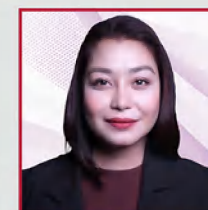



The spirit of connection and purpose should inspire every Rotary member. When club leaders focus on offering an excellent club experience, we retain

more members and attract more prospective members. We must make our clubs as welcoming and as engaging as we can.

Our goal is to create a sense of belonging, from our club meetings to our service activities. We need to continue creating inclusive, welcoming environments where everyone can be their authentic selves. All people of action need to be able to imagine a place for themselves in Rotary — it's up to us to ensure they can do so.

Over the next year, I will be putting a focus on continuing our journey in diversity, equity, and inclusion — ensuring that Rotary reflects the communities we serve and continues to take significant steps toward accessing the full range of human talents and experiences, so that we can better serve humanity. And we will continue to empower women and girls by helping them unlock the potential already within them.

As we begin this journey together, I take inspiration from Scotland's national poet, Robert Burns, who in the 18th century spoke of all the world becoming kin, promoting "sense and worth, over all the earth." This has long been my call to action, and I share it now with you.

Let us build peace within and spread it freely. Let us create belonging and imagine the future of Rotary afresh. Let us work together joyously and *Create Hope in the World*.

TRUSTEE CHAIR'S MESSAGE

Audacious goals

I love Rotary for many reasons, perhaps most of all for the impact we make when we work together. There is really no other group like us.

In the last five years, The Rotary Foundation has helped 100 million beneficiaries. That is staggering.

But the need is great. There are countless more we could be reaching and supporting right now if we had the resources. We could reach twice as many in the next five years. And your fellow Rotaractors and Rotarians are ready to help. They're hungry for more grants to help more people who need us.

That's why, this year, The Rotary Foundation Trustees have set an ambitious goal for giving of \$500 million, our highest ever.

This breaks down to \$150 million for the Annual Fund to help fund grants and \$50 million for polio eradication, to be matched 2 to 1 by \$100 million from the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation. For the Endowment Fund and our future, we are targeting \$60 million in outright giving and \$80 million in commitments, totaling \$140 million. And we want to collect \$60 million in other contributions, such as direct giving, cash for global grants, and Disaster Response Fund donations.

To make this happen, we need all of you — each and every Rotarian and Rotaractor.

Did you know that over 80 percent of Rotary members make no contributions to PolioPlus, or that over 60 percent make no donation at all to The Rotary Foundation? For an organization of 1.4 million members, that means that nearly 1 million of us are not contributing each year.

Imagine the tremendous difference it would make if each of those 1 million could contribute just \$25 a year. That would be \$25 million we wouldn't need to raise from our best donors.

We can all give something. That's why I am asking each of you to set a goal to give what you can to The Rotary Foundation this year.

Never have we set such an audacious goal, but I believe that you, who make up Rotary, always respond to a challenge, especially when you see the difference we can make with those funds. We are part of an audacious organization, one that dreams big and makes our dreams a reality.

Let's think bigger and differently this year, so we can meet our goal and do more to *Create Hope in the World*. In this way, we will make the Rotary year ahead an unforgettable one, not just for ourselves, but most importantly, for those whose lives we will soon touch.

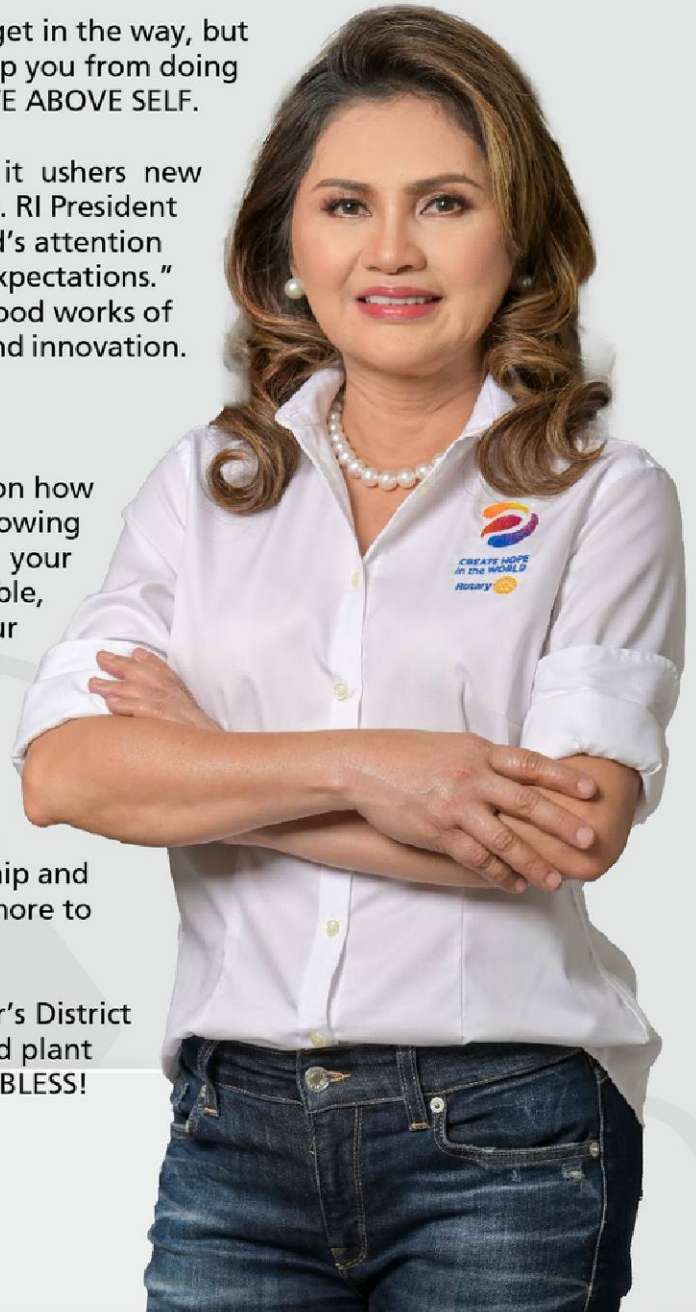

THE OBJECT OF ROTARY

The Object of Rotary is to encourage and foster the ideal of service as a basis of worthy enterprise and, in particular, to encourage and foster:

SECOND. High ethical standards in business and professions, the recognition of the worthiness of all useful occupations, and the dignifying of each Rotarian's occupation as an opportunity to serve society;

THIRD. The application of the ideal of service in each Rotarian's personal, business, and community life;

FOURTH. The advancement of international understanding, goodwill, and peace through a world fellowship of business and professional persons united in the ideal of service.

ROTARIAN CODE OF CONDUCT

**The following code of conduct has been adopted for the use of Rotarians:
As a Rotarian, I will**

- 1.) Act with integrity and high ethical standards in my personal and professional life
- 2.) Deal fairly with others and treat them and their occupations with respect
- 3.) Use my professional skills through Rotary to: mentor young people, help those with special needs, and improve people's quality of life in my community and in the world
- 4.) Avoid behavior that reflects adversely on Rotary or other Rotarians
- 5.) Help maintain a harassment-free environment in Rotary meetings, events, and activities, report any suspected harassment, and help ensure non-retaliation to those individuals that report harassment.

How to apply for a global grant

GLOBAL GRANTS SUPPORT large international activities with measurable, sustainable outcomes in Rotary's areas of focus. They can fund humanitarian projects, scholarships for graduate-level academic studies, and vocational training teams, which are groups of professionals who travel abroad to teach local professionals about their field or to learn more about it themselves.

By working together to respond to a community's priority needs for service projects, clubs and districts strengthen their global partnerships.

HOW ARE GLOBAL GRANTS FUNDED?

The grants have a minimum budget of \$30,000 and a maximum World Fund award of \$400,000. Grant sponsors can use a combination of District Designated Funds, cash, and/or directed gifts and endowment earnings to fund a global grant. The Rotary Foundation will provide an 80 percent World Fund match for all District Designated Fund contributions. There is no minimum World Fund match.



HOW DO WE GET QUALIFIED?

Two partnering groups must become qualified before applying for a global grant: the district or club in the country where the activity is carried out and the international partner district or club. Your club and district Rotary Foundation chairs can help you plan how to use your District Designated Funds and learn how to qualify your club.



HOW DO WE SUBMIT AN APPLICATION?

To receive approval for a global grant, your application must clearly describe how your project, scholarship, or vocational training team:

- Demonstrates sustainability, by including plans for long-term success after you spend the grant funds
- Includes measurable goals
- Aligns with the goals of one of Rotary's areas of focus
- Identifies community needs, by conducting a community assessment first and designing a humanitarian or vocational training project based on what you learn
- Actively involves Rotary and community members
- Meets the eligibility requirements in the grant terms and conditions

Consult with local experts early in the planning process to build a strong project plan and global grant application. Applications are accepted throughout the year and reviewed as they're received.

Note: For scholars who will begin studies in August, September, or October, sponsoring clubs and districts must submit their applications by 30 June.

HOW IS THE GRANT MONITORED AND EVALUATED?

Measuring outcomes is an integral part of global grant-funded projects. Proper monitoring and reporting ensure that Rotary grants have a positive effect.

Rotary Foundation grants

The Rotary Foundation offers grants that support a variety of projects, scholarships, and training that Rotary members are working on around the world.

DISTRICT GRANTS

District grants fund small-scale, short-term activities that address needs where you live and in communities abroad.

GLOBAL GRANTS

Global grants support large international activities with measurable, sustainable outcomes in Rotary's areas of focus.

PROGRAMS OF SCALE GRANTS

The Foundation awards Programs of Scale grants to Rotary or Rotaract clubs or districts that have demonstrated evidence-based interventions in one of the areas of focus. The grants fund large-scale, high-impact projects that attract partners while tapping into Rotary members' capacity and enthusiasm.

DISASTER RESPONSE GRANTS

Disaster response grants support relief and recovery efforts in areas affected by natural disasters.



Stories of service from around the world

All-female crew builds a home with Habitat for Humanity

Prior to May 2023, my main construction experience consisted of building an Adirondack chair 28 years ago for a Father's Day gift.

But there I was at a Habitat for Humanity Southeastern Virginia construction site, wearing a blue hard hat and safety goggles as I carefully ran boards through a table saw. I passed the boards to other female Rotarians helping to build a house.

Kudos go to Rotary International President Jennifer E. Jones for inspiring my foray into home construction. Hearing our first female international president speak last summer at the Rotary International Convention in Houston made me ponder ways to empower other women in my club.

I'm the ninth female president of the 109-year-old Rotary Club of Norfolk, which is 70% male. I'm happy that the men and women in our club frequently work side-by-side to benefit our area food bank and other key nonprofits. And yet, inspired by Jennifer, I longed for a tangible service project led by women. Habitat's third-annual Women Build project in southeastern Virginia was the perfect opportunity to engage female Rotarians.

Inviting Habitat's executive director to speak at a club meeting led to us awarding a \$5,000 club grant for the Women Build project in nearby Chesapeake, Virginia. Our speaker stressed that home ownership gives families stability, which leads to adults engaged in their communities and children succeeding in school and life. Since 1988, Habitat volunteers have constructed 243 homes for lower-income families in southeastern Virginia. One house each year is usually built by women.

After Habitat selected our club for the 2023 Women Build project, I recruited a team including current and past Rotary board members, one new Rotarian, and my identical twin sister (a Rotary spouse). Our ages spanned several decades. The group included current and retired professionals, a working mother of two toddlers, and grandmothers. We had little to no construction experience but were eager to learn and help.

The eight of us were among 200 Virginia women working in teams to successfully build a four-bedroom, 1,500-square-foot house in 12 days. Like all Habitat homeowners, our recipient family is donating at least 200 hours of sweat equity to Habitat and is responsible for paying off an affordable home mortgage.

The family moving into our house is headed by a couple who emigrated to Virginia from Morocco 10 years ago and became U.S. citizens. The husband works at a shipyard while his wife studies cybersecurity at a local community college. The family lives in a cramped, two-bedroom apartment with their 8-year-old son and 6-year-old daughter. Soon, they will move and welcome a baby to their spacious new home.

As the mom of three children, I understand the parents' excitement about owning a new home with plenty of room for their growing family to spread out and thrive.

During construction, our Rotary team experienced all of coastal Virginia's spring weather – cold, rain, wind, heat, and sunshine. But, with a deadline looming, our work never stopped. We started with a safety briefing and divided into teams of two and three. Each team had an experienced Habitat volunteer teach us to accurately measure boards, safely cut them to the right lengths, and use nail guns to secure them to a frame. After our training, the experienced volunteers stepped back and let us do our jobs.

We worked seamlessly, supporting each other as we measured, sawed, and nailed. Our group ended up feeling energized despite hoisting heavy boards and pounding nails with nail guns that weighed more than I would have guessed. We learned new skills, got to know each other better, and put Service Above Self into action.

Now I'm back to my normal work at Eastern Virginia Medical School in Norfolk. As director of community engagement, the main tool I wield is a computer. But I relish my Habitat construction experience and thank Jennifer Jones for all she does for Rotary International – and for being my role model.

Maybe it's time to build another Adirondack chair.
