

The year 2020has brought monumental changes that have already in included a global pandemic and a renewed call for social justice. We are reminded that we live in a constantly changing world, and Rotary is a reflection of that world.

We must be ready to listen and adapt, always drawing upon our core values of service, fellowship, diversity, integrity, and leadership. If we live these values and apply the Four-Way Test to all aspects of our lives, we will be prepared to lead at all times.

I am proud of how we have proven our ability to adapt. Faced with a pandemic, Rotary has not stopped. We moved meetings online and found new ways to serve. We turned the canceled 2020 Rotary International Convention in Honolulu into our first virtual convention. Each week, we are proving that Rotary is a flexible gathering that happens anywhere – in traditional meetings, on cellphones, and on computers. Rotary offers a way to connect for everyone who wants to, at any time, and will continue to do so.

Some have even told me that they enjoy Rotary's mix of online and in-person meetings more now than before! How can we build on this momentum and seize the opportunity to embrace change so that Rotary keeps thriving?

For me, supporting new clubs is key. They are no longer just experiments but a real part of Rotary today. In addition to traditional clubs, we have e-clubs, Rotaract clubs, caused based clubs, and passport clubs. These help make Rotary more inclusive, more flexible, and more attractive to new members. But I am also inspired about what hasn't changed and never will in Rotary: the friendships, the networking, the ethics, and the service. Indeed, these are the values that make Rotary attractive to all.

As Rotary's Founder, Paul Harris said, we have to be revolutionary from time to time. Now is such a time. *Rotary Opens Opportunities* – countless ones – for us to embrace change that will strengthen us even as we remain true to our core values.

Jennifer E. Jones, a member of the Rotary Club of Windsor-Roseland, Ontario Canada, has been nominated to become Rotary International's president for 2022-23, a groundbreaking selection that will make her the first woman to hold that office in the organization's 115-year history. Jones will officially become president-nominee on 1 October if no other candidates challenge her.



Jones says she sees Rotary's Action Plan as a catalyst for increasing Rotary's impact. "As we reflect upon our new strategic priorities, we could have never envisioned that our ability to adapt would become our North Star during what is inarguably the most profound time in recent history", Jones said in her vision statement. "Silver linings rise out of the most challenging circumstances. Using metric-driven goals, I will harness the historic landscape to innovate, educate, and communicate opportunities that reflect today's reality."

As the first woman to be nominated to be president, Jones understands how important it is to follow through on Rotary's Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI) Statement. I believe that diversity, equity, and inclusion...begins at the top and for us to realize growth in female membership and members under the age of forty – these demographics need to see their own reflection in leadership," Jones said. "I will champion double-digit growth in both categories while never losing sight of our entire family."

Jones is founder and president of Media Street Productions Inc., an award-winning media company in Windsor. She was chair of the board of governors of the University of Windsor and chair of the Windsor-Essex Regional Chamber of Commerce. She has been recognized for her service with the YMCA Peace Medallion, the Queen's Diamond Jubilee Medal, and Wayne State University's Peacemaker of the Year Award, a first for a Canadian. Jones holds a Doctor of Laws (LL.D.).

Jones recently led the successful #RotaryResponds telethon, which raised critical funds for Covid-19 relief and was viewed by more than 65,000. Jones has also received Rotary International's Service Above Self Award and the Rotary Foundation Citation for Meritorious Service. She and her husband, Nick Krayacich, are members of The Rotary Foundation's Arch Klumph Society, Paul Harris Society, and the Bequest Society.


SALIENT POINTS discussed during the Regular Meeting held last August 16, 2020 at Rtn. Trina's Place.

EDITORIAL - Proper Screening (The Phil. Star - 08.11.2020)

Filipinos continue returning en masse from different countries, most of them workers who lost their jobs abroad amid the coronavirus pandemic. Since the start of the community quarantine in mid-March, 221,275 overseas Filipinos have returned to the country. All of them were required to undergo 14-day quarantine upon arrival.

The Department of Health has reported that 211,540 of the returning Filipinos have been released from quarantine while 4,831 have tested positive for coronavirus disease 2019. Of that number, the DOH said 4,113 have recovered, 574 remain in hospital while five have died of Covid-19.

Another 1,796 Filipinos staying abroad have also tested positive, the DOH reported. The Department of Foreign Affairs, for its part, has recorded 9,692 confirmed COVID cases among Filipinos staying abroad.

Screening of all people entering the Philippines amid the pandemic, Filipinos and foreigners alike, must be stringent as the country grapples with community transmission of Covid-19. International flights are still limited so this is possible.

The global spread of COVID from the Chinese city of Wuhan has been attributed to international travel. In the Philippines, the belated ban on travelers from China gave the country its first Covid case on Jan. 30: a 38-year-old female Chinese tourist from Wuhan. Her male companion from Wuhan, the Philippine's patient No. 2, died on Feb. 1 in Manila.

By March 7, the first case of local transmission was recorded. And by March 11, a 67-year-ol woman with no history of overseas travel became the first Filipino to die of COVID.

These developments show the importance of screening travelers and subjecting them to proper testing and isolation. In the Philippines, local government executives have complained of recording their first Covid cases only after the arrival of locally stranded individuals from Metro Manila.

The DOH has stressed the detecting SARS-CoV-2 requires the "gold standard" reverse transcription-polymerase chain reaction swab testing and not just the rapid test for the presence of antibodies. A positive swab test result must be followed by proper isolation for anyone who tests positive.


There is general agreement that the country needs to gradually reopen the economy. But reopening without the necessary measures to prevent the further spread of COVID can only spell disaster, for both the economy and the public health.
