WHY BUILD ARTIFICIAL REEF DOMES

Man's activities and natural disasters have led to a reductions in our natural reef systems. Recreationally, growth in sports fishing, scuba diving, and boating has increased the pressures on these systems. Commercially, our seafood industry is dependent on developing the ocean to enable ever larger, yet sustainable, harvests. The loss of our natural systems, coupled with increased use, **COMPELS US TO DO EVERYTHING WE CAN TO SAVE NATURAL REEFS.** Even so, the natural reefs cannot rebuild themselves fast enough to meet human demands. Long lasting artificial reefs are useful tools for restoring our reef systems to a natural and productive balance. The key to making the decision to build a reef is having a properly defined set of project goals. Once these goals are established, it is possible to design a specific artificial reef that will accomplish that particular set of goals. It's not a simple process but the Reef Ball Foundation has completed a "[Step by Step Guide for Reef Rehabilitation for Grassroots Organization](#)" that will help you decide if designed artificial reefs are right for your project.

BAKAN—*Litsea philippinensis*

Local/Common Name: **Bakan**

Scientific Name: *Litsea philippinensis* Merr.

Family: Lauraceae

Distribution: Widely distributed and endemic to the Philippines; found in thickets and forest hills at low to high altitudes Propagation: By seeds

Average Height: 20 meters

Diameter at Breast Height: 40 centimeters Flowers: Axillary, small, greenish white or yellowish, arranged in 2-8 cm long pubescent racemes

Fruit: Sub-ellipsoid, about 8-10 mm long, g, fleshy; y; dark purple when young, black when ripe. Seeds sub-ellipsoid, black about 1-3 cm long

The pale golden-yellow wood is rather fine textured. It is very similar to baticulin (*Litsea obtusata*), and would certainly be accepted by sculptors to be used like that species for carving and sculpture, especially of sacred images[.]. There are a number of tree species (including this one) from southeast Asia that are in the family Lauraceae and produce a useful timber that is either not distinct enough in itself, or is in insufficient supply, to warrant being traded individually. These various species have been lumped together under the trade name ‘medang’[.]. We do not have any more specific information of the wood from this species, but a general description of medang timber is as follows:- The heartwood is very variable, from light-straw to red-brown and olive brown; the sapwood is ill-defined. The texture is moderately fine but even; the grain interlocked or wavy; the surface dull. The wood is soft to moderately hard, not very durable. It is easy to slightly difficult to resaw, and easy to moderately easy to cross-cut; easy to plane and the surface produced is smooth to moderately smooth. It is suitable for decorative work such as interior finishing, panelling, furniture and cabinet making. It is also suitable for plywood manufacture, whilst the heavier species are suitable for medium construction under cover[.].

RED LAUAAN — *SHOREA NEGROSENSIS*

Red lauan is a large tree attaining a height of about 50 meters and a diameter of about 200 centimeters. It is strongly buttressed and with straight-cylindrical bole. Its leaves are alternate, smooth, dark green above, hairy along nerves beneath, and oblong in shape.

The bark is dark brown to nearly black with reddish tinge. It is ridged with shallow furrows that are more prominent on the upper part of the trunk. The inner bark is dull tan or reddish and stringy in texture.

The species can be found in Luzon (Cagayan, Isabela, Nueva Ecija, Bataan, Bulacan, Laguna, Quezon, Camarines, Albay, Sorsogon), Polillo, Sibuyan, Samar, **Negros**, Cebu, Biliran, Leyte, Bucas Grande, and Mindanao (Surigao, Agusan, Misamis, Davao). It is also found in primary and secondary forests at low altitudes.

It can be propagated by seeds and by vegetative means (clones).

The trunk is used for furniture and cabinet-making, veneer and plywood, pulp and paper-making, particleboard manufacture, sash and mill work, boat planking and decking, and general building construction. Red lauan is a valuable export as sawn timber. The bark is considered to have great potential for use as building board.

S. negrosensis yields a pulp with high overall strength properties. The timber is commonly used as a compression member in timber-framed structures. The bark is a suitable source of tannin extract.

The tree is important in protecting watershed areas and potential in reforestation and agro-forestry, and provides wood used in making fencing material.

It is reported that the wood extractives are timber-inhibiting.”

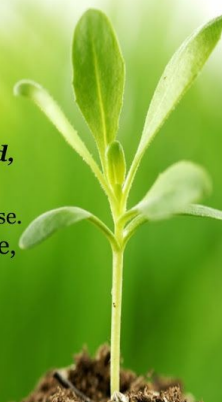
