

SEPTEMBER is Basic Education and Literacy Month and what better way to show that the Rotary Club of Waling-Waling Davao puts a premium on basic education and literacy, was the completion of the Duha Daycare Center New Building which is scheduled to be formally turned over this month to our partner in service, the Davao City' Social Services Development Office which supervises Daycare Centers.

The Day Care Center also has 2 toilets for boys and girls and handwashing facilities which is now a basic requirement for all schools.



We also participated in the culmination programme of the Nutrition Month in the end of August at our RCWWD Day Care Center in Tibungco wherein some of our members stood as judges during the different contests giving cash prizes to the winners.

To cater to the burgeoning enrolees in our Tibungco Day Care, the club donated 20 school chairs.

Likewise, discussion had started on the possibility of converting our Tibungco Rotary Friendship Center into our 2ND RCWWD Tibungco Daycare Center to accommodate the growing population each year. This year, we presently have 115 students.

A sad news .. last August 28, Davao City experienced severe flooding on its low lying area near the Talomo and Matina Rivers.

RCWWD Members again demonstrated its readiness to be of service to help the affected families in Barangay Bangkal which was hit the most of the flooding waters.

Special thanks to PP Remie who immediately spear-headed and moved into action, asking for contributions both cash and in kind making it possible for us to be in one of the evacuation centers last Friday.. August 30 bringing pails, basins, detergent and hand soaps, clothes, blankets and other necessities.

Thank you to PPs Marivic, Che, Remie and Baby, who accompanied me to distribute the items ourselves. Our thanks also to PP Malou who lent her driver Lito and vehicle to deliver and help in the distribution.

My appreciation goes to all who donated even at a short notice and to the members who went with me and selflessly sacrificed their precious time to join in the activity.

What is Rotary Literacy Month?

Rotary Literacy Month highlights literacy and education issues around the world.

Rotary Literacy Month is an excellent opportunity for Rotary clubs and districts to raise awareness about literacy, launch new literacy initiatives and projects, and recognize literacy accomplishments from the past year. Rotarians everywhere are encouraged to participate in Rotary Literacy Month by engaging in service or activities that specifically address literacy and education issues either in their communities or abroad.

Some ideas for Rotary Literacy Month activities include:

Raising awareness about literacy and education

- Invite local literacy or education experts like teachers, school administrators, government education officers, and university professors, to speak at your club's meeting about local, regional, or international literacy and education issues.
- Arrange for club members to visit local schools, universities, libraries, and tutoring centers to learn about your community's literacy and education resources.
- Facilitate a discussion session at your club's meeting about literacy and education in your community.

Take action for literacy

- Launch a new literacy project during Rotary Literacy Month
- Work with existing literacy providers to plan a literacy project
- Arrange for club members to volunteer at a tutoring center
- ♥ Begin a student mentoring program
- Encourage local businesses to offer education opportunities for employees
- Start an adult education program at a local school or community center
- ♥ Conduct a teacher training event for your district
- Conduct a literacy awareness campaign in your community
- Donate books for a community library, school supplies for under privileged students, or teaching materials for underprivileged schools

Celebrate literacy

- Arrange a community award to recognize contributions to literacy and education
- Hold a literacy ball to raise money for literacy programs in your community
- Conduct an essay contest to encourage writing among students in your community
- Arrange a literacy fair and invite local bookstores to participate, local authors to read about literacy, and local government agencies to display information about literacy and education programs

For many years, Rotarians have been active in efforts to reduce illiteracy, from building schools and paying salaries of teachers to serving as tutors to collecting and distributing books and audio visual materials to libraries.

Rotarians are working with governments to create large-scale replicable literacy projects in the developing world.





In 1985, Rotary declared basic literacy to be a pre-condition to the development of peace. Through this organizational emphasis, more than half the world's nearly 33,000 Rotary clubs address the full range of literacy and mathematical challenges for primary, vocational, and adult learners as well as teacher training. Many Rotary club members promote what is called "lighthouse" literacy projects – those that can be replicated easily, thereby increasing the scope of their impact.

Basic education and literacy is one of Rotary's six areas of focus.

We know that basic education and literacy are essential for reducing poverty, improving health, encouraging community and economic development, and promoting peace.

Consider these facts:

If all women completed primary education, there would be 66% fewer maternal deaths.

A child born to a mother who can read is 50% more likely to survive past the age of five.

If all students in low-income countries left school with basic reading skills, 171 million people could be lifted out of poverty, which would be equivalent to a 12% cut in world poverty.

The world is making good progress in this area. According to a United Nations Millennium Development Goals progress report, literacy rates among adults and youths are on the rise and the gender gap in literacy is narrowing.

But pressing global needs remain:

- 58 million children worldwide are out of school.
- Even after four years of primary schooling, as many as 250 million children cannot read and write.
- More than 775 million people over the age of 15 are illiterate.

That's 17 percent of the world's adult population.

Our goal is to strengthen the capacity of communities to support basic education and literacy, reduce gender disparity in education, and increase adult literacy. We support education for all children and literacy for children and adults.

These resources were made available to all Rotary Clubs around the world to bring literacy initiatives to children in need. Empowering communities by fighting adult illiteracy was also given focus.

Rotary scholarships were offered to students who have the potential to make positive changes in their own community. We also ventured into educating refugees in Nigeria to give children opportunity to learn despite their struggles. Rotary also got into the mentoring program matching student participants with Rotarians who are in their respective professional field that will share with them related experiences, job accomplishments and in how they achieved their goals.

Not only that their Mentor-Rotarians provide them with actual experiences on their chosen field but also to help them realize what they really wanted to embark in the future.

We also strive to attain peace through education

Remarkable as it is, Rotary endeavor to help in sustaining development in many communities by supporting programs in the area of basic education and literacy.

The needs of society differs in many ways and we acknowledge the fact that every community is unique and that it is important to set the stage by doing a thorough assessment to identify these needs before we can come up with a program to implement.

Again, we emphasize on sustainability. Partnering with key stakeholders in the community, school administrators, teachers, school staff, parents of students, students, and local community members and members of the department of education will ensure success of the project.
