This was recommended by the first Editor-in-Chief and Charter Member, PDS/PP Marina B. Ruivivar and approved by the Charter President, PDG Evelyn A. Magno. The Professionals’ first publication was on July, 1993 during the club’s first regular meeting in its charter year. Publication was done weekly. It was simply computerized with photos in black and white. A year after, printing was done by the Tesoro’s Printing Press, owned and managed by PP Linda C. Tesoro, a charter member. This time, the club bulletin is published in color.

During RY 2020-2021 to RY 2021-2022, The Professionals was done as an E-Bulletin, published twice monthly because of the pandemic. This RY 2022-2023, we are launching the club bulletin in an improved format, to be published digitally once monthly.

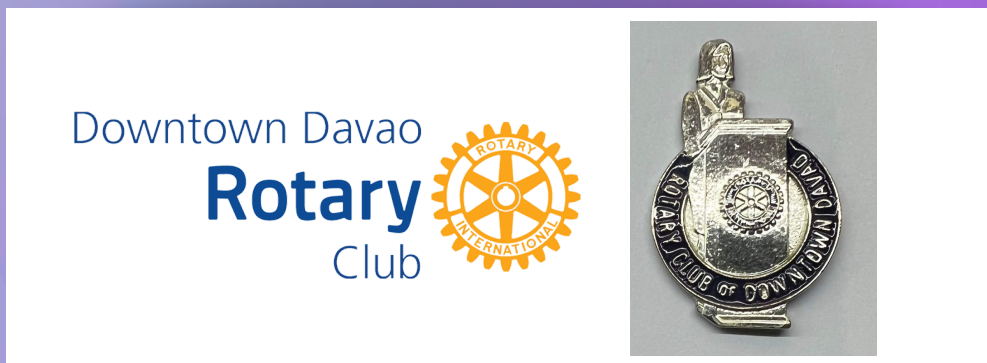

RCDD LOGO and PIN

The first club logo of the Rotary Club of Downtown Davao (RCDD) was designed in the middle part of its charter year by the Tesoro's Printing Press, initiated by PPLinda C. Tesoro, a charter member who was then the Committee Chair on Vocational Service.

RCDD was organized as an all-women service club, so the logo was of a dignified lady, in business suit at a rostrum signifying leadership, with the Rotary logo on the front side of the rostrum. For the RCDD pin, a ring around the logo with the name of the club on it, is added. The pin is in plain silver.



RCDD became a mixed club in RY 2018-2019. There was a suggestion to change the logo and present an entirely new layout. No less than the two active charter members, PP Marina and PP Vilma interpolated to preserve the old logo. As a way of compromise, a gentleman was just added standing beside the woman. In the advent of technology, a colored layout was conceptualized by PDG Riz Reyes. With a few refinements, the final new RCDD logo now depicts four colors: green, black, blue, and brown. On July 6, the new logo will be launched with the symbolic ceremonial pinning of the new RCDD Pin on the uniforms of the members.



Meet Our New President

ARCHIE FRANCISCO F. GAMBOA



Just as Rotary International (RI) made history this Rotary Year 2022-2023 with its first ever female President, Jennifer Jones, the Rotary Club of Downtown Davao (RCDD) is also making history with its first ever male president, Archie Francisco F. Gamboa.

President Archie got hooked on Rotary through his spouse, RI 3860 District Governor-Elect (DGE) Rozanne “Twinkle” Gamboa. When DGE Twinkle served as President of RCDD in 2016-2017, she enlisted the support of the entire Philippine Military Academy (PMA) Class of 1986 of her husband, Archie, to be RCDD’s partner-in-service.

This partnership gave birth to some of RCDD’s trailblazing projects that also support PNP’s programs such as building the Women’s Shelter for Victims of Violence at Camp Merezido in Police Regional Office 11; the donation of hospital beds and other medical equipment to the PNP Regional Hospital; and the Rotary School of Hope for Children in Conflict with the Law at the Davao City Police Office.

When President Archie rose to become the 23rd Chief of the Philippine National Police (PNP), he also mobilized the police force to partner with Rotary in various community service projects, notably in donating blood to the Philippine Red Cross; in promoting breast cancer awareness; and in the vaccination drive during the pandemic.

So even before he officially became a Rotarian in 2018, President Archie is already a valued partner of RCDD. In fact, he already received the “Rotarian Spouse Service Award” from RI in 2016-2017, the only Filipino awardee among the 50 other awardees from all over the world.

So it is no surprise that when he retired from government service, the four-star general would naturally assume a leadership role in Rotary. But before taking on the club presidency, he already served as Executive Director of RI District 3860 Disaster Management, Inc. and successfully implemented a Rotary Village to benefit more than 60 families in Magsaysay, Davao del Sur who were displaced by the 6.5-magnitude earthquake in October 2019.

President Archie is the perfect leader for imagining a Rotary that will effectively respond to the crisis brought about by the Covid-19 pandemic. He will bring a police general’s perspective and experience in organizing volunteers, managing resources, and rallying and lifting the morale of the RCDD “troops” to accomplish the club’s goals.

A lawyer like Rotary founder Paul Harris, President Archie shares an appreciation for truth, fairness, and justice and he is committed to promote Rotary’s Four-Way Test. His military training taught him to be stoic, capable of enduring hardships without complaints. In fact, he embraces any challenge as an opportunity to become better. His strong Catholic faith gives him the grace to serve others with joy and his generosity is legendary.

He is excited to lead RCDD on its 30th year, a major club milestone. He is the most prepared president in the history of the club being the first to complete a president’s workbook even before the Rotary year started. No doubt, he will also make sure that RCDD will not only accomplish all of its goals, but surpass them.

“It will be a team effort and I am just the team leader. RCDD has already made a reputation as an outstanding and multi-awarded club before I became a member. I am just continuing the legacy and, perhaps, will add a few surprises,” President Archie shares with a smile.



Rotary International President's Profile

PRES. JENNIFER E. JONES ROTARY INTERNATIONAL PRESIDENT

Jennifer E. Jones, a member of the Rotary Club of Windsor-Roseland, Ontario, Canada, has been nominated to become Rotary's International president for 2022-23, a groundbreaking selection that will make her the first woman to hold that office in the organization's 115-year history.

Jones will officially become president-nominee on 1 October if no other candidates challenge her.

Jones says she sees Rotary's Action Plan as a catalyst for increasing Rotary's impact.

"As we reflect upon our new strategic priorities, we could have never envisioned that our ability to adapt would become our North Star during what is inarguably the most profound time in recent history," Jones said in her vision statement. "Silver linings rise out of the most challenging circumstances. Using metric-driven goals, I will harness that historic landscape to innovate, educate, and communicate opportunities that reflect today's reality."

As the first woman to be nominated to be president, Jones understands how important it is to follow through on Rotary's Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI) statement. I believe that diversity, equity and inclusion...begins at the top and for us to realize growth in female membership and members under the age of forty - these demographics need to see their own reflection in leadership," Jones said. "I will champion double-digit growth in both categories while never losing sight of our entire family."

Jones is founder and president of Media Street Productions Inc., an award winning media company in Windsor. She was chair of the board of governors of the University of Windsor-Essex Regional Chamber of Commerce. She has been recognized for her service with the YMCA Peace Medallion, the Queen's Diamond Jubilee Medal, and Wayne State University's Peacemaker of the Year Award, a first for a Canadian. Jones holds a Doctor of Laws (LL.D.).

A current Rotary Foundation trustee, Jones has been a Rotary member since 1997 and has served Rotary as RI Vice President, director, training leader, committee chair, moderator, and district governor. She played a lead role in Rotary's rebranding effort by serving as chair of the Strengthening Rotary's Advisory Group. She is the co-chair of the End Polio Now Countdown to History Campaign Committee, which aims to raise \$150 million for polio eradication efforts.

Jones recently led the successful #RotaryResponds telethon which raised critical funds for Covid-19 relief and was viewed by more than 65,000. Jones has also received Rotary International's Service Above Self Award and the Rotary Foundation Citation for Meritorious Service. She and her husband, Nick Krayacich, are members of the Rotary Foundation's Arch Klump Society, Paul Harris Society, and the Bequest Society.



District Governor's Profile

GOV. LILO I. ALIÑO DISTRICT GOVERNOR

Lilo is an educator, an entrepreneur, and a Chamber advocate. But her enduring passion is service work in Rotary.

Lilo has been teaching at her alma mater, St. Theresa's College-Cebu where she graduated with a degree in Mass Communications. She has been teaching under the Masscom and Business programs since 1983. She is presently a board member of the STC Foundation.

She has over 35 years experience in Marketing Communication and is presently the managing director of lilo Advertising and Marketing Solutions, Inc.

Lilo has served the Cebu Chamber of Commerce and Industry for over 10 years; she was appointed as Cebu Business Month Chair and Adviser in 2018-2019, Vice-President for External Affairs in 2020-2021, and currently, as Trustee where she advocates for ease of doing business and to elevate the creative industry as another economic driver for Cebu. She is affiliated with the Philippine Marketing Association as Past President, Philippine Retailers Association as convenor for the Outstanding Filipino Retailer (Cebu), and Cebu International Film Festival as Past President and current Board Member.

Lilo is a proud member of Rotary Club of Cebu Gloria Maris since 2004. She was awarded as the most outstanding President of District 3860 in RY 2008-2009. She has served Rotary International as Assistant Public Image Chair in 2013-2015 for Zone 7A covering the Philippines and Indonesia. Lilo has served District 3860 in different positions since 2007. She served as Public Image Chair for 3 years, under her leadership, District 3860 was presented the outstanding performance award in public relations at the Rotary Institute in Bangkok in 2010. She served as District Governor's Representative to the Philippine Rotary Magazine for 3 years. She also served as Chair for Global Rewards, Deputy District Governor for Programs, District Awards Chair, District Trainer, and District Secretary. Currently, Lilo is the District Rotary Foundation Committee Chair serving 3 years until RY 2021-2022. Lilo will serve as District Governor in RY 2022-2023.

Her touchstone is her family: husband Dongie, a businessman and daughters, Marie Genevieve, a nurse in Australia and Marie Noelle, a writer and educator.

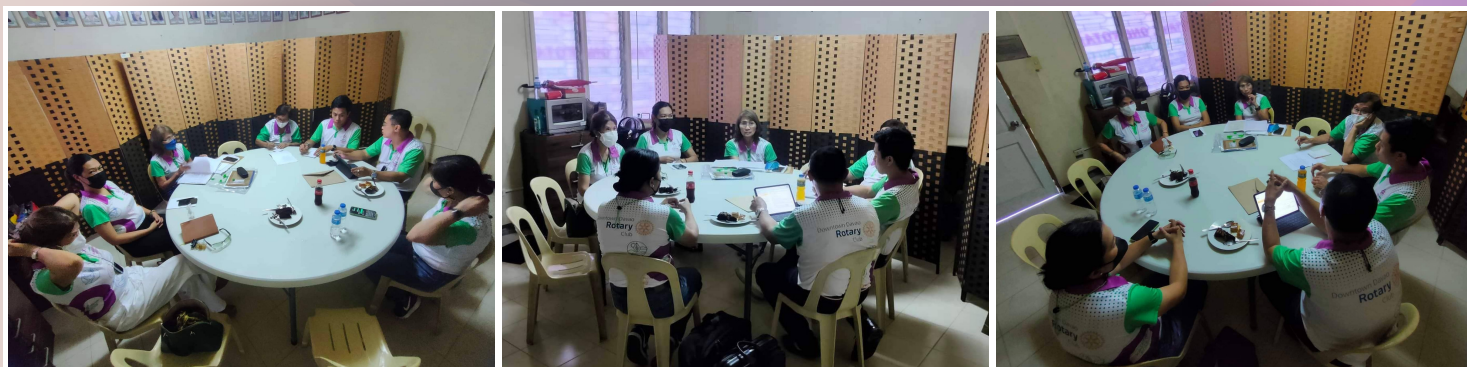
The Oath-Taking of the Members of the Board

There Are No Limits to What Rotary Can Be

The famous English poet William Blake said: *"What is now proved was once only imagined."*

The Rotary theme "Imagine Rotary" for the new Rotary Year 2022-2023 challenges all Rotarians to imagine a Rotary that continues to be relevant to a world that has undergone so many changes.

Rotary was first imagined into existence by its founder, Paul Harris, in 1905. The idea of Rotary was inspired by the camaraderie Harris witnessed among business owners and professionals in Chicago's North Side. He thought to bring these people together in the spirit of fellowship. He imagined: *"If others were longing for fellowship as I was, something would come of it."*

That something became a global network of 1.4 million people who belong to over 46,000 clubs working together to become one of the biggest volunteer humanitarian service organizations in the world today.

During its foundation in 1905 up to 1989, Rotary was exclusively for male members. This "male only" provision has been challenged as early as 1950 but resistance had been strong. It took a lawsuit by the Rotary Club of Duarte, California which reached all the way to the U.S. Supreme Court, for Rotary to finally make the historic change and admitted female members.

If the Rotary Club of Duarte did not imagine having women in their club, Rotary would have missed out half of the world's population as a resource to energize its clubs and provide different perspectives and solutions to social problems.

RI President 2022-2023 Jennifer Jones, Rotary's first female President, is the perfect leader to prove that the presence and leadership of women is better for Rotary and for the world.

The Rotary Club of Downtown Davao (RCDD), which started as an all-female club in 1993, has been living proof of women's outstanding leadership and service. Now that RCDD has proven that, it now elected its first male president, Archie Francisco F. Gamboa.

As a retired police general who served as Chief of the Philippine National Police (PNP), President Archie will have to reimagine public service in a new setting and doing things the Rotary way. And Downtowners are excited to imagine the new ways and perspectives that our first male president will bring to RCDD.

First female RI President and first male RCDD President. There are no limits to what we Imagine Rotary can be.

ROTARY CITATIONS

The Rotary Citation is an award that recognizes the hard work clubs do throughout the year. Taking action toward achieving the citation goals helps clubs engage their members, stay relevant in their communities, and run more efficiently. A welcoming and engaging club also reflects the values of Rotary. When clubs work to achieve these goals, they also contribute to the overall health and culture of Rotary for generations to come.

To be eligible for the Rotary Citation, clubs need to begin the year as active clubs in good standing - or having paid each invoice balance in full upon receipt. To verify that your club is in good standing, check your daily club balance report under Club Administration > Club Finances. You should have an outstanding balance of \$0.00. Invoices are due when they are posted, in mid-January and mid-July.

Rotary club leaders can go into Rotary Club Central and select at least 13 out of 25 goals they wish to apply toward citation achievement. This flexibility allows clubs to choose the goals that are the most relevant and achievable. In addition, many goals will be self-reported by marking "achieved" in Rotary Club Central.

To achieve the citation:

- Go to Rotary Club Central
- Review the 25 available goals
- Select at least 13 goals (or more than 50% of the available goals)
- Achieve those goals
- Report achievement in Rotary Club Central by 30 June.

Once you are in Rotary Club Central, navigate to the Goal Center, select the year, and click on the **All tab** to see the goals.

3.New member sponsorship	How many members will sponsor a new club member during the Rotary year?
4. Rotary Action Group participation	How many club members will be members of at least one Rotarian Action Group (RAG) during the Rotary year?
5.Leadership development participation	How many club members will participate in leadership development programs or activities during the Rotary year?
6.District conference attendance	How many members will attend your district conference?
7.Rotary Fellowship participation	How many club members will be members of a Rotary Fellowship during the Rotary year?
8.District training participation	How many of your club's committee chairs will attend the district training assembly?
9.Annual Fund contributions	How much money will be contributed to the Rotary Foundation Annual Fund by your club and its members during the Rotary year?
10.PolioPlus Fund contributions	How much money will be contributed to the Rotary Foundation PolioPlus Fund by your club and its members during the Rotary year?
11.Major gifts	How many single outright donations of US\$10,000 or more will be made by individuals associated with your club during the Rotary year?
12.Bequest Society members	How many individuals or couples will inform The Rotary Foundation of their plans to leave US\$10,000 or more to The Rotary Foundation through their estate.
13.Benefactors	How many individuals or couples will inform The Rotary Foundation of their estate plans to include the Endowment Fund as a beneficiary or will make an outright gift of US\$1,000 or more to the Endowment Fund?
14.Service Projects	How many service projects will your club complete during the Rotary year?
15.Rotaract clubs	How many new and existing Rotaract clubs will your club sponsor during the Rotary year?
16.Interact clubs	How many new and existing Interact clubs will your club sponsor during the Rotary year?
17.Inbound Youth Exchange students	How many Rotary Youth Exchange students will your club host virtually during the Rotary year?
18.Outbound Youth Exchange students	How many Rotary Youth Exchange students will your club sponsor virtually during the Rotary year?
19.RYLA participation	How many individuals will your club sponsor to participate in Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA) events during the Rotary year either in person or virtual?
20.Strategic Plan	Does your club have an up-to-date strategic plan?
21.Online presence	Does your club's online presence accurately reflect its current activities?
22.Social activities	How many social activities will your club hold outside of regular meetings during the Rotary year?
23.Update website and social media	During the Rotary year, how many times per month will your club's website or social media accounts be updated?
