THE 4-WAY TEST

One of the most widely printed and quoted statements of business ethics in the world is the Rotary 4-way test. It was created by Rotarian Herbert J. Taylor in 1932 where he was asked to take charge of a company that was facing bankruptcy Taylor looked for a way to save the struggling company mired in depression-caused financial difficulties. He drew up a 24-word code of ethics for all employees to follow their business and professional lives. The 4-Way Test became the guide for sales, production, advertising and all relations with dealers and customers, and the survival of the company is credited to this simple philosophy.

Herb Taylor became President of the Rotary International in 1954-55. The 4-Way Test was adopted by Rotary in 1943 and has been translated into more than a hundred languages and pub-

of the things we think, say or do.

- Is it the truth?
- Is it fair to all concerned?
- Will it build goodwill and better friendships?
- Will it be beneficial to all concerned?

OBJECT OF ROTARY

Rotary is to encourage and foster the ideal of service as a basis of worthy enterprise and, in particular, to encourage and foster;

- 1. The development of acquaintance as an opportunity for service;
- 2. High ethical standards in business and professions; the recognition of the worthiness of all useful occupations; and the dignifying of each Rotarian's occupation as an opportunity to serve society.



- 3. The application of the ideal of service in each Rotarian's personal, business, and community life.
- 4. The advancement of international understanding, goodwill, and peace through a world of fellowship of business and professional persons united in the ideal of service.

Navy Capt. Troy D. Bumagat (Ret.) is a member of Mabikas Class 1996 of the Philippine Military Academy (PMA) and has been assigned to various units throughout the Philippines spanning his 21 years of dedicated service to the Armed Forces of the Philippines.

Business Background:

Upon reaching the optional retirement in the service, he made a major life and career decision to hang up his white cap to join his family in Ormoc City and establish his own agri-business Trophy Farm Supplies in 2010, a farm located in Brgy. Montebello, Municipality of Kananga, Leyte which has current transaction in private corporations, local government units and the regional government agencies.

As an owner-operator of broiler farms, Troy manages a commercial broiler farming

In November 2013, his farm suffered heavy losses with 70% of his poultry building severely damaged by typhoon Yolanda. Not to back down on these challenges, he rebuilt his poultry building and saw an opportunity to expand and engage in other agri-businesses and activities.

Now a diversified and integrated farm, Trophy farm has also marked its name in organic farming (the first in Region VIII) after receiving third party organic certification from NICERT in its mushroom enterprise.

He has significantly contributed to the value chain of the poultry industry in Region VIII by continuously innovating and establishing best practices in poultry broiler production, organizing farming

Awards and Recognition:

A multi-awarded soldier while in the military service, Troy has made his mark in farming since he entered this field in 2011. Called "Farmer Troy" by his colleagues and friends, he is a recipient of the Top Ten Outstanding Farmers of the Philippines by TOFARM - Agricultural Entrepreneur Category (Silver National Awardee) in 2015 and 2016. He was also awarded as the Most Outstanding Agricultural Entrepreneur at the 2016 Gawad Saka Awards of the Department of Agriculture - Region 8. In August 2016, Troy was recognized as the Regional and National Winner as the Best SET-UP Adoptor for 2016 of the Department of Science and Technology for production, efficiency and innovation in poultry. He was a national finalist of the 2017 BCY Foundation Innovation Award under the Agribusiness Category for his Innovations in poultry broiler and farming integration. Recently, he was once again awarded as the Regional Gawad Saka winner under the agri-entrepreneur category for 2019.

Most recently, the farm is adjudged as the Most Technologically Advance Farm during the Search for Most Promising Farm in the 70th Founding Anniversary of Kananga.

Community Involvement:

True to form as a service-oriented individual, Troy is a proud member of the Rotary Club of Ormoc where he served two successive terms as club president in Rotary years 2013-14 and in 2014-2015, the crucial years during super typhoon Yolanda, which tested his leadership in addressing the immediate needs of the thousands of affected individuals in Ormoc and its nearby municipalities. From there, the club, in cooperation with its multiple partners and donors, was able to rehabilitate and construct a total of 205 classrooms of public elementary and secondary schools. He emerged that year as the District 3860 Most Outstanding Club President accomplishing 43 various service projects for the club.

He has sat as a trustee of the Ormoc City Chamber of Commerce, and has served as the Private Sector Representative (PSR) to the Regional Development Council (Region 8) with the National Economic Development Authority

In his spare time he teaches Senior High School students under the ABM program on Entrepreneurship and Marketing Management at St Paul's School of Ormoc, a 39-year old family-ran private school.

He serves as one of the Board of Directors of the Local Technical Organic Agriculture Committee of Ormoc City contributing in the marketing and positioning of organic produce of farmers in Ormoc and nearby communities.

Since 2017, he has served as a mentor for many aspiring agri-entrepreneur upon the invitation of the Go Negosyo and the Philippine Center for Entrepreneurship in the Kapatid Mentor Me Program of DTI and Kapatid Agri-Mentor Me Program of DA in both Regions VII and VIII. He appeared in many fora for farmers and MSMEs speaking about *Entrepreneur Mindsetting, Farm Operations Management and Marketing*.



We already connect so many people across the world. Imagine the possibilities when we bring even more people along for the ride. That's the future of Rotary I want to see: one where we are unstoppable in our service, relentless in our kindness, and intentional in the change we want to see.



How District 3860 Evolved

DISTRICT 3860

Fourteen years after the first Rotary club was organized by Paul P. Harris in Chicago, the Rotary movement reached the shores of the Philippines when the Rotary Club of Manila, the first Rotary club in Asia, was chartered in June 1919.

Thirteen years later, RC Manila sponsored the birth of the first Rotary club outside Manila and the second in the country – Rotary Club of Cebu – on November 26, 1932 with 26 charter members. This was followed in 1933 by the organization of the Rotary Club of Iloilo.

RC CEBU SOUTH MILESTONES

In the beginning, the Rotary Club Cebu South was just the proverbial "gleam-in-the-eye" of RC Cebu West resident Joe Cavan, and former District Governor Marianing Ilano. The year was 1968, and a feasibility study showed that there were as many as 92 classifications that could be availed of in the southern portion of the sponsoring club's territory. The matter was not pursued, however, and it was not until the incumbency of President Tom Espina that the move to form the new club was revived by then District Governor Onor Lozano.

On January 8, 1972 the Rotary Club Cebu South was formally organized at a meeting held at Cavan's Resort in Guadalupe, Cebu City, and a Charter was applied for. On March 5, 1972, Rotary International gave its official sanction to the club and released its Charter as the Fourth Club in RI District 385. On May 27, 1972, Rotary Club Cebu South held its Charter Presentation and Induction at the Casino Espanol de Cebu, with first President Munding Crystal accepting the Club Charter from District Governor Onor Lozano. There were 28 Charter Members then.

Through the years, the club continues to create footprints and impact in the service of the rotary. Its passions for service were manifested by the countless awards and citations as it rises to prominence and importance. The club prided itself for having a new President every rotary. This is just among the qualities of its members who can be the leader of the Club that can continue its legacy and identity. Currently, the Club has 30 active members. Even with the swift passing of the time that some men of honor and dedication to Club's service have gone by, the Club's enthusiasm to serve the community and do better has earned in the Rotary Year 2016-2017 marvelous and exceptional awards, as follows:

# RC CEBU SOUTH BREAKING NEWS

#### Entire Cebu remains under MGCQ until Nov. 30



CEBU CITY, Philippines — All areas in Cebu island will remain under modified general community quarantine (MGCQ) for the entire month of November.

This after the Malacañang, in a memorandum dated and issued on October 30, 2020, announced the new community quarantine statuses of all areas nationwide that will take effect this Sunday, November 1, 2020, and will last until November 30, 2020.

"The President (Rodrigo Duterte), taking into consideration the recommendation of the Inter-Agency Task Force for the Management of Emerging Infectious Diseases (IATF), has approved the (updated) quarantine classifications of provinces, highly urbanized cities, and independent component cities from November 1 – November 30," portions of the memorandum read.

It was signed by Executive Secretary Salvador Medialdea.

Cebu, and all other areas in Central Visayas, will remain under MGCQ, the most relaxed form of community quarantine.

However, the Malacañang noted that Cebu City is among the 'areas requiring special attention by the local government unit, Regional IATF, and the National Task Force'.

In the meantime, the national government has decided to extend the general community quarantine (GCQ) in Metro Manila, and the town of Pateros, and the province of Batangas. The cities of Iloilo, Bacolod, Tacloban in Visayas, and Iligan City and the province of Lanao del Sur in Mindanao were also included in the areas placed under GCQ, a stricter mode of community quarantine. /dbs




