BASIC EDUCATION & LITERACY ROTARIAN ACTION GROUP (BELRAG)

In September, Basic Education & Literacy Month takes on even greater importance for Rotarians this year, as we come to see the profound impact of the pandemic on Education and Literacy. Since March 2020, more than 100 countries closed schools for extended periods of time, leaving more than a billion students out of school and many schools have yet to reopen.

As a result there is a great concern that many children will not return to class once schools are reopened because of economic impact, increased pregnancies, general disengagement from education. Yet we know that before pandemic 773 million youth and adults could not read and write and 250 million children fail to acquire literacy skills (UNESCO 2019). Despite gains made in the last two decades to improve literacy, schools closing during the COVID pandemic threaten to reverse positive trends made toward greater school participation as a result of extended periods of time when children and youth not been able to attend school.

Under Supporting Education - one of Rotary's seven Areas of Focus - Rotarians understand the critical Importance of literacy. The ability to read and write is an essential skill necessary for our ability to participate and contribute to society. Literacy empowers people, expands our opportunity to lead a productive and meaningful life. Literate people have access to better employment, improved child and family health, and improved nutrition.

BELRAG supports Rotarians to address these challenges to enable children to be confident readers and learners. BELRAG is offering three excellent opportunities to assist clubs and districts in their outreach to support literacy in their communities.

ACCESS TO BOOKS. At home and in school promotes love of reading and better performance in math, science and other subjects.

LITERACY OPPORTUNITY IN EVERY CO. UNITY. BELRAG Literacy Award is an annual opportunity for Rotarians to showcase their community literacy project.

QUALITY EARLY CHILDHOOD LITERACY. Basic Education and Literacy is the focus of TOGETHER WE READ, the partnership between BELRAG and Save the Children.





Dengue is a viral infection transmitted by mosquitoes, and it is the primary cause of viral diseases transmitted by arthropods worldwide. It is often referred to as breakbone fever because of the intense muscle spasms and joint pain it causes. It is also known as dandy fever or seven-day fever because the typical duration of symptoms is around seven days. While many cases of dengue are mild or show no symptoms, it can lead to severe illness and even death. The virus is transmitted by Aedes mosquitoes, which are prevalent in tropical and subtropical regions. Over the past few decades, there has been a significant increase in the incidence of dengue, and it has become endemic in certain parts of the world. Some individuals who have been previously infected with one strain of the dengue virus may experience severe capillary permeability and bleeding if they become infected with a different strain, a condition known as dengue hemorrhagic fever.

Dengue fever is caused by four different serotypes (DENV 1-4) of single-stranded RNA viruses belonging to the Flavivirus genus. When a person is infected with one serotype, they develop lifelong immunity against that particular serotype. However, this immunity does not extend to the other serotypes, which means that a person can still be susceptible to infection by the remaining three serotypes even after recovering from one episode of dengue fever.

Dengue infection is characterized by three distinct phases: the febrile phase, the critical phase, and the recovery phase.

During the febrile phase, the individual experiences a sudden onset of high-grade fever, typically reaching around 40°C (104°F), which lasts for approximately two to seven days. In some cases, about 6% of patients, a saddleback or biphasic fever pattern may occur, particularly in individuals with Dengue Hemorrhagic Fever (DHF) or severe dengue. This pattern involves the fever subsiding for at least one day, followed by a recurrence of fever for at least one more day. Other symptoms that accompany the fever in this phase include facial flushing, skin redness (erythema), muscle and joint pain (myalgias and arthralgias), headache, sore throat, redness of the eyes (conjunctival injection), loss of appetite (anorexia), nausea, and vomiting. Skin manifestations may include a blanchable macular rash that appears in the first one to two days of fever and on the last day of fever, or a secondary maculopapular rash that can develop within 24 hours.

The critical phase, which follows the febrile phase, is characterized by defervescence, a gradual decrease in body temperature to approximately



37.5°C to 38°C (99.5°F to 100.4°F), or lower, occurring from days three to seven. During this phase, there is an increased permeability of capillaries, leading to potential complications. The critical phase usually lasts for one to two days and is marked by a rapid decline in platelet count, elevation in hematocrit (the percentage of red blood cells in the blood) (leukopenia, a low white blood cell count, may occur up to 24 hours before the platelet count drops), and the presence of warning signs. If left untreated, the critical phase can progress to severe complications such as shock, organ dysfunction, disseminated intravascular coagulation (DIC), or bleeding.

The recovery phase signifies the gradual reabsorption of extravascular fluid, which typically takes place over the course of two to three days. During this phase, the patient may display bradycardia, a slower than usual heart rate.

It's important to note that dengue fever can vary in severity, and not all individuals progress through all three phases. Some cases may exhibit milder symptoms and resolve without progressing to the critical phase.

Expanded dengue syndrome refers to uncommon or atypical manifestations that can occur in patients with dengue fever, involving the neurological, hepatic, renal, and other isolated organs. These manifestations can arise due to severe shock resulting from the infection.

Neurological complications associated with expanded dengue syndrome may include febrile seizures in young children, encephalitis (inflammation of the brain), aseptic meningitis (inflammation of the membranes surrounding the brain and spinal cord), and intracranial bleeding.

Gastrointestinal involvement can manifest as hepatitis (inflammation of the liver), liver failure, pancreatitis (inflammation of the pancreas), or acalculous cholecystitis (inflammation of the gallbladder without the presence of gallstones).

Additionally, expanded dengue syndrome may present as myocarditis (inflammation of the heart muscle), pericarditis (inflammation of the sac surrounding the heart), acute respiratory distress syndrome (ARDS) characterized by severe lung inflammation and fluid accumulation, acute kidney injury, or hemolytic uremic syndrome, which involves the destruction of red blood cells, low platelet count, and kidney dysfunction.

These atypical manifestations can occur in individuals with severe dengue fever and are associated with organ-specific complications. It's important to recognize and manage these complications promptly to ensure appropriate medical intervention and improve patient outcomes.

Common laboratory findings include thrombocytopenia, leukopenia, elevated aspartate aminotransferase. The disease is classified as dengue or severe dengue.

Criteria for Dengue Include

- Probable dengue: The patient lives in or has traveled to a dengue-endemic area. Symptoms include fever and two of the following: nausea, vomiting, rash, myalgias, arthralgias, rash, positive tourniquet test, or leukopenia.
- Warning Signs of Dengue: Abdominal pain, persistent vomiting, clinical fluid accumulation such as ascites or pleural effusion, mucosal bleeding, lethargy, liver enlargement greater than 2 cm, increase in hematocrit, and thrombocytopenia.
- Severe Dengue: Dengue fever with severe plasma leakage, hemorrhage, organ dysfunction including transaminitis greater than 1000 international units per liter, impaired consciousness, myocardial dysfunction, and pulmonary dysfunction
- Dengue shock syndrome clinical warnings: Symptoms include rapidly rising hematocrit, intense abdominal pain, persistent vomiting, and narrowed or absent blood pressure.



It is vital to assess pregnant patients with dengue as the symptoms may be very similar to preeclampsia.

Treatment / Management

Treatment of dengue depends on the patient's illness phase. Those presenting early without any warning signs can be treated on an outpatient basis with acetaminophen and adequate oral fluids. Such patients should receive an explanation regarding the danger signs and be asked to report to the hospital immediately if they notice any. Patients with warning signs, severe dengue, or other situations like infancy, elderly, pregnancy, diabetes, and those living alone need to be admitted. Those with warning signs can be initiated on IV crystalloids, and the fluid rate is titrated based on the patient's response. Colloids can be started for patients in shock and are also preferred if the patient has already received previous boluses of crystalloid and has not responded. Blood transfusion is warranted in case of severe bleeding or suspected bleeding when the patient remains unstable, and hematocrit falls despite adequate fluid resuscitation. Platelet transfusion is considered when platelet count drops to <20,000 cells/microliter, and there is a high risk of bleeding. Avoid giving aspirin and nonsteroidal anti-inflammatory drugs, and other anticoagulants. No antiviral medications are recommended.

No laboratory tests can predict the progression to severe disease.

Prognosis

Untreated severe dengue fever may have a mortality rate of 10% to 20%. Appropriate supportive care reduces the mortality rate to roughly 1%.

RCDD's DAY CARE SERVICE PROJECT

Rotary dreams of a world where children are well loved, well fed, well nourished, well protected and well educated. The Rotary Club of Downtown Davao (RCDD) is helping towards realizing this Rotary dream.

In Rotary year 2008–2009, RCDD formally opened Day Care services to the children of families, who could not afford to send them to pre-schools. RCDD believes that basic education starts at home during their young age, but a support system is needed to help these children to properly grow during their formative years, learn their first literacy skills and develop friendship with others, which their families, particularly their parents could not efficiently give since they too are wanting of these skills.

In partnership with the City Social Services and Development Office (CSSDO), a Day Care was opened at the club's Center for Hope, with teachers trained, supervised and paid by CSSDO. This was to answer the call of the City Government to implement its Early Child Development Program.

RCDD provided for their children's school uniform, their school supplies and books. Free feedings were conducted to provide them with proper nutrition. Christmas for these children is a day when the RCDD Rotarians join them and their parents to share the joy of the season and gift-giving.

The Day Care Center is provided by RCDD with facilities needed for learning, including 2 children comfort rooms, one for the girls and one for the boys. A hand washing station is installed tto teach them proper sanitation and hygiene. A playground is likewise provided so they could be safe to play under the shade of the trees with some play facilities.

The RCDD Day Care Service Project has helped develop the children's total personality and learn their first ABC and 1-2-3 before they reach school age, and we are proud to be a part of their growing up. To this day, we are committed to continue caring for these children because we believe in preparing them for their future to CREATE HOPE for them and their families.

Chartered on February 23, 1993, as an all-women service club, by then RI President Robert R. Batch. The charter year was one great celebration as the whole Rotary world was then celebrating the 88th Foundation Anniversary of the Rotary International. RCDD became the 29,258th Rotary club worldwide and the 79th club in District 3860.

On its 26th year in RY 2018-2019, RCDD marked another historical milestone when it inducted two distinguished gentlemen to the club membership, Paulino B. Ko, a successful businessman, and Archie Francisco F. Gamboa, a high-ranking Police General, who then became the Chief of the Philippine National Police, and RCDD's first male club President. This turned RCDD into a mixed club from an all- women club to manifest Diversity, Equity and Inclusiveness (DEI).

This RY 2023-2024 RCDD starts its 31st year of service and fellow- ship with 37 men and women of various professions, leaders of their own fields of specialization. RCDD's Rooster of Membership is a balance of the senior-aged group, middle-aged and the young generation. This year marks another milestone as its very own Past President Rozanne "Twinkle" C. Gamboa is installed as District Governor, the second from the club. The first was the club's Charter President, Evelyn "Len" A. Magno.
