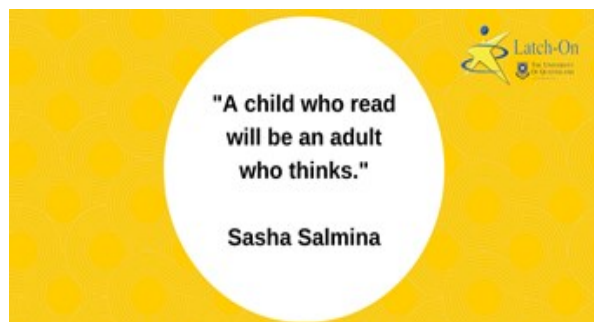

In 1985, Rotary declared basic literacy to be a pre-condition to the development of peace.

Through this organizational emphasis, more than half the world's nearly 33,000 Rotary clubs address the full range of literacy and mathematical challenges for primary, vocational, and adult learners as well as teacher training.

Many Rotary club members promote what is called "lighthouse" literacy projects – those that can be replicated easily, thereby increasing the scope of their impact.

Lighthouse literacy projects have been created for formal schooling, older children who are not in school, functionally illiterate adults (particularly women), special groups, and teacher's training.

The purpose of these projects is to inspire, guide and support national authorities toward alleviating mass illiteracy in developing countries.

In Thailand, for example, the "lighthouse" literacy effort has been so successful that the government adopted it as a national program. Similar literacy initiatives have been sponsored by Rotary clubs in Australia, Bangladesh, and South Africa.

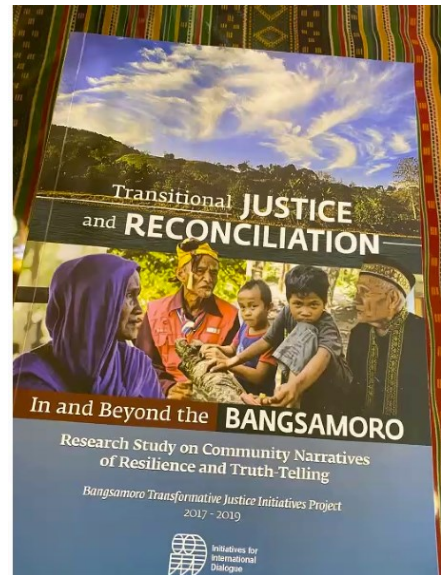

Help achieve universal education: take action during Rotary Literacy Month

Since the U.N. Millennium Development Goals were established in 2000, Rotary has played a role in global efforts to reduce extreme poverty and reach target goals.



While great progress has been made towards universal primary education, advancements towards this goal slowed significantly over the past eight years. About 58 million primary-school-age children are currently not enrolled in school while 781 million adults and 126 million youth worldwide lack basic literacy skills. Achieving universal primary education and gender equality in schools is critical to meeting other development goals. Greater levels of education help communities fight poverty, prevent disease, and access and sustain resources for longer, more prosperous lives.*

During **Rotary Literacy Month**, replicate successful Rotary projects to continue addressing literacy, education, and gender equality at school:

- ♥ The Rotary Club of Makati North, Philippines, works with their Rotary Community Corps to provide undernourished primary school pupils with nutritious meals. As a result, 100+ pupils experienced fewer medical issues and miss less school.
- ♥ With the help of partners and a Rotary Grant, the Rotary Club of Taipei Twins, Taiwan provided 2000 students' homes in Myanmar with solar power and LED lighting. A generator charging station and storage was installed at the local school. Reliable access to electricity has improved school attendance & helped students keep up with their studies.
- ♥ Rotary Clubs from Malaysia & India used a Rotary Grant to construct toilet blocks for girls at a public school in Chennai, India. Fewer girls missed school as a result of these new facilities

How else can we help?

Conduct assessments. Determine core literacy and education needs in a particular community.

- **Involve the whole family.** Organize family events to empower parents and caretakers to remain actively involved in their children's education or to seek educational opportunities for themselves.

CASE STUDY: OPERATION UPGRADE:

SOUTH AFRICA

In the province of KwaZulu-Natal, adult illiteracy is high and HIV/AIDS is prevalent.

Operation Upgrade, a nongovernmental organization in South Africa, runs an adult literacy program that prepares learners for practical life skills such as opening a bank account, writing and posting a letter, managing finances, and developing a small business.

The curriculum also includes information and supplemental projects related to HIV/AIDS and other health issues, nutrition, food security, and other community development concerns.

The adult learners cover all these topics through lessons in Zulu literacy, English literacy, and numeracy.

Several Rotary clubs have partnered with Operation Upgrade to teach adult learners literacy, numeracy, and related practical skills.

The curriculum includes a Zulu literacy component in which students are taught how to break sentences into words, words into phrases and then into phonetic syllables, enabling them to build new words based on what they learned.



Good Practice: South Africa

Operation Upgrade - This research-based project uses adult literacy and adult basic education to promote social change and development in Kwanbela, a remote and isolated rural community with a high literacy rate and prevalence of HIV and AIDS. The Kwanbela Project's goals of improving the literacy of rural women who head households and improving access to health facilities and sanitation constitute a holistic vision which strongly illustrates the important connection between literacy and health.

(Winner of the Conducar Prize for Literacy 2009)

Literacy is the foundation for virtually all forms of education and a crucial component of effective social and economic participation, human development, and poverty reduction. According to the United Nations Educational, Scientific, and Cultural Organization (UNESCO) nearly 800 million people over the age of 15 lack even basic reading and writing skills worldwide.

Literacy empowers people. It is the foundation for virtually all forms of education and an essential component of poverty reduction, social inclusion, and economic development. Despite the importance of literacy, there are over 800 million people unable to read or write in the world today, and 64 percent of these people are women and girls.

STRATEGY: FOCUS ON GETTING GIRLS INTO SCHOOL

While the gender gap in school enrollment is narrowing globally, major disparities remain in regions such as the Middle East, South and West Asia, and sub-Saharan Africa. The causes preventing girls in these regions from attending school include:

- Cultural attitudes toward girls’ and women’s place in society
- Economic barriers, including the cost of transportation, school fees, and the missed “opportunity cost” of income-generating activities that girls undertake when not in school
- Predominance of male teachers who lack gender-sensitivity training
- Long distances between home and school, which pose security concerns (especially the threat of sexual violence)
- Lack of sanitation facilities (especially separate latrines) at schools

Working to remove these barriers to girls’ education can pay huge dividends in the overall development of a community. More educated women tend to be healthier, work and earn more income, have fewer children, and provide better health care and education to their children.

It is estimated that some countries lose more than \$1 billion per year in missed economic production by failing to educate girls to the same standard as boys.



WASH (Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene)

interventions in schools have been an effective way to improve school attendance, as well as children’s health and school performance.

Providing clean drinking water, hygiene education (e.g., handwashing), and safe sanitation facilities creates a virtuous cycle in which children become less susceptible to waterborne illness and therefore miss school less frequently, attend school in a healthier state, and consequently perform better in school.

Through a global grant, Rotary clubs supported nine public elementary schools outside Guatemala City by laying new pipes for fresh water, improving quality of drinking water, and installing flush toilets and hand
