THE 4-WAY TEST

One of the most widely printed and quoted statements of business ethics in the world is the Rotary 4-way test. It was created by Rotarian Herbert J. Taylor in 1932 where he was asked to take charge of a company that was facing bankruptcy Taylor looked for a way to save the struggling company mired in depression-caused financial difficulties. He drew up a 24-word code of ethics for all employees to follow their business and professional lives. The 4-Way Test became the guide for sales, production, advertising and all relations with dealers and customers, and the survival of the company is credited to this simple philosophy.

Herb Taylor became President of the Rotary International in 1954-55. The 4-Way Test was adopted by Rotary in 1943 and has been translated into more than a hundred languages and pub-

of the things we think, say or do.

- Is it the truth?
- Is it fair to all concerned?
- Will it build goodwill and better friendships?
- Will it be beneficial to all concerned?

OBJECT OF ROTARY

Rotary is to encourage and foster the ideal of service as a basis of worthy enterprise and, in particular, to encourage and foster;

For true economic development, women are essential

Here's why these organizations and their Rotary club partners are supporting local women's entrepreneurship with financial literacy, small business loans, and one-on-one advisors.

Women's economic empowerment contributes to a nation's growth and to the world's economic health overall. <u>Studies have shown</u> that it boosts productivity, increases economic diversification and income equality, and supports economic resilience. And income loss associated with gender discrimination costs the world economy an estimated \$12 trillion and well as a reduction of 16 percent of cost to the global GPD.

Factors that enable and constrain women's economic empowerment: **Direct factors:** linked to women's individual or collective lived experiences

- 1. Education, skills development, and training
- 2. Access to quality, decently paid work
- 3. Address unpaid care and work burdens
- 4. Access to property, assets, and financial services
- 5. Collective action and leadership
- 6. Social protection

Underlying factors: wider structural conditions that determine women's individual or collective lived experiences

- Labor market characteristics
- 2. Fiscal policy
- 3. Legal, regulatory and policy framework
- 4. Gender norms and discriminatory social norms

Why Being Kind is as IMPORTANT as EVER ...

Your parents told you to be nice to people. Guess what? They were right. Here's why.



Many studies have established a connection between volunteering and improved health. In the brain, acts of kindness release powerful chemicals like oxytocin, serotonin, and dopamine, elevating our mood, increasing reward stimuli, and reducing stress. Compassion evokes lower heart rates and reduces coronary distress. Oxytocin is also connected to social bonding, so as it is released, the ties that bind us are strengthened.

Doing good doesn't only benefit other people. It helps us, too.

Studies show that helping others boosts serotonin, a neurotransmitter that makes us feel satisfied. Another benefit to feeling rewarded when we do good: It lowers our stress levels. Who couldn't use that right now?

Facing the COVID-19 pandemic, people everywhere are feeling anxious about their health, their families, their jobs, and their futures.

"When we are all feeling lower than we are used to feeling, with some levels of situational depression, we all need a boost," says psychologist Mary Berge, a member of the Rotary Club of Johnstown, Pennsylvania, USA, who has led discussions with many Rotary clubs about coping during the pandemic.

"There has been a lot of research that when we are helping others, or when we are doing something for someone else, our reward centers light up in the brain and our stress levels go down as cortisol is released."

It feels good to do good

In a <u>2016 study</u>, researchers asked participants about scenarios in which they either gave or received support. The study, published in Psychosomatic Medicine: Journal of Biobehavioral Medicine, found that MRI tests showed only the instances of giving correlated to reduced stress and enhanced activity in the brain's reward centers — which suggests that giving support ultimately had greater mental benefits than receiving it.

Researchers at Oslo Metropolitan University in Norway and the Technical University of Dortmund in Germany explored the relationship between volunteering and well-being in 12 European countries, noting the relative lack of such studies outside the U.S. Their <u>2018 analysis</u> found that people who are or have been volunteers report greater well-being than people who have not.

And in a 2013 Canadian <u>study</u> posted by the National Library of Medicine, researchers looked at the effect on the cardiovascular health of adolescents who do volunteer work. The study confirmed that helping people reduced the volunteers' body mass index and other cardiovascular risk factors.





How District 3860 Evolved

DISTRICT 3860

Fourteen years after the first Rotary club was organized by Paul P. Harris in Chicago, the Rotary movement reached the shores of the Philippines when the Rotary Club of Manila, the first Rotary club in Asia, was chartered in June 1919.

Thirteen years later, RC Manila sponsored the birth of the first Rotary club outside Manila and the second in the country – Rotary Club of Cebu – on November 26, 1932 with 26 charter members. This was followed in 1933 by the organization of the Rotary Club of Iloilo.



RC CEBU SOUTH MILESTONES

In the beginning, the Rotary Club Cebu South was just the proverbial "gleam-in-the-eye" of RC Cebu West resident Joe Cavan, and former District Governor Marianing Ilano. The year was 1968, and a feasibility study showed that there were as many as 92 classifications that could be availed of in the southern portion of the sponsoring club's territory. The matter was not pursued, however, and it was not until the incumbency of President Tom Espina that the move to form the new club was revived by then District Governor Onor Lozano.

On January 8, 1972 the Rotary Club Cebu South was formally organized at a meeting held at Cavan's Resort in Guadalupe, Cebu City, and a Charter was applied for. On March 5, 1972, Rotary International gave its official sanction to the club and released its Charter as the Fourth Club in RI District 385. On May 27, 1972, Rotary Club Cebu South held its Charter Presentation and Induction at the Casino Espanol de Cebu, with first President Munding Crystal accepting the Club Charter from District Governor Onor Lozano. There were 28 Charter Members then.

Through the years, the club continues to create footprints and impact in the service of the rotary. Its passions for service were manifested by the countless awards and citations as it rises to prominence and importance. The club prided itself for having a new President every rotary. This is just among the qualities of its members who can be the leader of the Club that can continue its legacy and identity. Currently, the Club has 30 active members. Even with the swift passing of the time that some men of honor and dedication to Club's service have gone by, the Club's enthusiasm to serve the community and do better has earned in the Rotary Year 2016-2017 marvelous and exceptional awards, as follows:







Cebu City Hall targets waterway obstructions

AFTER a massive flood hit Cebu City and took three lives on Tuesday night, Oct. 13, 2020, the season of fault-finding and solution-seeking has begun—the city officials initially identified establishments in the uptown area that caused obstruction in the waterway.

These establishments—identified by the City Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Office (CDRRMO) personnel on their initial walk-through on Thursday, Oct. 15—are near a creek and a bridge on Gen. Maxilom Ave., which saw a deluge that carried garbage and mud.

CDRRMO officer-in-charge Ramil Ayuman said the structures that they saw as obstruction were a hotel's parking lot, a restaurant and various businesses near Rahman Bridge.

However, Ayuman's team still has to determine if these establishments violated the three-meter easement.

Labella's meeting

Mayor Edgardo Labella said he will meet with the owners of the establishments and the Department of Public Works and Highways (DPWH) officials, to discuss the measures that they must do to prevent a similar magnitude of flooding from happening again.









