#### JOJI ILAGAN BIAN

**Chair: Joji Ilagan International Schools Honorary Consul – Bangladesh for Jurisdiction** in Mindanao



**Joji Ilagan-Bian** wears many hats: foremost is her being a business leader and an educator.

Through her various initiatives she has helped create a favorable business and investment climate in Davao City since 1988 which resulted to higher employment in the countryside. She has transformed the lives of thousands of less privilege youth through her technical vocational skills scholarship since 2000. She has worked with women influencing them and instilling in them an entrepreneurial mindset.

Founder and Chairperson of the Joji Ilagan Career Center Foundation, Inc; the school eventually progressed to what is now the Joji Ilagan Career Center College of Business and Tourism. The organization has since flourished even further in the last decade with the addition of five (5) more educational institutions: Institute of International Culinary Hospitality Entrepreneurship; International Management School; Joji Ilagan International School of Hotel and Tourism Management; Career Institute of Southeast Asia; and Stockbridge American International School. The organization has also expanded the reach of its operations by opening the JIB International Management School and Stockbridge American International School in General Santos City. These international schools have come to form the network of JIB International Schools, all offering transnational, international and industry standard, skills based education and training which allows its students to earn certifications that are recognized internationally. All of these schools are accredited by the Commission of Higher Education (CHED); Department of Education (DEPED) and the Technical Skills Development Authority (TESDA).

Joji Ilagan has worked tirelessly for over 35 years on her personal advocacy of people empowerment through education and skills training and provision of job opportunities. She has done this not only through her network of schools but also in her personal engagements and affiliations. She has functioned in various capacities in civic, religious, industry, trade and business organizations as well as government- created commissions, carrying with this advocacy with her. These efforts have not gone unnoticed. Joji Ilagan is held in high esteem in the trade, industry and business sector for her accomplishments.

In holding past leadership and trustee roles in the Mindanao Business Council, Philippine Chamber of Commerce Industry, Davao City Chamber of Commerce Industry and East ASEAN Business Council and Mindanao Commission of Women, Davao Investment Promotion Board, Davao Tourism Assn, Asia Pacific Council of Hotel Restaurant Educators and Divine Mercy Apostolate Archdiocese of Davao among others.

Joji Ilagan is particularly known for her ability to strongly inspire people to share her passion and advocacy and involve them in making positive change happen. This is evidenced by her being founding chair of organizations such as the Mindanao Technical Vocational Schools Association, Philippine Call Centers Alliance and Council of Hotel and Restaurant Educators Region X1. She has been awarded by various institutions for being the embodiment of leadership and for being an empowering force wherever she goes. As a businesswoman- entrepreneur, Joji Ilagan is a prime example of what an empowered woman can do for her family and community. As the first woman president of the Davao City Chamber of Commerce and Industry, Inc. and the Mindanao Business Councill she has blazed a trail for women to take an active role in affecting change in the business landscape. In all her involvements and leadership roles and engagements, she is able to voice the perspectives of women and bring them to a national and international sphere of attention. As the former Vice Chairperson of the Mindanao Commission of Women, she advocated for the positioning of women to be key decision makers and beneficiaries for peace and development in Mindanao and make them active movers in the achievement of multicultural peace, dynamism and harmony. Joji Ilagan Bian has a solid track record in community engagement in the fields of education, business, and politics, civic and religious movement that spans more than 30 years. She has received the Patnubay Award in Non- Governmental Organization Work for Education in recognition of her consistent work in providing free skills trainings and scholarships at the grassroots level. She was the youngest ever recipient of the Datu Bago Award in Business and Education as a testament to the appreciation of Davao City for her contributions to the city's growth and development in the areas of business and education and the Kabalikat Laang Bisig Presidential National Awardee 1997 for the promotion of Development of Technical Vocational Training in the Philippines and for the scholarship programs to out of school youth of the Joji Ilagan Foundation conferred by then President of the Republic of the Philippines, President Joseph Estrada; 2012 LEAD Awardee of the Jaycee Senate; Outstanding Alumni of the Immaculate Conception College and the Service Medal of Merit granted by Pres Macapagal Arroyo. Recently in 2017 she was awarded as one of the Most Outstanding ASEAN Women Entrepreneur during the ASEAN Summit in Manila. She was also one of the 100 Most Influential Filipina of the World in 2017 of the Global Filipina Women's Network and was awarded in Toronto Canada.

# **Training in Plumbing:**Skills that Make a Difference<sup>2</sup>

**Title of the Project:** 

Training in Plumbing: Skills that Make a Difference"

This project aims to provide skills training to enthusiastic young men and women, many of whom come from underprivileged

families, most of them breadwinners. The greater impact of this project is not only supporting education and training, providing clean water with good plumbing but also in growing local economies that composed

three of Rotary's Areas of Focus.
Empowerment and Capacity Building are the cornerstones of this project that will "feed men for a lifetime."

**Location:** TESDA Training Center, Tibungco, Davao City **Beneficiaries:** Nineteen (19) Out of School Youth from RCWWD's Rotary Community Corp (RCC) & Boystown.

**Date:** August 6, 2018 to September 28, 2018

#### The Mechanics

The Process of Implementation of the Project

The Rotary Club of Waling Waling Davao (RCWWD), in its efforts to empower the different communities within Davao City, recognizes the need to train out -of -school youth residing in its

four (4) Rotary Community Corps (RCC). Davao City Water District (DCWD), a partner of RCWWD in previous projects, had been conducting trainings on plumbing as part of its Corporate Social Responsibility

With this common goal, RCWWD and DCWD has again forged a partnership which includes Technical Education and Skills Training (TESDA), as in charge of the training proper for the skills training entitled

"TRAIŇING ON PLUMBING: SKILLS THAT MAKE A DIFFERENCE.

#### RCWWD Day Care Center Tibungco Relocation Area (sustaining project)

**Project Background** 

When the informal settlers living along the then open dumpsite area in Diversion Road in Maa, along with the other informal settlers and urban squatters from other areas, were relocated by the City Government of Davao in Tibungco, Bunawan District, the local Department of Social Welfare and Development and City Social Service Development provided the social services for this disadvantaged and depressed citizenry of the city.

The end goal was to help this community become productive, self-reliant, and ultimately attain better quality of life.

To support this objective, the Rotary Club of Waling Waling Davao pursued to help this marginalized group. One specific concern that RCWWD identified, together with

One specific concern that RCWWD identified, together with the new residents, was the need for a Day Care Center to address the early child development requirements of the new community.

Specifically, the RCWWD Day Care will provide the opportunity for the young generation to develop into nation builders of the future.

#### **Beneficiaries:**

Every school year, the RCWWD Day Care Center accepts enrolees for about 75-80 pre school children with ages 4-6 years old.

The other sequential beneficiaries of this program are the parents, who are formally organized under the Parent-Teacher Association and the Rotary Village Corp. Responsible parenthood is key to child development. In the macrocosm, the entire residents of this relocation area have been invited to participate in Rotary-sponsored activities.

Since its start in 2000, an estimated 2000 + pupils have graduated from the RCWWD Day Care Center.

Over the years, several students from the Center have received awards from inter-city contests, proof that the Center has been effective in providing basic learning and development training to the young members of the community.



Among the annual activities conducted by RCWWD in the Center are:

- Conduct of medical and dental check-up in July, including immunizations & anti-rabies vaccination of pets
- Milk / lugaw Feeding
- \* Donation of school supplies, learning materials and books
- \* Support in the celebration of Nutrition Month, and Family Month
- \* Support in sports fest
- Christmas Gift-giving
- \* Support in Moving-Up Graduation Ceremonies
- Sponsor Day Care Teacher to attend trainings and seminars

Regular needs analysis by the Club has resulted to the construction of additional facilities. Among these are:

- Friendship and Training Center that also serves as a mini public library and laboratory for TESDA-accredited income generating skills trainings



The birth of the Rotary Club of Waling-Waling Davao was a breakthrough in Rotary International District 3860 where membership was purély male until 1991.

The Rotary Club of East Davao with then Extension Committee chairperson (now Past District Governor) Reynaldo "Boy" Reyes paved the way for the civic-minded women of Davao to become Rotarians.

After only 2 provisional meetings in September 1991, thirty (30) professional and business ladies were inducted and swore commitment to Rotary Ideals.

On January 20, 1992, the Rotary International approved the club's membership with Ms. Sylvia Marfori as the Charter President
