OBJECT OF ROTARY

The Object of Rotary is to encourage and foster the ideal of service as a basis of worthy enterprise and, in particular, to encourage and foster:

FIRST:

The development of acquaintance as an opportunity for service;

SECOND:

High ethical standards in business and professions; the recognition of the worthiness of all useful occupations; and the dignifying of each Rotarian's occupation as an opportunity to serve society;

THIRD:

The application of the ideal of service in each Rotarian's personal, business, and community life;

FOURTH:

The advancement of international understanding, goodwill, and peace through a world fellowship of business and professional persons united in the ideal of service.

Rotary Code of Conduct



As a Rotarian, I will

1. Exemplify the core value of integrity in all behaviors and activities
2. Use my vocational experience and talents to serve Rotary
3. Conduct all my personal, business and professional affairs ethically encouraging and fostering high ethical standards as an example to others
4. Be fair in all dealings with others and treat them with the respect due to them as fellow human beings.
5. Promote recognition and respect for all occupations which are useful to society
6. Offer my vocational talents: to provide opportunities for young people, to work of the relief of the special needs of others, and to improve the quality of life in my community.
7. Honor trust that Rotary and other Rotarians provide and not do anything that will bring disfavor or reflect adversely on Rotary or other Rotarians
8. Not seek from a fellow a privilege or advantage not normally accorded others in a business or professional relationship

DECLARATION OF ROTARIANS IN BUSINESS AND PROFESSIONS

The Declaration of Rotarians in Businesses and Professions was adopted by the Rotary International Council on Legislation in 1989 to provide more specific guidelines for the high ethical standards called for in the Object of Rotary:

As a Rotarian engaged in a business or profession, I am expected to:

1. Consider my vocation to be another opportunity to serve;
2. Be faithful to the letter and to the spirit of the ethical codes of my vocation, to the laws of my country, and to the moral standards of my community;
3. Do all in my power to dignify my vocation and to promote the highest ethical standards in my chosen vocation;
4. Be fair to my employer, employees, associates, competitors, customers, the public, and all those with whom I have a business or professional relationship;
5. Recognize the honor and respect due to all occupations which are useful to society;
6. Offer my vocational talents: to provide opportunities for young people, to work for the relief of the special needs of others, and to improve the quality of life in my community;
7. Adhere to honesty in my advertising and in all representations to the public concerning my business or profession;
8. Neither seek from nor grant to a fellow Rotarian a privilege or advantage not normally accorded others in a business or professional relationship.

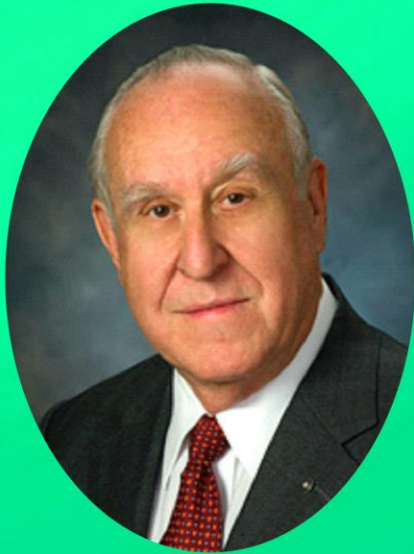

HISTORY OF ROTARY INTERNATIONAL

Paul P. Harris, an attorney, wanted to create a professional group with the same friendly spirit he felt in the small towns of his youth. On 23 February 1905, Harris, Gustavus Loehr, Silvester Schiele, and Hiram Shorey gathered at Loehr's office in Room 711 of the Unity Building in downtown Chicago. This was the first Rotary club meeting. They decided to call the new club "Rotary" after the practice of rotating meeting locations.

Within five years clubs had formed across the country, from San Francisco to New York.

In August 1910, Rotarians held their first convention in Chicago. The 16 clubs that existed at that time united to form the National Association of Rotary Clubs.

In 1912, the name changed to International Association of Rotary Clubs to reflect the addition of clubs in other countries. The name Rotary International was adopted in 1922.

By July 1925, Rotary had grown to more than 2,000 clubs and an estimated 108,000 members on six continents.

Rotary's reputation attracted presidents, prime ministers, and a host of other luminaries to its ranks — among them author Thomas Mann, diplomat Carlos P. Romulo, and composer Jean Sibelius.

As Rotary grew, members pooled their resources and used their talents to serve their communities. The organization's dedication to this ideal is best expressed in its motto: Service Above Self.

Dear Life Changing Governors and DRFCs and TRF Team Members

Happy new Rotary and TRF year to everybody!

We have reasons to be happy as we start the new rotary year. As you are probably aware, last rotary year was truly a banner TRF year for Zone 10A Philippines. We did not only break the existing TRF records on End Polio, Endowment and Total Giving, we achieved a lot of new high records on categories like most number of Paul Harris Fellows, Major Donors, EREY Eligible, Sustaining Member and the lowest number of non-giving clubs for Annual Fund and End Polio. On the worldwide standing, for second year in a row, we landed as number 9 in total giving and number 8 both for Annual Fund and Per Capita.

If you remember, we started Rotary Year 2020-21 with a lot of apprehensions and pessimism mainly caused by the Covid pandemic. We could not imagine yet how we can adopt to the new normal when it comes to TRF Giving. The Transforming Governors anticipated a slow down or reduced contributions and they were constrained to adjust the total giving goal to \$3,300,000. At that time, I can only agree with them and submitted to TRF the lower goal. The year before that, in RY 2019-20 our total giving goal was \$4,000,000 but the actual performance reached \$5,071,350. There were nine months of pre-pandemic and three months of pandemic period. We know already that it will be different for RY 2020-21 since it will be purely pandemic period all the way.

Looking back, what did we do to neutralize the pessimism, fear and negative attitude? First we asked the Districts to do a snowball early campaign and rally all our regular Rotarian supporters for them to give early as in the first quarter of the year. Second, we also emphasized about the gargantuan task ahead of us and only teamwork can see us through in achieving our set goals. Third, we emphasized that the responsibility to raise funds for TRF belongs to all the Rotarians. Fourth, we asked the districts to shift the campaign from physical giving to online giving. Last, we engaged our Rotarians as to why we have to give even in times of a very grave crisis like the covid pandemic.

Many districts responded with their enthusiastic early snowball campaigns. In fact, we saw many districts whose average giving a year has been achieved already in their first semester. By the end of December, more than half of the ten districts had achieved their TRF Goals. Around middle of February, all of the ten districts achieved their goals. The question then is how far can we surpass our TRF Goals. We adjusted the total giving goals progressively as we quickly surpass the new goals we have set. By end of May, the total giving is already near the five million mark. With one full month to go, we know already that we will have a new record. On June 12, 2021, it was announced that we have achieved a new record in the amount of \$5,090,000 surpassing our highest record set last RY 2019-2020. It was a significant announcement made on Independence day of the Philippines. We rallied the team to push more and go for the highest we can reach. We also asked the

TRF Team and the Transforming Governors to participate in the Guess the Total Giving by end of June 30, 2021. There were 19 entries submitted. The lowest bid was that of DRFC Pichoy Ramirez at \$5,179,999 and the highest was that of DRFC Jude Doctrora at \$5,450,000. The winner will receive a Macallan 12 years old single malt sherry oak casket. Let us all congratulate Transforming Governor Dindo Berino for winning the contest when his bid \$5,377,000 was declared the nearest to the total giving as of June 30, 2021 in the amount of \$5,384,176. The second place is the bid of Transforming Governor Maria Concepcion Camacho at \$5,410,000 whom we decided should also receive a special bottle of red wine. Congratulations to the two winners.

Allow me to present to all of you the fantastic TRF Performance of Zone 10A Philippines as of June 30, 2021.



Former refugees help recent defectors adapt to South Korea

Since the end of World War II, the Korean Peninsula has been divided. Partitioned in 1945 — the North under Soviet occupation and the South under U.S. occupation — the nations, still in conflict, have struggled for decades to achieve a peaceful relationship.

In the years since the divide, more than 30,000 people from the North have escaped through China and come to South Korea for a new beginning. During the COVID-19 pandemic, the number of people defecting has drastically declined due to increased border security. Before the outbreak, North Korean leader Kim Jong Un's regime had also increased border patrols and added an electrified fence, making escape more difficult.

Those who make it to South Korea go through a government-run, three-month resettlement process. Once they are released, a police officer is assigned to watch them. The work of building a new life in a different Korean culture is up to them.

The relationship between North and South Koreans is complex. As part of a single nation for thousands of years, they share the same language and observe the same traditional holidays. However, the memory of espionage after the Korean War lingers. In South Korea, those from the North must adapt to an unfamiliar capitalist system and culture without any family or friends, while enduring suspicions and prejudice against them.

In 2016, with support from the Rotary Club of Ulsan Daeduck, North Korean immigrants chartered the Rotary Club of Ulsan Freedom — a fitting name for those who risked their lives for their freedom.

The majority of North Korean immigrants in South Korea are women (72.1%), and more than half are in their 20s and 30s (57.2%). Many survived defector brokers' violence, a fear for their lives, human trafficking, or forced marriages to finally arrive in South Korea after years of living as fugitives. After gaining status as defectors, they receive a monthly salary about \$500 lower than the South Korean average, and their unemployment rate is twice the South Korean average (6.3%). (Statistics from the South Korean Ministry of Unification)

Ju Eun Seok, the founder of the Ulsan Freedom club, spent six years in China between crossing the Yalu River in 1997 and arriving in Korea with her son in 2003. Immediately thereafter, she attended college and majored in social work with the aim of helping North Korean defectors adapt to society. From 2010 to 2013, she served as a counselor for defectors in the Ulsan area and supported the early stages of their settlement. "I am as happy as if it happens to me when I see North Koreans getting vocational training, adapting to society, and getting a job," she says. She currently works as a unification education instructor.

"Life in China had always been anxious and tough because of the fear that I might get discovered and forced to return to North Korea," Seok says. "My Chinese husband and I had to frequently flee during the night to avoid the crackdowns by Chinese officials. It was difficult to adapt, even after the arrival in Korea. I could not understand what people were saying — they used unfamiliar capitalism terms such as 'stock market' or 'investment.' English words had become integrated into everyday conversation."

However, Seok says many South Korean people helped her and other defectors. Rotary clubs offered scholarships and supported their settlement. After she spent a few years participating with Rotary clubs in Ulsan, the then-governor of District 3721, Hae-Sang Choi, suggested to her that Rotary could be a starting point for others to build relationships with the community.

Today, the Rotary Club of Ulsan Freedom is active in serving its community along with other local clubs. In addition to supporting new immigrants and helping them acclimate, members work with a local orphanage to help the staff care for children. On holidays like Chuseok (Thanksgiving), Seollnal (New Year's Day), and Christmas, the club invites North Korean immigrants and local low-income families to share foods and presents, wear holiday costumes, and enjoy time together in order to ease the feeling of alienation and create a sense of belonging. "We call ourselves 'unification already in existence,'" Ju Eun Seok says. "We believe our activities will make it easier for the people of the South to accept people from the North without prejudice, and the people from the North will feel that they can be accepted, as they see us serving as proud members of the community."

Seok's club is one of many working to make the transition for immigrants a positive experience. Rotary clubs in South Korea have long supported defectors from North Korea in a variety of ways — by building schools for youth, offering scholarships, and providing free health checks and dental care. During the pandemic, five clubs (Ulsan-Dongbu, Ulsan-Jeil, Ulsan-Namsan, Ulsan-Muryong, Ulsan Freedom) have delivered quarantine kits to 580 North Korean immigrants in the Ulsan area. With help from people like Seok and their Rotary clubs, lives continue to be transformed for good.

Korean clubs in action

1. The Rotary Club of Seoul Shilla and more clubs from District 3650 regularly hold charity concerts to fund a new building for the Yeomyung School for North Korean immigrant youth.
2. The Rotary Club of Seoul Guro in District 3640 supports Samjeong School, an alternative school for North Korean immigrant youth.
3. The Rotary Club of Yangsan in District 3721, along with the Yangsan Police Department, has sponsored nine couples' joint weddings since 2015 for North Korean immigrants with economic difficulties.
4. The Rotary Club of Ilsan-Jeongbal in District 3690 provides free dental care for North Korean youth.

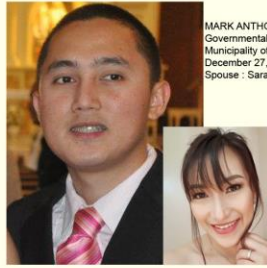

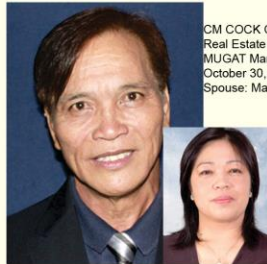

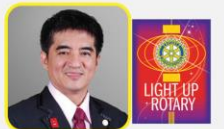

WHY THE ROTARY YEAR BEGINS 1 JULY?



Ever wonder why the Rotary year begins 1 July? The international convention initially played a key role in determining the start date of our fiscal and administrative year.

Rotary's first fiscal year began the day after the first convention ended, on 18 August 1910. The 1911-12 fiscal year also related to the convention, beginning with the first day of the 1911 convention on 21 August.

At its August 1912 meeting, the Board of Directors ordered an audit of the International Association of Rotary Clubs' finances. The auditors recommended that the organization end its fiscal year on 30 June to give the secretary and treasurer time to prepare a financial statement for the convention and board, and determine the proper number of club delegates to the convention.

The executive committee concurred, and at its April 1913 meeting, designated 30 June as the end of the fiscal year. This also allowed for changes to the schedule for reporting club membership and payments. Even *The Rotarian* changed its volume numbering system to correspond to the fiscal year (beginning with vol. 5, July 1914).

Rotary continued to hold its annual conventions in July or August until 1917. Delegates to the 1916 event in Cincinnati, Ohio, USA, approved a resolution to hold future conventions in June, mainly because of the heat in cities where most of them occurred. The next one was held 17-21 June in Atlanta, Georgia.

The term "Rotary year" has been used to signify Rotary's annual administrative period since at least 1913. An article in *The Rotarian* that July noted, "The Rotary year that is rapidly drawing to a close has been signaled by several highly successful joint meetings of Clubs that are so situated as to assemble together easily and conveniently."

Since the executive committee's decision in 1913, the end of the Rotary year has remained 30 June.

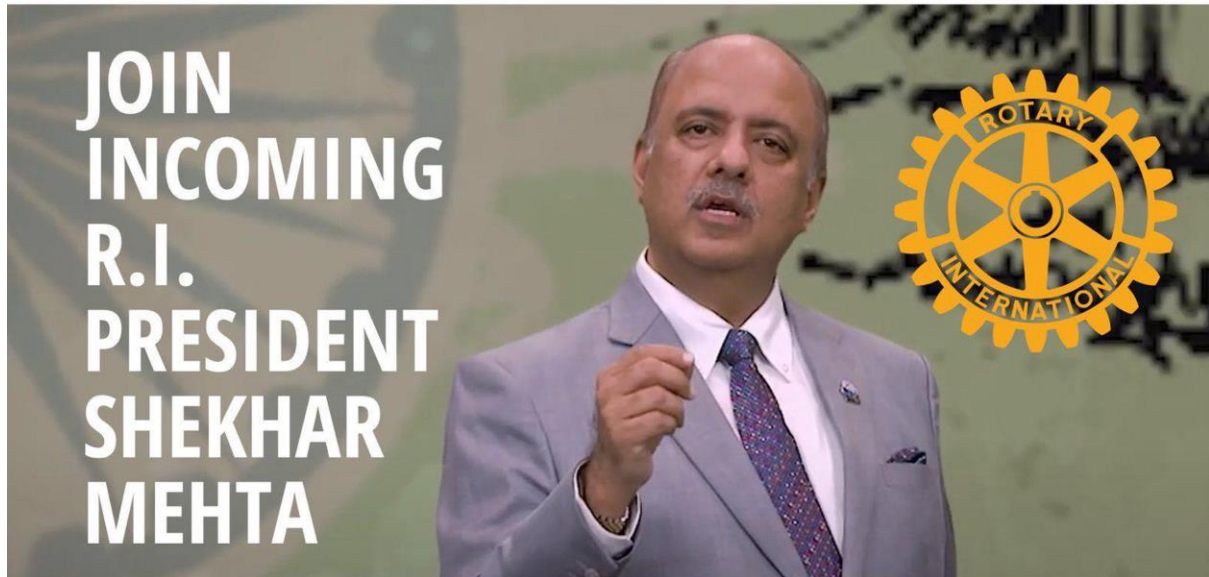
