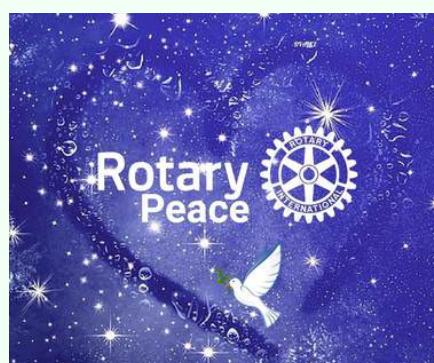

Peace fellows are dedicated champions of transformation, addressing critical issues such as refugee resettlement, youth and women's empowerment, and reconciliation in conflict zones. Many founded vital organizations or hold leadership roles in governments, nongovernmental organizations, and international institutions like the United Nations and World Bank. One inspiring story is that of Ntang Julius Meleng, a 2024 Rotary Peace Fellow at Makerere University in Uganda. Through his Social Change Initiative, Julius has worked to empower young people in Cameroon to take active roles in peacebuilding and leadership.

His project provided training in conflict prevention, civic engagement, and leadership to youths and community officials in areas affected by conflict, equipping people to drive sustainable peace efforts. Julius harnessed Rotary's global network to overcome obstacles, including limited funding and security risks, and make a meaningful impact. The Rotary Peace Fellowship gave Julius the tools and support to turn his vision into reality. His work embodies The Magic of Rotary – the transformative power of connecting people, sharing resources, and uniting for a common purpose.

As we reflect on the achievements of our peace fellows and celebrate Rotary's enduring commitment to peace, let us also recognize the role that everyone in our network of 1.2 million members plays in creating magic through service. Together, we can amplify our impact, inspire new generations of leaders, and build a brighter, more peaceful future.

THE IMPORTANCE OF PEACE: A STORY OF SERVICE AND HOPE

PEACE is more than just the absence of war; it is the foundation upon which communities grow, children thrive, and societies flourish. My journey as a Military Officer assigned to war-conflict remote provinces in Mindanao opened my eyes to this painful reality, yet it also ignited in me a passion for peace and education.

During my time in the military, I was deployed to areas where armed conflict was a part of daily life. Fear loomed in every corner, and the people—especially children—lived in uncertainty. Many of these children had never set foot in a classroom. Some were already older but could not even read or write because war had robbed them of their right to education. Witnessing their struggles, I knew I had to do something. I started volunteering to teach them, offering them not just knowledge but also hope for a better future. In their eager eyes, I saw resilience; in their enthusiasm, I saw the promise of a brighter tomorrow.

That experience changed me. When my time in the military ended, I carried with me the lessons of my service and the deep desire to continue my mission of peace through education. This calling led me to become an educator, dedicating my life to empowering children with knowledge and opportunities. Education, I realized, is one of the most powerful tools for peace. When children learn, they grow up with the ability to dream beyond conflict, to aspire for progress, and to become instruments of change in their communities.

As a Rotarian, I continue my advocacy for peace and education. The Rotary motto, "Service Above Self," aligns perfectly with my belief that peace is built through acts of kindness, understanding, and service. I share my story not for recognition but in the hope that it inspires others to take action—whether through education, humanitarian work, or simply by fostering understanding among different communities.

Peace is possible when we work together to break the cycle of violence and ignorance. It begins with the smallest acts—teaching a child to read, extending a helping hand, or choosing dialogue over conflict. It is my hope that by sharing my journey, more people will realize the profound impact of peace and education, and that together, we can build a world where children no longer have to suffer the consequences of war.

Let us all be ambassadors of peace, one child, one lesson, and one act of kindness at a time.

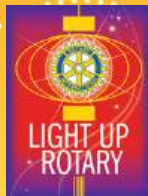

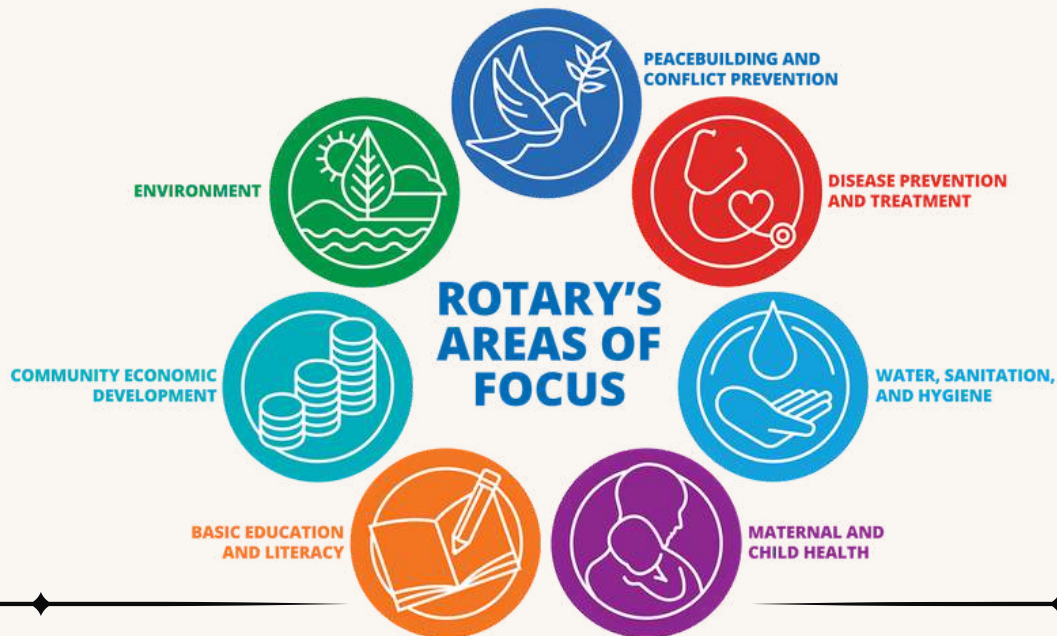

THE RI PRESIDENT-ELECT SPEAKS ABOUT THE POWER OF ROTARY'S MEMBERS

Rotary International President-elect Mário César Martins de Camargo asked members to Unite for Good by embracing growth, service, and connection as he outlined a plan to expand “the best-qualified team of volunteers on the planet.”

“Rotary’s greatest asset is not our history, our projects, or even our unmatched global reach. It is our members,” de Camargo said at the organization’s International Assembly in Orlando, Florida, USA, on 10 February. He noted praise from one of Rotary’s partners about “the extraordinary dedication” of Rotary members. “That recognition from an outsider deepened my understanding: Rotary’s greatest gift to the world is its people.”

De Camargo, a member of the Rotary Club of Santo André, São Paulo, Brazil, emphasized the importance of seeking out new perspectives and strengthening Rotary’s service to communities around the globe. He outlined three “essential pillars” for growth: innovation, continuity, and partnership.

Ultimately, de Camargo said, all of Rotary’s achievements and growth depend on members. By focusing on attracting and retaining them, Rotary can renew its strength as well as its ability to create change in communities for years to come.

“In a world often divided, Rotary stands as a beacon of unity and hope,” de Camargo said. “Our projects bring together people of all races, religions, genders, ideologies, and economic backgrounds, uniting us in a shared purpose: to do good in the world. ... Let’s build a Rotary that unites for good and ensures a brighter future for all.”
