ROTARY CLUB OF POLOMOLOK 101 PARTICIPATES IN COOPERATIVE MONTH CELEBRATION AND MOVE-UP PROJECT LAUNCHING

The Rotary Club of Polomolok 101 joined hands in celebration of Cooperative Month and in support of the Dolefil CARES Community Outreach Program spearheaded by Mahintana Foundation, Inc., in partnership with the Local Government Unit of Polomolok and the People's Multi-Purpose Cooperative. The event was held on October 29, 2025, at the Landan Barangay Covered Court.

Our very own Past President Dr. Bel Acuesta rendered her professional service by administering fluoride applications to over one hundred Indigenous People (IP) children to help protect their teeth from cavities. Each child also received a free toothbrush and toothpaste after the procedure.

Prior to the fluoride application, an educational session was conducted for the IP children and their mothers on the proper techniques of tooth brushing and handwashing, emphasizing the importance of good hygiene practices in maintaining overall health.

This partnership activity highlights the commitment of the Rotary Club of Polomolok 101 to promote community health and well-being while supporting initiatives that strengthen local resilience and cooperative empowerment.

The MOVE-UP Project (Mainstreaming Opportunities and Ventures for Economic Upliftment of People) is a three-year program funded by BPI Foundation and Dole Philippines, and implemented by Mahintana Foundation, Inc. It aims to develop inclusive and sustainable micro-enterprises among conflict-affected and vulnerable communities in Polomolok.

Through collaboration and service, the Rotary Club of Polomolok 101 continues to be a partner in creating opportunities and uplifting lives

What used to paralyze hundreds of thousands of children every year now exists only in a few areas. That's an incredible success — but until we completely wipe it out, every child everywhere is still at risk.

That's why our contributions matter. Every peso we give helps buy vaccines, support health workers, and reach children even in the most remote communities. Through Rotary's PolioPlus program, we help ensure that no child will ever suffer from this preventable disease again.

It doesn't take much to make a big difference. A small contribution from each Rotarian adds up to millions of lives protected. When we give, we're not just donating — we're giving a gift of health, freedom, and a future without polio.

Together, let's continue what Rotary started. Let's be part of history — the generation that finally ends polio for good.







The Rotary Club of Polomolok 101 was officially chartered by Rotary International on August 31, 2005, through the dedicated efforts of its mother club, the Rotary Club of Midtown General Santos. While initial attempts to establish a Rotary club in Polomolok began as early as February 2003, it was only in January 2005 that persistence bore fruit. With the support of Rotary Club of Midtown General Santos, Omar Gallinero was appointed as the club's Charter President, leading 25 charter members from diverse professional backgrounds. The club was established under the leadership of then-District Governor Len Magno of District 3860.

The number 101 in the club's name holds special significance. First, it marks the club's founding during Rotary International's 101st anniversary. Second, it represents the club's distinction as the 101st chartered club under District 3860.

Registered under District 3860, Area 2F with Club Number 70517, the Rotary Club of Polomolok 101 continues to thrive, powered by a dedicated team of 26 committed individuals who embody the spirit of service above self.







