



We are celebrating membership month. and last Thursday, we had another guest speaker, our very own PP Veg. Her topic was about leadership. She said that leadership is the art of motivating and inspiring to work together to achieve a common goal.

She reiterated that the success of our club is because of the diversity of its members. PP Veg even proposed that we do a leadership training to tap great leaders in our club to lead our club to great heights.

Dir Teri, Dir Ces and myself visited our RCC ADAP to assess what they need and how we can help them. They do have an ongoing project right now. They make plant stands and have DTI post them in the website for them to sell online. We encouraged them to continue to fabricate plant stands from scrap irons they have, since there is a trend on ornamental plants and plant stands selling like hotcakes.

Last Aug 17, we started a project "Gunting at suklay pangkabuhayan" a basic training on haircutting at the House of Hope for the parents of the children with cancer. We had 11 trainees, 7 males and 4 females. The participants came from different cities from Mindanao. It was very engaging. The participants were so attentive that they wanted to start cutting each other's hair. We required them to finish 3 haircutting for 3 models before we award them with their personal kit consisting of 2 scissors, one for cutting and the other for thinning, a comb, an apron, hair clip and a spray.

They were very thankful to our club that we shared this livelihood program for them. I am thankful to Vocational Dcirector Luchi for coming up with this project.

Dir Teri, Dir Ces, RTn Chona, and myself went to Sitio Magwawa at Marilog last August 18. We brought books and soap for handwashing to the Magwawa Day Care Center.

They are very thankful for the goods we brought. They warmly welcomed us , they even prepared snacks for us and fresh vegetables from their backyard.

I noticed that these group of parents are very young and active. They have 35 pupils that are already enrolled.



In my mind if we extend extra help to this community they would be very thankful.

I again thank Dir Teri, Dir Ces, Dir Luchi, Sec Baby and Rtn Chona for being with me on all the project visits From the bottom of my heart THANK YOU, I LOVE YOU GUYS.



ROTARY HISTORY



23 February 1905 was the first Rotary Club meeting.

They decided to call the new club "Rotary" after the practice of rotating meeting locations.

PAUL HARRIS the president of Chicago Rotary Club, the first public service project was the construction of ______ in Chicago.





What is Rotary?

"Rotary is an organization of business and professional person united worldwide who provide humanitarian service, encourage high ethical standards in all vocations and help build friendship and peace in the world."

In 1923, the present gear wheel, with cogs and spokes was adopted by the "Rotary International Association"

The United States Supreme Court upheld the California court indicating that Rotary clubs do have a "business purpose" and are in some ways public-type organizations.

This action in 1987 allowed women to become Rotarians in any jurisdiction having similar "public accommodation" statutes. The RI constitutional change was made at the 1989 Council on Legislation, with a vote to eliminate the "male only" provision for all of Rotary.

Now, 38% of Rotarians are women.

Easy Ways to Attract and Retain Rotary Members

Promote - via the media -

club and district activities which address important community issues

Each time Rotary is mentioned in the news, hundreds, thousands, and sometimes millions of people are reached.

More than just enhancing Rotary's image, public relations can help gain support for projects, attract members, and improve the quality of service that Rotarians provide. In order to take full advantage of the media, Rotary news must be presented properly.

The following are some tips on how to effectively promote Rotary in the media:

- Appoint club PR chairpersons Attracting media attention requires hard work and research. A significant advantage is gained by appointing club and PR chairpersons who work in the communications field and understand the media in your area.
- [°] Know the media in your area Approach the media strategically. Link your story to a larger trend or current news events. When presenting a story idea to the media, make sure it is brief and to the point. Think of how to best present Rotary in a 30-second sound "bite." Tailor your idea to a specific journalist, publication or broadcast program. Health segments require stories with a health angle, international news programs require an international angle.
- Offer knowledgeable rotary spokespeople When suggesting a story to the media, make sure you can offer articulate local spokespeople. A spokesperson should be someone who is actively involved and can inform others.
- Identify Newsworthy Story Angles Every Rotary story must have significant news value. The best public relations for Rotary is effective service. How Rotary addresses real needs in the community is the kind of newsworthy story that interests journalists. It helps to support your story idea with background materials, such as fact sheets or brochures, which are available from the service center in your area.
- Consider developing your own club web page. Rotary sites help attract and retain members, improve club communications across the globe, and make club project information available to your local media. The number of people reached with Rotary's message can be substantially increased by encouraging community groups to send their visitors to your club's site for additional information on certain local issues and programs.
- Solicit third party endorsements of Rotary projects It is important for Rotarians to share the good work of Rotary. But it is more credible, more believable and more impressive to have others talk about our good deeds. An organization with which Rotary partners is an excellent source for a third party endorsement.




- Ask the beneficiaries of Rotary service to speak on behalf of the club or district - No comment is more powerful than one made by a person or a family that has benefited from Rotary's work. For example, at a press conference to announce housing units built or supported by Rotary, have the head of household or a child speak instead of a Rotary official. People watching the report on television or reading about it in the newspaper will be much more moved by their testimony.
- Arrange for Rotary displays in local libraries, banks, city halls, etc. - Many organizations will permit community groups to put up displays in their buildings.
 Order materials from the RI catalog and set up an educational display in heavily trafficked

places.

- Promote Rotary's work with and for young people The media is often interested in programs relating to young people. They are particularly interested in projects being carried out by young people such as Rotaract and Interact activities and the Ambassadorial Scholarship program. Promoting the work of young people to the media is also a good way of updating the image of Rotary.
- Seek opportunities for Rotarians to speak at community events and in schools -Visibility is an important prerequisite to membership recruitment. Be aggressive in identifying opportunities for members of Rotary to speak at community events. Rotarians are capable of providing valuable commentary on any number of community issues.

Be proactive! Don't wait to be invited. Organizers will be glad that you called!

MEMBERS

YOUR CLUB EXPERIENCE:

Members who have a positive Rotary experience are more likely to stay. In turn, they create a positive Rotary experience for others, because their enthusiasm is contagious.

If your club's members genuinely enjoy being a part of the club, you're on the right path. Your experience includes not just your club meetings and other activities, but also the connections you've made and your pride in Rotary's work.

While some members leave for logistical reasons, many leave because of a lack of engagement, an inflexible club culture or other unmet expectations, all of which affect a member's experience.

If members are not having a good experience, your club is at risk of losing them.

Club meetings: Change the meeting format or style. Find out what your members want using the Member Satisfaction Survey Develop leadership skills among club leaders and members by holding a *leadership skills training.*

Rotary experience beyond the club:

Sponsor an Interact or Rotaract club, organize a RYLA event, create a scholarship, or start an exchange. Join a Rotary Fellowship or Rotarian Action Group.

Promote district events that are open to all members.

Try having someone who's attended in the past talk about the experience.

SERVICE AND SOCIALS

Participating in service and having fun with fellow members are the primary reasons Rotarians join and



stay in Rotary.

The healthiest clubs vary their activities and offer multiple ways to get involved. Try a new kind of social event or a different service experience and watch the impact it has on your club.

Clubs that have inadequate social or service opportunities are at risk of losing members who don't feel connected or empowered.

The good news is that these deficiencies can be remedied in fun and rewarding ways.

A healthy club is one that is growing and changing. Having members with diverse perspectives and backgrounds will fuel innovation and give



your club a broader understanding of your community's needs. Pay attention to how your members are feeling about the club.

Research shows that one of the most common reasons members leave is that club leaders are not open to new ideas.

Involving members and giving them a voice in their club's future will strengthen both the club and members' commitment to Rotary.

Clubs that have deficiencies in membership are at risk of becoming out dated, dull, and less valuable to their members and community. .

Clubs that have fun and make an impact are attractive to those who see that.



A positive public image improves your

club's relationship with your community and prospective members.

Make sure your club is getting the credit for the service you provide. Demonstrating that

your club meets real needs confirms your value to your community. Clubs that don't have a visible presence in their community are at risk of minimizing their impact or being perceived as irrelevant.

BUSINESS AND OPERATIONS

When your club runs smoothly, you likely have good leaders who are looking toward the club's future. The leaders shape the club as a whole, and it's crucial to have skilled people in those leadership positions. For this reason, leadership development is also a way to fortify your club.

Clubs that don't have skilled members in leadership roles or that neglect member needs are at risk of becoming ineffective and obsolete,

and losing their members as a result. There are plenty of remedies for clubs that want to thrive.
