are linked. Our organization is made up of more than 48,000 Rotary and Rotaract clubs, and without our dedicated club members, we can't perform service. Our members also carry out the Foundation's mission of doing good in the world, by working on grassroots projects and making contributions that support countless Foundation programs and grants.

With more members in Rotary, the Foundation could do even more good in the world. We would have more hands to set up water, sanitation, and hygiene projects, so that more people could access clean water. We would have more minds to plan global grants projects that support prenatal services, so that more babies could live. We could fund more district grants that support literacy, so that more people could learn to read.

Today, roughly a third of our members actively support the Foundation through

annual giving or other means. Imagine how we could extend Rotary's reach if we were to increase that engagement, even by just a little. More Rotarian contributions would mean additional funding for the Rotary Peace Centers, as well as more matched contributions to help eradicate polio, thanks to our partnership with the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation.

The Rotary Foundation is a powerful force that efficiently carries out impactful and sustainable projects around the world; Charity Navigator has recognized The Rotary Foundation with a four-star rating annually for 13 consecutive years. All Rotary members can be proud of this. And how great it would be if all Rotarians would support the Foundation in whatever way they could.

I have a simple request this month. Please take 10 minutes during your next club meeting to discuss ways to get more involved in the Foundation this year. It could be planning an online fundraiser to benefit the Foundation or partnering with other clubs for a global grant project.

Whatever you do, remember that our members — all of us — drive Rotary's efforts and sustain our Foundation.

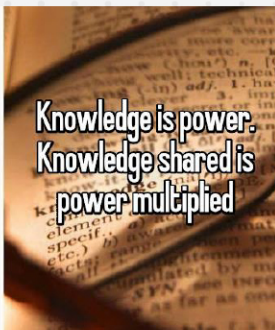
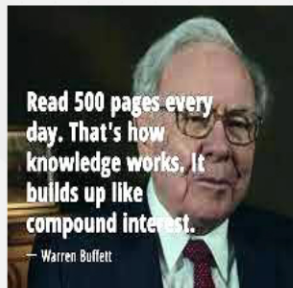

Let me end this with the famous lines of Winston Churchill, "The empires of the future are the empires of the minds" and from Benjamin Franklin, "An investment in knowledge pays the best interest."

2020-21 TRF COMPREHENSIVE FUNDRAISING RESULTS

A message from Chief Philanthropy Officer, Eric Schmelling

Congratulations to clubs and districts around the world on setting a new record for grants and fundraising in Rotary year 2020-21! We successfully overcame challenges created by the pandemic and raised over \$440 million – far surpassing our \$410 million comprehensive fundraising goal! We also met our \$50 million PolioPlus goal.

POLIO IN AFGHANISTAN



We have been receiving many enquiries regarding the impact of the situation in Afghanistan on the polio eradication activities taking place there. PRIVP / International PolioPlus Chair Mike McGovern has released a comment:

In 2021, despite internal conflicts and a global pandemic, Afghanistan is seeing unprecedentedly low transmission of wild polio, with just one case reported this year. Not only has the country seen a drastic reduction in cases of wild polio, polio surveillance data confirms this progress and significantly less virus is being detected in the environment.

As conflict in Afghanistan quickly evolves, we must advocate for the children of Afghanistan. The polio program must work and communicate with all stakeholders involved to ensure that polio immunization remains a priority so that the gains we have made against polio do not diminish. We look forward to working with our polio eradication partners and the Afghani people to completely eradicate polio.

NEW POLIO GIVING PROGRAMS

Our Regional End Polio Now Coordinators, **PDG Mary Anne Solomon** in Zone 10A and **PDG Bob Aitken** in Zone 8, have been busy promoting new programs to recognise members who support PolioPlus.



Mary Anne's **PolioPlus Society** recognises members who pledge to donate US\$100 each year to PolioPlus. When it was launched in June, starting with three of the Philippines districts, more than 100 Charter Members contributed over \$10,000! Thank you to the Charter Members and congratulations to all involved!

Bob Aitken has launched the **Clem Renouf End Polio Club** in Australia and the **Bill Boyd End Polio Club** in New Zealand and Pacific. These programs encourage 100% of a club's members to give at least \$10 (local currency) to PolioPlus. There's a [multiple donor form](#) that clubs can use to facilitate participation and contributions in New Zealand should be made in the usual ways to NZRCCT.

ZONE 8 TRAIN RIDE TO END POLIO

World Polio Day is October 24. Over the past three years, the train ride to end Polio has taken place in Sydney and expanded to Brisbane, Perth, Auckland and Wellington. The Sydney ride has raised over \$450,000 through sponsorship of the riders in their attempt to stop at EVERY Station on the Sydney metro network in just one day. The record is currently 18 hours, 10 minutes and 12 seconds, to cover the 190 stations. Rotarians and others generally sponsor riders at \$1 per station and Rotary Clubs at \$10 per station. This is a HIGH IMPACT public image fundraiser—and a fun Rotary fellowship event. If lockdowns permit, we hope to see you on the train!



ZONE 8 POLIO MOVIE EVENT



Each year, during the September to November period, we make a movie available to Zone 8 clubs, which they screen as a polio fundraiser. For obvious reasons, this year is a big challenge. The movie distributors are experiencing high levels of uncertainty about when they will be able to release their new movies to the cinemas. We do have a great movie lined up for November (Foundation Month), however if the Covid situation does not improve, the distributor is likely to slip the release date to February. It's a wait and see situation so we'll keep you posted.

PROJECT STORIES AND VIDEOS – AUSTRALIAN CLUBS

The Chair of *Rotary Foundation Australia*, PDG Maurie Stack, recently circulated an email to DGs and DRFCs requesting that clubs send us videos of their grant-funded projects.
