# Rotary Information PE Kathleen A. Quintero

The Guatemala Literacy Project is working to reverse the country's low literacy rates and keep children in school



When Rotary International President Jennifer Jones visited a primary school in a farming village in Guatemala's highlands and asked who wants to become the country's president, the students' hands shot into the air. Before a Rotary-supported reading program began in the village of Chajalajyá, students would often drop out after a couple years of school. "Reading will change our society," Principal Vilma Nizeth Moreira told Jones during an April visit to the school. "These are powerful tools we are giving children to eradicate ignorance." Schools often teach in Spanish, but about 25 languages are spoken in the country, and there are few written materials in local languages.

The Guatemala Literacy Project has worked for 25 years to improve reading rates. In 1997, Joe and Jeff Berninger, brothers from Ohio, were volunteering as English teachers at a Guatemalan school that had no books. The two launched a project to solve that. The day the books arrived, there was a huge celebration, and a Rotarian dentist volunteering nearby heard the noise and asked what was going on. "He said this would be a perfect project for Rotary," says Joe Berninger, now a member of the Rotary Club of Pathways, Ohio, which coordinates the project.

Vilma Nizeth Moreira, the principal of a primary school in the village of Chajalajyá, has seen firsthand the students' success with help from the Guatemala Literacy Project.

Rotarians in Guatemala helped develop reading programs in other schools, and since 1997, The Rotary Foundation has helped fund the literacy project with 48 grants totaling \$6.5 million. Nearly 800 clubs in 90 districts have participated, making it one of the largest grassroots, multiclub, multidistrict projects in Rotary. The initiative also receives support from the U.S. nonprofit Cooperative for Education. "There's a lot of push and drive and enthusiasm that comes from Rotary," says Howard Lobb, Cooperative for Education's director of partner development, also a member of the Ohio Pathways club.

From that initial textbook project, the work has grown to include computer labs, Rise Youth Development Program scholarships, and the Spark Reading Program to provide books and teacher training.

Students pay a fee to rent textbooks, and the money is put into a revolving fund, used to replace the books after five years. "Rotary's donation acts as a seed investment, and when textbooks wear out or become outdated, the school ... can replace their textbooks with their own savings without having to ask Rotary for more funding," Lobb says.

Moreira, the village school principal, recalls a former student who stayed in classes thanks to a Rise scholarship and is headed to university. The girl read a book about Nobel Prize winner and Pakistani activist Malala Yousafzai that Moreira lent her. "Now this girl wants to be as big as Malala," she says. "It changed her life."

# **Rotaract Speaks**

# "Kita Naman"

"Kita Naman", is a waray-waray phrase commonly used in eastern Visayas, a reminder of the devastating effect and lesson of hope during Typhoon Yolanda last November 8, 2013.

Now, it's time to pay-back the blessings and help that we received during those times of challenge and calamity. The Rotaract Club of Kandaya Tacloban came up with the "Kita Naman", a relief operation and a flagship project that brings help and assistance to its beneficiaries.



1st Wave at Abuyog Community College with Rotaract Club of Kankabato, Rotaract Club of Central Tacloban, Rotaract Club of Tacloban and 546 th Engineer Construction Battalion, 53rd Brigade Philippine Army. A total of 168 beneficiaries were given relief packs, clothing and hygiene kits.

The first activity was held last April 16, 2022. A total of 168 beneficiaries located in five different evacuation centers at Abuyog Leyte received help from the "Kita Naman" relief operations. This was made possible by the help of our partner clubs and agencies in District 3860, (Rotaract Club of Kankabato, Rotaract Club of Tacloban, Rotaract Club of Central Tacloban and RAC Calbayog) and the 546th Engineer Construction Battalion, we were able to collect and distribute relief goods, clothings, and hygiene kits to typhoon-victims.



2nd Wave at Brgy. Balucawi Evacuation Center, Abuyog Leyte with Rotaract Club of Kankabato, Mindanao State University, and Malungon Youth Development Council. A total of 137 beneficiaries were given water jugs, relief packs and hygiene kits.

Our strong linkages with Rotaract Club of Kankabato, Mindanao State University, Malungon Youth Development Council, Paaralan para sa Sarangan Organization, CM and Malungon Youth Movement, also made the second wave of relief operations possible. This was held at Balucawi Evacuation Center, Abuyog Leyte last May 7, 2022 and a total of 137 beneficiaries were given relief packs and hygiene kits.



3rd Wave at Brgy. Utanan and Brgy. San Antonio Hilongos, Southern Leyte with Rotaract Club of Kankabato, PATTS Student Council (PATTS College of Aeronautics), and 546th Engineer Construction Battalion, 53 rd Brigade Philippine Army. A total of 100 beneficiaries were given relief packs, used clothing and hygiene kits.

Last May 24, 2022, the Rotaract Club of Kandaya Tacloban launched its 3rd wave of relief operations at Brgy. Utanan, San Antonio Hilongos, Leyte in partnership with the 546th Engineer Construction Battalion. Sharing with the beneficiaries them a total of 100 packs of hygiene kits and canned goods.

# DIVERSITY, EQUITY, AND INCLUSION CODE OF CONDUCT



#### **ROTARY CORE VALUES:**

Fellowship Integrity Diversity Service Leadership

This code of conduct reflects our core values and explains the responsibility that comes with being a Rotarian and Rotaractor, which includes members from nearly every country in the world, speaking over 100 different languages. committed to upholding and evolving this code our organization grows.

Like our core values, we expect Rotarians and Rotaractors to exemplify this code of conduct as they interact with one another, Rotary program participants, Alumni, project partners, and members of the community. Specifically, the code of conduct applies at all club, district, zone, and Rotary International meetings, trainings, events, and anywhere else a member represents Rotary and on My Rotary and social media

#### **Expectation:**

All club members and other participants including Rotary program participants, Alumni, project partners, and representatives of Rotary are expected to comply with this code of conduct, be considerate and contribute to a collaborative, positive, and healthy environment in which all are respected and valued.

#### **USE RESPECTFUL LANGUAGE**

- When you first meet someone, introduce yourself and explain how you would like to be addressed, including your preferred pronouns (he/him/his, she/her/hers, they/them/theirs).
   Call others by their preferred name, rather than using a nickname that is easier to pronounce.
- When addressing larger groups, utilize gender neutral words to avoid gender assumption.
- Use active listening to deepen your understanding of others.
- Be conscious of language use and adapt depending on region. Some wording is acceptable in some cultures but unacceptable in others
- Avoid slang or idioms that do not translate across cultures or be deliberate in explaining them to share our diverse cultures and languages.
- Speak plainly and avoid acronyms and jargon that not everyone may understand.
- If you are curious about someone's cultural background, faith, sexual orientation, gender, or another characteristic, ask if they are open to sharing more about themselves. Refrain from asking if the topic is not relevant to your conversation.
- Foster an atmosphere of intergenerational dialogue and avoid describing anyone by their age.

#### **BE SUPPORTIVE**

- Be an ally and advocate for others and be ready to intervene when you see a need.
- If you see or hear something inappropriate, address the behavior in a way t0 offer support to those affected.
- As a member of Rotary, uphold the Code of Conduct, build this culture within your club experience, and address any issues as they arise.

# FOSTER A WELCOMING AND INCLUSIVE ENVIRONMENT

- Ensure every member and participant can fully engage in any meeting, event, or activity that you organize in person or online by offering an accessible venue, simultaneous interpretation, closed captioning and/or transcripts, and other resources as needed.
- Review any club or program traditions and stop or change activities that may be offensive or alienating to a specific group.
- Create a welcoming environment and include all in conversations, projects, and events.
- As much as possible, pay attention to nonverbal communication such as eye contact, facial expressions, tone of voice, personal space, gestures, and posture, and how it impacts your ability to engage with and relate to others.
- Know the important dates of various religions and schedule events and activities in a way that is inclusive and considerate of people who observe them.
- Be aware of people's dietary and health restrictions.
- Open opportunities for everyone to hold leadership roles in your club and district or engage with your community partners.

#### **CELEBRATE DIVERISTY**

- Increase your club's awareness, understanding, and acceptance of people with disabilities.
- Celebrate a variety of cultural events and religious observances, rather than continually conducting service projects or hosting events associated with a single culture or religion.
- Acknowledge and celebrate significant dates relevant to diversity.
- Avoid stereotyping and mocking any specific group.
- Acknowledge and celebrate different genders.






