Because of this pandemic , we had a simple virtual induction ceremony but was seen in Japan, Australia and the USA. A first indeed.

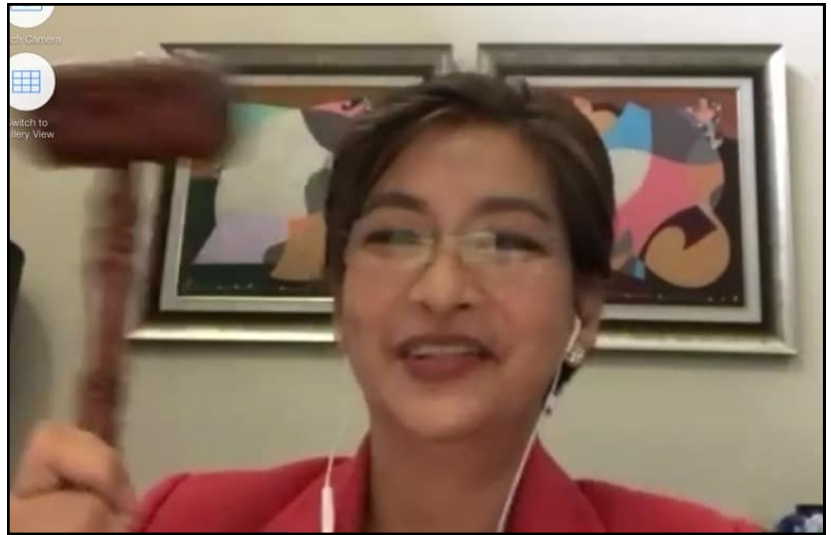

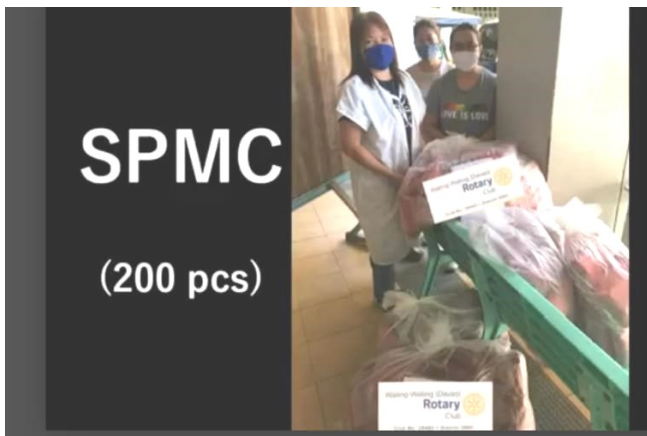

Remembering Rotary International Convention 2019 and the Choice of RI President Holger Knaack

I have attended a few RI Conventions since I became a member of Rotary but the Hamburg, Germany convention on June 2-5, 2019 was to me, the most memorable one to date apart from the milestone virtual Honolulu convention.

I stayed about 20 minutes by train from the main venue and had commute every day and walk another 10 minutes (if I walk really fast!) through the beautiful Planten un Blomen garden in the midst of Hamburg. The Hamburg RI Convention was one of the most well attended with more than 20,000 registered participants from around the world. I got the second seating for the Opening Ceremonies and the parade of flags from all the member countries gave me goosebumps.

It was festive and joyful with presentations that were excellent and well timed.

There were no technical glitches whatsoever and the program was excellently hosted.

I had a soft spot for RI President Barry Rassin which made me enjoy the convention so much.

I attended all general session meetings and chose my favorite topics at the breakout sessions.

The sessions were replete about Rotary – it's projects, visions for women Rotarians and increasing their leadership in Rotary, nurturing Rotaractors, leadership and leading people, the great End Polio campaign and how Rotary impacted many lives of people around the world.

It was a proud moment to be a Rotarian – to be part of and sharing a vision that was bigger than one's self.

I attended the RI Business Meeting to represent the Rotary Club of Waling Waling Davao.

It was at that time that Holger Knaack was presented by the RI Nominating Committee as president for Rotary Year 2020-2021.

It was a fortuitous choice in the heels of the resignation by President Nominee Sushil Gupta due to health reasons.

RI President Holger Knaack must not have seen it coming and it brought to my mind how fate and destiny worked.



"A Rotary member since 1992, Knaack has served Rotary as treasurer, director, moderator, member and chair of several committees, representative for the Council on Legislation, zone coordinator, training leader, and district governor.

He is an endowment/major gifts adviser and co-chair of the Host Organization Committee for the 2019 Rotary International Convention in Hamburg.

Knaack is the CEO of Knaack KG, a real estate company. He was previously a partner and general manager of Knaack Enterprises, a 125-year-old family business.

He is a founding member of the Civic Foundation of the City of Ratzeburg and served as president of the Golf-Club Gut Grambek. Knaack is also the founder and chair of the Karl Adam Foundation."

"To build a stronger membership, Knaack says Rotary must focus on increasing the number of female members and transitioning Rotaractors into Rotarians.

Knaack believes that the People of Action campaign offers new public awareness possibilities for Rotary.

"This campaign conveys our global image while still respecting differences in regions and cultures," he says.

I went home with lots of Rotary Information, loads of friendly encounters with other Rotarians from the Philippines and other countries.

I learned about Hamburg and the history of Germany and its people. My long walks allowed me to observe how people in Hamburg live. I had the opportunity to walk across a weekend market where fruits, vegetables and dry goods inside and outside my neighborhood.

I took the Red Hamburg Tour Bus many times and had great fellowship with fellow club members PP Lorna Llamas, then Incoming President Teresita Yniguez, Director Letty Tai and Rotarian Elsa Villagomez.

We had great times at the convention venue, long walks, shared meals, shopping and simple fellowship.

Life is great with Rotary.

Incoming RI president announces 2020-21 presidential theme

Rotary International President-elect Holger Knaack is encouraging Rotarians to seize the many opportunities Rotary offers to enrich their lives and the communities they serve.

Knaack, a member of the Rotary Club of Herzogtum Lauenburg-Mölln, Germany, revealed the 2020-21 presidential theme, Rotary Opens Opportunities, to incoming district governors at the Rotary International Assembly in San Diego, California, USA, on 20 January.

Rotary isn't just a club for people to join, but rather "an invitation to endless opportunities," said Knaack, who becomes president on 1 July. He emphasized that Rotary creates pathways for members to improve their lives and the lives of those they help through service projects.

"We believe that our acts of service, big and small, create opportunities for people who need our help," Knaack said. He added that Rotary creates leadership opportunities and gives members the chance to travel the world to put their service ideas into action and make lifelong connections. "Everything we do opens another opportunity for someone, somewhere," said Knaack

Changing for the future

Knaack also urged members to embrace change so Rotary can expand and thrive. Rather than setting a specific target for increasing the number of members, Knaack said he's asking clubs and districts to think about how to grow in a sustainable and organic way. He wants clubs to focus on keeping current members engaged and adding new members who are the right fit for their club.

We will capture this moment to grow Rotary, making it stronger, more adaptable, and even more aligned with our core values.



"We need to stop thinking of new members as people we can mark down as statistics and then forget about," Knaack said. "Every new member changes us a little bit. That person brings a new perspective, new experiences. We need to embrace this constant renewal. We will grow stronger as we learn from new members."

Knaack pointed to Rotary's Action Plan as a compass that can guide clubs as they evolve. He recommended that every club have a strategic plan meeting at least once a year. At that meeting, clubs should ask where they want to be in five years and how they can bring more value to their members.

Knaack also wants to see more women in leadership roles and see Rotaractors play an integral role in how new clubs are formed and run. He encouraged district leaders to create new club models and rethink what it means to be in Rotary and allow young people to be the architects of these new clubs

"We have to be open to new approaches and creating unique clubs for younger people is just part of the solution," said Knaack. "Let Rotaractors decide what kind of Rotary experience works best for them. These young people are bright, energetic, and they get things done."

In stressing the need for Rotary members to embrace change, Knaack noted that time won't slow down for Rotary: "We will not let rapid change defeat us. We will capture this moment to grow Rotary, making it stronger, more adaptable, and even more aligned with our core values





New Rotary club models enhance connections

Rotary's new strategic plan is underpinned by four key priorities – to increase our impact, expand our reach, enhance participant engagement, and increase our ability to adapt. The emergence of new club models is evidence that Rotary clubs and districts are working actively to advance these priorities.

These new club models represent an opportunity to connect with a more diverse group of individuals – particularly those who are unable or unwilling to join our traditional clubs. While new club models have been emerging for some time, the 2016 Council on Legislation decision to promote flexibility and innovation has arguably accelerated their development.

At the present time, it's possible to recognize at least seven different types of clubs:

- * **Traditional clubs** – at the heart of Rotary: a group of professionals and aspiring leaders who meet regularly for service, connections and personal growth
- * **Satellite clubs** – sponsored by a traditional club, but with their own meetings, projects, bylaws and board
- * **E-Clubs** – that meet exclusively online
- * **Passport clubs** – that allow members to attend other Rotary club meetings and service projects, so long as they attend a specified number of meetings in their own club
- * **Corporate clubs** – whose members are employed by the same employer, but who have different roles in their workplace
- * **Cause-based clubs** – whose members share a passion for a particular cause and whose service projects and activities center around that cause, and
- * **Rotaract clubs** – sponsored by Rotary clubs, whose members are aged between 18 and 30 and who meet together for service, friendship, and connections

Amid this landscape there are also hybrids of these types – adding further to the diversity of Rotary, and there can be little doubt that new club models will continue to emerge – including the possibility of a model of participation which is not club-based.

Development of new club models and new ways to engage with Rotary is a healthy sign – indeed some would say a critical ingredient – of our ongoing sustainability and success.

Our challenge is to continue to evolve – to meet the needs of our members and our communities and to ensure Rotary stays relevant, innovative, and engaging long into the future.
