It's a special form of ingenuity to consider how people who are seemingly very different can, in fact, share our values and have some of those same talents, just waiting to be unleashed.

It's time for Rotary to take our next step in advancing diversity, equity, and inclusion (DEI) across our organization.

Embracing an experience where people feel included is more than just making our membership numbers more diverse. It's about making our meetings and events places where we can speak openly and honestly with each other, where our members feel welcome and safe. This means removing barriers for entry and opening doors for inclusion. Our values remain our strength — and our commitment to excel-

lence requires us to maintain high standards for our members as well.

I believe we are all determined to advance DEI across Rotary. This is rooted in the deepest traditions of our organization, and it will ensure that we remain vibrant and relevant for decades to come.

A few years ago, our Rotary Board set the ambitious goal of increasing the share of female members to 30 percent by 2023. We have less than a year to go, but I believe we can meet and exceed this target.

We need Rotary leaders to rise from every continent, culture, and creed. We need young members and young thinkers to take on larger roles and responsibilities. We need to listen to new Rotary members just as keenly, and with as much respect, as those with many years of membership.

During our recent convention in Houston, we heard from astronauts about their journeys into space. We reflected upon a time in the 1960s when U.S. President John F. Kennedy urged the world to dream, with his declaration that we would “go to the moon [and do] other things, not because they are easy but because they are hard.”

Fully committing Rotary to DEI and meeting our ambitious membership targets may seem as unlikely as a moon shot. But I know that when people of action are committed to a big goal, we make it worth every ounce of our energy.

TRUSTEE CHAIR'S MESSAGE

Two sides of the same coin

During my travels, Rotary often comes up in conversation. Most people associate us with local projects and fundraisers — which is great — but few know what a global force Rotary is. It's easier to understand this aspect of Rotary through an example, such as how Rotary responded to the devastating bushfires in Australia in late 2019 and early 2020.

The result of extreme drought, global warming, and adverse weather conditions, the fires caused catastrophic damage. The need for help was obvious and substantial.

No stranger to forest fires themselves, Canadian Rotarians knew the best way to help was through The Rotary Foundation. They were soon joined by Rotary clubs and districts in other countries and Taiwan, resulting in three Foundation global grants totaling \$280,000 to support the economic recovery of farmers affected by these fires.

One farmer wrote a letter of thanks on behalf of the remote communities we helped, saying they “were in disbelief that Rotary clubs from other countries would step up and help our relatively small farming region” and adding that “they were very grateful and honored to be considered worthy of such aid.”

Friends, this is the kind of impact your Foundation has every single day around the world and why it deserves the support of all Rotary members.

The most significant projects done in Rotary's name are those accomplished through The Rotary Foundation. The list goes on and on. Think of the impact of our polio eradication efforts, our peace education programs, and our Programs of Scale grants. All these efforts to make the world a better place emanate from our Foundation.

The Foundation also impacts our club experience, membership, partnerships, and so much more. The more visibility and impact we have through Foundation projects, the more people want to be part of what we are doing as partners or as members. Everybody wins.

To me, Rotary and its Foundation are inseparable — you can't have one without the other. They are two sides of the same coin. I love the friendship and fellowship and projects I experience as a member of the Rotary Club of Sandringham, Australia, but I am also thrilled to be part of a global movement that is changing the lives of countless people through The Rotary Foundation.

Remember that other side of the Rotary coin and support your Foundation. By doing so, you will also be supporting your fellow members who are bringing to life the projects our world truly needs.

BRING ON THE BREWS

Event: Boji Brew Fest

More than 20 local and regional craft breweries, wineries, and distilleries are participating in this fifth annual beer festival. VIP ticket holders get an extra hour of sampling before the fest opens, as well as exclusive access to special offerings. To complement the bounty of beverages, food trucks will be on site.

DAS IST GUT!

Event: DAS Run

Host: Rotary Club of Elkhorn, Wisconsin

What it benefits: Local charities

Date: 6 August

The Elkhorn club has organized this Saturday morning 5K to kick off the second day of DAS Fest USA, a three-day German festival held annually in Elkhorn. All runners get an event T-shirt, a

goodie bag, and a free beer at the festival, and the top finishers in each age group will receive an award. The event includes activities for kids.

CATCH A WHOPPER

Event: King Mackerel Tournament

Host: Rotary Club of Sneads Ferry, North Carolina

In its 31st year, this fishing tournament awards \$40,000 in prizes, with a hefty \$10,000 cash prize going to the boat that catches the heaviest king mackerel. DON'T MISS THE BOAT

Event: Belfast Harbor Fest

There's something for everyone at this annual festival that celebrates the boating traditions of Maine. Highlights include the 5K Bug Run/Walk (named after a local moniker for lobsters), a boat building competition, a cardboard boat regatta, a blueberry pancake breakfast, and a barbecue dinner. Musical acts will entertain attendees, and activities have been planned for kids. Proceeds from an auction will benefit a local technical education center.

STATE OF THE ART

Event: Fine Art in the Park

Host: Rotary Club of Los Altos, California

What it benefits: Scholarships and local and international projects

Dates: 13-14 August

As one of California's most prestigious outdoor art shows, this 47th annual event

expects to draw more than 10,000 attendees to Lincoln Park in Los Altos. Under the park's redwood trees, more than 100 artists from around the United States will display and sell paintings, sculptures, jewelry, textiles, glass, metalwork, and ceramics. A separate "Young at Art" display showcases works by local high school students.

It's easy being green

How to make your club more eco-friendly

Joey O'Brien is an unlikely eco-warrior. For about 25 years, he ran a ski resort in Nova Scotia. The property was so densely utilized that whenever someone suggested increasing the ski terrain, O'Brien would quip, "We have four trees left on our property — which one do you want me to cut down?"

But O'Brien has always been a big fan of data, and owing to his livelihood, he spent a lot of time tracking the weather to gauge potential snowfall. In the process he observed something alarming: Temperatures were rising at an unprecedented rate.

Nearly two decades ago, O'Brien moved to Canmore, a town in the Bow Valley of Alberta's Rocky Mountains, 50 miles west of Calgary, where he became acquainted with some climate scientists who further stoked his concern about global warming. He was one of the first in town to install solar panels on his roof, and later launched his own environmental consulting company, SustainDriven. When O'Brien joined the Rotary Club of Canmore, club leaders made him one of their experts on sustainability, and he was later nominated to join the international board of the Environmental Sustainability Rotary Action Group.

He offers these suggestions to help you make your club more eco-friendly. — STEVE ALMOND



START AT HOME

To benefit your wallet as well as the planet, install solar panels, insulation, and geo-thermal heating — improvements that are often aided by government grants and tax breaks. Your club can also help insulate and upgrade houses for neighbors in need.

BANISH BOTTLED WATER

It takes a lot of plastic and CO₂ to move bottled water from its source to your house or Rotary event — and blind taste tests often reveal that tap water tastes as good or better.

REDUCE, REUSE, RETHINK

Launch a regional composting campaign. More and more cities have them — does yours? They reduce the production of climate-harming methane and the volume of landfills. And try thrifting. O'Brien says their grandkids can't wait to see what recycled clothes his wife has bought them, often for just a few dollars each.

SPREAD THE WORD ABOUT HYBRID, PLUG-IN, AND ELECTRIC VEHICLES

Most people don't realize transportation is the leading cause of greenhouse gases in the United States. While switching to electric requires a higher upfront investment, it can save you thousands of dollars in gas and substantially reduces greenhouse gas emissions, with no loss of space or comfort.



THINK OUTSIDE THE (PENALTY) BOX

Look for opportunities to advocate for sustainability in places that might not seem obvious. Case in point: A couple of years ago, O'Brien convinced the local junior hockey franchise, the Canmore Eagles, to sign on to the town's declaration of a State of Climate Emergency, to work toward zero waste, and to educate players and fans. The team's decision to brand itself as the "Greenest Hockey Club in the World" has become a key feature in its marketing to sponsors, helping to make it profitable as well as ecologically responsible.

DON'T ARGUE — EDUCATE

In Alberta, where carbon-heavy industries are a major employer and economic engine, O'Brien's environmental initiatives often provoke a negative reaction. Even a discussion about climate change runs the risk of backlash. So O'Brien created a nine-part educational pathway for his club and invited guest speakers to explain the environmental science. A few club members left the meetings in protest, and others tolerated the presentations without changing their worldview. But the vast majority, once they understood the situation, supported the club's efforts.

KEEP HOPE ALIVE

O'Brien says the biggest challenge Rotary clubs face is the sheer scope of the crisis. "Rotarians worry that they'll never actually effect change," he observes, "which is often what prevents a club and individuals from doing anything." Saving the planet will have to be a collective endeavor, he says, accomplished not by a single sweeping measure, but through billions of small actions.

TAKE CONCRETE ACTION

Otherwise, O'Brien says, "you will be looking at your grandchildren in 20 years and trying to explain why you chose to do nothing."

20% Discount, But Why?

The Philippines celebrated the 43rd National Disability Prevention and Rehabilitation Week and in line with such celebration, the Rotary Club of Cebu Fuente (RCCF) and the Rotary Club of Cebu Guadalupe

(RCCG) catered a forum on the Rights and Privileges of Persons with Disability and the Signs and Symptoms of Autism. The event was widely attended by the heads of the various barangay PWD organization of Cebu City.

Atty. Bernardino T. Amago IV has shed light on the Perks of Being Special under the mandate of Republic Act No. 7277, as amended, or the Magna Carta for Persons with Disability (PWDs). One of the essential features of the said legislation is the granting of twenty percent (20%) discount to our PWDs vis-a-vis the VAT exemption



of certain transactions. It must be noted that the intention of the law is for the State and the private sector to fully support the improvement of the total well-being of the PWDs and their integration into the mainstream of society. Granting them these privileges among others, as well as, penalizing ridicule and vilification against them, will significantly contribute to realizing the noble ends of the Magna Carta.

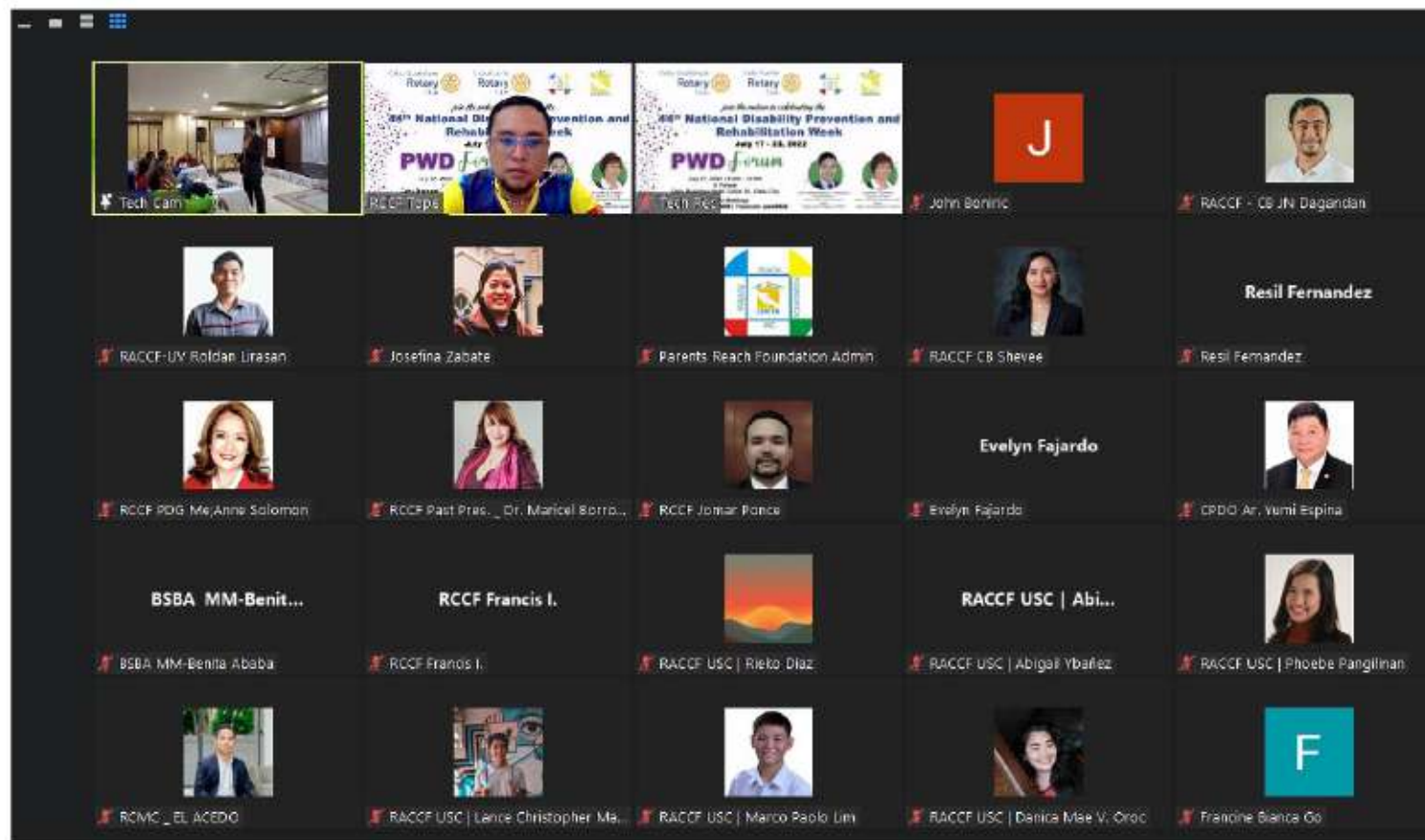


Placing a perspective on the application of the PWDs' rights to children with autism spectrum disorder (ASD), Reach Center Directress, Sandra Espina enlightened the eager audience on the necessity of early detection and intervention for a

productive future of the child and the family living with autism. There are several tells to ASD and it is imperative that individuals, especially family members and school and LGU personnel, must be mindful of these signs and symptoms of autism on children so they can immediately refer the child to an expert for proper diagnosis.

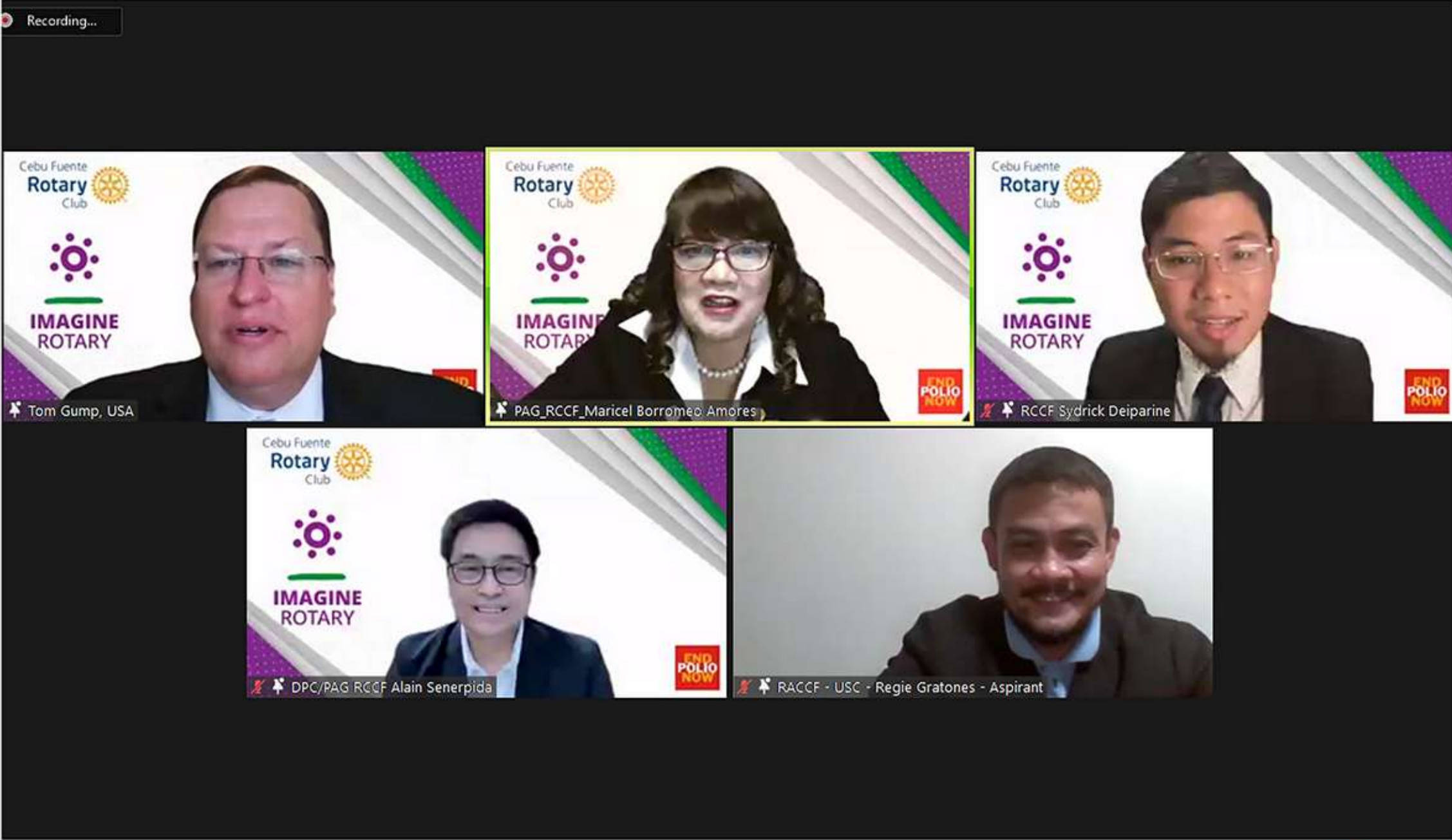
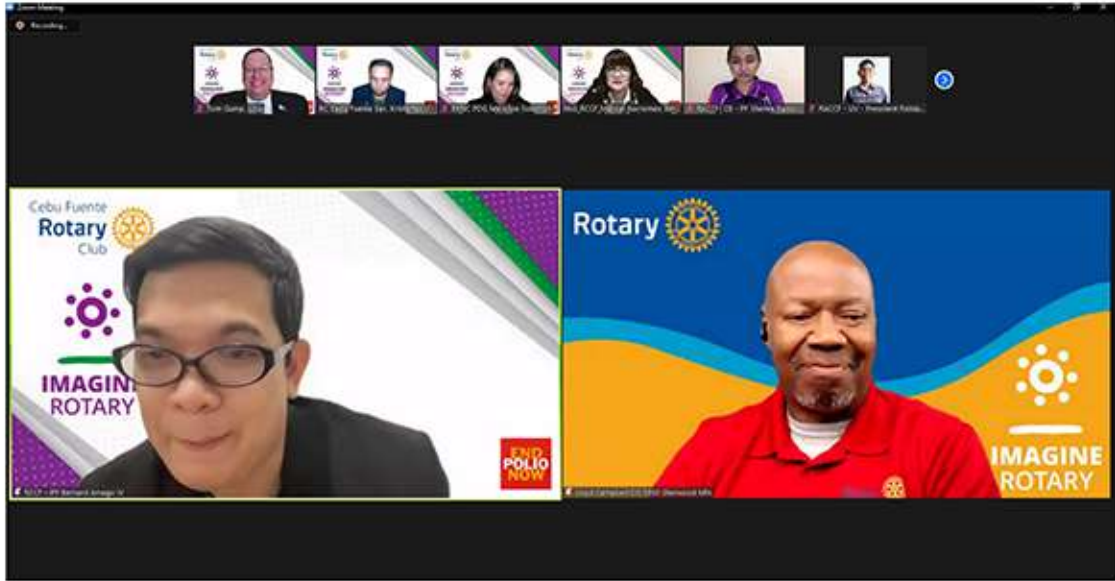
The REACH Center is run by The Parent's Foundation, Inc., an empowered, self-reliant,

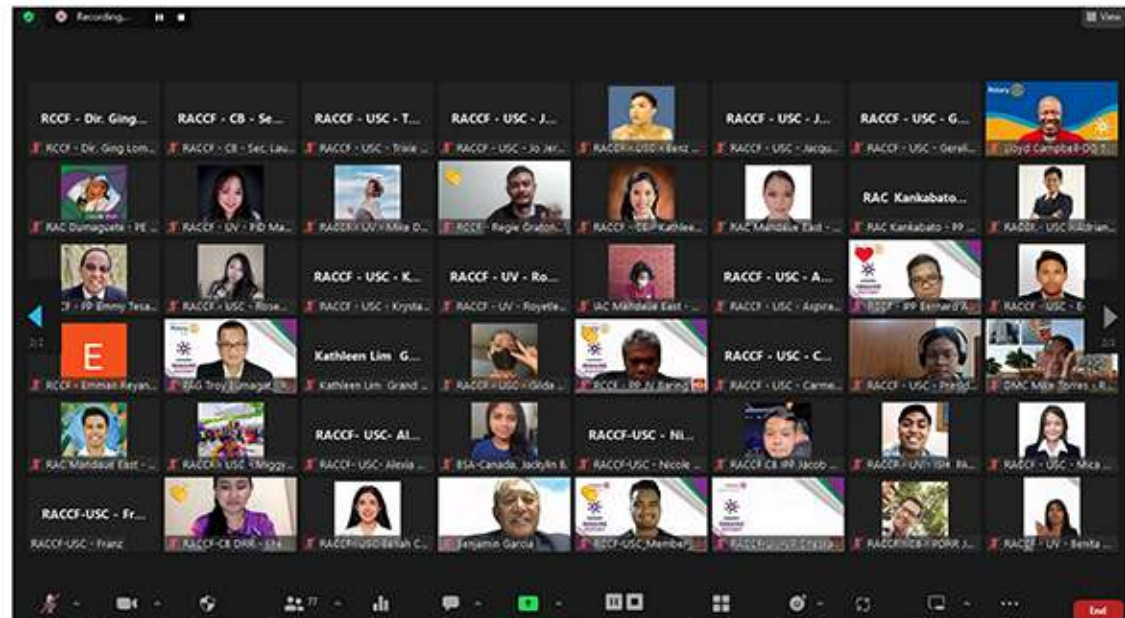
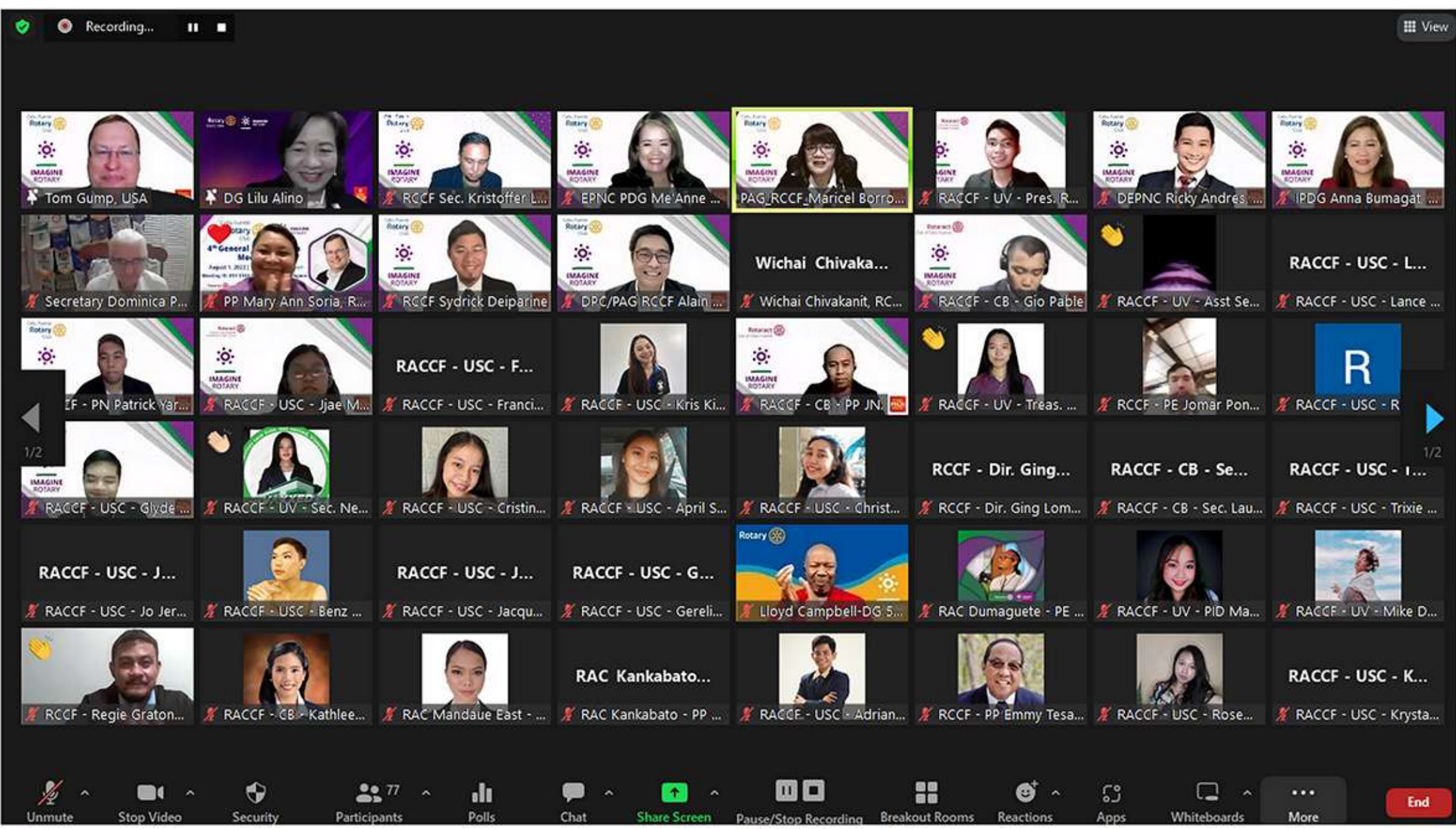
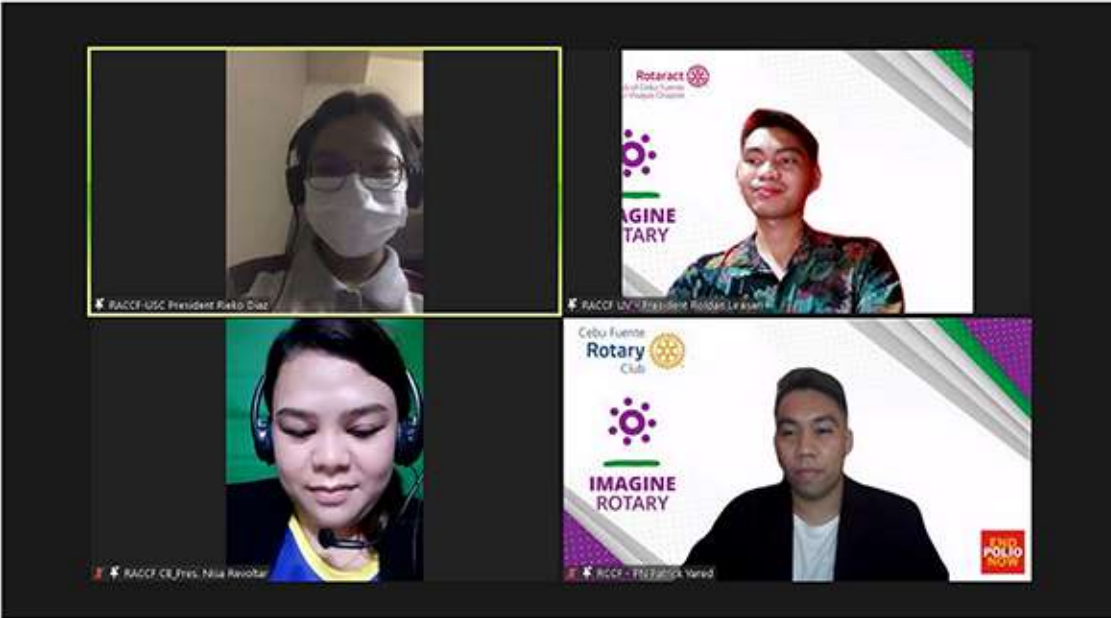

ROTARIAN CODE OF CONDUCT

The following code of conduct has been adopted for the use of Rotarians:

As a Rotarian, I will

1. Act with integrity and high ethical standards in my personal and professional life
2. Deal fairly with others and treat them and their occupations with respect
3. Use my professional skills through Rotary to: mentor young people, help those with special needs, and improve people's quality of life in my community and in the world
4. Avoid behavior that reflects adversely on Rotary or other Rotarians
5. Help maintain a harassment-free environment in Rotary meetings, events, and activities, report any suspected harassment, and help ensure non-retaliation to those individuals that report harassment.
