Tips for Recruiting, Supporting & Endorsing Successful Peace Fellows



Use Your Network

Utilize the district's existing connections. Project partners and local organizations may be able to refer candidates from their staff or networks.

Think outside the box! Peace fellows come from all walks of life and a variety of professional backgrounds. Consider recruiting unconventional candidates.

Have a connection with a local university? Ask them to help advise candidates on what universities are looking for from students.

Be Honest with Candidates

Talk with candidates about their experience and motivations, and be honest about their fit for the program.

Ask about personal readiness to study abroad for an extended period of time. Consider asking:

How will they handle being away from family and friends?

How will they cope with the stresses of living in a different culture?

How will they adapt to an academic environment?

Review and Refine Applications

Ensure that candidates incorporate information in their essays about their goals and why the Rotary Peace Fellowship is the right fit for them, and in return, what they can add to the Rotary community.

Review candidate resumes for clarity and to ensure they highlight relevant experience.

Help candidates eliminate language and grammar errors from their materials.



🔼 🖁 Work as a Team

Appoint a District Rotary Peace Fellowship Subcommittee Chair.

Establish a subcommittee to help with recruitment tasks, mentoring, conducting interviews, and writing endorsements.

Create a plan to rotate the responsibilities of the Subcommittee Chair to preserve knowledge and prevent burnout.





Be Consistent

Set an interview day or week that is publicized to clubs and candidates in advance.



Finalize a list of interview questions and a standard rubric for assessing candidates.

Plan how you will interview remote or at-large candidates using tools such as Skype or Zoom.

Discuss the subcommittee's endorsement decision immediately following the interview. Let candidates know the decision as quickly as possible.



Connect to Rotary

Explain your district's expectations for fellows' continued engagement with clubs, your district, or Rotary International.

Build a connection between candidates and a club or Rotarian mentor so they feel engaged with the organization.

Teach candidates about Rotary and its impact on community and international development.

Rotary Projects Around the Globe

CANADA



Herring are food for salmon, halibut, lingcod, seabirds, and orcas and other marine mammals, and are a traditional staple of First Nations tribes' diet. But herring populations are in decline because of overfishing and the degradation of preferred egg-laying surfaces such as kelp fronds and eelgrass. In February, Rotarian "sea foresters" in British Columbia dropped herring curtains into Porpoise Bay, northwest of Vancouver. The curtains — heavy-duty landscape fabric cut to lengths of about 8 feet, floated with foam and nylon rope or PVC pipe, and anchored with rocks — are ideal surfaces for the fish's eggs. Since 2020, nearly 30 volunteers have installed more than 100 curtains and returned weekly to monitor them through the spawning cycle. Six Rotary clubs are participating in the project, led by the Rotary Club of Sechelt.

Public safety in Cali has improved since the mid-1990s, when drug cartels lorded over the city. The Rotaract Club of Cali-Norte is promoting peace and conflict resolution through its Re-Créate initiative, "a social and psychoeducational intervention project" involving role-playing, discussions, arts and crafts, music, and athletics at a local school, says Diana Rivera, immediate past president of the club. Since 2017, hundreds of children have participated in the program, which covers social topics such as bullying, setting personal boundaries, and team building. "We make two visits per semester on Saturdays," Rivera says of the initiative. Though the COVID-19 pandemic has sidelined a popular soccer tournament fundraiser, individual donors, raffle proceeds, and other initiatives have filled the gap as the club works to enhance Re-Créate with digital offerings.



PEACEBUILDING AND CONFLICT PREVENTION





DISEASE PREVENTION AND TREATMENT

More than 100 million people are pushed into poverty each year because of medical costs. We aim to improve and expand access to low-cost and free health care in underdeveloped areas. Our members educate and mobilize communities to help prevent the spread of major diseases such as polio, HIV/AIDS, and malaria. Many of our projects ensure that medical training facilities are located where the workforce lives.



WATER, SANITATION, AND HYGIENE

More than 2.5 billion people lack access to adequate sanitation facilities. At least 3,000 children die each day from diarrheal diseases caused by unsafe water. Our projects give communities the ability to develop and maintain sustainable water and sanitation systems and support studies related to water and sanitation.



MATERNAL AND CHILD HEALTH

At least 7 million children under the age of five die each year due to malnutrition, poor health care, and inadequate sanitation. To help reduce this rate, we provide immunizations and antibiotics to babies, improve access to essential medical services, and support trained health care providers for mothers and their children.



BASIC EDUCATION AND LITERACY

Sixty-seven million children worldwide have no access to education and more than 775 million people over the age of 15 are illiterate. Our goal is to strengthen the capacity of communities to support basic education and literacy, reduce gender disparity in education, and increase adult literacy



COMMUNITY ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

Nearly 1.4 billion employed people live on less than \$1.25 a day. We carry out service projects that enhance economic and community development and develop opportunities for decent and productive work for young and old. We also help strengthen local entrepreneurs and community leaders, particularly women, in impoverished communities.



ENVIRONMENT

We are committed to supporting activities that strengthen the conservation and protection of natural resources, advance ecological sustainability, and foster harmony between communities and the environment. We empower communities to access grants and other resources, embrace local solutions, and spur innovation in an effort to address the causes and reduce the effects of climate change and environmental degradation.
