THE 4-WAY TEST

One of the most widely printed and quoted statements of business ethics in the world is the Rotary 4-way test. It was created by Rotarian Herbert J. Taylor in 1932 where he was asked to take charge of a company that was facing bankruptcy Taylor looked for a way to save the struggling company mired in depression-caused financial difficulties. He drew up a 24-word code of ethics for all employees to follow their business and professional lives. The 4-Way Test became the guide for sales, production, advertising and all relations with dealers and customers, and the survival of the company is credited to this simple philosophy.

Herb Taylor became President of the Rotary International in 1954-55. The 4-Way Test was adopted by Rotary in 1943 and has been translated into more than a hundred languages and pub-

of the things we think, say or do.

- Is it the truth?
- Is it fair to all concerned?
- Will it build goodwill and better friendships?
- Will it be beneficial to all concerned?

OBJECT OF ROTARY

Knowing what it takes to conquer polio, survivors refuse to crumble under a new threat

Paul Engleman was two years old when he was diagnosed with polio in 1955. One of the lucky ones, as his mother would say, he was not paralyzed by the crippling disease that sometimes kills. Now, he is in the age group that is more susceptible to a new threat, COVID-19. A frequent contributor to Rotary magazine, Engleman describes what it is like to survive polio and live through the COVID-19 pandemic and talks with

Sixty-five years ago, in 1955, I was diagnosed with <u>polio</u>. I was two years old, so I was unaware of what it meant to have been infected with the poliovirus, but I became more aware of it in subtle ways as I got older. And at some point, I understood what my mother meant when she said I was "one of the lucky ones."

My mother came from Jersey City, New Jersey, and she sounded like it all her life, aided and abetted by a daily regimen of unfiltered Kool cigarettes. She drove a supply truck as a civilian during World War II and delighted in telling a tale about a GI who tried to "get fresh" with her when she gave him a lift back to the base. When she told him she was married and her husband was deployed overseas, he said, "Baby, what're you saving it for — the worms?"

She stopped the truck and told him, "Ride in back, buster!" I have no doubt that she used an expletive, although she never employed one in the retelling, Jersey accent notwithstanding. But she still thought "saving it for the worms" was the funniest line she had ever heard. She was a woman who could take things in stride, the quintessential "tough cookie."

But there was one recollection that could unravel my mother like no other — the one that involved her youngest son being diagnosed with polio and the palpable fear that stalked parents across the country during the summers of the early 1950s. She could not stop her voice from cracking when she spoke about that time. That, along with her warnings about staying out of "polio puddles" after it rained, shaped my awareness of how frightening the epidemic had been.

Among my childhood memories, getting the oral polio vaccine is as vivid as the <u>classroom drills</u> that taught us to seek safety under our desks in case of a nuclear attack. While I can now joke about how sturdy school desks must have been back then, there's no amusement in my recollection of lining up outside the local firehouse for the <u>Sabin sugar cube</u> — that was serious, important business. I knew it then, and I know it now.

My appreciation for having survived polio faded away over time, but returned in force about 12 years ago when I began writing for <u>Rotary magazine</u>. I had assumed polio had been <u>eradicated</u> — or, more accurately, I didn't think about it. I have since had the opportunity to get to know, and be awed by, some of the Rotarian volunteers who are working to achieve that goal.

One of the lucky ones

Now, as the <u>novel coronavirus</u> makes its way across the world, I feel a renewed gratitude for what it means to be one of the lucky ones — and a deeper understanding of how terrifying life was for many people six decades ago. As a 67-year-old former smoker, I'm among those now considered vulnerable — I have two adult children to keep reminding me of that — but I'm also among the privileged. My wife and I are able to work from home, we live in a single-family house with creature comforts, and we can afford to practice social distancing with little sacrifice.

Although adults were not immune to polio — President Franklin D. Roosevelt famously <u>contracted the</u> <u>disease</u> at age 39 — most of its victims were young children. Today, COVID-19 appears to pose the most danger to people over 60 — that is, the same group that polio targeted 65 years ago. "There was a high level of fear in the country then, very similar to what we have now," says Cort Vaughan, who is one of those volunteers I'm awed by. When we spoke in April, Vaughan and his wife, Tonya, had recently returned from participating in a polio vaccination campaign in India.

A member of the <u>Rotary Club of Greater Bend, Oregon</u>, and a past End Polio Now coordinator, Vaughan began his work on the polio front before he was even aware of it: He was a March of Dimes poster child in Riverside, California, when he was three years old. He still has a copy of an article from a local newspaper with a photo of him dressed as a cowboy guarding the spare change that people contributed during a fundraising drive in 1955.

Vaughan doesn't remember contracting polio at age two in October 1954, but, he says, "I have clear memories of my parents relating stories about it, and I could feel the emotion in their voices about what they went through. For my mother, it was like she was reliving the fear and anxiety of having her child stricken with a potentially deadly disease. Their stories were so vivid, so palpable, they almost became my own memories."

The darkest story starts with his mother discovering one morning that her toddler was suddenly unable to walk, calling the doctor, and rushing him to the hospital. "If you had to go to the hospital, there was a high probability of being crippled for life," Vaughan says. "Once my parents took me there, it was out of their hands." At that time, polio wards restricted visitors, and Vaughan's mother was desperate to be with him. "She discovered a women's group that was sending volunteers to hospitals. She joined the Junior League primarily to get to see me."

Vaughan's illness paralyzed his right leg from the knee down, requiring him to wear a brace and sentencing him to a childhood in which frequent trips to the hospital for physical therapy replaced playing outdoors with friends. "I didn't feel lucky then, but looking back, now I do," he says. He also believes that the knowledge that comes from living with the scars of polio has heightened his grasp of what is required to overcome the current pandemic. "I know what it's like to face a hidden threat, and I understand the need for people to stay vigilant and work together to prevent the spread," he says. "I was defending the stay-at -home order in Oregon early on, when friends and relatives were thinking it was not really serious."





How District 3860 Evolved

DISTRICT 3860

Fourteen years after the first Rotary club was organized by Paul P. Harris in Chicago, the Rotary movement reached the shores of the Philippines when the Rotary Club of Manila, the first Rotary club in Asia, was chartered in June 1919.

Thirteen years later, RC Manila sponsored the birth of the first Rotary club outside Manila and the second in the country – Rotary Club of Cebu – on November 26, 1932 with 26 charter members. This was followed in 1933 by the organization of the Rotary Club of Iloilo.



RC CEBU SOUTH MILESTONES

In the beginning, the Rotary Club Cebu South was just the proverbial "gleam-in-the-eye" of RC Cebu West resident Joe Cavan, and former District Governor Marianing Ilano. The year was 1968, and a feasibility study showed that there were as many as 92 classifications that could be availed of in the southern portion of the sponsoring club's territory. The matter was not pursued, however, and it was not until the incumbency of President Tom Espina that the move to form the new club was revived by then District Governor Onor Lozano.

On January 8, 1972 the Rotary Club Cebu South was formally organized at a meeting held at Cavan's Resort in Guadalupe, Cebu City, and a Charter was applied for. On March 5, 1972, Rotary International gave its official sanction to the club and released its Charter as the Fourth Club in RI District 385. On May 27, 1972, Rotary Club Cebu South held its Charter Presentation and Induction at the Casino Espanol de Cebu, with first President Munding Crystal accepting the Club Charter from District Governor Onor Lozano. There were 28 Charter Members then.

Through the years, the club continues to create footprints and impact in the service of the rotary. Its passions for service were manifested by the countless awards and citations as it rises to prominence and importance. The club prided itself for having a new President every rotary. This is just among the qualities of its members who can be the leader of the Club that can continue its legacy and identity. Currently, the Club has 30 active members. Even with the swift passing of the time that some men of honor and dedication to Club's service have gone by, the Club's enthusiasm to serve the community and do better has earned in the Rotary Year 2016-2017 marvelous and exceptional awards, as follows:

This has been a long-standing promise of the Cebu City government when it saw a rapid rise in the use of the bicycles due to the lack of public transport while under the community quarantine.




