R.I. PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



If we are to truly change the world with The Magic of Rotary, it's up to all of us to foster a sense of belonging in our clubs. But every club should take its own path to get there, and the Action Plan can help you find your way. What does that look like?

Take for instance the Rotary Club of Beveren-Waas in Belgium. It was chartered in 1974 but has evolved with the times, developing both a strategic plan and a membership plan. To find new members, the club analyzes the city's professions to help focus its search, and all new members are quickly assigned tasks and roles.

The club also mixes up meeting times, alternating between evening and afternoon sessions, making them accessible for all members.

Sometimes, circumstances force clubs to make changes. But as people of action, we know that behind every obstacle is an opportunity.

The Rotary Club of Holyoke in Massachusetts was forced from its meeting place because of rising costs after the COVID-19 pandemic, but members took this setback and turned it into a strength. The club started meeting in a library community room that was available for no charge and catering lunch from a nearby deli. Lunch costs \$10 per person but it's optional, so no one has to spend money to attend a meeting. What a great way to work toward being "fair to all concerned."

Since making this change, the Holyoke club has gained 13 members. I suspect part of its membership growth is due to the club's sense of inclusivity — the first step toward belonging.

If you ask members what they expect from the club experience, you might find that your club doesn't meet expectations. Think of this as an opportunity to reshape your club in exciting ways, as alternative club models are making a positive impact.

For example, a Rotary Fellowship called Beers Rotarians Enjoy Worldwide, or BREW, has worked closely with the Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene Rotary Action Group for the past eight years to assist with clean water projects. In that time, BREW has funneled 25 percent of its dues to those initiatives.

BREW is one of many examples of members pursuing belonging to improve the world.

I can't stress enough the importance of belonging. Clubs become simply irresistible when all members feel that they are exactly where they need to be. To me, belonging is the spark that ignites The Magic of Rotary .

As you receive feedback from club members and the community you serve, I urge you to pursue that spark. The Action Plan can help you find the path to success, and if you light your way with the spirit of belonging, that path will lead to a bright future for your club, your community, and the world.

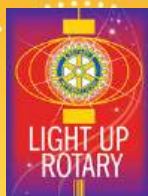

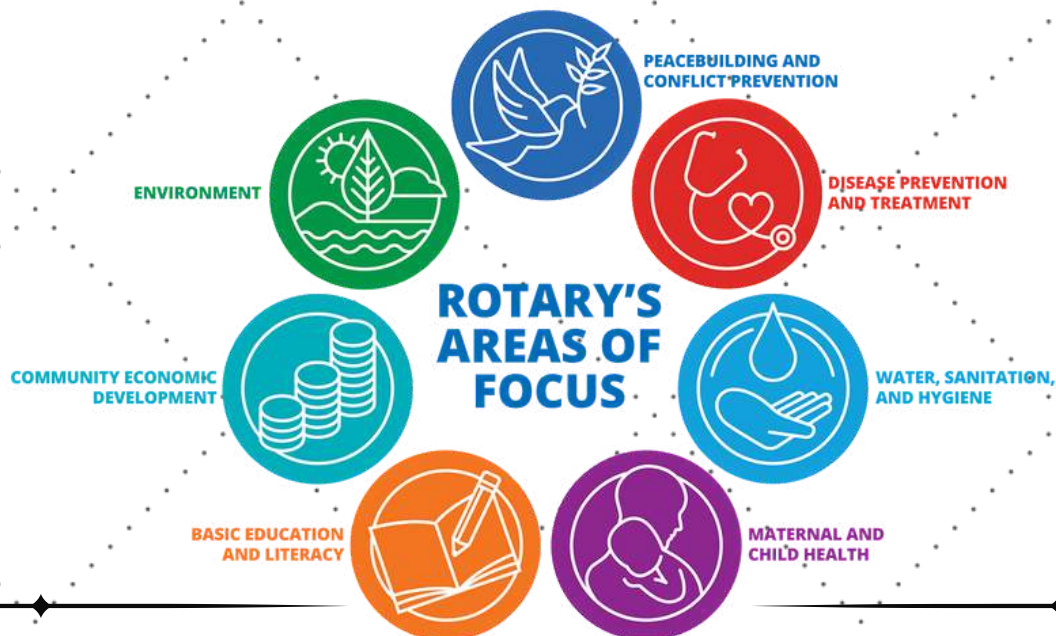

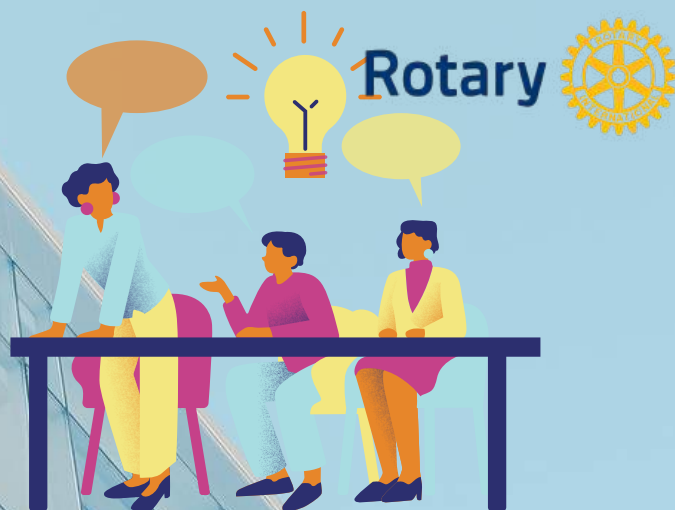
- *Get more involved in your community

Celebrating diversity in the 2024 Olympic Games

The Olympic Games in Paris are especially delightful this year. They mark a historic milestone in gender equality. After 128 years, an equal number of male and female athletes are participating.

For the first time, the number of male and female athletes will be equal in 28 of the 32 sports that will award medals. The number of mixed-gender events where women and men compete together will increase from 18 to 20. Women will compete in 152 events, while men will compete in 157 events.

We wouldn't be here if it weren't for a woman named Stamata Revithi. One hundred and twenty-eight years ago, Revithi became the catalyst for an incredible uprising in sports history when she insisted on running a marathon. She was around 30 and had moved to Athens, Greece, with her two children to find work. She loved long-distance running, so she applied to participate in the Olympic marathon. The International Olympic Committee rejected her application.

PAVING THE WAY

Revithi was stubborn. To at least show the Athenians that she could do it, she decided to run the 40-kilometer course on her own the day after the official marathon. She started her run at 8 a.m. and finished in about 5 hours and 30 minutes. During this time, she collected witnesses and documents to verify her run. But when she arrived at the Panathenaic Stadium, soldiers prevented her from entering. This historic moment became a symbol of the struggle for women's participation in the Olympics. Revithi paved the way for women to compete in the next Games.

Since then, diversity, inclusion, and equal opportunity have become the Olympics' most important values. In the 1936 Berlin Olympics hosted by Nazi Germany, African American athlete Jesse Owens defied the racist rhetoric of the host country by winning four gold medals. His long-jump record remained unbroken for 25 years.

The 1980 and 1984 Olympics failed to provide equal opportunities and inclusiveness due to politics. The United States boycotted the 1980 Moscow Olympics to protest the Soviet invasion of Afghanistan, and the Soviet Union retaliated by boycotting the 1984 games in the U.S. For athletes in both countries, years of preparation were wiped out.

My own country made its first appearance at the Paris Olympic Games 100 years ago, with 40 athletes. All our representatives that year were men. But Turkey did have a commitment to women's sports. Mustafa Kemal Atatürk considered sports something that determined the level of development of a country. In 1926, to enable women's participation, specialists were brought from Sweden to train Turkey's first female physical education teachers at the Çapa Girls' Teacher School.

The last Olympic Games Atatürk witnessed was the 1936 Berlin Olympics. Here, Turkey not only won its first medals but was represented by female athletes for the first time. Halet Çambel and Suat Fetgeri Aşeni, who competed in fencing, were the first Muslim female athletes to compete in the Games. In this year's Olympics, a total of 102 Turkish athletes – including 54 women and 48 men – will participate in 18 sports.

OLYMPIC MOTTO

The Olympic motto is “Citius, Altius, Fortius,” or “Faster, Higher, Stronger.” Can we be faster if one of us is missing? Can we reach higher if we separate a few of us? Is there a possibility of being stronger if we do not include everyone? I don't think so. I believe the Olympics brings us closer to global citizenship. I believe that sports, like art, will heal us by using the ointments of universality and diversity. I believe that competition under the roof of friendship blunts the power struggles in our souls. That's why, Paris, I'm eagerly waiting for you. I wish all our athletes success.

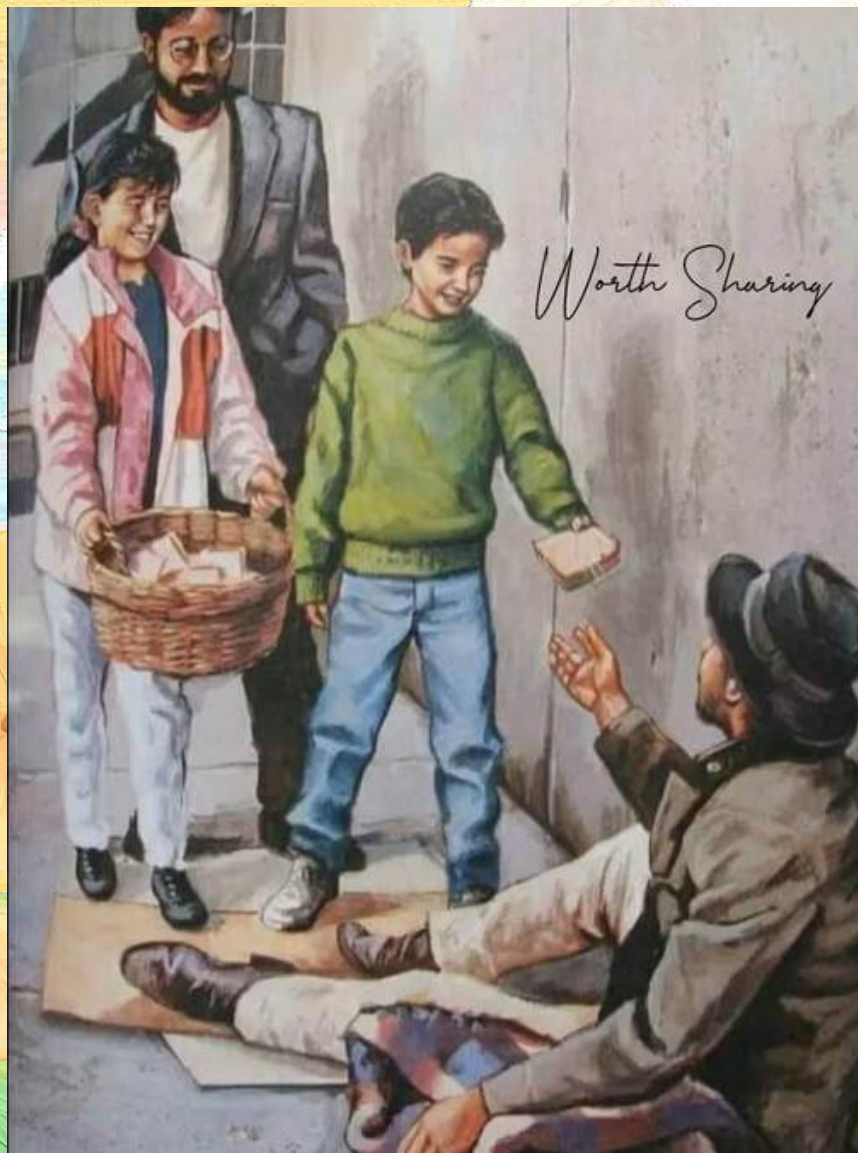

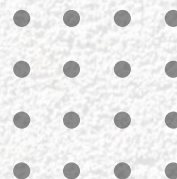

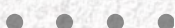

History of the Rotary Club of Polomolok 101

The Rotary Club of Polomolok 101 was officially chartered as a legitimate club by Rotary International, through the efforts of its mother club – the Rotary Club of Midtown Gensan on August 31, 2005. As early as February 2003, there were already numerous attempts to organize a Rotary club in the municipality of Polomolok, but it was only in January 2005 when persistence finally paid off. With the blessing of RC Midtown Gensan, Omar Gallinero became the new club's Charter President, leading 25 other charter members with various classifications. Rotary Club of Polomolok 101 was formed under the leadership of Len Magno as then the District Governor of 3860. The club's name is suffixed with the number 101 for two significant reasons: one, the club was founded on Rotary International's 101st foundation anniversary; and the club was the 101st club to be chartered under District 3860.

The Rotary Club of Polomolok 101 was registered under District 3860, Area 3F with Club Number 70517 . To date, the Club runs on man-strength of twenty five(25) committed individuals.
