### ROTARY CLUB OF CEBU

Chartered on November 28, 1932, Rotary Club of Cebu is the second oldest club in the Philippines. The club currently has 63 members and prides itself in the quality characterizes its weekly meetings.

The club sponsored the organization of several Rotary clubs in the Visayas and has produced six district governors, including Vicente L. Faelnar, Joaquin Panis, Vicente Lozada, Federico Reyes and Manuel de Veyra. The latest, Edgar Chiongbian, was the District Governor in RY2013-2014 and also the RY2017-2018 Chairman of the Philippine College of Rotary Governors.

Rotary International District 3860 has consistently recognized the club for its role and contribution to the District, winning the Club of the Year and President of the Year awards multiple times over the years. Our members continue to donate generously to The Rotary Foundation and consistently leads the District in TRF Donations and Disaster relief drives. The club has long led the district with the greatest number of Major Donors (15 currently) and in RY2019-2020, three members of the club (one posthumously) were inducted into the Arch Klumph Society, the first AKS members in our District. Likewise, RCC was the first club to establish a TRF Endowment Fund in the District. Lastly, the RCC has been very active in Global Grant projects, leading the country with almost 5% of the total approved Philippine global grant budget over the past six years.

Public health is on everyone's mind due to the global pandemic that still threatens the safety of ourselves and our loved ones. In a sense, COVID-19 has made all of us much more aware of the roles and responsibilities of medical professionals than we were before we had to wear masks and maintain social distance. In addition, while moving through this pandemic, we have also learned about the role we can play in keeping others safe.

December is Disease Prevention and Treatment Month in Rotary. The pandemic unfortunately has schooled most people on the toll that disease takes on our communities. But fighting disease is something that Rotarians around the world have been doing for decades. In fact, it is one of Rotary's seven areas of focus.

As Rotarians, we believe that good health and well-being is a human right — even though 400 million people across the globe do not have access to essential health services. The work we do in establishing clinics, eye hospitals, and blood banks, as well as in building infrastructure for medical facilities in underserved communities, all returns to a central belief that access, prevention, and education are the keys to stopping deadly outbreaks that harm the most vulnerable.

My exposure to health work began with my Rotary club, Calcutta-Mahanagar. There, among other things, I helped pioneer a program called Saving Little Hearts that over the years has provided more than 2,500 free heart surgeries for children from

India, Pakistan, Bangladesh, Nepal, and Africa. Before the program went international, it started locally with the goal of performing just six surgeries within our community. Today, our goal is to complete another 20,000 surgeries over the next five years.

The world relies on Rotary to tackle challenges like these and to set an example for others. Over the past decade, medical professionals and government workers have provided free health services to 2.5 million people in 10 countries during Family Health Days, which are organized by Rotarians around the world. Similar health camps in India also provide thousands of surgeries to those in need. Medical missions from India to Africa each year are an excellent example of hands-on service in disease prevention and treatment. Rotary members can also get involved at a local level; clubs in the United States and Mexico, for example, fund a free health clinic in Guerrero, a small town in Mexico.

And of course, our effort to eradicate polio is by far the best story in civil-society health care.

This month, think about how your club can focus on preventing and fighting disease. This is the time to take a bigger, better, bolder approach through both club and district projects that can impact more people. Reevaluate where you are with your goals. Create strategies that can sustain change over years, not months.

Everyone deserves a long, healthy life. When you Serve to Change Lives, your actions today can help extend the lives of others.

### December 2021

You can't have a great team without great PEOPLE. P stands for pride in our organization, our achievements, and our potential. E is our empathy for others, which we transform into service. Our second P is for perseverance, helping us stick to our goals, like polio eradication, when the going gets tough. L stands for leadership, and E for enthusiasm — the fuel of Rotary.



While we are revisiting our goals, we also need to remember the why. For me, this needs little explanation. Why wouldn't you help expectant mothers and their children survive and thrive by supporting a Rotary Foundation grant? And why wouldn't you initiate programs to help preserve the environment, our cherished home? The pandemic has only renewed my conviction that life is precious, and we must seize every opportunity to enhance the lives of others.

You are one of the PEOPLE on our TEAM. I encourage you this month to join other leaders who participate in Rotary's strong tradition of philanthropy by making a gift to The Rotary Foundation. 





# ARGAO & DALAGUETE RELIEF OPERATIONS

### **Barangays of Argao and Dalaguete**

Days before typhoon Odette hit, we already knew it was going to be a strong one. As Rotarians, we also knew we needed to get ready to help many who were going to be impacted. Discussions were held and we had a basic plan in place.

But the tempest had a surprise of its own for us. Not only did it hit us hours ahead of schedule, it also hit us beyond what our expectations were for a "strong" typhoon. In less than 4 hours, our city, and the southern part of our province was transformed and as fast as it came, it traversed our island and left a wide swath of debris-strewn field, ripped open roofs and leaning structures. Anything that wasn't tied down was gone and much of what remained standing were damaged or mangled. And in one fell swoop, typhoon Odette made Rotarians themselves part of the statistics of people whose homes, businesses, and lives were upended.



Within 24 hours after the wind died down, messages of support and assurances of aid began to trickle in from the District, our mother club, Rotary Club of Manila, and other Rotary dignitaries. Within days, humanitarian supplies consisting of rice, sleeping mat, blankets, bottled water, sandals and solar powered inverters collected and donated by our mother club were loaded on to the Philippine navy's first strategic sealift vessel, BRP Tarlac (LD601), and departed Manila for Cebu. As the ship sailed, members of RCC began working with the Cebu Contractor's Association to discuss distribution plans, logistics and destinations. Upon docking, on Dec. 24, the supplies were unloaded and transported to the head office of Virginia Food, Inc. where they were repacked with other supplies and canned goods for easy distribution.

On Sunday, December 26, a little over a week after the typhoon, a convoy of cargo trucks, delivery panels and over 10 other vehicles departed for the southern towns of Argao and Dalaguete. Headed by RCC President Jacob Ong, members and their children, along with friends of RCC, members of the Rotaract Club of Cebu and the Cebu Contractor's Association. Also in our midst were volunteer staff from Virginia Food, Inc. who did a marvellous job repacking goods and getting them ready.

At the outskirts of the city, endless scenes of damage and misery abounded. Long lines of people and vehicles queueing for water and fuel. An endless line-up of damaged infrastructure, homes and businesses waiting to be cleared away.

Further out, one could see mountains stripped of large

vegetation, rows of coconut palm with their tops gone. Banana plants never stood a chance as they fell in one direction, a testament to the strength of the wind. Centuries old acacia trees were stripped of every leaf and sadly, some lay on the ground, never to recover.

Our first stop was in the sitio of Langtad, Argao. Word went out fast and it didn't take much time for long lines of humanity to form, waiting for their turn to receive their allocation. People from nearby communities could also be seen coming in motorcycles, bicycles and on foot to join the never-ending queue. With local community leaders qualifying the recipients, controlled chaos would best describe the distribution process. The din of voices filled with excitement, joy, giving out instructions, and chatter was almost overwhelming. But in this chaotic scene, order was maintained. Que jumpers were quickly led to the back of the line and "double dippers" were politely asked to give way for others. Recipients entered on one side and came out laded with goods on the other.

From time to time, we reminded everyone to share their largesse with neighbors and friends. Young children of members took turns standing shoulder to shoulder with adults to distribute supplies. As each recipient left their line, children wished them a Merry Christmas. At one time, I stood there and asked myself if anyone realized the irony of the greeting. For how can one be merry in this situation? In fact, I would say it ranks as one of the worst Christmas in my life!

But no sooner did the thought crossed my mind then it dawn on me that the happy faces and profuse words of thanks from the

recipients meant that in the eyes of these less fortunate, what we were doing gave true meaning to the greeting! For while we may look at others and pine for what they have, there are many more who look up to us and wish they were in our place. What a wonderful lesson in life, happiness and kindness.

This scene was repeated in four different locations, serving over 2000 victims of the typhoon. When we ran out of one item, we replaced it with another. And when we ran out of that, we gave them double of what was available. And while we could not give everyone everything they hoped for, there was nary a whimper of disappointment. Instead, they thanked us for helping them. Many left with nothing but a few bottles of water and that was more than enough as they left cradling this precious liquid beaming with happiness.

Driving back, I was briefly filled with sadness. Sad for the loss of lives, the destruction of property, and the overwhelming darkness with only the road to follow my way home. We passed by towns that appeared deserted as people stayed indoors. With no familiar landmarks and illumination to guide us, I wasn't even sure where we were at times. But I told myself that in spite of it all, the sun would rise the following day. And while the surroundings may look different now, the leaves on the remaining trees will return and the saplings around the mountains will grow. Recovery will happen and life will turn back to normal. And even if our effort does not make it happen sooner, I know that on their long road to recovery, there was one day when we made them happy. And that is worth all our effort.
