

Mental health and your club

Dear fellow Rotary members, The World Health Organization designates 10 October as World Mental Health Day, and with Rotary placing a special focus on mental health this year, I would like to help answer the question posed to me most often when I travel to meet members: How can my club get started?

There are some wonderful examples of Rotary members taking action already. In the Philippines, the Rotary Club of Tiaong-Hiyas held a 12-week health challenge for mothers in the community to promote some baseline health screenings and coaching on a healthier lifestyle.

By the end of the challenge, the mothers had a special bond and decided to form a Rotary Community Corps called Ilaw ng Tahanan (“one who lights up the home”) with the goal of involving more mothers in health education and wellness support — and later youth services, teen pregnancy prevention, and help with unhealthy substance use. Almost a year later, the RCC is preparing to open its own health center where mothers can come for peer-to-peer support.

Another strong example is in Colorado. In the fall of 2021, a small group of stakeholders from the Rotary Club of Highlands Ranch formed the Rotary Clubs of Colorado Endowed Fellowship for Pediatric Mental Health, which enhances the ability of Children’s Hospital Colorado to recruit and train pediatric psychiatry providers and allows the hospital network to make additional appointments. This increases access to mental health care for children and decreases provider shortages.

Since then, the project has brought on new supporters and is now fully funded with a \$500,000

endowment. Investment income from this endowment will support a fellow — a psychologist or psychiatrist — at Children’s Hospital. A new fellow will be named every one to two years, beginning spring of 2024. Over time this will create a cohort to bolster the mental health workforce, treating kids from all 64 Colorado counties and neighboring states.

There are many more great mental health project stories on Rotary Showcase, and I invite you to share your experiences as you begin your own projects. Also, please reach out to mindhealth@rotary.org with any thoughts or ideas you would like to share about mental health in the Rotary world.

On 10 October, I will host a Facebook Live event when we will recognize World Mental Health Day and further explore how Rotary members can begin this journey. But I would like to leave you with one way every Rotary member can make a difference.

Right now, there is someone you know in the Rotary world — in your club, from a project you’ve worked on, in a Rotary Fellowship or Rotary Action Group — who could use a little more of your time and attention. Rotary is this great gift of global friendship, and that also means being there for each other.

Discovering the human connections that bind us is what we do through our membership every day. It’s what Rotary has always been about, and we can build on it by helping each other find peace at home.

We need to learn how to ask not just “How are you?” but also “How are you really?” By doing so, Rotary can continue to *Create Hope in the World*.

TRUSTEE CHAIR'S MESSAGE

Our goal is in sight

On 24 October, we renew our commitment to our top humanitarian goal for World Polio Day.

This year, let's remember a young health worker in Pakistan known as Bibi Marjana (Miss Marjana). She braves the snow and cold in the mountains to vaccinate 84 children in rural areas, visiting each home, often miles apart.

Marjana is one of the thousands of frontline workers in Afghanistan, Pakistan, and outbreak areas I consider heroes in the final push to end polio. The work they do, coupled with the vision of our partners and the support you give, is moving mountains.

With Rotary's partnership, the Global Polio Eradication Initiative is aggressively pursuing two key goals from its 2022-26 strategy. First, we aim to halt wild poliovirus type 1 transmission. This year, only six cases have been documented as of this writing. Could this be the year we see the last of these poliovirus cases? We're cautiously optimistic that it might.

Second, we aim to report the final case of circulating vaccine-derived poliovirus type 2, or cVDPV2, in outbreak countries. About 80 percent of cVDPV2 cases last year occurred in subnational areas of the Democratic Republic of Congo, Nigeria, and Yemen. We must implement tailored strategies to stop the virus in these areas.

Other challenges persist, including

political tensions, security risks and access issues, and the lasting effect of the pandemic in Afghanistan and Pakistan.

Despite these challenges, we are making progress. Poliovirus strains are diminishing, as is the number of affected regions where polio once prevailed. A new vaccine we have introduced reduces the incidence of the circulating vaccine-derived virus type 2.

Rotary is the organization that had the audacity to take on a global effort to protect children everywhere from disability or even death due to polio. We must have the tenacity to see it to the finish line.

What can you do to help us get there, you ask? Join or initiate a PolioPlus Society in your club or district and engage all members in this historic moment. And don't forget that the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation continues to amplify Rotary's donations to polio eradication with a 2-to-1 match for every dollar.

You can also advocate the cause of polio eradication with governments to secure political and financial support and promote Rotary's leadership role in all media.

Like Marjana marching up the mountain, we have our goal in sight, and we will keep going until we get there.

District Governor's October Message

Dear Fellow Rotarians,

We begin the month of October with our advocacy on breast cancer awareness since this month is celebrated as International Breast Cancer Awareness Month dubbed as Pink October. I am so impressed with the ways the clubs commemorate it, and I am delighted to share with you that the City of Davao and the City of Dumaguete have already passed and approved a Resolution that starting this year and every year of every October, both cities will celebrate and support the campaign for Breast Cancer Awareness Program of Rotary.

I would also like to recognize and express my great appreciation for your fund-raising activities to raise funds to eradicate polio, but don't you forget that in Rotary it is also Economic and Community Development Month. It is one of the seven Areas of Focus that Rotary has asked all clubs to focus on this month of October.

Over the years, Rotarians have struggled hard to empower their communities. Every community has unique needs and concerns, and Rotary has countless ways to address them. One is to explore livelihood skills training opportunities for members of the community. Another is to improve their access to financial services by partnering with a local micro-lending organization in the locality and providing financial infrastructure in the community, including a job placement program.

In many developing countries, we see increased poverty, especially after the Covid-19 pandemic. Most of these deprived of livelihood are found in the rural areas. As Rotarians, we are in an ideal position to help them recover what they lost during the pandemic. Aside from creating livelihood skills training, you may opt to sponsor a person's career through an apprenticeship in your own business or through connections to other business or service organizations. Dole outs are discouraged since we don't want short-lived means of empowering people; we give them means that will sustain them through the years. That is economics, offering opportunities for people to be resources to their communities through networking activities. To develop community leaders that will help strengthen local entrepreneurs and help them establish their own small-scale businesses.

Rotarians should lead in developing communities through their various community service projects. Together, we empower them. Together, we give them hope, the best way to fulfill Rotary's motto of Service Above Self.

A new anthology of crime fiction raises funds for polio eradication

Lorraine Stevens had the motive and the means. All she needed were accomplices in her plot: publishing a collection of original crime fiction to raise money for the fight to end polio.

The idea for the anthology of short stories, published in July 2023 as "An Unnecessary Assassin," came to Stevens last year at a literary festival in Yorkshire, England. She'd recently learned about the poliovirus reappearing in Great Britain and was talking with friends about how upset she was by the news.

"I happened to mention that polio had been found in the sewers of London," says Stevens, a member of the Rotary Club of Scunthorpe, Humberside, England. "I found that quite disturbing. I had known polio was still around, but not as much as I went on to find out. One of my author friends said, 'Well, you know enough authors, Lorraine. Why don't you do an anthology and sell it for charity?'"

A former librarian who regularly attends crime-writing festivals, Stevens knew her friend was right. This was something she could do. She began asking authors she knew to donate stories for the book. Her first recruit was David Penny, the author of a well-regarded series of historical mysteries. He was eager to fight polio.

"Growing up in Wales in the '50s, polio was a major issue for us," Penny says. "This was just prior to the vaccine coming out, and it was pretty much everywhere. As a kid of six or seven, it was always on your mind. I knew people who were in leg braces or iron lungs — or who died from the disease. That stays with you. It becomes almost an embedded fear in you."

Penny helped Stevens assemble a diverse group of short stories and arranged to self-publish the book using Amazon's print-on-demand program. The pair were excited to receive two submissions specifically about polio. Gerralyn Ingram, who writes under the name G.L. Waring, used her story to channel her anger at both vaccine deniers and arrogant doctors. A former pediatric nurse, Ingram based the villain of "It Takes Three Drops" on doctors she'd encountered.

"They think they know everything, and their opinion is the only opinion that counts," she says. "In the story, basically, here's a doctor who thinks he's God... [and] who doesn't think that a woman can be equally as qualified and actually know better."

Among the book's highlights are stories by Ann Cleeves and Lee Child. Cleeves' contribution, "The Habit of Silence," is a detective story set in a distinguished library. In Child's "Safe Enough," a contractor working on a suburban lot begins stalking the lot's previous owner. Child interweaves his menacing tale with a critique of economic policies that hurt the working class.

Other stories feature a wide range of situations. Chris McGeorge's "Box" is a locked-room mystery set in a glass box 820 feet (250 meters) underwater. Robert Scragg's "Revenge is Best Served Hot" and F.D. Quinn's "Best Served Cold" each give a culinary twist to crime. Judith O'Reilly's "A Face for Murder" combines a whodunit with a satire of YouTube makeup tutorials.

Penny was delighted by the diversity of the stories.

"You don't want all the same thing," he says. "There's some funny stories, and there's some poignant ones in there."

Penny's own contribution, written as DG Penny, was based on an idea he'd been thinking about for several years: What are the consequences of trying to do the right thing? In "Drive By," Penny's protagonist tries to protect a victim of human trafficking and soon comes to regret it.

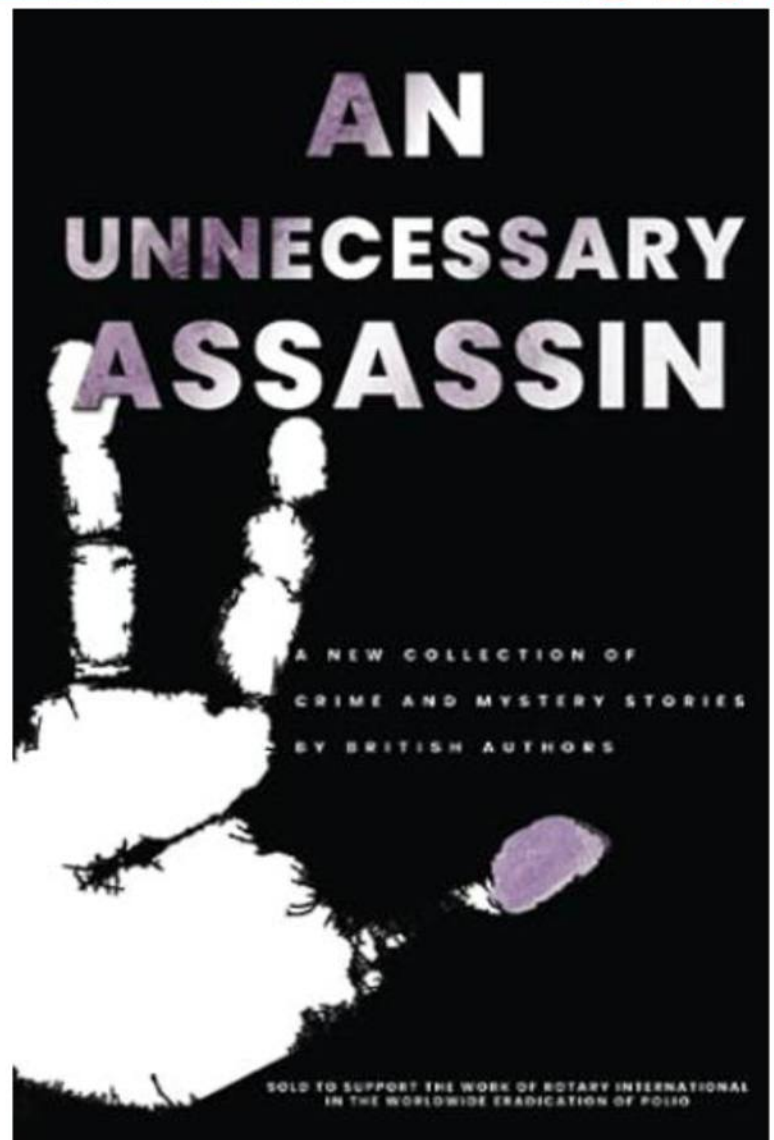
"An Unnecessary Assassin" also includes two poems. That's unusual for a crime anthology, but one of them further cements the book's link to polio. In "Surviving Relations," Jim Taylor describes a man who had polio as a child and now embraces a succession of dangerous pastimes. "He would never run. It didn't stop him doing what he wanted," Taylor writes. "Look him in the eyes, and he would look straight back, unwavering."

The anthology also references polio in its cover art, which is shaded purple, and in an afterword explaining the significance of the color. It's what is used to tint children's fingers at mass vaccination events to show that they've received the vaccine. The title refers to the fact that polio is preventable with a vaccine.

"We came up with all sorts of different ideas. There were probably over a dozen potential titles," Penny says. "This one won because of the alliteration."

The book is available in paperback and Kindle formats on Amazon. Stevens has also sold it at Rotary club meetings and crime-writing festivals all over Great Britain. It's raised more than US\$3,000 so far, and its proceeds will be matched 2-to-1 by the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation.

"The phrase 'An Unnecessary Assassin' kind of sums up the thing," Penny says. "Polio is totally an avoidable disease, provided there is enough money to immunize each child."
