Rotaract projects net honors

The 2018-19 recipients of the Rotaract Outstanding Project Awards were announced in April and honored in June at the Rotaract Preconvention in Hamburg, Germany. Eight projects were selected from 558 nominees. They were evaluated on impact and sustainability, alignment with Rotary's six areas of focus, collaboration with Rotarians and community organizations, innovation, and involvement of Rotaract club members. The single club and multiclub honorees received \$1,000 toward a future project. Find out more at on.rotary.org/ROPA2019.

INTERNATIONAL AWARD RECIPIENTS:

Single club: **Rotaract Club of Bugolobi, Uganda**, for its project 1000smiles, which is providing safe water to more than 12,000 people by constructing boreholes and latrines, as well as training women to make sanitary pads.

Multiclub: **Rotaract clubs in Turkey** for their Rotaract Academy project, which has trained 6,500 young people on topics within Rotary's areas of focus and on vocational and personal development.

REGIONAL AWARD RECIPIENTS:

Asia-Pacific: **Rotaract Club of Manila, Philippines**, for HeARTfelt, which provided art therapy to 29 out-of-school youth to guide them away from gang violence and substance abuse.

Canada, Caribbean, and USA: **Rotaract Club of Barbados** for Once Upon a Time, a project that improved literacy through a book drive, a spelling bee, and a public service announcement.

Central Asia, Europe, and Middle East: **Rotaract District 2420 (Turkey)**, for working with 39 Rotaract clubs in 17 countries to organize AIDS awareness events, including distributing educational and preventive materials and providing free tests.

Latin America: **Rotaract Club of Itápolis, Brazil**, for Setembro Amarelo, a project that educated over 20,000 people about the risk of depression and signs of suicidal behavior.

South Asia: **Rotaract Club of University of Moratuwa, Sri Lanka**, for creating marine habitat by stimulating the growth of coral reefs through the placement of steel structures (read more on page 12).

Sub-Saharan Africa: **Rotaract Club of Qiloane, Lesotho**, for Project Moipone, which provided a greenhouse, seeds, and training for teenage mothers learning to grow vegetables to feed their families and to sell.

Rotary grants for polio eradication

In June, Rotary announced \$100 million in grants to support the global campaign to end polio. Half of the funds are allocated to polio eradication efforts in endemic countries: Afghanistan (\$16.3 million), Nigeria (\$10.2 million), and Pakistan (\$25.2 million). Additional funding will help keep vulnerable countries polio-free:

Chad: \$102,395

Democratic Republic of Congo: \$9.5 million

Ethiopia: \$2.6 million

Iraq: \$6 million

Kenya: \$6.3 million

Mali: \$1.2 million

Somalia: \$1.4 million

South Sudan: \$1.2 million

Syria: \$1.7 million

Yemen: \$2.1 million

The World Health Organization will receive \$1.3 million to conduct research and will also receive support for

surveillance activities in its Africa (\$10.9 million) and Eastern Mediterranean (\$4 million) regions.

"As we work with our partners to apply innovative new strategies to reach more children and embrace lessons learned thus far, Rotary is doubling down on our commitment to end polio for good," says Michael K. McGovern, chair of Rotary's International PolioPlus Committee. "I'm optimistic that the end of polio is within our grasp, but we must remain vigilant in rallying global political and financial support as we push toward a polio-free world."

Rotary has committed to raising \$50 million a year for polio eradication, to be matched 2-to-1 by the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, amounting to \$150 million. Since launching its polio eradication program in 1985, Rotary has contributed more than \$1.9 billion to fight the disease, including matching funds from the Gates Foundation, as well as

countless volunteer hours. Since the initiative launched, the incidence of polio has plummeted by more than 99.9 percent, from about 350,000 cases in 1988 to 33 cases due to wild poliovirus in 2018.

Family-friendly service projects with Steven Boe

President-elect, Rotary Club of Silverdale, Washington

1 Making Rotary family-friendly is one of Rotary President Mark Daniel Maloney's priorities this year. What has been your club's approach?

Several of our members have young kids, including me — I have a five-year-old and a seven-year-old — and many have grandkids. Our annual fundraiser is the Silverdale Rotary Duck Race, where we drop 18,000 rubber ducks into the bay and they race to the finish line. Through sponsorships and ticket sales, we raise \$70,000 and upward a year. Several Rotarians bring their kids to help tag the ducks ahead of time, sell tickets, or do cleanup afterward. That prompted us to start coming up with ideas for projects that were specifically designed for kids and parents to work on together. That's how our project for families got started.

2 What's the project all about?

The project allows parents to lead by example and build the next generation of Rotarians. People often say they want to get involved in volunteering, but they don't know what to do or where to start. Our website

(kidsfaction.com) offers a list of kid-friendly ideas — everything from walking dogs at the animal shelter to stuffing bags of supplies for homeless teens. Families can do those things together.

Our club has always been open to kids at events, but our project helps the family members feel like they're part of Rotary, rather than guests. Now we're working with organizations in our community to have a day of volunteering designed for parents and kids.

3 Did your kids inspire this project?

They have been the inspiration since the beginning. Last June, I created a comic book for our duck race — a small coloring book that kids could color while they were at the event. The characters were based on my kids. I realized a lot of kids might want to help others, but they don't exactly know how. We have to teach them. That was the big moment. Now we're in the middle of creating an animated commercial to help promote our project.

My kids love Rotary. They like coming to the Rotary events and they steal all of my Rotary pins! One of the reasons I joined Rotary was to set an example of service for my kids. My five-year-old daughter was asking me about

some homeless people she had seen. When I explained that they had nowhere to live, she said, "We should do something." I told her that's why I joined Rotary. I reminded her of the time she helped stuff bags of supplies for homeless teens at one of our meetings. She had a very big smile on her face when she realized that she had already been helping them. And that put a big smile on mine.

4 How are you connecting with parents, especially those who aren't members of Rotary?

Rotary connects to the community, and we want the community to connect with us as well. For those who aren't already committed to Rotary, it might seem difficult to come to a Rotary meeting — especially for parents, both in terms of money and time. But maybe they can come on a weekend to volunteer on a project, or we can call them when there's an event. The next step is getting them into a pattern of service, not just the one-time thing. And that's where Rotary comes in. The next time they see that park, that cleanup project, those people who were helped, that holiday event, or whatever it is, Rotary will be on their radar.


