What US\$100 can do


It is as simple as having a notebook, pencil and glue.

Most public schools in Costa Rica are under funded and lack many basic supplies, so the Rohrmoser Rotary Club, Costa Rica developed a packet of teaching materials for students and partnered with the Vancouver Rotary Club, Canada to distribute 777 packets to children in five very poor elementary schools.

US\$100 buys 15 packets. Without this project many students would not be able to continue their education and would be forced to drop out of school.

Lilu has been a proud member of Rotary Club of Cebu Gloria Maris since 2004.


She became president in RY2008-2009 and served in different positions as



The Rotary Foundation grants program has been extensively revised and streamlined through the concepts supporting Future Vision. This new structure is both more efficient and sustainable and allows Rotary to have a greater impact around the globe. At the core of the grants are the **Six Areas of Focus**.

There are three primary grant types - District, Global and Packaged.



Districts are encouraged to distribute these grant funds for relatively short-term activities, either local or international.

While not required, clubs are encouraged to support the *Six Areas of Focus* in their grant project selection.


Districts can request up to 50% of their <u>District Designated Fund (DDF)</u> in one annual block grant. The **District SHARE Committee** determines the allocation of District Grant Funds between:

- Humanitarian Grants
 Local and international humanitarian projects
- Scholar Grants
 Scholarship awards and programs
- Vocational Training Teams Vocational training opportunities

Global grants support large international activities with two impt. characteristics, i.e.,

sustainable and measurable outcomes in one or more of the Six Areas of Focus.

Global grants are funded with a combination of District Designated-Funds or cash contributions and matching funds from The Rotary Foundation's World Fund.

Global grants encompass:

Humanitarian Grants
 Humanitarian projects supporting the goals of one or more of the Six Areas of Focus

Scholar Grants

Scholarships for graduate-level academic studies that relate to one or more of the Six Areas of Focus

• Vocational Training Team Grants

Vocational training teams, which are groups of professionals traveling abroad either to learn more about their profession or teach local professionals about a particular field within the Six

Packaged grants have been predesigned by Rotary and our strategic partners.

The activities they fund are similar to those funded by Global Grants in many ways — they support the *Six Areas of Focus* and can include humanitarian, scholarships, and vocational training — but designing the activity's framework has been done. You can direct your Annual Fund gift to SHARE, the World Fund, or an area of focus fund. This allows Rotarians to focus their talents and energies on bringing the project to life. With a packaged grant, the club's role may include:

- Assessing community needs and identifying those who could benefit from a project
- Selecting and mentoring scholars
- Assembling teams of professionals for peer-based training
- Providing technical expertise or direct service
- Promoting and publicizing activities
 Monitoring and evaluating the project

Major achievement focus of Rotary's World Polio Day event

Rotary's 2020 World Polio Day Online Global Update program on 24 October hails this year's historic achievement in polio eradication:

Africa being declared free of the wild poliovirus

Paralympic medalist and TV presenter Ade Adepitan, who co-hosts this year's program, says that the eradication of polio in Africa was personal for him. "Since I was born in Nigeria, this achievement is close to my heart," says Adepitan, a polio survivor who contracted the disease as a child. "T've been waiting for this day since I was young."

He notes that, just a decade ago, three-quarters of all of the world's polio cases caused by the wild virus were contracted in Africa. Now, more than a billion Africans are safe from the disease. "But we're not done," Adepitan cautions. "We're in pursuit of an even greater triumph — a world without polio. And I can't wait."

Rotary Foundation Trustee Geeta Manek, who co-hosts the program with Adepitan, says that World Polio Day is an opportunity for Rotary members to be motivated to "continue this fight."

She adds, "Rotarians around the world are working tirelessly to support the global effort to end polio."

The future of the fight against polio

Rotary's challenge now is to eradicate the wild poliovirus in the two countries where the disease has never been stopped: Afghanistan and Pakistan.

Routine immunizations must also be strengthened in Africa to keep the virus from returning there.

To eradicate polio, multiple high-quality immunization campaigns must be carried out each year in polio-affected and high-risk countries.

During the COVID-19 pandemic, it's necessary to maintain populations' immunity against polio while also protecting health workers from the coronavirus and making sure they don't transmit it.

Rotary has contributed more than \$2.1 billion to polio eradication since it launched the PolioPlus program in 1985, and it's committed to raising \$50 million each year for polio eradication activities.

Because of a 2-to-1 matching agreement with the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, that means that, each year, \$150 million goes toward fulfilling Rotary's promise to the children of the world:

No child will ever again suffer the devastating effects of polio.

Polio eradication is truly a collective effort ... This accomplishment belongs to all of us.

FIRST. The development of acquaintance as an opportunity for service:

SECOND. High ethical standards in business and professions; the recognition of the worthiness of all useful occupations; and the dignifying of each Rotarian's occupation as an opportunity to serve society;

THIRD. The application of the ideal of service in each Rotarian's personal, and community life:

FOURTH. The advancement of international understanding. goodwill, and peace through a world fellowship of business and professional persons united in the ideal of service.
