
Greetings!

GREETINGS, DEAR CHANGE-MAKERS OF ROTARY,

We have overcome so many challenges these past two years and changed many lives. It brings me great joy that we have worked so hard this year to grow Rotary through the Each One, Bring One initiative. The result has been excellent membership growth. Let us keep up the momentum.

On 11 March 2020, the World Health Organization declared that COVID-19 constituted a pandemic. Two years later it is important that we continue to draw on our expertise in disease prevention and treatment to help people worldwide cope with the continuing challenges. The pandemic continues to defy all expectations, but we cannot be frozen in fear. Our work is too important. It is also important that we make time for each other, and I urge you to register for the 2022 Rotary International Convention in Houston.

We can continue to build hope and spread peace by using our resources to help the most vulnerable. The pandemic has had an especially devastating impact on girls; on its first anniversary, Henrietta Fore, the executive director of UNICEF, said that “immediate action is needed to mitigate the toll on girls and their families.” This need remains just as strong a year later. The pandemic has affected girls in unique ways — stunting their educational attainment, weakening their job prospects, and contributing to other terrible results such as child marriages and increased human trafficking.

Data from UNICEF reveals why our action is so essential. In the 2010s, important progress was made toward eliminating the practice of child marriage, and UNICEF estimates that 25 million such marriages

were averted worldwide. Unfortunately, the pandemic reversed those positive trends, and as a result an additional 10 million girls are vulnerable to becoming child brides by the end of this decade.

This is why our focus on Empowering Girls is such vital work, and I am delighted that President-elect Jennifer Jones has committed to continuing this initiative. In my travels, I have witnessed many wonderful examples of club projects that back our Empowering Girls goals. But all Rotary members know that real change requires big efforts sustained over many years. This is the power of our global grants and actions taken within our areas of focus.

I encourage clubs to think of innovative ways to empower girls when designing their grant projects. Every step we take to improve education, health care, and economic opportunities for girls makes an important difference in helping them achieve their full potential. With opportunity we create hope, and with hope we address the root causes of conflict around the world, setting the stage for sustainable peace.

None of us know how long the COVID-19 virus will linger — and as an organization that has worked tirelessly for decades to eradicate polio, we understand better than most the difficult work that lies ahead. That is why we need to remain focused on what is possible — not feeling nostalgic for the way our lives were, but looking hopefully to a future that uses this opportunity to *Serve to Change Lives*. I look forward to continuing this good work with you.

TRUSTEE CHAIR'S MESSAGE

Let's get clean water flowing worldwide

In the mid-18th century, Benjamin Franklin wrote: "When the well's dry, we know the worth of water."

Right now, in the 21st century, many of us take water for granted because we have been fortunate to live in places where clean water is plentiful. But that's not the case for millions of others around the world. The United Nations estimates that 2 billion people — about 1 in 4 people on the planet — lack safely managed drinking water. Just under half of the world's population lives without access to safely managed toilets and sanitation systems, and nearly a third lacks basic hand washing stations with soap and clean water.

Isn't it astounding that, in an age of instant information and space tourism, we still haven't managed to guarantee the necessities of water, sanitation, and hygiene (WASH) to so many?

Rotary is doing something about it; WASH projects are among the most funded within our areas of focus: Since 2014, Rotary clubs have carried out more than 2,100 global grants related to WASH by using \$154 million in Foundation funding, impacting countless people.

In addition, Rotary's WASH alliance with USAID, more than a decade strong, is considered Rotary's largest partnership outside of PolioPlus. Rotary and USAID have committed a combined \$18 million in WASH funding to large-scale strategic efforts at the national level in countries

such as Ghana and Uganda. The partnership unites the technical expertise of USAID's development professionals with the local leadership and advocacy of Rotary members to find workable, sustainable WASH solutions in hundreds of communities. You can learn more at riusaidwash.rotary.org.

The theme of World Water Day, 22 March, is *Groundwater: Making the Invisible Visible*. This is an opportune time for clubs to learn more about WASH issues and take action collectively to create and sustain momentum for expanding access to universal WASH services. Rotary members can bring attention to the WASH challenges that impact us locally by sharing the stories, experiences, and WASH needs of those we serve globally.

We can be proud of the work that Rotary clubs and our Foundation continue to do to provide communities with clean water and working sanitation and hygiene systems. But let's not stop there.

This month, let's look out for our neighbors around the world whose wells are running dry or who lack toilets or soap. Rotary has the resources, partnerships, and passion to improve WASH services for millions in need worldwide. And most important, we have the people who can make it work — you and me.

Second High ethical standards in business and professions, the recognition of the worthiness of all useful occupations, and the dignifying of each Rotarian's occupation as an opportunity to serve society;

Third The application of the ideal of service in each Rotarian's personal, business, and community life;

Fourth The advancement of international understanding, goodwill, and peace through a world fellowship of business and professional persons united in the ideal of service.

THE FOUR-WAY TEST

1. Is it the **truth**?

3. Will it **build goodwill** and **better friendships**?
4. Will it be **beneficial** to all concerned?

ROTARIAN CODE OF CONDUCT

The following code of conduct has been adopted for the use of Rotarians:

As a Rotarian, I will

1. Act with integrity and high ethical standards in my personal and professional life
2. Deal fairly with others and treat them and their occupations with respect
3. Use my professional skills through Rotary to: mentor young people, help those with special needs, and improve people's quality of life in my community and in the world
4. Avoid behavior that reflects adversely on Rotary or other Rotarians
5. Help maintain a harassment-free environment in Rotary meetings, events, and activities, report any suspected harassment, and help ensure non-retaliation to those individuals that report harassment.



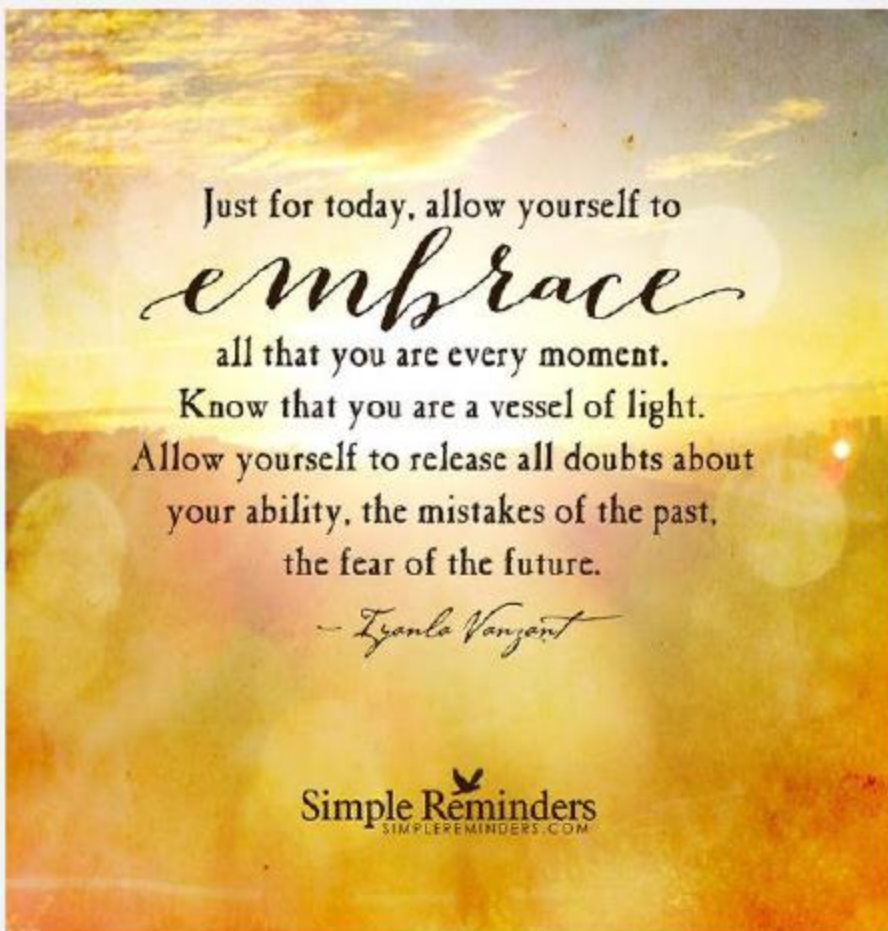

HANDBOOK

You say you want a resolution

RI's robust legislative process is open to all

In a great hall, international leaders wearing headphones listen to a passionate debate that is being simultaneously interpreted into their respective languages. A representative from Nigeria pleads for passage, and a representative from New Zealand rises in support. Their votes will have a global impact for years to come.

While it may sound like a meeting of the United Nations, this scene plays out at Rotary International's Council on Legislation.

Representatives come from more than 200 countries and geographic regions of the world, and they speak and debate in their native languages, so it is truly an international, parliament-like assembly.

Many Rotarians know that the Council on Legislation (COL), established in 1933, meets every three years to review and vote on proposed changes to the constitutional documents that govern Rotary: the RI Constitution, the RI Bylaws, and the Standard Rotary Club Constitution. Also, the Council on Resolutions (COR) gathers online annually to address resolutions relating to actions outside the purview of the constitutional documents as well as urgent requests for changes to the constitutional documents that cannot wait until the next COL.

What Rotarians may not know is that most of these proposals come from Rotary members at the club and district levels. Every member has a voice in how Rotary functions, from the role of Rotaract to membership dues. The fact that changes usually begin at the grassroots level emphasizes Rotary's democratic approach, says Sarah Christensen, Rotary's council services supervisor. "A lot of other membership organizations don't do what we do; they have their board or a council of senior leaders make bylaw changes," says Christensen. "In Rotary, anybody can suggest a change to our constitutional documents and actually see it implemented." — JOSEPH DERR

KNOW WHAT TO PROPOSE

You propose *enactments* to the COL and *resolutions* to the COR. Enactments are major structural changes to RI's constitutional documents — they can alter things like the qualifications for RI officers, how districts are formed, and club attendance requirements. Resolutions pertain to procedural or policy changes — for example, whether to replace annual presidential themes with a permanent theme, how to allocate funds from the World Fund to District Designated Funds, or how to determine Rotary's next corporate program after polio eradication.



DO YOUR RESEARCH

It's critical to examine RI's constitutional documents. Also review past enactments and resolutions to make sure your idea hasn't already been proposed. Part of that research, says RI Director Urs Klemm, who has served as a representative to multiple councils, includes gathering opinions from members of other clubs. "Don't be a lone wolf; be a team player," Klemm says. "There are many visions, ideas, and suggestions in the district, so encourage Rotarians, and especially Rotaractors, to get involved."

ASK FOR HELP — EARLY

Contact former council representatives in your district. RI staff members are also ready to help — Christensen is one of three specialists who work on council-related issues, along with experienced Rotarian volunteers. They can help clarify a proposal, provide background on earlier legislation, and give general advice, especially if contacted well in advance. "Typically we receive between 150 and 200 items for any council," Christensen says, "and usually 80 percent of those items come in during the two weeks before the deadline, so the sooner members reach out before we get swamped, the better." Email them at council_services@rotary.org.

THINK GLOBALLY

Consider the global impact of the structural change you are proposing. As Christensen says, “Just because something is a good idea for your club doesn’t mean it’s a great idea for all clubs.” Also remember that some changes may be best handled through changes to Rotary’s Code of Policies, which can be suggested through a resolution or as a petition directly to the RI Board.

BE CLEAR AND SPECIFIC

Aim for clarity and precision in proposal language. A proposal may be rejected as defective if something is unclear. Avoid general phrases such as “it will be reviewed by the committee,” Christensen says. “Be specific. We need to know what committee you’re talking about and that committee’s deadline for review.”

GET THE DISTRICT ENDORSEMENT

Enactments and resolutions typically originate in clubs. The district must endorse the item, with the district governor confirming the endorsement when the item is submitted.

WHAT HAPPENS NEXT?

After endorsement by the district and submission to RI:

1. RI’s Council Services team reviews proposed enactments and resolutions, and translates, edits, and formats proposals for review by RI’s Constitution and Bylaws Committee. A financial impact statement is also drafted for each item.
2. The committee evaluates each item for inclusion at a council and finds it to be one of the following:
 - “Regular items” are items that are acceptable for the council’s consideration.
 - “Not duly proposed” means the item does not meet technical submission requirements.
 - “Defective” indicates the item lacks clarity or has an issue with its wording.
3. Proposers are given an opportunity to correct defective items.
4. Regular items are translated, prepared for publication, and published on My Rotary before the event.
5. Council representatives, one from each district, vote on each measure.
6. Results are published on My Rotary. Adopted enactments take effect 1 July, after the Council on Legislation. Adopted resolutions are considered by the RI Board and The Rotary Foundation Trustees after the Council on Resolutions.

Submission deadlines

2022 Council on Resolutions: 30 June
2025 Council on Legislation: tentatively 31 December 2023

BE THOROUGH

When proposing an enactment, be sure to properly amend all related sections of constitutional documents in question, using Microsoft Word versions provided at rotary.org/governance-documents. Use the Track Changes feature so that proposed changes will be easily seen and understood by all readers. Also, double-check that the change you’re proposing will not affect existing legislation elsewhere. For example, if you propose a change to the Object of Rotary, remember that the Object is included in both the RI Constitution and the Standard Rotary Club Constitution, so any proposed change needs to cover both documents.

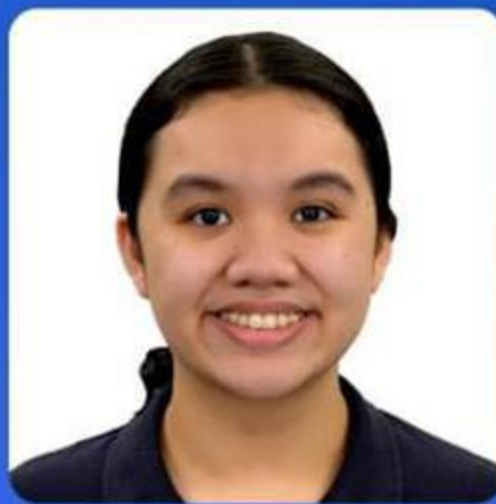
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
