

Last Thursday's 11th Regular Meeting was not only educational but special as well.

We were blessed to have as guest speaker, Ms Eliza Miole-Suarez, a professional licensed Guidance Counselor of F. Bangoy National High School who talked on "*Factors Affecting Academic Performance of Students*".

The topic was truly informative and the speaker was noteworthy and remarkable.

The event was hosted by the House of Hope Foundation and the city government of Davao. The programme was amazingly well thought of. There was a fire dance and performances from the Kadayawan 2019 Indak-Indak champion Sta. Ana National High School and John Paul II College dance troupe.

On Sept. 21, some club members again travelled to the farm of Mrs. Adelina Royo (PP Vangie's sister) in Bgy Kimamon Sto Tomas, Davao del Norte for the 2nd dose of Tetanus Toxoid.

Just like on the first dose activity, we were again treated to a sumptuous array of crabs, shrimps, lechon and many more including unlimited eat all you can lanzones.

After the activity, we made a sidetrip visit to PP Eliza Lapiña (who is currently the chief administrator of the municipality of Sto Tomas) to a shooting range in the area and like a typical Waling-Waling member, ideas on a peace project came up during our conversation with one of the army officials. It was a fruitful 15 minutes visit.

It is a community service arm of the Davao Medical School Foundation with the aim of promoting primary health care, livelihood enhancement and capacity building of partners (Communities, POs, LGUs, other stakeholders).

It has worked in the field of participatory development since 1978.

For the past 3 decades, IPHC have worked in more than 300 rural villages in region XI, XII, & XIII. it has organized more than 150 people's organization (POs) with varying levels of capacity and nature of operation and most of which are now active dev't. partners in their community.

Although it began 30 years ago as a small NGO engaged solely in primary health care, it has evolved into a multi-issue NGO whose programs and projects range from health care financing, water system construction, family planning, gender and dev't. and reproductive health to agrarian reform and community-based forest management, early childhood education and sponsorship, organic farming, adult literacy and micro-lending.

The institute is a member of several networks including LGCNet, PNGOC, PhilDHRRRA, MINCODE and the Local Development Councils at regional, provincial, municipal and Barangay levels.

IPHC is setting in the Local Special Bodies like Municipal Health Boards, Social Development Council and Development Administration Committee of Region XI.

Teaching the Teachers

Realizing that getting children into schools isn't enough to solve illiteracy, Rotary shifts to mentoring and coaching teachers

Learning outcomes over enrolment

Rotary projects like the Guatemala Literacy Project and Nepal Teacher Training Innovations (NTTI) in Nepal are leading the effort to advance childhood reading by empowering teachers to teach better.

Rotary, the United Nations, USAID, and other organizations are shifting their focus to helping teachers plan lessons that ensure students will actually learn. The entire effort is part of a larger goal to reduce extreme poverty, because knowing how to read and write increases a person's earning potential and ability to build a better life.

Another project that's succeeding is Johnson's Guatemala Literacy Project. The program began 20 years ago, setting up computer labs and supplying textbooks for middle school students in the western and central highlands. It has evolved to center on teacher mentoring.

Carolyn Johnson, a member of the Rotary Club of Yarmouth, Maine, U.S.A., visited the region in 2006, seeking a literacy project for her district. She ended up leaving her job as a primary school principal after seeing the potential to address a deeper problem — the students' poor reading skills.

"The primary school teacher in me realized you don't start reading in the seventh grade. You have to start in the first grade," Johnson says.

Over the next year, she returned to Guatemala several times, meeting with nonprofits, teachers, community members, and school administrators. She developed a curriculum based on the Concentrated Language Encounter method used widely in other parts of the world. A partnership was formed with the nonprofit Cooperative for Education (CoEd), which has a strong presence in Guatemala.

Five trainers hired by CoEd, with the help of local Rotary members, lead three two-day training sessions, usually in January, April, and July, for about 150 primary school teachers. Between those sessions, each teacher receives in-class coaching. Each year, a new global grant from The Rotary Foundation extends the effort to another 40 or so primary schools and a dozen middle schools selected after meetings with community leaders, parents, teachers, and administrators. More than 480 clubs in Guatemala, the United States, Canada, Cayman Islands, England, and Japan have provided financial support. Every year, about 50 Rotary volunteers take part by delivering materials and visiting classrooms.

After completing the training, most of the teachers continue to use what they've learned to enhance education in their communities.

"Does it always happen? No. But more often than not teachers continue to use the approach to learning, if not the specific model," Johnson says.

She adds, *getting into classrooms once a month can be a challenge and increases costs, but it is the piece that really makes it work."*

"A teacher can go to training and take it back to their classroom. But maybe it doesn't work because you left a piece out, or maybe the teacher tries it and decides it doesn't work so they aren't going to do it again,"

"You need somebody there to coach and model and give you feedback. To say 'You're doing great, but let's look at this little corner and shape it differently.'"



Teacher training is a key component of Nepal Teacher Training Innovations, which is improving the classroom experience for both students and teachers.

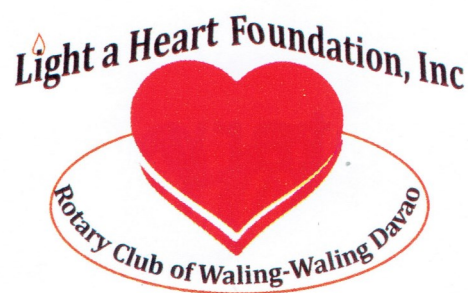
