History of Rotary

Today, Rotary is well known throughout the world for its dedication to service and international goodwill. Changing the world through service, however, was hardly uppermost in the mind of Paul Harris when he founded the organization in 1905. Harris, a lawyer in Chicago, Illinois, USA, had been raised in a rural village in Vermont. He envisioned a new kind of club for professionals that would kindle the fellowship and friendly spirit he had known in his youth.

On the evening of 23 February 1905, Paul Harris invited three friends to a meeting. Silvester Schiele, a coal dealer, Hiram Shorey, a merchant tailor, and Gustavus Loehr, a mining engineer, gathered with Harris in Loehr's business office in Room 711 of the Unity Building in downtown Chicago. They discussed Harris' idea that business leaders and professionals would have regular acquaintances. The club met weekly; membership was limited to one representative from each business and profession. Though the men didn't use the term Rotary that night; that gathering was commonly regarded as the first Rotary Club meeting.

As they continued to convene, members began rotating their meetings among their places of business, hence the name Rotary. After enlisting a fifth member, printer Harry Ruggles with the group, then it was formally organized as the Rotary Club of Chicago. The original club emblem, a wagon wheel design, was the precursor of the familiar cogwheel emblem now used by Rotarians worldwide.

By the end of 1905, the club's roster showed a membership of 30 with Schiele as President and Ruggles as Treasurer. Paul Harris declined office in the new club and didn't become its President until two years later. Club membership grew, making it difficult to gather in offices, so the members shifted their meetings to hotels and restaurants, where many Rotary club meetings are held today.

These early "Rotarians" realized that fellowship and mutual self-interest were not enough to keep a club of busy professionals meeting each week. Reaching out to improve the lives of the less fortunate proved to be an even more powerful motivation. The Rotary commitment to service began in 1907, when the Rotary Club of Chicago donated horse to a preacher. A few weeks later, the club constructed Chicago's first public lavatory. With these inaugural projects, Rotary became the world's first club organization.

Rotary's popularity began to spread throughout the USA. The second Rotary Club was chartered in 1908 in San Francisco, California, with a third club formed in Oakland, California. Others soon followed in Seattle, Washington; Los Angeles, California; and New York, New York. When the National Association of Rotary Clubs held its first convention in 1910, Harris was elected President.

At the following year's convention, speakers used the phrases "Service, Not Self" and "He Profits Most Who Service Best," which became the organization's mottos. "Service, Not Self," was later changed to "Service Above Self," and has since been adopted a Rotary's primary motto.

The Birth of the Rotary Club of Dadiangas

In 1974, the Rotary Club of General Santos City was confronted with a problem on how its members could make up their absences. Since there was no other club within General Santos City and the nearest Rotary Clubs were in Marbel, South Cotabato and in Digos, Davao del Sur. The members of the RC Gensan found it difficult to make up especially when the roads going to other places were rough and rugged; dusty when dried and muddy when wet. There were no paved roads yet. That, the Board of Directors together with its Club President Jess Veneracion decided to organize a new Rotary Club in the city – the Rotary Club of Dadiangas.

For this noble purpose, RC Gensan loaned two of its senior members to form as the core for the new club – Rtn Frank Zuzon and Rtn Joe Lansang. They accepted the challenge with pride and honor. The whole month of January 1975 was devoted to recruit new members and comprehensive rotary information were given to all prospective Rotarians. After several fellowship meetings conducted, RC Dadiangas was formally organized with twenty three (23) charter members. Rtn Frank Zuzon was elected Charter President with Vic Tajanlangit as Club Secretary. PDG Johnny Asencio and PP Joe Lansang were elected as members of the Board of Directors.

On May 7, 1975, RC Dadiangas was officially admitted as regular member of Rotary International and was conferred the provisional status as duly organized club. The Rotary Club of Dadiangas was finally chartered on September 08, 1975.

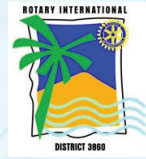

He has a golden voice but most of us were sorry to see his extremely worn out shoes that is not even comparable to the pairs of shoes that we usually dumped to the garbage bin. The incident touched our club fellows as they passed the hat to raise an amount for the young boy to buy a shoes. My extreme appreciation goes to Rotarians Yelcy, Myra, Claire, Vanessa, Joy and Prexy Jing for extending some amounts to the great delight of the boy. It was such a beautiful moment where such things keep us going as we take on the challenges to connect the world. Indeed, service come with bliss.

I love to travel! I even enjoy the mundane process of getting from here to there. But last year, my wife, Gay, and I had one of those experiences that would strain the optimism of even the most cheerful traveler. We found ourselves with six hours to wait, at an airport where we were not scheduled to be, on a day we had not planned still to be traveling, having woken up that morning at a hotel unknown to us the night before. It was one of those days.

As we waited at John F. Kennedy International Airport in New York City, Gay and I took a walk to people watch. We went from one end of the terminal to the other and back, looking at every gate, every destination, every group of people waiting for their flights.

Each gate was its own island of humanity. When we walked down the center of the concourse, we were in New York, moving along with everyone in one river. But when you veered off into those seats, you left that current and landed on an island. You were already in Delhi or Paris or Tel Aviv.

As we started our walk, I thought: "All these different people, all these different countries, all in one place. This is like Rotary!" But as we walked past gate after gate, I realized something. It was not like Rotary at all. Because everyone in that river was heading for an island. And every island stayed an island. The people heading to Taipei might be talking to one another, but they were not talking to the people heading to Cairo or Lagos.

Contrast that with Rotary. Rotary allows us to connect with one another, in deep and meaningful ways, across our differences. It connects us with people we would never otherwise have met, who are more like us than we ever could have known. It connects us with our communities, to professional opportunities, and to the people who need our help.

Connection is what makes the experience of Rotary so very different from walking along that concourse at JFK Airport. In Rotary, none of us is an island. All of us are in Rotary together, whoever we are, wherever we are from, whatever language we speak or traditions we follow. We are all connected to one another — part of our communities and members not only of our clubs, but also of the global community to which we all belong.

This connection is what lies at the heart of the Rotary experience. It is what brings us to Rotary. It is why we stay. Please join your fellow Rotarians on this journey as Rotary Connects the World.

I believe in the power of the human connection. It is astounding to consider the impact that a smile or a touch, a pat on the shoulder can have on others.

Gloomy workplace have come to life again, dissatisfied workers' downtrodden spirits have been lifted, and the "batang tun-og of GenSan" and the lolos and lolas of Strambi Home for the Aged have found a purpose, all because someone took the time to sit down and talk with them even for a few minutes. We interact with people all throughout the day. And have you ever thought of the power that your words hold over them? Have you ever considered how your body language might change the moods and mindsets of those around you? I find it kind to somehow observe how people act around you in times that you are having a bad day, or an exceptionally good one. I bet you will notice a difference in the two situations. This is the manner in which the human interaction works. Every move we make creates an impact to all people around us, to some extent. It is almost impossible to make a decision that would truly only affect you as an individual. Such is the level to which human intertwine.

One of the best years of my life was spent in Rotary, where together, we Rotarians experienced unbounded happiness in the face of true scarcity if not poverty. I was astounded to see how we had affected their lives. Since that day, I firmly believe that we are all here to allow others to breathe easier. We have been put here as part of a higher purpose. This phrase is very beautiful and explains selfless giving and I quote: "I learned to give not because I have much but because I know how it is to have nothing."

Water and Hand-washing Facilities donated to GSCNHSAT

The Rotary of Dadiangas-General Santos City through the philanthropic advocacies of its kind-hearted couple rotarians, Past President Myra Atendido and two-time Past President Bobbie Eduardo Atendido afforded the General Santos City National High School of Arts and Trades with Safe Drinking Water and Hand-washing Facilities.

One of the Rotary's six areas of focus is Water and Sanitation where it can be achieved through providing schools with safe drinking water, improved sanitation facilities and hygiene education that encourages the development of healthy behaviors for life. This social intervention of RC Dadiangas supports the strategic approach of the Department of Education dubbed as Water, Sanitation and Hygiene Education or WASH in Schools. WASH in Schools not only promotes hygiene and increases access to quality education but also supports national and local interventions to establish equitable and sustainable access to safe water and basic sanitation services in schools.

RC Dadiangas also provides electric fans, hygiene kits, hand-washing essentials and fire extinguishers as it believes that poor sanitation, water scarcity, inferior water quality and inappropriate hygiene behavior are disastrous to children. Those conditions are also detrimental to the health of school-aged children who spend long hours in schools. The physical environment and cleanliness of school facility can significantly affect the health and well-being of the general studentry. Disease spreads quickly in cramped spaces with limited ventilation, where washing facilities or soaps are not available, and water toilets are in despair. Too often, schools are places where children become ill.

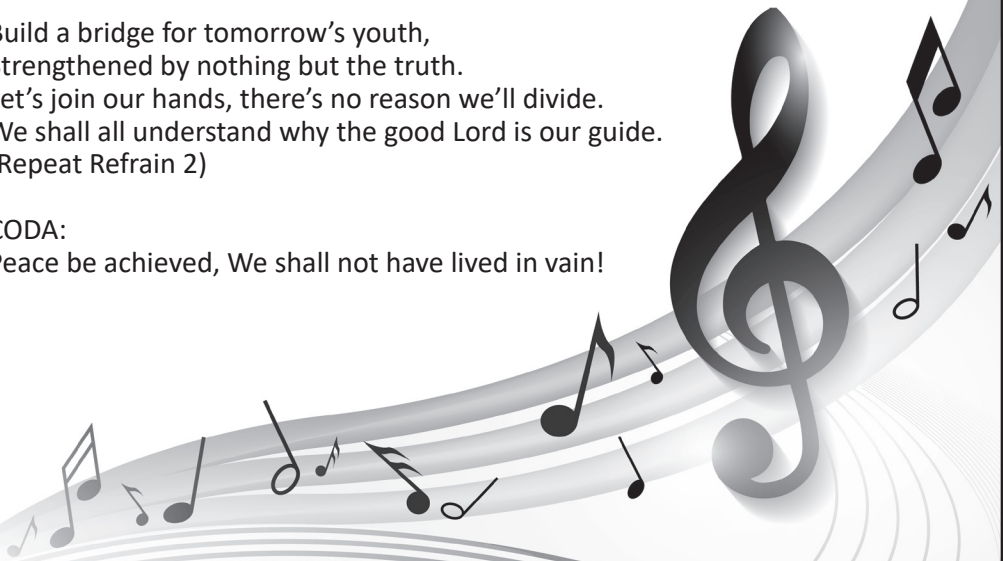
