

ENGAGEMENT THROUGH EXPERIENCE

During the COVID-19 pandemic's initial U.S. wave in 2020, Detroit, Michigan, was one of many cities where first responders and medical personnel needed more personal protective equipment. A Rotary club in India learned about the situation and contacted its longtime partner, the Rotary Club of Detroit.

"Our Indian partners got to work and were able to locate and coordinate shipments of personal protective equipment to Detroit," says Margaret Thorpe Williamson, a past club president who is now assistant governor of District 6400. She says the club has always had an international perspective and has worked with partners in Australia, Canada, Ethiopia, India, New Zealand, and more.

Getting needed equipment from India to the U.S. is just one example of the power of the Rotary network. And being able to instantly activate that network to make positive change is a key factor in engaging participants, because it shows people the breadth of Rotary's reach and how quickly members can take action.

"If you're interested in knowing something about women's economic development in Papua New Guinea, it takes two phone calls to reach a Rotary club or member who can tell you more," says John Townsend, chair of the Rotary Action Group for Reproductive, Maternal, and Child Health. "If we can make this incredible network known to more people, we're going to attract and engage more [people of action] to Rotary. And that means our clubs will be in very good hands for the future."

Highlighting Rotary's capability for broad engagement is also critical to showing members with big ideas that no club is too small to make a difference and that Rotary brings clubs together for large-scale projects.

"If you want to make an impact on maternal and child health, you have to go big — to make a difference at scale and for the long term," Townsend says. "It's going to take more than helping one clinic or one school."

Another experience that lets members engage more deeply with members around the globe is getting involved with a Rotary Action Group. These groups are independent, Rotary-affiliated organizations made up of people from all over the world who are experts in a particular field, such as peace, economic development, or the environment. Action groups offer their technical expertise, global network, and support so that clubs can plan and implement projects that increase their impact — a key priority of our Action Plan. But only about 10 to 15 percent of Rotary members participate in action groups, Townsend says. That means people may be missing out on experiences that can connect them more with others and with Rotary.

For Williamson, joining an action group was a way to expand her horizons and ensure that her club didn't become "just a check-writing" organization. "I realized there were other people to meet and other clubs to work with," she says. She later became chair of the Rotary Action Group for Community Economic Development, which had 11 countries represented on its board of directors.

"We all need to be willing to step outside of ourselves and embrace new people and opportunities to serve above self," she says. "I've been enriched by all the relationships I've made in Rotary — and we know that the more relationships people make, the longer they stay in Rotary. Helping people experience the full power of the Rotary network is really a way to look toward the future."

The TRF Grants Dir. Lolit Escano

The Rotary Foundation offers grants that support a wide variety of projects, scholarships, and training sponsored by clubs and districts around the world.

Types of Grants

District Grants

District grants are block grants that enable clubs and districts to address needs in their communities and abroad. Districts may request up to 50% of their District Designated Fund for one grant annually) to support district- and club-sponsored activities, including vocational training teams, scholarships,humanitarian service projects, and youth programs that align with the Foundation's mission.

Global Grants

Global grants offer clubs and districts opportunities to participate in strategically focused, highimpact activities. These grants fund large-scale international humanitarian projects, vocational training teams, and graduate and postgraduate scholarships that have sustainable, measurable outcomes in one or more of Rotary's areas of focus.

Disaster Response Grants

Rotary disaster response grants support relief and recovery efforts in areas affected by natural disasters within the past six months. Qualified districts in affected areas may apply for grants of up to \$25,000, based on the availability of funds. Districts may apply for additional grants after they report on any previous disaster response grants. Grant funds can be used to provide basic items such as water, food, medicine, and clothing. Districts that request help are responsible for determining the needs in communities affected by disaster. They should work closely with local officials and community groups to ensure that the funding meets those needs.

All humanitarian projects, scholars, and vocational training teams funded by global grants work toward specific goals in one or more of the Foundation's areas of focus:

Peacebuilding and conflict prevention Disease prevention and treatment Water, sanitation, and hygiene Maternal and child health Basic education and literacy Community economic development Environment



QUALIFICATION AND STEWARDSHIP

What districts must do

To participate in grants, districts must complete an online qualification process in which they agree to follow and implement the financial and stewardship guidelines in the district memorandum of understanding. Each district must also conduct a grant management seminar as part of the qualification process for clubs.

What clubs must do

Clubs must complete an annual qualification process to be eligible for global grants. To qualify, clubs must send one or more members to the district's grant management seminar, sign and adhere to the club memorandum of understanding, and fulfill any additional qualification requirements set by the district.

Grant Application Process

Once they are qualified, clubs and districts may submit district and global grant applications through the Grant Center. Applications for global grant scholars who will begin studies in August, September, or October must be submitted to the Foundation by 30 June. Applications involving travel need to be submitted 90 days before the travel dates. To apply for disaster response grants, the district governor and district Rotary Foundation chair complete the Rotary Disaster Response Grant Application and send it to grants@rotary.org.

Reporting

Final reports that document the disbursement of district grant funds must be submitted to the Foundation within 12 months after sponsors receive the payment, or within two months of the last payment. Global and disaster response grant sponsors need to send in a first progress report within 12 months of receiving the first grant payment. After that, progress reports are due within 12 months of the acceptance date of the previous report. Final reports need to be submitted within two months of completing the project. District and global grant reports are submitted through the Grant Center. Disaster response grant reports are sent to grants@rotary.org.

EduCar: Building a Glimmer of Hope for Disadvantaged Children

A forlorn silhouette of a child was seen from afar as we slowly, yet excitedly, strolled towards that edifice that embodies the hopes and dreams of 11 disadvantaged children. As we get nearer, the silhouette takes the form of a little boy who now bears a broad smile on his face. He stood up, waving his hands in the air, eyes filled with joy, and shouted, "Ate! Kuya!"

We smiled back, swallowing a lump of pain, knowing how difficult their condition is. But we masquerade that with loving smiles as we grasp the surprises we prepared for them that day. We may not be there daily, but we know our presence gives them a glimmer of hope. Being present makes them feel that someone cares for them and that they're not alone. This gives them a trail of rainbows despite their clouded state.

Our third EduCar episode emphasized the importance of studying well to reach their dreams. The club conducted an activity wherein the children drew an image of who they wanted to be when they grew up. To our surprise, almost half of the children dreamed of becoming soldiers.

Surprising as it may seem, we also understood that they see soldiers as heroes, especially since some troops from the 546th Engineer Construction would join us to empower these young men. You can't imagine their joy as they listened to the heart-moving story of Sgt Gilbert on how he became part of the Philippine Army. Like the soldiers, for sure, they also want to extend help to other people — the same way they are being assisted now. It could be a way for them to pay back when it's their turn to lift others from mudded grounds. Since it is still not yet a reality, it now sits as their ultimate dream.

The children's dreams keep them going. To dream is to fill themselves with a burning flair to take every small step they can, no matter how dwindling the path will be. And it is our mission to support them and be with them as they slowly reach these dreams.

It may sound ambitious to sustain our assistance to these disadvantaged children. But we know that with the support we get from kind-hearted individuals and groups, we can continue building their trail of rainbows until they're strong enough to build their own.
