



A RESOLUTION CONGRATULATING ROTARY INTERNATIONAL ON ITS 118th ANNIVERSARY AND SUPPORTING ROTARY WEEK 2023 IN DAVAO CITY

WHEREAS, on February 23 of every year, Rotarians around the world celebrate World Understanding and Peace Day, which is the commemoration of the first meeting of Rotary in 1905 in Chicago, Illinois, USA;

WHEREAS, Rotary International is a global network of 1.4 million members worldwide "who see a world where people unite and take action to create lasting change across the globe, in our communities, and in ourselves;"

WHEREAS, for more than a century, Rotarians champion peace, fight disease, provide clean water, save mothers and children, support education, grow local economies, and support the environment.

WHEREAS, the first Rotary club in Mindanao, the Rotary Club of Davao, was established on October 24, 1938, a year after Davao became a chartered city;

WHEREAS, no less than Davao City's first mayor, Santiago Artiaga, became the charter vice-president of the first Rotary club in Davao and in Mindanao;

WHEREAS, from that first mother club, Rotary has since organized 14 clubs in Davao City and all these service clubs have been and continue to be valuable partners of the City Government of Davao in various programs and projects through the years since 1938;

WHEREAS, Rotarians in Davao City, together with their partners in service and the communities they serve, celebrate Rotary Week from February 20 to 26, 2023 to commemorate the 118th anniversary of Rotary International;

WHEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED AS IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED, that this August Body congratulates all the Rotary Clubs in Davao City and joins them in celebrating the 118th Anniversary of Rotary International and commends the men and women of Rotary for their significant contribution to the growth and development of Davao City.

RESOLVED FURTHER that copies of this resolution be furnished all the Rotary Clubs in Davao City, the District Governor of Rotary International District 3860, the President of Rotary International, the Office of the City Mayor, the Office of the Vice-Mayor, and other concerned agencies for their information and guidance.





# THE FIRST DECADE: Setting the Foundation for Excellence

Our Charter President Evelyn Abellera-Magno holds the distinction of being the first woman District Governor of District 3860 during Rotary Year 2005-2006. Under her leadership, RCDD organized its first Interact Club and organized the Downtown Davao Foundation, Inc., which served as the financial arm of the club.

In our charter year, RCDD was the only club in District 3860 to be awarded the RI Presidential Citation of a "Balanced Club Achievement Award." On year one, RCDD already got three major awards for new clubs: Most Outstanding Club, Most Outstanding President, and Most Outstanding Club Bulletin for The Professionals.

That RCDD tradition of excellence started on the first year never wavered until the present and every year our club consistently earned multiple major awards and recognitions.

The first decade firmly established the good foundation with the strong leadership of the following past presidents:



### President Nelia P. Aportadera

under whose term the club's first Rotary Village Corps was organized; sent the first Rotary Exchange scholar to as well as hosted the first ROTEX scholar from the United States. The club's World Window Display won special recognition at the 1995 Rotary International Convention in Nice, France. The club received the same major awards as the first year.

President, RY 1994-1995



### **President Cynthia B. Rodriguez**

led the club's hosting of the Intercity Forum on Matching Grants and bested all 83 clubs in the District during the awards season and received the Presidential Citation for Integrity, Love and Peace.

President, RY 1995-1996



#### President Estrella Luz B. Cabebe

led the club's hosting of the First New Generation Conference and the club's first fund-raising event - a jewelry and fashion show. Under her leadership, the club also single-handedly and successfully hosted the District Assembly (DISTAS) 1997. The club won the Most Outstanding Club, President, and Secretary in the District.

President, RY 1996-1997



### **President Elisa W. Tay**

led the club in organizing its first club extension, RC Midtown Davao and published a book entitled "Facets of Davao History" as part of the Araw ng Davao celebration. RCDD was awarded the District Most Outstanding Club and President.

President, RY 1997-1998



### **President Linda C. Tesoro**

led RCDD's Dream Team. Under her leadership, the club's second Interact Club and the second extension club, RC Pag-Asa, were organized. Davao City was declared as the 19th Rotary Peace City of Rotary International through RCDD's initiative and the first Memorandum of Agreement was signed between the club and the City Government of Davao as a partner in service. The dream team won **President, RY 1998-1999** 



### **President Felina A. Javellana**

led the club in realizing its dream to have its own multi-purpose building. A 300-square meter lot was purchased through the Downtown Davao Foundation, Inc. at Barangay Centro, Agdao, Davao City. The land development and construction was funded by a Matching Grant and the World Community Service from Chiba, Japan. During this time, three past presidents left the club to organize the Rotary Club of Davao 2000.

President, RY 1999-2000



#### **President Vilma U. Kho**

led the club in organizing the first Rotary Community Corps at Barangay Centro, Agdao where the club's multi-purpose building is located. It was named "Center for Hope" and community and vocational service projects were implemented. The RCDD website created by then CICO Edna C. Ko won the "Best Website" award during the RI Convention in San Antonio, Texas, the lone awardee from the Philippines. RCDD was awarded the District Most Outstanding Club and President and Most Outstanding Vocational Service.

President, RY 2000-2001



### **President Chona Fortuna Caingles**

initiated Project Kontra-Baha in partnership with Task Force Davao and the Philippine Military Academy Alumni Association Davao Chapter. RCDD helped declog Davao City's open canals, donated garbage cans to barangays, and conducted an awareness campaign on the Solid Waste Management Program of the government. An Anti-Rabies campaign was also launched in partnership with the City Veterinarian Office. RCDD received the Most Outstanding Club President award.

President, RY 2001-2002

# The Second Decade: Overcoming Challenges and Responding to the Needs of the Community

On the second decade, the club, like the City of Davao, faced many challenges but it remained strong and undaunted with the leadership of the following past presidents:



### **President Charisse P. Puentespina**

responded to the problems on peace and order in the city by leading the club in launching the Anti-Terrorism Campaign named "Kalinaw sa Dabaw" in partnership with Task Force Davao and the Philippine National Police. The project O.Y.S.T.E.R for out-of-school youth; "Adopt-A-Park" in the city; and "Adopt-A-Ward" at the Davao Medical School Foundation Hospital projects were also initiated. The Family of Rotary and Rotakids were first organized. RCDD got the District Most Outstanding Club Bulletin award and Rotary Foundation District Service Award for President Charisse's Paul Harris Contribution.

President, RY 2003-2004



#### President Edna C. Ko President, RY 1998-1999

led the club in celebrating Rotary's Centennial Year. The club's banner project was the Nuing Spring Water for the indigenous tribe who had no safe drinking water in their remote village. This project won for RCDD the Most Outstanding Community Service award. RCDD hosted the District 3860 Membership Development Seminar and signed Sisterhood Agreements with RC Koronadal and RC Novato, California, USA for a Rotaplant Medical Mission in Davao City. RCDD was awarded the District Most Outstanding Club, International Service, Public Relations, and Most Outstanding President.



### **President Agatha Salanatin Valencia**

led the club in hosting the District Convention in Davao City when Charter President Len Magno became the first woman District Governor of District 3860. RCDD intensified its partnership with various government offices to implement education programs like the Alternative Learning System (ALS) and the Anti-TB Campaign. RCDD received RI Presidential Citation for Outstanding Club Service Projects.

President, RY 2005-2006



### **President Maria Richelle Bangoy Vicente**

led the expansion of the Center for Hope into a two-story building with the help of the World Community Service and Rotary clubs in Chiba, Japan. RCDD initiated the "Libreng Tawag" for overseas Filipino workers (OFWs) and their families in partnership with PNP and forged a partnership agreement with the Ray of Hope women's jail in Ma-a, Davao City. A Rotary marker with the 4-Way Test was installed at the center island of Barangay 7-A. RCDD got the Most Outstanding Club and President awards with certificates of recognition for all projects in the Four Avenues of Service in Area 2-C.

President, RY 2006-2007



### **President Eliza Joy Santos Hilario**

led the development of the Center for Hope with another expansion dubbed as the club's Monument of Service. The project was supported by RC Oyodo, Osaka, Japan. The Rotary Community Corps got sports facilities for children. RCDD Charter President Len Magno was awarded a Women in Rotary Award by Rotary International.

President, RY 2007-2008



#### **President Marina Bello Ruivivar**

started the institutionalization of the service programs offered in the Center for Hope. She led the club in establishing the Children's Day Care Center in partnership with the City Social Services and Development Office, which has been sustained until now. A nutrition and feeding program were added and school uniforms and school supplies for the children were provided. A community garden at the center was started to sustain the nutrition program. These programs designed for long-term sustainability was supported by the Rotary Foundation and USAID. The club also sponsored the first Rotary Peace Fellow from Mindanao to the Rotary Peace Center in Thailand. RCDD got the Most Outstanding President, Club Bulletin, Literacy Project, Public Relations for Mindanao and RI Presidential Citation awards. President Marina also received a District Governor's Service Award, another first for a club President. President, RY 2008-2009



### **President Thelma S. Ciudadano**

led the club in realizing one of RCDD's landmark projects, the Children's Library and Reading Center at People's Park which was funded by the RC Oyodo of Osaka, Japan and turned over to the City Government of Davao through then Mayor Rodrigo R. Duterte. RCDD also hosted a Group Study Exchange scholar from Canada and implemented two community water system projects. RCDD was awarded Most Outstanding Club President, Secretary, and Club Bulletin in Area-2C.

President, RY 2009-2010



### **President Cristeta G. Gallano**

led the club in strengthening its environmental projects implementing the 3-H Grant Community Water Project in Marilog, Davao City. Improvements were also made in the Center for Hope through new lavatories and comfort rooms for children and installation of rain water catchment. # RCDD's BRIEF PROFILE

Chartered on February 23, 1993, the Rotary Club of Downtown Davao (RCDD) started as an all-women club with 26 lady executives of various professions and vocations. The whole Rotary world was then celebrating the 88th Founding Anniversary of Rotary International when RCDD became the 29,258th Rotary club all over the world, and the 79th club in District 3860. Led by Charter President Evelyn "Len" A. Magno, RCDD on its first year was already blazing the trail and raising the bar for Rotary clubs in the District with a mark of excellence. Eleven (11) new members were inducted during the charter year, making a total membership of thirty-seven (37) women.

RCDD IS a multi-awarded service club in Davao City, a consistent recipient of annual District awards. In RY 1998-1999, RCDD won all the major district awards as the "Most Outstanding Club, President, Secretary, and club bulletin- The Professionals." It was a grand slam, besting then all 99 clubs in District 3860. RCDD is a 100% Paul Harris Fellow Club, and topping the annual list of club donors to The Rotary Foundation (TRF).

RCCD became a mixed club in RY 2018-2019 when two gentlemen were inducted to the Roster of Membership, the former PNP Chief Archie Francisco F. Gamboa and businessman Paulino B. Ko.. RY 2022-2023 starts with 27 members, 27 female, and 6 male members. twelve (12) are aged 40 and below.

The Downtowners are easily identified in their apple green blazers during formal and official Rotary events, and in their uniform club t-shirts during service project activities. They meet regularly every first Wednesday of the month at 12:00 noon. Fellowships are held during weekends.
