DECLARATION OF ROTARIANS IN BUSINESS AND PROFESSIONS

The Declaration of Rotarians in Businesses and Professions was adopted by the Rotary International Council on Legislation in 1989 to provide more specific guidelines for the high ethical standards called for in the Object of Rotary:

As a Rotarian engaged in a business or profession, I am expected to:

- 1. Consider my vocation to be another opportunity to serve
- Be faithful to the letter and to the spirit of the ethical codes of my vocation, to the laws of my country, and to the moral standards of my community;
- Do all in my power to dignify my vocation and to promote the highest ethical standards in my chosen vocation;
- Be fair to my employer, employees, associates, competitors, customers, the public, and all those with whom I have a business or professional relationship;
- Recognize the honor and respect due to all occupations which are useful to society;
- Offer my vocational talents: to provide opportunities for young people, to work for the relief of the special needs of others, and to improve the quality of life in my community;
- Adhere to honesty in my advertising and in all representations to the public concerning my business or profession;
- Neither seek from nor grant to a fellow Rotarian a privilege or advantage not normally accorded others in a business or professional relationship.



I am sure you are having an enriching experience as you Serve to Change Lives. One of the ways you can make the greatest change in a person's life is to help them learn to read. Literacy opens up the world to us. It makes us better informed about life in our own communities and opens vistas to other cultures. Reading and writing connects people and gives us another way to express our love for one another.

September is Basic Education and Literacy Month in Rotary. Enhancing literacy skills is critical in our pursuit of reducing poverty, improving health, and promoting peace. In fact, if all students in low-income countries left school with basic reading skills, it would result in a significant cut in global poverty rates.

Without education, illiterate children become illiterate adults. Today, 14 percent of the world's adult population — 762 million people — lack basic reading and writing skills. Two-thirds of that group are women. Literacy and numeracy skills are essential to obtaining better housing, health care, and jobs over a lifetime.

Especially for girls and women, literacy can be a life-or-death issue. If all girls completed their primary education, there would be far fewer maternal deaths. And a child is more likely to survive past age 5 if he or she is born to a mother who can read. Improving outcomes for more people worldwide is possible only if countries remove barriers to education for girls. The economic argument for doing so is clear: In some countries where schooling is geared toward boys, the cost of missed economic opportunity is more than \$1 billion per year.

Empowering people through education is among the boldest goals we have as Rotarians. We don't have to travel far from our homes to encounter those whose lives are being curtailed because they struggle with reading, rely on others to read for them, or cannot write anything more than their own name.

Starting this month, consider how your club can Serve to Change Lives through literacy: Support local organizations that offer free programs to support adult literacy or local language learning, or that provide teachers with professional development centered around reading and writing. Become literacy mentors, or work with an organization like the Global Partnership for Education to increase learning opportunities for children around the world. Have conversations with local schools and libraries to see how your club can support their existing programs or help create needed ones in your community.

In India, the TEACH program, a successful collaboration between the country's Rotary clubs and its government, has demonstrated how to scale up literacy efforts to reach millions of children. And at a time when schools across India were closed due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the program's e-learning component reached more than 100 million children through national television.

Literacy is the first step out of poverty. As Nobel laureate Malala Yousafzai has noted, "One child, one teacher, one book, and one pen can change the world."



Malala Yousafzai is a young Pakistani activist for the education of girls and women. As a teenager, Malala, whom the world knows by her first name, courageously spoke out for the rights of girls to learn. Extremists in her country disagreed with Malala, and she was shot by a Taliban gunman on her way home from school.

But the attack didn't dissuade her; it made her more determined. As soon as she recuperated, she resumed her mission of education activism. Today the Malala Fund supports education through projects around the world. Not only is Malala an inspiration for Rotary members, we also have some commonalities: a drive to do what is right, a passion for literacy, and the power to transform dreams into reality.

One of my life mottos is: If you can dream it, you can do it. This applies to everything Rotarians do, particularly with The Rotary Foundation. We literally make our dreams happen.

Like Malala, we know that literacy is, for many, the first step out of poverty. To put our vision into action, we first understand a community and the unique problems of its members, and then form a partnership with them. Next we join forces with others — exchanging ideas with clubs in other districts, and working with people and organizations outside of Rotary.

Our solution, in the form of a district grant or global grant, will be tailored for that community. And if it's a Rotary grant, you can bet it will be well-planned, strategic, and most of all, sustainable. We want that gift of literacy to not be a one-time book donation but a plan to transform a community over time.

Over the years, I have seen countless literacy efforts in Rotary, from national programs to local projects. When the global COVID-19 pandemic hit last year, many clubs took action to help communities adjust to online schooling, including providing laptop computers. Rotary's solutions are endless, our volunteers tireless. And if I know Rotarians, I know that more solutions are being created as I write these words.

Rotary's passion for literacy and education projects is well-known. So is our commitment to make them happen. You, through Rotary, are a big part of helping people take their first step out of illiteracy, out of poverty, and into something much better. Remember, if you can dream it, you can do it — just like Malala.

DISTRICT GOVENOR'S MESSAGE

Dear fellow Rotarians,

This September, we celebrate the Basic Education and Literacy Month in our Rotary calendar. Consider these facts:

- If all women completed primary education, there will be 66% fewer maternal deaths.
- A child born to a mother who can read and write is 50% more likely to survive past the age of five.
- If all the children in low income countries completed primary education, 171 million people could be lifted out of poverty.

As one of the areas of focus of Rotary, Rotarians are supporting educational projects that provide school materials, technology, teacher training, vocational training teams, student feeding programs, water and sanitation facilities, skills training, strengthening mental health of learners, and textbooks for school communities.

As a teacher, I have worked with various schools on crafting a reading program for non-readers in my early years as a Rotarian. I had also been involved in rebuilding efforts especially after super typhoon Haiyan, or locally known as Yolanda, damaged majority of the schools in Ormoc and in Leyte. From working with Rotary clubs on enhancing the skills of teachers on technology to the provision of WASH facilities, materials, equipment, and repairing classrooms and constructing new school buildings, I have seen how communities recover and move forward better with our collective efforts to ensure that schoolchildren return to school in a safe and protected environment.

I hope that as Rotarians, we continue channeling our energies towards strengthening the capacity of our professionals in learning institutions to support basic education and literacy by enabling our learners to have a better and brighter future ahead. Let us be continually inspired to work together for the future of our nation and our world.



HISTORY OF ROTARY INTERNATIONAL

Paul P. Harris, an attorney, wanted to create a professional group with the same friendly spirit he felt in the small towns of his youth. On 23 February 1905, Harris, Gustavus Loehr, Silvester Schiele, and Hiram Shorey gathered at Loehr's office in Room 711 of the Unity Building in downtown Chicago. This was the first Rotary club meeting. They decided to call the new club "Rotary" after the practice of rotating meeting locations.

Within five years clubs had formed across the country, from San Francisco to New York.

In August 1910, Rotarians held their first convention in Chicago. The 16 clubs that existed at that time united to form the National Association of Rotary Clubs.

In 1912, the name changed to International Association of Rotary Clubs to reflect the addition of clubs in other countries. The name Rotary International

By July 1925, Rotary had grown to more than 2,000 clubs and an estimated 108,000 members on six continents.

Rotary's reputation attracted presidents, prime ministers, and a host of other luminaries to its ranks — among them author Thomas Mann, diplomat Carlos P. Romulo, and composer Jean Sibelius,

As Rotary grew, members pooled their resources and used their talents to serve their communities. The organization's dedication to this ideal is best expressed in its motto: Service Above Self.



This initiative focuses on the empowerment of girls through club and district events and service activities, as well as through RI-sponsored events such as the Rotary International Convention, Rotary Day at the United Nations, presidential conferences, and Rotary Days of Service. Our purpose is to:

- Prioritize girls in one or more areas of focus to improve their well-being and allow them to make greater contributions to their communities
- Raise awareness of the need to empower girls and work to close the youth gender gap across Rotary activities
- Inspire clubs and districts to carry out service projects that aim to empower girls

WHAT WE IN ROTARY CAN DO

Clubs and districts can emphasize the empowerment of girls in events such as Rotary Days of Service, Rotary institutes, community-based projects, district events such as photo or essay awards, other service activities, and through communications such as social media and messages from Rotary leaders. Use the service activities and resources in this brochure to help you prioritize the empowerment of girls.

Post your service activities, projects, and programs that empower girls to the Rotary Showcase Empowering Girls campaign using the tags Empowering Girls 2021 or EG2021.

IDEAS YOU CAN START WITH

- Consider planning events and activities related to 11 October, the International Day of the Girl Child.
- Plan Rotary Days of Service activities that highlight or focus on the empowerment of girls.
- Think about how you can apply the principles of diversity, equity, and inclusion in projects and programs that emphasize gender equity and empower girls.
- Contact Rotary Action Groups to find resources, guidance, and project ideas for empowering girls in each of their areas of expertise.

- Advise clubs to use the tags EmpoweringGirls2021 or EG2021 on their project posts to the Rotary Showcase Empowering Girls campaign.
- Work with Rotary partners such as ShelterBox, Habitat for Humanity International, or Mediators Beyond Borders International on projects to empower girls in ways related to their expertise, such as disaster response, affordable and safe housing, or peacebuilding and mediation.



PROGRAMS FOR YOUNG LEADERS IDEAS

- Encourage Interact clubs to take part in the Interact Awards and submit videos, photos, and essays that are about empowering girls.
- Support the creation of new Interact clubs, either at traditional or all-girl schools, to help empower girls through leadership development and community service.
- Consider events and activities related to Global Youth Service Day, which is 29 April to 1 May 2022, to emphasize how youth service can empower girls.
- Use your Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (and virtual RYLA events) to empower girls through leadership development activities.
- Encourage members to submit session ideas for the Youth Exchange Officers Preconvention that are about supporting and empowering girls.
- Start using the service-learning materials for adult advisers and youth participants in the Learning Center to plan projects that empower girls through service and address the needs of girls in each community.



- Highlight in club and district communications the benefits for girls of participating in Rotary Youth Exchange.
- Feature stories about girls who found leadership opportunities through Interact.

ROTARACT IDEAS

- Develop projects that focus on empowering girls and submit them to the Rotaract Outstanding Project Awards, which showcase Innovative, sustainable service activities aligned with our areas of focus.
- Encourage members to submit session ideas for the Rotaract Preconvention that are about supporting and empowering girls.
- Establish near-peer mentor relationships between Rotaract and Interact members with a focus on mentoring girls.

SUGGESTED ACTIVITIES FOR EACH AREA OF FOCUS



BASIC EDUCATION AND LITERACY





- Consider projects that include an investment in training female teachers.
- Work to create or improve the teaching of science, technology, engineering, arts, and math for girls as part of a school curriculum or in an after-school program.
- Set up after-school mentoring and tutoring programs for girls.
- Include adult literacy programs for mothers in your education projects.
- Facilitate professional development opportunities for teachers on gender-sensitive topics.
- Find ways to increase the conversation opportunities for boys about cultural and societal practices that affect girls.
- Contact government leaders to advocate that they invest in girls' educational opportunities and establish stricter laws against child labor, female genital mutilation, and early marriage.
- Provide menstrual hygiene education to boys and girls in the community.



DISEASE PREVENTION AND TREATMENT



MATERNAL AND

- Support programs that provide sexual and adolescent health care, including reproductive care services.
- · Facilitate education about preventing and treating sexually transmitted diseases, such as HIV and HPV.
- · Promote vaccinations that prevent the transmission of HPV and hepatitis B and C.
- Contact Rotary Action Groups that support these areas of focus, such as the Rotary Action Group for Reproductive, Maternal, and Child Health, which has an interest in adolescent health, gender equality, and the empowerment of girls.
- Advocate for mental health services specific to young girls and teens, such as those that focus on preventing suicide and dealing with substance abuse and addiction.
- Support early prevention and treatment services focused on teen pregnancies and fetal alcohol syndrome.

· Consider projects that work to prevent and treat adolescent-onset diabetes.





PEACEBUILDING AND CONFLICT PREVENTION





- Support projects that educate people about how to protect young women from being trafficked.
- Facilitate the education and engagement of young women in peacebuilding processes.
- Promote rehabilitative services programs for victims of domestic violence.
- Advocate for refugee programs aimed at young girls.
- Work to promote health education throughout a girl's school years.
- Contact peace fellows who work with femaleled organizations that are making positive social change.
- Focus stories from your club or district on how COVID-19 has affected women and girls.



COMMUNITY ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT



- Develop projects to support families' livelihoods and protect them from external economic shocks, because when families are desperate, children especially girls — are often the first to suffer.
- Facilitate projects that provide skills and experience to girls so they can improve their future access to jobs.
- Support projects to ensure that girls have access to a reliable food supply and high-quality nutrition.
- Promote projects that empower women, which create more role models and mentors for girls and set precedents for girls having learning opportunities.





ENVIRONMENT





- Promote the use of traditional and Indigenous knowledge to empower girls in natural resource management practices and understand how it affects their lives.
- Educate girls about the importance of sustainable agricultural methods to improve food security, reduce food waste, and increase access to fresh, healthy food.
- Support activities that educate and empower girls to influence family decisions about food security, family nutrition, and health.
- Develop environmental projects that have economic, educational, and health benefits for girls.
- Educate girls about the disproportionate impact of climate change on them and their futures.
- Improve access to education for girls so they can make informed choices later about issues that can have an environmental impact, from family planning to sanitation to food security.



WATER, SANITATION, AND HYGIENE





- Develop projects that improve water, sanitation, and hygiene services at schools so that girls can safely manage their menstrual hygiene without sacrificing their education. This would include, among other things, gender-specific toilets, access to sanitary napkins, and convenient and environmentally safe waste disposal.
- Support initiatives that provide women with the skills and experience to be become entrepreneurs and start businesses or cooperatives that make and sell sanitation and menstrual hygiene products, such as menstrual hygiene kits, reusable pads, and undergarments.
- Work with groups that ensure that sanitation initiatives in schools include gender-specific toilet facilities.
- Participate in projects to develop menstrual hygiene management plans and resources, including safely managed water and sanitary systems, sanitary napkins, and programs to address cultural taboos.
- Promote projects that encourage girls to assume leadership positions in hygiene promotion programs, such as the creation and implementation of school health clubs.




