

The Birth of the Rotary Club of Dadiangas

History of Rotary Today, Rotary is well known throughout the world for its dedication to service and international goodwill. Changing the world through service, however, was hardly uppermost in the mind of Paul Harris when he founded the organization in 1905. Harris, a lawyer in Chicago, Illinois, USA, had been raised in a rural village in Vermont. He envisioned a new kind of club for professionals that would kindle the fellowship and friendly spirit he had known in his youth.

On the evening of 23 February 1905, Paul Harris invited three friends to a meeting. Silvester Schiele, a coal dealer, Hiram Shorey, a merchant tailor, and Gustavus Loehr, a mining engineer, gathered with Harris in Loehr's business office in Room 711 of the Unity Building in downtown Chicago. They discussed Harris' idea that business leaders and professionals would have regular acquaintances. The club met weekly; membership was limited to one representative from each business and profession. Though the men didn't use the term Rotary that night; that gathering was commonly regarded as the first Rotary Club meeting.

As they continued to convene, members began rotating their meetings among their places of business, hence the name Rotary. After enlisting a fifth member, printer Harry Ruggles with the group, then it was formally organized as the Rotary Club of Chicago. The original club emblem, a wagon wheel design, was the precursor of the familiar cogwheel emblem now used by Rotarians worldwide.

By the end of 1905, the club's roster showed a membership of 30 with Schiele as President and Ruggles as Treasurer. Paul Harris declined office in the new club and didn't become its President until two years later. Club membership grew, making it difficult to gather in offices, so the members shifted their meetings to hotels and restaurants, where many Rotary club meetings are hold today.

These early "Rotarians" realized that fellowship and mutual self-interest were not enough to keep a club of busy professionals meeting each week. Reaching out to improve the lives of the less fortunate proved to be an even more powerful motivation. The Rotary commitment to service began in 1907, when the Rotary Club of Chicago donated horse to a preacher. A few weeks later, the club constructed Chicago's first public lavatory. With these inaugural projects, Rotary became the world's first club organization.

Rotary's popularity began to spread throughout the USA. The second Rotary Club was chartered in 1908 in San Francisco, California, with a third club formed in Oakland, California. Others soon followed in Seattle, Washington; Los Angeles, California; and New York, New York. When the National Association of Rotary Clubs held its first convention in 1910, Harris was elected President.

At the following year's convention, speakers used the phrases "Service, Not Self" and "He Profits Most Who Service Best," which became the organization's mottos. "Service, Not Self," was later changed to "Service Above Self," and has since been adopted a Rotary's primary motto.

In 1974, the Rotary Club of General Santos City was confronted with a problem on how its members could make up their absences. Since there was no other club within General Santos City and the nearest Rotary Clubs were in Marbel, South Cotabato and in Digos, Davao del Sur. The members of the RC Gensan found it difficult to make up especially when the roads going to other places were rough and rugged; dusty when dried and muddy when wet. There were no paved roads yet. That, the Board of Directors together with its Club President Jess Veneracion decided to organize a new Rotary Club in the city – the Rotary Club of Dadiangas.

For this noble purpose, RC Gensan loaned two of its senior members to form as the core for the new club – Rtn Frank Zuzon and Rtn Joe Lansang. They accepted the challenge with pride and honor. The whole month of January 1975 was devoted to recruit new members and comprehensive rotary information were given to all prospective Rotarians. After several fellowship meetings conducted, RC Dadiangas was formally organized with twenty three (23) charter members. Rtn Frank Zuzon was elected Charter President with Vic Tajanlangit as Club Secretary. PDG Johnny Asencio and PP Joe Lansang were elected as members of the Board of Directors.

On May 7, 1975, RC Dadiangas was officially admitted as regular member of Rotary International and was conferred the provisional status as duly organized club. The Rotary Club of Dadiangas was finally chartered on September 08, 1975.

It began when I joined others in my club for a project to bring toilets and clean drinking water to rural villages near our city. It moved forward when we promoted sanitation and provided opportunities for education across the country, thanks to generous gifts from supporters who believed in our projects

as much as those of us on the ground did.

There is no better time of the year to be reminded of that generosity than November, which is Rotary Foundation Month.

As the charitable arm of Rotary International, The Rotary Foundation is the engine that powers so many Rotary projects throughout the world. The Foundation transforms your gifts into projects that change lives. •More than two dozen hospitals in Honduras received personal protective equipment for their medical staff thanks to a \$169,347 global grant sponsored by the Rotary clubs of Villa Real de Tegucigalpa, Honduras, and Waldo Brookside-Kansas City, Missouri.

•The Rotary clubs of Cotonou Le Nautile, Benin, and Tournai Haut-

Escaut, Belgium, received a \$39,390 global grant to provide agricultural training at an ecologically responsible permaculture mini-farm connected to a center for children in Sowé, Benin. This will help a new generation of farmers become economically self-sufficient.

I like comparing The Rotary Foundation to the Taj Mahal, a monument of one man's love for a woman. The Foundation is a dynamic monument of our love for all of humanity.

This month I am asking all Rotary clubs to bring attention to the Foundation. It is what connects all Rotarians worldwide and transforms our collective passions into projects that change lives. The Blaan women of Nopol Dam IP community sends their deepest gratitude and thanks to all the life changing Rotarians who made all of this possible.

After which, RC Dadiangas conducted a Rotary Community Corps orientation to our fellow Blaan brothers and sisters in the Nopol Dam Indigenous People's Community, Brgy. Mabuhay, General Santos City led by our outstanding DCSC Joel Inabangan of the same day, October 29, 2021. This initiative aims to invite and encourage like-minded non-Rotarian members to work hand-in-hand with the club in continuing our advocacies. We are thankful for our fellow brothers and sisters in the Nopol Dam IP community, for fully committing in this duty and choosing to Serve to Change Lives.

To top it all of, on November 2, 2021, RC Dadiangas, turned over the contactless thermometer scanner with alcohol dispenser device to Aspang High School with the initiative of PP Bobbie and PP Myra Atendido.

Discovering the Underserved Sitio Nopol

One finds to understand and serve them better when we get to see and hear the voices of the underserved people. Amidst the hot and sunny skies of General Santos City and owing to the divine global positioning system, the President of the Rotary Club of Dadiangas Ernesto M. De Guzman and I found Sitio Nopol in Barangay Mabuhay as untapped and underserved where one could hear nothing but tweets and chirps of birds and burbles of water from the flowing stream. The village is home to indigenous B'laan folks living under impoverished community with no direct supply of water to the households, but one must fetch it from a far distant source at the foot of the mountain. Toilets are loosely taken for granted where no single household owns as residents in the area defecate or urinate anywhere, they like. Further needs assessment in the community shows that the people are deprived of basic services that Rotary may somehow initiate, not discounting the need to empower women by providing livelihood stimulus project enough to start a bit or at least augment their farm earnings.

The Rotary Club of Dadiangas embraces the village as its adopted community where array of service initiatives is being implemented; the water supply system project where the infrastructure for collection, treatment, storage, and communal distribution of water to the central point of the community is done on the project's initial phase while the extension of distribution pipeline is underway to cater the wide base of the village's populace and provides potable water in their households.

Latrine has been introduced when the club donated a public toilet for the community to develop conscious approach to health and sanitation that would lead to behavioral change in hygiene practices of the people in the area.

The club also donates sewing machines to the Rotary Community Corps it has formed in the village to empower its largely women members. Procuring a sewing machine is out of anyone's reach. These poor women, again through the assistance of Rotary are enrolled in the government's Technical Education and Skills Development Authority or TESDA's short Dress Making course that will teach them in drafting, cutting, and sewing fabric and making them into casual apparels, rags, upholsteries, and the likes.

With the Rotary Club of Dadiangas' multiple interventions in the area, the health and socioeconomic well-being of the community are likely to improve. With the skills training program the women have acquired would become a life-saving moment in their lives that would give them income and pave their way to come out of poverty. These women are to become empowered and empowering them economically helps the gap as it gives them control over their choices to thrive. Wives are ultimately capacitated to putting food on the table; not simply as limited to doing household chores but as equal earners as that of their husbands. The once underserved Sitio Nopol has been discovered when Rotary serve to change lives.
