Rotary's long-term, sustained battle against polio has defined our organization for decades. We have a right to be proud of all that we have accomplished through the years.

Our progress is real and noteworthy. In 1988, polio was endemic in 125 countries, with more than 350,000 new cases a year worldwide. Since then, Rotary and our Global Polio Eradication Initiative partners have reduced the incidence of polio by more than 99.9 percent, vaccinated more than 2.5 billion children against the virus, and prevented 18 million cases of paralysis. Over the years, Rotary has helped country after country move into the polio-free column. This includes India, which some considered impossible not long ago. Of the three types of poliovirus, type 2 has been eradicated and type 3 could soon be certified as eradicated. Nigeria has not reported a case of wild poliovirus in nearly three years. If this trend holds, we will be down to just one type of wild poliovirus in only one section of the world, Afghanistan and Pakistan.

There are major challenges in that region. But it is crucial that we remain optimistic. Look at all that we have accomplished so far. This is no time to get discouraged or to think that the task is impossible. We will end polio forever, but only if we remain steadfast and vigilant. World Polio Day is a time for Rotarians from all over the globe to come together, recognize the progress we have made in our fight against polio, and plan the action we must take to end polio forever. The key word is action, because we still have important work to do.

This year, we want to see as many Rotary clubs as possible holding World Polio Day events around the world. Need some ideas? How about organizing a viewing party for friends and club members to watch Rotary's Online Global Update? You could also dedicate a club meeting to World Polio Day or create a fundraising event. Remember, every dollar raised is matched 2-to-1 by the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation.

Once you have created an event, register it at endpolio.org/register-your-event. Then promote it using the World Polio Day toolkit, available at endpolio.org/world-polio-day.

Mark your calendar to tune in to Rotary's World Polio Day Online Global Update on 24 October. This year we will stream our program on Facebook in multiple time zones around the world. Visit the Rotary International Facebook page to RSVP to your region's program. And do not forget to follow the event on social media and share it with your network.

When we reach our goal, polio will become only the second human disease eradicated on the planet, and Rotary will receive international acclaim. But what matters most is the children who will never again have to face this terrible, disabling virus. Rotary must continue to connect the world in the effort toward polio eradication. It is up to us. Let us finish the job.

President's Corner

Good evening Champion Rotarians,

Rotary International begins its fight against polio with a multi-year project to immunize 6 million children in the Philippines.

On 29 September 1979, volunteers administered drops of oral polio vaccine to children at a health center in Guadalupe Viejo, Makati, Philippines. ... Rotary launched PolioPlus in 1985 and was a founding member of the Global Polio Eradication Initiative in 1988

Rotary is an international community that brings together leaders who step up to take on the world's toughest challenges, locally and globally. The eradication of polio is one of our longest standing and most significant efforts. Along with our partners, we have helped immunize more than 2.5 billion children against polio in 122 countries. We have reduced polio cases by 99.9 percent worldwide and we won't stop until we end the disease for good.

The DOH declared a polio epidemic or outbreak last Thursday, September 19, after it found one confirmed case of the disease in Lanao del Sur. The 3-year-old girl afflicted with polio now has residual paralysis due. The Rotary Community immediately acted the outbreak on how to mitigate the spread of the disease.

Our Club started its Oral Polio Immunization at Sitio Tapayanon, Barangay Gupitan, Kapalong last September 30, 2019. We also conducted series of radio guesting last Sept 19, 2019 at 95.1 Energy FM and DXDN Radyo Ukay last Sept. 26, 2019. On October 10, 2019 we already schedule for TV Guesting in PTV 48.

Our calendar for October is almost full, we have a lot of events for the celebration of October Pink and World Polio Day. Just update our schedule to our FB Page . Damo Kid na Salamat Champion Rotarians.

HISTORY OF ROTARY INTERNATIONAL

Paul P. Harris, an attorney, wanted to create a professional group with the same friendly spirit he felt in the small towns of his youth. On 23 February 1905, Harris, Gustavus Loehr, Silvester Schiele, and Hiram Shorey gathered at Loehr's office in Room 711 of the Unity Building in downtown Chicago. This was the first Rotary club meeting. They decided to call the new club "Rotary" after the practice of rotating meeting locations.

Within five years clubs had formed across the country, from San Francisco to New York.

In August 1910, Rotarians held their first convention in Chicago. The 16 clubs that existed at that time united to form the National Association of Rotary Clubs.

In 1912, the name changed to International Association of Rotary Clubs to reflect the addition of clubs in other countries. The name Rotary International was adopted in 1922.

By July 1925, Rotary had grown to more than 2,000 clubs and an estimated 108,000 members on six continents.


Rotary's reputation attracted presidents, prime ministers, and a host of other luminaries to its ranks — among them author Thomas Mann, diplomat Carlos P. Romulo, and composer Jean Sibelius.

As Rotary grew, members pooled their resources and used their talents to serve their communities. The organization's dedication to this ideal is best expressed in its motto: Service Above Self.

The roots of Rotary's polio eradication efforts





On 29 September 1979, volunteers administered drops of oral polio vaccine to children at a health center in Guadalupe Viejo, Makati, Philippines. The event in metropolitan Manila was arranged and attended by Rotarians and delegates from the Philippine Ministry of Health.

When James L. Bomar Jr., then RI president, put the first drops of vaccine into a child's mouth, he ceremonially launched the Philippine poliomyelitis immunization effort. Rotary's first Health, Hunger and Humanity (3-H) Grant project was underway. Bomar and Enrique M. Garcia, the country's minister of health, had earlier signed an agreement committing Rotary International and the government of the Philippines to a joint multiyear effort to immunize about 6 million children against polio, at a cost of about \$760.000.

In a 1993 interview, Bomar reminisced about the trip. He recalled how the brother of one of the children he had immunized tugged on his pant leg to get his attention and said, "Thank you, thank you, Rotary."

The project's success led Rotary to make polio eradication a top priority. Rotary launched PolioPlus in 1985 and was a founding member of the Global Polio Eradication Initiative in 1988. Through decades of commitment and work by Rotary and our partners, more than 2.5 billion children have received the oral polio vaccine.



TIMELINE: PARTNERS IN ERADICATING POLIO

Rotary has been working to eradicate polio for more than 30 years. Since 1979, we have vaccinated more than 2.5 billion children. But we haven't done it alone. Here is a timeline for our partnerships.

1979-early 1980s

Rotary undertakes a series of polio immunization campaigns throughout Southeast Asia and Latin America, beginning with one in 1979 in the Philippines and followed by similar activities in Cambodia, Haiti, Morocco, Paraguay, and Sierra Leone.

1985

Rotary introduces PolioPlus – the first effort to immunize every child in the world with polio vaccine – and aims to raise \$120 million. During its 1988 convention in Philadelphia, Rotary announces it has raised \$247 million, more than double the target amount.

1988

Rotary pushes forward the global resolution to eradicate polio at the 1988 World Health Assembly in Geneva. It also spearheads the launch of the Global Polio Eradication Initiative with the World Health Organization, U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, and UNICEF.

2002-03

Rotary launches the Polio Eradication Fundraising Campaign with a fundraising target of \$80 million. The campaign, netting \$135 million, eclipses Rotary's goal. The Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation contributes \$1 million when it honors Rotary with its Gates Award for Global Health, its first gift to Rotary's efforts to end polio.

2007

The Gates Foundation announces its first major grant to polio eradication – a \$100 million challenge to Rotary, promising to match funds raised by Rotarians.

2009

Bill Gates pledges an additional \$255 million at Rotary's International Assembly, and Rotary increases its fundraising goal to \$200 million.

2011

Bill Gates speaks at the Rotary International Convention in New Orleans.

2012

Rotary raises \$228.7 million, surpassing the original goal of \$200 million. In the same year, Jeff Raikes, then-CEO of the Gates Foundation, announces an additional \$50 million contribution to polio eradication efforts at Rotary's International Assembly.

2013

An announcement at the Rotary International Convention in Lisbon sets the stage for a new extension of the partnership between Rotary and the Gates Foundation. The Gates Foundation agrees to match 2-to-1 every dollar committed by Rotary, up to \$35 million per year, through 2018. Throughout the campaign, Rotary exceeds its annual fundraising goal.

2017

On the heels of the success of the 2-to-1 matching grant, Rotary and the Gates Foundation announce an increased combined pledge of up to \$450 million at the Rotary International Convention in Atlanta. Rotary's new goal is to contribute \$50 million per year over three years. With a 2-to-1 match, the Gates Foundation's contribution will increase to \$300 million if Rotary reaches its fundraising target.

Polio outbreak - The Philippines: Disease outbreak

REPORT from World Health Organization

On 19 September 2019, the Philippines declared an outbreak of polio. Two cases have been reported to date, both caused by vaccine-derived poliovirus type 2 (VDPV2). Environmental samples taken from sewage in Manila on 13 August and a waterway in Davao on 22 August have also tested positive for VDPV2.

The first case was confirmed on 14 September following testing by the National Polio Laboratory at the Research Institute for Tropical Medicine, the Japan National Institute of Infectious Diseases (NIID) and the United States Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). The case-patient is a 3-year-old girl from Lanao del Sur in the southern Philippines. The virus isolated is genetically linked to VDPV2 previously isolated from environmental samples in Manila and Davao. This indicates that the virus is circulating.

The second case was confirmed on 19 September and is a 5-year-old boy from Laguna Province, approximately 100 km south-east of Metro Manila. Investigations and further characterization of the virus are ongoing.

In addition, VDPV1 has also been isolated from environmental samples collected on 1 July, 22 July, 13 August, and 27 August from

Vaccine-derived polioviruses are rarely occurring forms of the poliovirus that have genetically changed from the attenuated (weak-ened) virus contained in oral polio vaccine. They only occur when the vaccine virus is allowed to pass from person to person for a long time, which can only happen in places with limited immunization coverage and inadequate sanitation and hygiene. Over time, as it is passed between unimmunized people, it can regain the ability to cause disease. When the population is fully immunized with both oral polio vaccine and inactivated polio vaccine, this kind of transmission cannot take place. The gut immunity in people immunized with oral polio vaccine stops the virus from being passed on. Full immunization therefore protects against both vaccine-derived and wild polio viruses.

Public health response

- 1.- Acute flaccid paralysis (AFP) and environmental surveillance are being enhanced to detect poliovirus.
- 2.- Field investigation is currently underway in Lanao del Sur to define the geographic scope of the circulation of the virus and inform planning for outbreak response including mass immunization campaigns.
- 3.- The Department of Health (DOH) reinforced its recommendation that all children should be vaccinated according to the routine immunization schedule.
- 4.- WHO and other partners of the Global Polio Eradication Initiative (GPEI) are supporting the Department of Health and local health authorities in their detailed investigations and supporting efforts to enhance surveillance, strengthen routine immunization, communicate risk to the public and implement outbreak response in line with internationally agreed polio outbreak response guidelines

WHO risk assessment

WHO currently assesses the risk of international spread from the Philippines to be low. However, the risk of further spread within the Philippines is high due to limited population immunity (coverage of bivalent oral polio vaccine (OPV) and inactivated polio vaccine (IPV) was at 66% and 41% respectively in 2018) and suboptimal AFP surveillance.

WHO advice

It is important that all countries, in particular those with frequent travel and contact with polio-affected countries and areas, strengthen surveillance for AFP cases in order to detect virus importation and to facilitate a rapid response. Countries, territories and areas should also maintain uniformly high routine immunization coverage to minimize the consequences of any possible polio virus introduction or transmission.

WHO recommends

that all travellers and residents in polio-affected areas be fully vaccinated against polio.

As per the advice of an Emergency Committee convened under the International Health Regulations (2005), the international spread of poliovirus remains a Public Health Emergency of International Concern (PHEIC). Countries affected by poliovirus transmission are subject to Temporary Recommendations. To comply with the Temporary Recommendations issued under the PHEIC, any country infected by poliovirus should declare the outbreak as a national public health emergency.

'Polio vaccine is very safe,' DOH reminds public amid epidemic



The DOH declared a polio epidemic or outbreak on Thursday, September 19, after it found one confirmed case of the disease in Lanao del Sur. The 3-year-old girl afflicted with polio now has residual paralysis due.

Environmental samples that tested positive for the vaccine-derived poliovirus were also found in Manila and Davao. (EXPLAINER: What is polio?)

The DOH and the World Health Organization (WHO) have since emphasized that vaccination is the only cure for the disease.

In August, the DOH kicked off its polio vaccination campaign against polio in Manila. Duque said the positive sample was found in Tondo, the largest district in Manila in terms of area and population.

The polio vaccination campaign will be focused on the National Capital Region, Davao and Lanao del Sur in October, while the campaign in Central Luzon and Calabarzon would also begin in October.

The organization, whose international counterpart has been conducting anti-polio initiatives for 30 years, said it would provide volunteers in local communities to amplify the grassroots response to polio. Ten Rotary districts throughout the country vowed to join the initiative.

Duque also said that the health department had enough supply for the first two rounds of polio immunization. He said that they were only waiting for confirmation that there would be enough supply for the nationwide rollout of the vaccination campaign, which is set to start early next year.

The DOH also urged local governments to intensify their Zero Open Defecation program and called for proper sanitation practices, like regularly washing one's hands. – Rappler.co

DOH & Rotary International ink agreement to strengthen polio awareness, vaccination drive



QUEZON CITY, Sept. 20 (PIA)--The Department of Health (DOH) today signed a Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) with Rotary International's 10 Districts to heighten polio awareness and vaccination campaign in light of the reemergence of poliomyelitis in the country.

Polio eradication is one of Rotary's longest standing and most significant efforts. The Rotary Districts will provide support through fundraising, advocacy and volunteer recruitment, as DOH intensifies its health promotion activities focusing on sanitation and hygiene, and prepares for a rapid response polio vaccination campaign.

In 2018, 12 out of the 17 regions in the country were identified as high-risk areas for polio reemergence. The National Capital Region is one of the identified regions with a high-risk of re-infection due to a number of factors including low polio vaccination coverage coupled with poor surveillance of polio symptoms, ongoing practice of open defecation, and poor sanitary practices in communities. OPV coverage at the National Capital Region has been steadily decreasing from 77.25% in 2016 to 23.45% in the second quarter of 2019.

To mitigate the risk, DOH – Metro Manila Center for Health Development will conduct three (3) rounds of supplemental Oral Polio Immunization to ensure protection against polio among children under 5 years old.

DOH will also strengthen surveillance of children below five years old who developed sudden onset of muscle weakness or paralysis of the upper and lower extremities, intensify implementation of the Zero Open Defecation Program, and strengthen environmental sanitation and personal hygiene.

"It is unthinkable that a child will suffer from a disease that is highly preventable by vaccination. Together let us all work to protect our children and ensure their future," Health Secretary Francisco T. Duque III concluded. (PIA-NCR/DOH)

B. Handicapping / Female players

- All female bowlers will have an additional 10 handicap points for each game played.
- A female bowler must play the whole game in order for her to avail of the additional points.
- in case the team has no female players in the lineup, BEFORE THE START OF THE GAME, the team must declare which player gets a blind score (of 60)

C. Substitution

- The names of the 5 Players must be registered with the organizing committee before the start of the games (on each playing date)
- Substitution will not be allowed once the game have started (1st Ball rolled).
- A blind score of 60 will automatically be assigned in case of a Substitution

D. Absent Player / Late player

- When the games have officially started and some named members of the team are

physically present at the venue, they may still proceed with the games. A Blind score of 60 will be used for the absent player.

- at no time should there be less than 3 players physically present at the start of the games.
- if a team member is late, he may still play provided the games have not reached the 4th frame.
- (1) the frames he missed will get a zero (0) pin-fall score
- (2) the actual pin-falls / score will be counted (even if it is less than the blind score)

E. Classifying Round (Play Date: October 13 -12:30 PM)

Teams will play 2 games for the classifying round. The team scores for the 2 games will be added. The top half teams will classify for the Governor's Cup while the bottom half will vie for the Presidents Cup. In case of a tie, the team who scored the better last game will be ranked higher.

Teams will draw lots to know which lanes they will be playing at. There will be a change of lanes after the first game. Even numbered lanes move 4 lanes to the right, while odd numbered lanes move 4 lanes to the left.

F. Championship Round (Play Dates October 20 & 27 - 12:30 PM)

Governors Cup and Presidents Cup will be playing 2 games on October 20, and 2 games on October 27 with lane movement every game.

F.1 On October 20 (Game 1 & 2)

Lanes will be assigned for each division. Lane occupancy for game 1 will be drawn by lots (random pairing)

Lane Movement: Teams will move 2 lanes, odd numbered lanes 2 lanes to the left while even numbered lanes 2 lanes to the right. Governor's Cup lane movement will be restricted on the lanes that will be used for the Governor's Cup, and so also with the Presidents Cup.

F.2 On October 27 (Games 3 and 4)

Games 3 & 4 – Lane assignment per division shall be based on rank (Left to right; the Team with the Highest score to the left) for the Governor's Cup , and so also with the Presidents Cup.

The highest total pin falls after 4 games will be declared champion in their respective Divisions. The Rotary Club's name of champion Team will be engraved onto the trophy as champion for 2019.

In case of a tie, the two (2) teams will be asked to play 3 additional frames. The team with the highest score after 3 frames wins. This may be repeated only once and if a tie still persists, both teams will be declared the co-winners.

WHY THE ROTARY YEAR BEGINS 1 JULY?



Ever wonder why the Rotary year begins 1 July? The international convention initially played a key role in determining the start date of our fiscal and administrative year.

Rotary's first fiscal year began the day after the first convention ended, on 18 August 1910. The 1911-12 fiscal year also related to the convention, beginning with the first day of the 1911 convention on 21 August.

At its August 1912 meeting, the Board of Directors ordered an audit of the International Association of Rotary Clubs' finances. The auditors recommended that the organization end its fiscal year on 30 June to give the secretary and treasurer time to prepare a financial statement for the convention and board, and determine the proper number of club delegates to the convention.

The executive committee concurred, and at its April 1913 meeting, designated 30 June as the end of the fiscal year. This also allowed for changes to the schedule for reporting club membership and payments. Even The Rotarian changed its volume numbering system to correspond to the fiscal year (beginning with vol. 5, July 1914).

Rotary continued to hold its annual conventions in July or August until 1917. Delegates to the 1916 event in Cincinnati, Ohio, USA, approved a resolution to hold future conventions in June, mainly because of the heat in cities where most of them occurred. The next one was held 17-21 June in Atlanta, Georgia.

The term "Rotary year" has been used to signify Rotary's annual administrative period since at least 1913. An article in The Rotarian that July noted, "The Rotary year that is rapidly drawing to a close has been signalized by several highly successful joint meetings of Clubs that are so situated as to assemble together easily and conveniently."

Since the executive committee's decision in 1913, the end of the Rotary year has remained 30 June.

AVENUES OF SERVICE

It all frist started with a simple water pump project, which later expanded into a "Spring Water impounding System" (SWIS) in Magdum, Tagum Davao. In its unending passion to provide potable water for indigent families in the remote barangays of Davao del Norte and Compostela Valley, the "Water For Life" became the Club's Centennial Project. It is a continuing project, which aims to install 100 water pumps these communities. To date, RCTN has installed a total of 81 pumps and one Water Reservoir.

It its commitment to hasten the productivity of the local farming industry, the "Cable-Liff project in 2004 has provided an ingenuously cable cart system used to transport farmers and convey their produce from one side to another side of the river in Asuncion, Davao del Norte.

Another community development project that RCTN took part includes "Oplan Flip Flops para sa Indigenous People" which provided 148 pairs of slippers in Barangay San Jose, Municipality of Sto. Tomas.

The club organized its Basic Stills Training Program promoting Basic Electronics for "Differently-Abled" individuals; Cellular Phone, Radio and TV Repair and Basic Carpentry for the out-of-school youth. The club stretched its program to the women sector by conducting Livelihood Trainings in Meat Processing, Pillow Case and Curtain Making, Cosmetology and Basic Baking in 2008.

Providing avenues of learning started to be the prime commitment in its literacy program. In 1999, the club's generosity was measured when it donated, through the help of the WCS Project, from Chiba, Japan, a Braille Typewriter to the Magugo Pilot Innelda SPED School. The compassion was contagious when RCTN further initiated and provided a brand new computer unit with printer to the Nueva Teurza Elementary School and Magugo Pilot ALS, Tagum City, assorted Math & Physics books for the Pipisan Maug National High School, Tagum City, and a Library, Tagum City The club also donated Pip 5,000.00 for the "Lakbay Arajur Dity." COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

The club has dedicated numerous innovative services to help develop and improve the conditions of its nearby communities. As a first club project of RCTN in 1988, the construction of the Rotary Landmark structure at the corner of Pioneer and Rizal Streets has repeatedly caught the attention of anybody who comes to visit Tagum City for the first time or just pass by at one of the busiest junctions of the city.

and from its neighborhood communities. Since its conception, the RCTN has incessantly conducted innumerable Surgical/ Medical Dental and Optical Missions to the less privileged members of the Tagum community, to the nearby underprivileged prisoners/ parolees, and even to its farthest neighborhood communities in Davao del Norte, Compostela Valley and Agusan del Sur Provinces. The club has established a program on "Botica sa Barangay" in Asuncion, Davao del Norte that helped a total of 26 remote barangays access to cheap but effective medicines.

In 1998, the club proudly launched the "Operation New Look" program. On its 14th year as a continuing project funded by Jerome Foundation. Inc., the program has generously provided sixty-nine (69) free cleft lip and cleft palate surgeries in addition to the previous indigent 600 patients.

"Hot Lunch Plus", a feeding program for malnourished elementary school pupils at the Rizal Elementary School II that was initiated in 1999, is a another continuing project of the Club that became the recipient of United Nationals Millennium

the recipient of United Nationals Millennium Development Award given by UNICEF in RY 2006-07.This year the program has extend its services to giving free medical consultation and PPD testing to the undernourished beneficiaries.

In 2001, the RCTN coordinated with the Pediatrics Department of Davao Regional Hospital and the City Government of Tagum City in carrying out the project - "Bantay Dengue Tagum", a dengue awareness and prevention campaign program that curved the unprecedented and scaring rise of dengue cases in Davao del Norte Province.

The "Renal Care Foundation", another continuing program of the RCTN since 2003 enables indigent patients to avail of hemodialysis treatment at a very low and affordable cost of only PHF950.00 (-US 10.00) per session. Presently, the program is taking care of 15 End-Stage-Kidney Disease patients at the Davao Regional Hospital.
