MEET THE RI PRESIDENT

STEPHANIE URCHICK

Genuine, authentic, kind, committed...a few of the many words frequently used to describe 2024-2025 Rotary International President Stephanie Urchick.

Three facts about Stephanie:

1. She's the biggest Pittsburgh Steelers fan
2. She can Polka with the best of them
3. She studied Russian, Serbian, Italian, and French in school

Urchick is seen as a uniter. Find her at any event and you'll see people gathered around her, listening intently — much like players gather huddled around their coach. They unite, all a part of the same team. Until, 30 June 2025, that team is Rotary and Urchick is our coach. So there's really only one thing left to say: Game on...



Music has been a touchstone throughout Urchick's life. Her dad played the accordion and led a polka band, the Harmonizers, for more than 35 years. "I learned to polka before I learned to walk," she says. Urchick was a singer with her father's band and when she's in town, she sings with the Orthodox church choir directed by another of her cousins. "You know how some families get together and play cards?" she asks. "My father was a musician. My grandmother, my aunts, they were all singers. So when we got together, we sang."

Urchick grew up here in western Pennsylvania, near the border of West Virginia, a countryside of forests and farms in the foothills of the Appalachian Mountains. Both her maternal and paternal grandparents moved here from Eastern Europe (Poland, Slovakia, and Ukraine), settling down to take advantage of the jobs in the region's coal mines and steel mills. When she arrived in the United States, her mother knew one sentence: "Give me some potatoes."

Urchick's culture and her family remain important to her. Spend a bit of time with her and you're likely to hear family lore involving a misunderstanding around beets and the power of a patron saint and stories about her visits to meet distant relatives in Eastern Europe. She gathers regularly with Hatalowich and her other maternal cousins who live nearby, and she gets together with her more far-flung paternal cousins for an annual trip.

As a child, Urchick devoured Nancy Drew mystery novels and dreamed of being a spy. "I was in this little place in Pennsylvania, and I really had never gone anywhere," she says. "I wanted to see the world." When she went to college, she channeled that desire into a major in international relations, with its focuses on history, political science, and languages. She studied Russian, Polish, Serbian, and Italian, on top of the French she'd learned in high school. As she was finishing up college, she applied to work for the FBI, the CIA, and other U.S. intelligence agencies. But there was one obstacle: All four of her grandparents were from Eastern Europe. "Most people's background checks take about three or four months," she recalls. "Well, mine apparently took a year and a half." By the time the FBI called with a job offer, Urchick had started down a new career path as an administrator in higher education. And she loved it. She declined what had been her dream job (although she jokes that her work with Rotary is merely an elaborate cover for her cloak-and-dagger pursuits), and she went on to earn a master's degree in education and a doctorate in leadership studies. Her dreams of an international career were back-burnered — that is until Rotary came along.

When she went to her first meeting of the Rotary Club of California, a town south of Pittsburgh, she met Chuck Keller, a member of the club and RI's 1987-88 president. "He introduced himself and we got to be friends quickly," she says. "I had a built-in Rotary godfather. It was amazing." Urchick dove in, hosting Group Study Exchange team members and pitching in with the club's Youth Exchange students. She organized an indoor picnic complete with a three-legged sack race. "Oh, my gawd," she says in her Pittsburgh accent, "it was hilarious."

Given Urchick's background in international relations, her interest in peace as another of her priorities as president likely comes as no surprise. She encourages living The Four-Way Test, investing in a positive club culture, and engaging with Rotary Peace Centers as ways members can help spread the message of Rotary's commitment to peace. "We're not going to get a Nobel Peace Prize for stopping a war," Urchick says, "but we can use what we have in Rotary to make the world a better place."

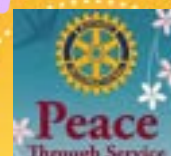

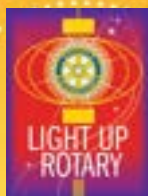

Yang Leadership Award, People Award, Regional Franchisee Award for Visayas, National Franchisee Award as awarded by Philippine Franchising Association Franchising Excellence Awards and the most coveted Fred L. Turner Golden Arch Award, an award given to the Top 1% of McDonald’s Franchisees of more than 38,000 restaurants across the globe.

DG Caycay is married to Robert “Bobby” Andrade, a past president from the Rotary Club of Tacloban. They are blessed with five children – Carl, a specially gifted child; Tanya, a lawyer; Meggy, a graduate of Hotel Restaurant and Institution Management; Sean, a certified public accountant; and youngest Denise, an incoming College student.

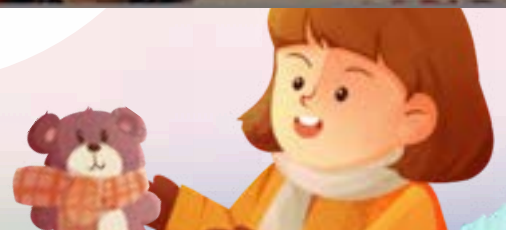
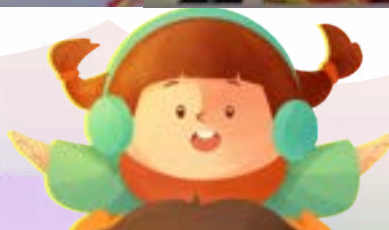


PEOPLE OF ACTION

RCP 101 Co-celebrates Happy Rotary New Year Children's Party

It is always refreshing to begin with a good deeds. So as to start the New Rotary Year, the Rotary Club of Polomolok 101 joint together with other Rotary clubs from GenSan (Area 3F & G) for various activities targeting the seven areas of focus at the Rotary Village in Alabel Sarangani Province on July 1, 2024. This activity is intended for children but we opted to also include their parents to benefit from the services being offered by the Rotary Clubs to make everyone happy at the Village. Services offered include free medical check up with medicines by the Medical staff of St Elizabeth Hospital. Meanwhile, a lecture on Preventive Oral Education for children along with their mothers/guardians and tooth Fluoride Application for ages 3 to 10 years old were administered by Philippine Dental Association- GenSan Chapter. Rotarians also happily demonstrated the Proper Hand Washing Drill along with volunteer children. Right after the Tooth Fluoride Application, gift-giving took place with the following items- toothbrush & toothpastes, slippers, school supplies, hygiene kits, & loot bags. To complete the children's party, snacks were served with nutritious Bread,Puto & suman, juice, ice cream and hot arroz caldo.

Activities for adults include tree planting, mats and rug making, and lecture on Drug Prevention & Campaign among young people and household. More than 300 children & 50 adults benefited from this activity. The magic has indeed started!

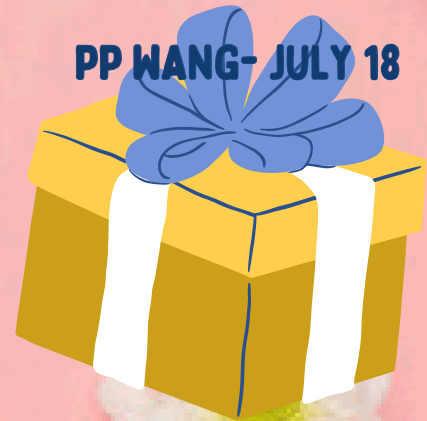
