
Dear RCCF Family,

GREETINGS, DEAR CHANGE-MAKERS OF ROTARY,

Due to your positive response to the Each One, Bring One initiative, I am so happy to see that the membership trends in Rotary are looking up. Let us not lose this momentum — keep inviting new members, and also work hard to retain every member we attract. I look forward to seeing you next month in Houston at the 2022 Rotary International Convention, which I assure you will be a great event.

Also in Houston this June, we will be hosting my final presidential conference. We have devoted this year to conferences built around Rotary's areas of focus. They have been a tremendous success, both in terms of attendance and in the ideas that were generated.

Last fall, our conference in the Philippines, which focused on protecting the environment and growing local economies, attracted 2,200 people online. In Brazil, our meeting centered around water, sanitation, and hygiene and how it relates to disease prevention and treatment; more than 600 people attended. That was followed by an event about the environment, economy, and peace in Maputo, Mozambique, which attracted around 400 in-person attendees and another 700 virtually. Our conference about keeping the economy and environment in harmony, held in Venice, Italy, had more than 600 in attendance.

Through these conferences and my world travels, numerous leaders have met with me and agreed to collaborate with Rotary. They include the prime minister of Mauritius, the president of Seychelles, the deputy prime minister of Bahrain, and the presidents of Albania and Kosovo. Clearly, Rotary is making an impact, and the world is eager for our leadership.

In Houston, the final presidential conference, *Serve to Bring Peace*, will focus on an area in which Rotary has long provided leadership. Everything we do in Rotary helps create the conditions that foster peace in communities, nations, and ourselves.

In March, I was able to see firsthand the tremendous difference Rotary is making in Ukraine, as refugees continue to pour into Poland. Donors have contributed millions of dollars to this effort; our projects are making a tremendous difference, and there is enormous gratitude for your continued generosity and support.

It is heartbreaking to see up close all the lives that have been uprooted, and the Ukrainian people are not alone. A devastating civil war in Yemen continues. The humanitarian crisis in Afghanistan is deepening. Armed conflicts affect nations across Africa, including Libya, South Sudan, the Central African Republic, northern Mozambique, Ethiopia, and Cameroon. And major refugee crises continue in Syria and Venezuela.

Rotary will always be on the side of the peaceful resolution of conflict and providing aid and comfort to people in need. Rotary was there at the end of World War II, promoting the creation of the United Nations and standing up for the cause of peacebuilding worldwide. It is time to renew our mission and perform our role as one of the world's great promoters of peace.

There is no better way to *Serve to Change Lives* than to serve the cause of peace.

TRUSTEE CHAIR'S MESSAGE

We can build a better future

As an engineer, I have worked my entire life for success that can be measured. I believe in the kind of success you can reach out and touch. And I also know that it doesn't come overnight, it happens one step at a time.

At The Rotary Foundation, we don't settle for a vague idea of doing good; we take measurable steps, ones that are concrete and real, toward a defined goal. It's progress that you can see and tell your family and friends about, each step of the way.

Measurable success is what our new Programs of Scale grants are all about. The first member-led program to receive this annual \$2 million grant, Partners for a Malaria-Free Zambia (PMFZ), seeks to reduce malaria by 90 percent in 10 highly affected districts within two provinces of Zambia. It's an ambitious but achievable goal, based on a community health worker model that has been successful in reducing malaria in other parts of Zambia, as implemented by Rotary members and our partners on the ground.

To help end malaria in Zambia, The Rotary Foundation, World Vision U.S., and the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation are each contributing \$2 million to PMFZ, whose Rotary-led program already has begun to expand life-saving malaria diagnosis and treatment to hundreds more rural communities. So far this Rotary year, PMFZ has trained, equipped, and deployed more than 1,300 of the 2,500 new community health workers who will

help local health centers reach more people who are vulnerable to malaria, such as mothers and children. PMFZ is also collecting and analyzing data to ensure medical supplies get to where they are needed most. This work, along with the close collaboration between implementing partners and Rotary and Rotaract clubs across Zambia, has comprised the first bold steps toward our goal.

PolioPlus is another example of a global project that has been engineered for impact. The fact that we have reduced polio cases by 99.9 percent worldwide is a testament to your generous contributions, our strong partnerships through the Global Polio Eradication Initiative, and a vast network of volunteers who administer drops to children around the world.

And we won't stop now. Rotary spearheaded the drive to end polio, and Rotary will complete it. Encourage your district leaders to designate leftover District Designated Funds (DDF) for polio eradication, so we can finish the job.

As an engineer, I have been proud to see my blueprints transformed into great structures and facilities. But perhaps I am even prouder of how together in Rotary we have engineered a better world — measurably, step by step, project by project. In Rotary, we can all be engineers of hope, building a better future for the next generation.

ROTARIAN CODE OF CONDUCT

3. Use my professional skills through Rotary to: mentor young people, help those with special needs, and improve people's quality of life in my community and in the world

5. Help maintain a harassment-free environment in Rotary meetings, events, and activities, report any suspected harassment, and help ensure non-retaliation to those individuals that report harassment.

Rotary members honored as Champions of Girls' Empowerment

Six Rotary members were honored in March as People of Action: Champions of Girls' Empowerment during Rotary Day with UNICEF in New York City. This distinction recognizes the honorees' commitment to improving girls' access to education, health, and sanitation and hygiene resources, as well as their work to create environments where girls can flourish. Empowering Girls is one of RI President Shekhar Mehta's key initiatives, and he is encouraging clubs and districts to make it a focus of their service projects this year.



Elaine Ruiz

Rotary Club of Senador Guimard, Brazil

Ruiz is the director of Sewing the Future, a project that offers professional training to young women in the criminal justice system. It prepares girls to become seamstresses, artisans, and service workers, which helps them find work after they're released and reduces their chances of being convicted of crimes again. Ruiz serves as a liaison between the girls and the justice system and plays an integral part in establishing financial partnerships in the community.

omtaz Chowdhury

tary Club of Dhaka Mavericks, Bangladesh

Chowdhury is vice president of the Institution for Shelter, Training, and Development of Underprivileged Girls in Dhaka, Bangladesh, which provides housing, food, and education for girls through secondary school. The organization offers vocational training and, when the girls graduate, job placement assistance. Chowdhury has also helped girls through the international development organization BRAC and her family's own educational philanthropy projects. Chowdhury believes that instilling leadership and entrepreneurial skills in girls benefits them as well as their communities, which is why she works with banks to provide flexible loans for female entrepreneurs. She also collaborates with banks to provide small-business aid to women who have lost their jobs because of the COVID-19 pandemic.



Mildred Fragante

Rotary Club of Cubao Metro Aurora, Philippines

Fragante has worked hard throughout her career to raise awareness of abuse of women and children. She was a producer for *Women's Desk* (later known as *Draw the Line*), a national TV program that collaborated with the Philippine government's Women and Children Protection Center on stories about domestic abuse. Fragante also founded Aurora, a resource and education program that works to empower girls, and Reconnect, which pairs journalists and authors with survivors of abuse so that the writers can better tell these stories. As president of her club in 2018-19, she secured a Rotary Foundation global grant to renovate a community shelter for abused girls.

Srinidhi S U

Rotaract Club of Swarna Bengaluru, India

Srinidhi S U has devoted his efforts in Rotaract to the health needs of women and girls in his community. He served as the project chair for a menstrual hygiene management session in 2018 and later founded Project Sthree to address women's health concerns, including menstrual hygiene, thyroid and breast cancer, and HPV, in and around Bengaluru. The initiative also provides leadership and safety training. He has participated in District 3190's Red Dot Talks, which encourage men to discuss menstrual issues. His work has given more than 5,000 girls a greater awareness of menstrual hygiene.



Lydiah Njoroge

Rotary Club of Kiambu, Kenya

Njoroge is the manager of the Freedom for Girls program at Health Education Africa Resource Team (HEART), which has directly affected the lives of almost 300,000 girls in Kenya and other parts of East Africa by providing hygiene products to keep them healthy and in school. Njoroge has conducted extensive research on how menstrual concerns affect girls' access to education. She has worked with Rotary clubs in the U.S. and Kenya and with Procter & Gamble's Always Keeping Girls in School initiative; she facilitates relationships with program partners to provide girls with resources and help them get an education. The Freedom for Girls program has reached girls in more than 500 schools and trained over 10,000 teachers in mentoring female students.

Motalib Weijters

Rotary Club of Uden, The Netherlands

As a child adopted by Dutch parents, Weijters knew very little about his biological family or about life in their home country of Bangladesh. In 1994, he reconnected with them and saw the needs of people in their community. While in Bangladesh, he worked on water and sanitation projects and later founded a clinic for mothers and children. He also established a cervical and breast cancer treatment center that offers services to women and girls in need. These initiatives have helped more than 21,000 people. The clinics are financially supported by nongovernmental organizations and Rotary clubs in the Netherlands and Bangladesh.

MEMBERSHIP DEVELOPMENT

Dear Rotary leaders,

Rotary International staff and your regional leaders are here to support you during your time as a club or district leader. We'd like to share some information about the process of managing membership leads through My Rotary that will help you to achieve your membership goals.

Each year, more than 30,000 people express an interest in Rotary at rotary.org/join. This is a convenient, secure way for them to take the first step toward membership and start building a lasting connection with Rotary. The Manage Membership Leads page on My Rotary connects you with these prospective members, as well as returning and relocating members and candidates referred by our members.

Each of you play an important role connecting with these candidates. The most important thing you can do is establish a process for managing leads, or become familiar with our recommended process for [club](#) and [district](#) leaders.

District governors: Making a district plan for responding to leads is crucial so you can make sure that every candidate is contacted. You'll be copied on email notifications about leads that are assigned to your district. Empower your **district membership chair** to check for leads regularly, take action to learn more about them, and assign them to clubs. It's one of their primary responsibilities, and they receive training in how to manage online leads and cultivate relationships with prospective members.

Assistant governors: You'll receive email notifications only when a candidate is assigned to a club in your group. Because you work closely with a smaller number of clubs, you have a better understanding of the different club experiences and can advise the district membership chair on what each of your clubs has to offer candidates.

District Rotaract representatives: You'll receive an email notification when a candidate is assigned to a Rotaract club in your district. As liaison between Rotaract clubs and your district, you have a deep knowledge of the various expressions of Rotaract available in your region. Work with your district membership chair to connect candidates with Rotaract clubs that will be responsive and help your club leaders adopt effective lead management practices.

District membership chairs: You and the district governor will receive email notifications about membership leads, but you are in the best position to manage or delegate this process. If your role has been reported to Rotary and you have an active My Rotary account, you can go to [Manage Membership Leads](#) to review leads, contact candidates to learn about their needs and interests, assign them to clubs, and follow up with club leaders. Consult with other district leaders who know clubs in the candidates' area well, including assistant governors, the district Rotaract chair, and the district Rotaract representative, before you assign the candidate to a Rotary or Rotaract club.

Club leaders: If your club is ready to welcome candidates, make sure you tell your district membership chair, assistant governor or district Rotaract leaders that you're interested in being assigned membership leads. When you receive an email notification that a lead has been assigned to you, it indicates that district leaders believe your club will be a good match for that candidate. Go to your [Manage Membership Leads](#) page to learn more about and contact these prospective members. Contacting them does not promise them membership in your club or Rotary. But it does signal to that person — a member of your community — that Rotary cares and is interested in learning how we can engage with them. Make sure each candidate's experience with Rotary is a positive one, regardless of whether they join your club.

THE ROTARY FOUNDATION CREATES CHANNEL FOR DIRECT HUMANITARIAN SUPPORT IN UKRAINE REGION



In response to the deepening humanitarian crisis in Ukraine, The Rotary Foundation has created an official channel for Rotary members around the world to contribute funds to support the relief efforts underway by Rotary districts and has designated its Disaster Response Fund as the main avenue for contributions:

- Now through **30 June 2022**, designated Rotary districts that border Ukraine and the Rotary district in Ukraine may apply for grants of up to \$50,000 each from the Disaster Response Fund. These expedited disaster response grants can be used to provide relief to refugees or other victims of the crisis, including items such as water, food, shelter, medicine, and clothing.
- Also through **30 June**, other impacted Rotary districts that wish to offer support to refugees or other victims of the crisis in their district can apply for \$25,000 grants from the Disaster Response Fund.
- Now through **30 April 2022**, Rotary districts can transfer unallocated District Designated Funds (DDF) to the Disaster Response Fund, directly supporting these Ukraine-specific humanitarian grants.
- Contributions to the Disaster Response Fund in support of Ukraine can be made at my.rotary.org/disaster-response-fund. All funds need to be received into the Disaster Response Fund by **30 April 2022** in order to qualify for use in support of the Ukrainian relief efforts.
- Although the Disaster Response Fund will be the main avenue for Rotary Foundation support, Rotary and Rotaract clubs are also encouraged to create their own responses to the humanitarian crisis in Ukraine.

In addition to providing support through the Disaster Response Fund, the Foundation is coordinating with partners and regional leaders, exploring effective solutions to the increased humanitarian needs:

- We are in contact with the International Rescue Committee and UNHCR, the United Nations refugee agency, to prepare our response to the needs of those being displaced within Ukraine and to neighboring countries.
- ShelterBox, our project partner for disaster response, is in communication with Rotary members in Central Europe to explore how it can offer assistance with temporary transitional housing and essential supplies.
- The Rotary Action Group for Refugees, Forced Displacement, and Migration is also mobilizing its resources to assist in this crisis.
