Capt. Bethoveen Rubinos who is also the incumbent President of Rotary Club of Tagum.

Rev. Fr. Alfredo B. Elnar, Jr. July 11, 2021 meeting of the Rotary Club of Tagum Golden LACES



For this short input, I intentionally prepared this in a way that even those who are not Catholics can resonate because I know some of you belong to other religious traditions. With that in mind, even though I am invited in this virtual meeting in my capacity as a Catholic priest, there is no need to worry because I'll speak on conceptions and principles that lay men and women can easily standard.

For this occasion, I propose to ponder conscientiously on two key words in this brief talk, namely: service and change. In addition, we'll discover how people's attitude on service and change affect their commitment to the philosophy of a particular group. Personally, I do not have major credentials in psychology and counselling although I can share some titbits from what I have undergone through the years.

Let's start. I guess I have to start with establishing certain facts. On my part, answering the calling to the priestly ministry demands a life-long commitment and that holds true as well for other professions. The Catholic priesthood, to be clear, is not a profession but a vocation. But God, whatever He is called in different religions, calls us to different paths of life so that this transitory life on earth will be meaningful. As a starting point, all of you who are listening choose to be part of the Rotary Club because it's a calling worth entering.

Before elaborating on these two words, I would like to assert first that anyone who goes into service and commits to change is a person who is able to expand his or her horizon in life. That explains why a reasonable degree of maturity and professionalism is expected among members of an organization like the Rotary Club. As a student at St. Mary's College under the RVM sisters, I used to remember that one of the goals of the school was to form students who are catalysts for change. The teachers required us to memorize the vision-mission of the school in preparation for the PAASCU accreditors' visit but I never bothered to look into the dictionary as to what and who is a catalyst. Lo and behold, I discovered that a catalyst is "an agent that provokes or speeds significant change or action." Browsing into internet sites about Rotary International, I come to the thought that Rotarians are indeed contemporary catalysts for change.

Now, let me first go through the facets of the word service.

The noun service, like any other words in the dictionary, is vulnerable to misunderstanding inasmuch as the word salvage took a different meaning in the Philippines in the 1970s and 80s. Here, I am attempting to offer four propositions on the meaning of the word service.

1.1. Service is done in the context of socialization. It is relational. Service is interpersonal. It reaches out to others. It is only possible in persons who come out of their comfort zones to engage with a mysterious world with its hopes and miseries. Hence, on the opposite side, a person who draws oneself to isolation is incapable of service or any life-long commitment. This explains why marriages wherein one of the spouses has narcissistic traits can be a candidate for a declaration of nullity of their church marriage. My point is that a person who cannot afford to take any risk in socialization is incapable of service in any organization.

In any case, a person who believes in a philosophy of service refuses to be engulfed with fatalism. When I was at Roxas City last April for psychological assessment and psycho-education sessions, I learned from a priestpsychologist that there is such a thing as maladaptive belief of failure which affects the attitude and performance of a person who is a rank-and-file employee or a member of a group. In effect, a life spent in service believes in the good inherent in humanity. These people, like Rotarians hopefully, look beyond imperfections. These are the kind of people who believe that humanity can move on from hurts and pains. These people have a reasonable amount of optimism to continue going forward. I believe that is exactly what Rotarians are advocating.

Service, in the context of socialization, is facilitated by a human need for belongingness. It means that we've come to realize that there's a lot we can do if we have others with us who share our vision of goodwill and peace. This need for belongingness gives rise to fraternities, sororities, associations, cooperatives, companies, etc. Furthermore, it seems to me that all of us in this virtual meeting are not naïve on the phenomenon of globalization. In fact, we often just take it for granted but we are actually affirming what Aristotle would say that man is a social animal by nature which is the entry point of service.

1.2. Service is embodied in committed persons. Definitely, the word service cannot be seen walking around. In short, there is a doer of the action as one would say in in terms of grammar. But the human person, however, is dynamic and has its mortality to face. I'll have to ask all of you here: What have you become when you started to realize that you will not live forever? Whether you believe in Darwin's evolutionary science or not, we cannot but affirm that the human race has definitely made a big imprint on this planet but that starts with individuals who are committed. But what's in that commitment? Any commitment will inevitably include one's acceptance of limitation. With our undeniable mortality, stronger commitments are made by persons. So, some persons who had befriended the reality of death had achieved greater accomplishments because it made their life worth living. Service may become part and parcel in a person's search for meaning in life. Hence, I also believe that Rotarians are indeed committeed persons because it makes their lives worth living.

1.3. Authentic service presupposes self-esteem. During a psycho-spiritual seminar, our class was told about this important equation: self-knowledge and self-acceptance begets self-esteem. Self-esteem is crucial in order to deliver what is being aimed to give. It should not be denied that many people, in fact, enter groups and organizations for all the right reasons they have in mind. Some of these reasons may be actually ulterior. Are they trying to prove something? When somebody joins the Rotary Club, what is it that he/she is looking forward to? Remember that there is a difference between awareness and commitment to change. Some are obviously aware of their weak-nesses yet they still push themselves to social groupings without a commitment to change themselves for the bet-ter. And so, when they enter social groupings, they brought along with them their agendas. And maybe some of them wish to feel better when they're in a group without acknowledging their individuality. Many people might go into service to serve their own unconscious needs. If they do not find themselves fulfilled, then, they look for it somewhere, transferring from one group to another. So, it is my hope that the Rotary Club will all the more recognize the uniqueness of its members in attaining a common objective.

1.4. Service, in all its forms, needs re-examination. Since service is essentially relational, service is, in effect, placing a high regard for others. But every human person is dynamic. From time to time, each of us will face existential questions especially during milestones and stepping stones in our lives. Why am I doing this? Why this repetitious cycle in life? And for sure, there is almost nothing to end human pride as long as human beings inhabit this earth. This pride, as well as other countless emotions, affects our service. You and I have our own pride in varying degrees even those who claim as or acclaimed to be philanthropists. It is but conventional to expect that we grow in maturity especially if one is a member of a group that cares for goodwill and peace.

And now, I'll proceed to present points to ponder on the word change.

2.1. The reality of change needs a solid foundation of self-knowledge. As a seminarian before, I learned that every person is unique and unrepeatable. God created the souls of each person which we all have. Our soul remains even with all the physiological changes that come in life including natural death. I suppose that all of us here in this virtual meeting, if not the majority of us, had in one way or another heard of Erik Erikson's famous Eight Stages of Life wherein all human persons face particular struggles according to their particular stage. A toxic person, for example, does not respect the pacing of peoples, ultimately lacking self-knowledge. Persons who have deep-seated anger issues, for example, are people who are actually angry with themselves but cannot afford to shame themselves before others, so, they choose to explode at the mistakes of other people. Eventually, we need to face and resolve ourselves so as to establish a firm ground especially if we attach ourselves to a group that cares for humanity. That demand is reasonable because you eventually cannot give what you do not have. So, Rotarians must be integrated persons, that is, persons who are healed so that they can heal a broken world.

2.2. Change can be befriended to facilitate growth. Anyone who had gone through social studies knows by now that the reality of change occupies the pages of history books. Change may not be easy to accept and, for some, change can be scary. In a similar case, persons who refuse to accept the reality of aging, for example, may insist in wearing fashionable clothes conventionally worn by teenagers. Another example: a male with a distorted view of masculinity might devour younger women when his wife could no longer satisfy him in bed. People who refuse to acknowledge change are incapable of commitment and responsibility. In so many words, all of our actions, conscious or subconscious, reflect our core beliefs on the reality of change. Furthermore, it is undeniable that many people invest so much money in avoiding pain and undesirable circumstances in life. Haven't we notice that insurance and health care companies get richer when they exploit our anxiety? The late Dr. Leo Buscaglia, a sought-after T.V. personality in the 1980s, once remarked that some people spent lots of money on professional fees in the belief that these professionals would ultimately solve their pains and hurts. Changes can either isolate a person or can be befriended so that it will become an avenue for growth. What is my point here? Especially with the phenomenon of globalization, Rotarians must be all the more flexible because uncontrollable changes will modify the services that the group is envisioning to deliver.

Summary: When I studied and taught for a short period at the Ateneo de Davao, I came across a quotation from the Jesuit Pedro Aruppe who said in 1973 that education should form persons-for-others. I think that is a brief and apt description of a person who is a member of the Rotary Club. As I said earlier, one necessary foundational conviction that each Rotarian must have is a firm belief in the inherent goodness in humanity.

In my own personal life as a newly ordained priest, I can say that ministry is so taxing precisely because it is relational. The priesthood indeed is a life of service that aims for change. And from my own family upbringing and social influences, I am a person who has his own personal issues and dramatic setbacks in life. But I voluntarily and consciously entered the priestly ministry because I responded to a calling which has concrete manifestations that unfolds in time. Mostly, it is about getting in touch with feelings and to objectify matters one at a time. That long unfolding in my life, including thirteen years of training, made me attune to the reality of change so that my ministry (service, in short) can be efficient.

The same pattern is applicable to all members of the Rotary Club. We all have our share in human foolishness and in the flaws of human existence (separation, break-ups, death of a loved one). But Rotarians, I believe, are people who dare to cross beyond the misery to effect significant changes in people's lives. Without this fundamental conviction in the goodness of humanity, whether someone believes in God or not, any service that aims for change loses its relevance. Henceforth, I urge all you in hold on to that optimism that brings change through selfless service.








ROTARY CLUB OF TAGUM GOLDEN LACES HISTORY

The idea of organizing an all-female Rotary Club of Tagum was thought of as early as 1989 by the Rotarian and Anns of RC Tagum North. The initial organizing of the club however started only sometime in the first week of February 1991.

The names of 28 selected ladies were first floated by the Rotarians & Anns of RC Tagum North. Out of this number, 16 responded by attending the first organizational meeting held at Magnolia Kiosk along Quezon St., Tagum. Other ladies were later invited to the regular weekly meetings as prospective members of the club although their attendance along with some of those who were initially invited were irregular. In this organizational meetings, Rotary Information was given by Rtn. Jess Albacite, Special Governor's Representative and PP of RC Tagum North, Rtn. Rey Vegara, Incumbent President RC Tagum North, Rtn. Bebot Madayag, District Governor's Representative & PP of RC Tagum. Other Rotarians who helped in giving various information included Rtn. Arrel Olaňo, PP RC Tagum; Rtn. Danny Lee, Past DGR and PP of RC Tagum North; Rtn. Jun Cagas and Rtn. Raffy Erfe, both RC Tagum North.

Out of the original forty (40) ladies who were invited to organizational meetings, only 25 were finally submitted for charter membership of the new club. The names which were submitted to Rotary International on October 30, 1992 are as follows: Nelida Aguillon, Cynthia Catungal, Leonida Decena, Natividad del Rosario, Maria Cleofe Evidente, Corazon Fernandez, Susan Franco, Rebecca Lectura, Flordeliza Magallon, Marilyn Grace Mangilet, Jocelyn Melendres, Ofelia Millan, Anna Geraldine Morante, Nenita Nazareno, Providencia Nuňez, Jocelyn Ong, Evelyn Ross Perdido, Carolina Quirante, Mai Rallos, Agnes Resurreccion, Linda Sicam, Lay Fong Soo-Montero, Arisfina Torre, Conchita Yago, and Amelie Tan-Ramos.

Susan Franco, Sec.; Rtn. Jocelyn Melendres, Tres.; Rtn. Linda Sicam, Auditor; Rtn. Conchita Yago, P.R.O.; Rtn. Natividad del Rosario, Sgt-at-Arms; Rtn. Corazon Fernandez, Dir.; Rtn. Agnes Resurreccion, Dir.; Rtn. Marilyn Grace Mangilet, Dir.; and Rtn. Arisfina Torre, Dir.

The club officers & members of the newly organized ROTARY CLUB OF TAGUM GOLDEN L.A.C.E.S. (Ladies in Action Committed to Effective Service) first met DG Xavier C. Ledesma, Incumbent District Governor for 1991-1992, at Molave Hotel on Sept. 4, 1992 in his club visitation of the Rotary Clubs in Tagum.

On December 1, 1992, the club received the good news from SEABO that its application for membership was formally admitted by Rotary International on November 19, 1992 with Club No. 29117.


