- Opening schools: In Afghanistan, Rotary members opened a girls' school to break the cycle of poverty and social imbalance
- Teaching adults to read: Rotary members in the United States partnered with ProLiteracy Detroit to recruit and train tutors after a study showed that more than half of the local adult population was functionally illiterate.
- New teaching methods: The SOUNS program in South Africa, Puerto Rico and the United States teaches educators how to improve literacy by teaching children to recognize letters by sounds instead of names.

HISTORY OF ROTARY INTERNATIONAL

Paul P. Harris, an attorney, wanted to create a professional group with the same friendly spirit he felt in the small towns of his youth. On 23 February 1905, Harris, Gustavus Loehr, Silvester Schiele, and Hiram Shorey gathered at Loehr's office in Room 711 of the Unity Building in downtown Chicago. This was the first Rotary club meeting. They decided to call the new club "Rotary" after the practice of rotating meeting locations.

Within five years clubs had formed across the country, from San Francisco to New York.

In August 1910, Rotarians held their first convention in Chicago. The 16 clubs that existed at that time united to form the National Association of Rotary Clubs.

In 1912, the name changed to International Association of Rotary Clubs to reflect the addition of clubs in other countries. The name Rotary International was adopted in 1922.

By July 1925, Rotary had grown to more than 2,000 clubs and an estimated 108,000 members on six continents.


Rotary's reputation attracted presidents, prime ministers, and a host of other luminaries to its ranks — among them author Thomas Mann, diplomat Carlos P. Romulo, and composer Jean Sibelius.

As Rotary grew, members pooled their resources and used their talents to serve their communities. The organization's dedication to this ideal is best expressed in its motto: Service Above Self.




FUNDING

- A new strategy called the Polio Endgame Strategy 2019-2023: Eradication, Integration, Certification and Containment is being drafted. Rotary is extending our matching agreement with the Gates Foundation to raise US\$50 million per year to be matched 2:1 to support the new strategic plan.
- By the time the world is certified polio-free, Rotary's contributions to the global polio eradication effort will exceed US\$2.2 billion, including over US\$985 million in matching funds from the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation.
- Rotary's contribution to the GPEI since 1988 accounts for nearly 10% of all contributions through June 2018 and approximately 31% of private sector giving.

Select PolioPlus Grant Projects Funded in 2018

- DR Congo: 300,000 information, education and communication materials (posters) as well as 751 broadcasting messages by community based media during National Immunization Days.
- Afghanistan: Allowance and training for 125,014 vaccinators during one National Immunization Day and one Sub-National Immunization Day.
- Pakistan: Allowance and training for 310,229 vaccinators during one National Immunization Day and one Sub-National Immunization Day.
- Cameroon: Organization of a micro-plan workshop, 800 post-round evaluation meetings, and cross-border activities for one National Immunization Day.

What is circulating vaccine-derived virus?

In populations with low-immunization coverage, it is possible for the weakened virus used in the oral vaccine to circulate in the environment long enough to undergo genetic changes that can cause paralysis. This is called vaccine derived poliovirus and is tracked separately than cases of wild poliovirus. When a population if fully immunized, they will be protected against both vaccine derived and wild polioviruses.

POLIOPLUS FACT SHEET

Although it currently circulates in only a few countries, polio is highly infectious and spreads rapidly. The disease, which afflicts mainly children, is transmitted via contaminated water and food supplies. Five to 10 percent of cases are fatal. As long as polio threatens even one child anywhere in the world, children everywhere are at risk. Only the global eradication of polio will ensure that no child ever again suffers its devastating effects.

WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW

- If polio is not eradicated, within 10 years, as many as 200,000 children will be paralyzed by it each year.
- In 2018, more than 400 million children were vaccinated multiple times using more than two billion doses of oral polio vaccine. This will be done every year until the world is certified polio free. Rotary funds will help do this.
- To date, 122 countries have benefited from PolioPlus grants.
- Since 1988, the number of polio endemic countries declined from over 125 to three.
- With the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, every \$1 Rotary commits to polio eradication is matched 2-to-1 (up to \$50 million per year).



Our District Governor's becoming a Rotarian is one for the books. Upon the invitation of a drinking buddy, he unknowingly accepted with his innocence that drinks and food are free during Rotary meetings. That was in 2000 and the rest they say is history.

Convinced of the ideals and principles of Rotary, he became CONNECTED as an active member and eventually became the 45th President of the Rotary Club of Cebu West, seven years after his induction. His stint as President gave honor to his Club with the following recognitions: Area 1-C Most outstanding Club President and Highest TRF Contribution, District's Outstanding Club

Secretary and the most prestigious Rotary International Presidential Citation.

Through the years, he has transcended his leadership from the Club to the District level, serving Rotary in various major positions, amongst others as Assistant Governor, District Trainer, District Secretary, District Finance Chair, Paul Harris Fundraising Chair and the latest Chairmanship of District Rotary Foundation Committee (DRFC).

He also put his money where his mouth is -- He is a Paul Harris Society member and a Major Donor. He believes that this financial contribution demonstrates his commitment to serve others.

Aside from being a Rotarian, he is also actively involved in other socio-civic and religious organizations. He is currently the Vice Chair - Visayas of Philippine Business for Social Progress (PBSP); Board of Regents of Cebu Technological University (CTU), a certified Fellow of the Institute of Corporate Directors (ICD), Past President of the Mandaue Chamber (MCCI) and eleven other prestigious civic, religious and non-governmental organizations, both local and national.

His dedication to serve the country was twice recognized by former President Gloria Macapagal Arroyo, for promoting productivity and innovations in his advocacy and contributions that benefited businesses groups, government agencies, LGU's and particularly, the Department of Labor and Employment. In 2014, former President Benigno Aquino III appointed him as one of the Management Representative to the Regional Tripartite Wages and Productivity Board of DOLE Region 7. In 2016, SGV / Ernst and Young awarded him INNOVATION ENTREPRENEUR OF THE YEAR in the Philippines. Guidelines during the

Official District Governor's Club Visit

Rotary International mandates the District Governor, to at least once during his term within his/her Rotary Year, to visit the Clubs and meet up with the members. The purpose to which is to CONNECT Rotary International and the Clubs through the District any mutual concerns that would strengthen Rotary in achieving its goals in humanitarian service and membership growth. The following should make such visit fruitful with the cooperation between the District Secretary, Assistant Governor, and the concerned Club President:

- The District Secretary informs the respective Area Assistant Governor (AG) of the planned visit of the Clubs within the assigned dates;
- Upon confirmation of Club Presidents, the District Secretary advises the Area Assistant Governor of the arrival itinerary and hotel accommodation of the Governor;
- The Assistant Governor meets up with the District Governor prior to the visits to individually know each Club's history, culture and challenges.
- The District Governor, together with the Assistant Governor, will have a caucus or Executive Session with the Club President, Club Secretary, the different chairs of the Committee on Membership, The Rotary Foundation (TRF), Public Image, and the Club Service Director (Areas of Focus);
 - The meeting has to be conducted at least one hour before the Club General Membership Meeting, preferably held in the same venue;
 - Basic courtesy by way of introduction by the Club Secretary is necessary amongst those present, but no protocol required during this time.
 - c. During the Official meeting with the Club Officers, the Governor prefers a short, simple, and down to earth discussion, presided by the Club President but actively participated with discussions coming more from the Committee Chairs and Club Secretary;
 - No PowerPoint presentation / printed materials required, sharing your challenges
 is more important specially on how the District can be of service and help
 overcome the different issues;
 - Club discussions/presentation by President, the different Chairs & Club Secretary: within 15 minutes
 - · Response by the District Governor & Assistant Governor: 15 minutes
 - Open forum and free wheeling discussion on Club's plans within the Rotary Year 2019-20: 30 minutes
 - The Club Secretary take notes on the highlights and the minutes of the Discussions and emails this information to the Assistant Governor and the District Secretary.
 - · The Governor adjourns the meeting
- The District Governor is the "only" Guest of Honor of the Club, representing the Rotary International President Mark Maloney, with the Club President presiding the Club General Membership Meeting;
 - Basic protocol is encourage like the Flag positioning (if there is any), and the order of seating arrangement where the Guest (DG) and Assistant Governor will be seated;
 - b. During part of the program, the Club Secretary presents to the Club General Membership the MINUTES of meeting between Club Officers and the District Governor, and any agreement(s) RATIFIED by the majority of its members.
 - The District Governor will be given enough time to speak during the meeting.
 - d. The Club President adjourns the meeting.

All formalities of the District Governor's visit must be made simple and completed within THREE hours, on or before 9:30 pm, with fellowship to start only after adjournment. As much as possible, avoid intermissions during the program proper, which can done before or after the Club formalities.



WHY THE ROTARY YEAR BEGINS 1 JULY?



Ever wonder why the Rotary year begins 1 July? The international convention initially played a key role in determining the start date of our fiscal and administrative year.

Rotary's first fiscal year began the day after the first convention ended, on 18 August 1910. The 1911-12 fiscal year also related to the convention, beginning with the first day of the 1911 convention on 21 August.

At its August 1912 meeting, the Board of Directors ordered an audit of the International Association of Rotary Clubs' finances. The auditors recommended that the organization end its fiscal year on 30 June to give the secretary and treasurer time to prepare a financial statement for the convention and board, and determine the proper number of club delegates to the convention.

The executive committee concurred, and at its April 1913 meeting, designated 30 June as the end of the fiscal year. This also allowed for changes to the schedule for reporting club membership and payments. Even The Rotarian changed its volume numbering system to correspond to the fiscal year (beginning with vol. 5, July 1914).

Rotary continued to hold its annual conventions in July or August until 1917. Delegates to the 1916 event in Cincinnati, Ohio, USA, approved a resolution to hold future conventions in June, mainly because of the heat in cities where most of them occurred. The next one was held 17-21 June in Atlanta, Georgia.

The term "Rotary year" has been used to signify Rotary's annual administrative period since at least 1913. An article in The Rotarian that July noted, "The Rotary year that is rapidly drawing to a close has been signalized by several highly successful joint meetings of Clubs that are so situated as to assemble together easily and conveniently."

Since the executive committee's decision in 1913, the end of the Rotary year has remained 30 June.

The Mission of Rotary International, a worldwide association of Ratary Clubs, is to provide service to others, to promote high ethical standards, and to advance world understanding, goodwill and peace through its fellowship of business, professional and community leaders.

The Vision of Rotary International is to be universally recognized for its commiment to Service Above Self to advance world understanding, goodwill and peace

OBJECT OF ROTARY

The Object of Rotary is to encourage and foster the ideal of service as a basis of worthy enterprise and, in particular, to encourage and foster:

FIRST: The development of acquaintance as an opportunity for service;

SECOND: High ethical standards in business and professions; the recognition of the worthiness of all useful occupations; and the dignifying of each Rotarian's occupation as an opportunity to serve society;

THIRD: The application of the ideal of service in each Rotarian's personal, business, and community life;

FOURTH: The advancement of international understanding, goodwill, and peace through a world fellowship of business and professional persons united in the ideal of service.

It is a continuing project, which aims to install 100 water pumps these communities. To date, RCTN has installed a total of 81 pumps and one Water Reservoir.

It its commitment to hasten the productivity of the local farming industry, the "Cable-Liff project in 2004 has provided an ingenuously cable cart system used to transport farmers and convey their produce from one side to another side of the river in Asuncion, Davao del Norte.

Another community development project that RCTN took part includes "Oplan Flip Flops para sa Indigenous People" which provided 148 pairs of slippers in Barangay San Jose, Municipality of Sto. Tomas.

Since 1998, RCTN helped in the promotion of a reliable livelihood program in Tagum City. The club organized its Basic Stills Training Program promoting Basic Electronics for "Differently-Abled" individuals; Cellular Phone, Radio and TV Repair and Basic Carpentry for the out-of-school youth. The club stretched its program to the women sector by conducting Livelihood Trainings in Meat Processing, Pillow Case and Curtain Making, Cosmetology and Basic Baking in 2008.

AVENUES OF SERVICE

Providing avenues of learning started to be the prime commitment in its literacy program. In 1999, the club's generosity was measured when it donated, through the help of the WCS Project, from Chiba, Japan, a Braille Typewriter to the Magugo Pilot Innelda SPED School. The compassion was contagious when RCTN further initiated and provided a brand new computer unit with printer to the Neueva Teurza Elementary School and Magugo Pilot ALS, Tagum City, assorted Math & Physics books for the Pipisan Maug National High School, Tagum City, and a Library, Tagum City The club also donated Pip 5,000.00 for the "Lakbay Arajur Dizy, The club also donated Pip 5,000.00 for the "Lakbay Arajur Dizy, and a Library Tagum City, and Talaingod".





COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

The club has dedicated numerous innovative services to help develop and improve the conditions of its nearby communities. As a first club project of RCTN in 1988, the construction of the Rotary Landmark structure at the corner of Pioneer and Rizal Streets has repeatedly caught the attention of anybody who comes to visit Tagum City for the first time or just pass by at one of the busiest junctions of the city.

and from its neighborhood communities. Since its conception, the RCTN has incessantly conducted innumerable Surgical/ Medical Dental and Optical Missions to the less privileged members of the Tagum community, to the nearby underprivileged prisoners/ parolees, and even to its farthest neighborhood communities in Davao del Norte, Compostela Valley and Agusan del Sur Provinces. The club has established a program on "Botica sa Barangay" in Asuncion, Davao del Norte that helped a total of 26 remote barangays access to cheap but effective medicines.

In 1998, the club proudly launched the "Operation New Look" program. On its 14th year as a continuing project funded by Jerome Foundation. Inc., the program has generously provided sixty-nine (69) free cleft lip and cleft palate surgeries in addition to the previous indigent 600 patients.

"Hot Lunch Plus", a feeding program for malnourished elementary school pupils at the Rizal Elementary School II that was initiated in 1999, is a another continuing project of the Club that became the recipient of United Nationals Millennium

the recipient of United Nationals Millennium Development Award given by UNICEF in RY 2006-07.This year the program has extend its services to giving free medical consultation and PPD testing to the undernourished beneficiaries.

In 2001, the RCTN coordinated with the Pediatrics Department of Davao Regional Hospital and the City Government of Tagum City in carrying out the project - "Bantay Dengue Tagum", a dengue awareness and prevention campaign program that curved the unprecedented and scaring rise of dengue cases in Davao del Norte Province.

The "Renal Care Foundation", another continuing program of the RCTN since 2003 enables indigent patients to avail of hemodialysis treatment at a very low and affordable cost of only PHF950.00 (-US 10.00) per session. Presently, the program is taking care of 15 End-Stage-Kidney Disease patients at the Davao Regional Hospital.
