In Rotary, April is the month we celebrate Mother and Child Care. So it is with great pleasure that Dr Gina Lopez – Batuto accepted our invitation to be our guest speaker. Her topic today would be **"Women Matters – Screening for Cervical Cancer".**

Cervical Cancer is the fourth most common cancer in women.

In 2018, an estimated 570,000 women were diagnosed with cervical cancer worldwide and about 311,000 women died from the disease according to the World Health Organization .

Effective primary vaccination and secondary prevention approaches (screening for and treating precancerous lesions) will prevent most cervical cancer cases.

Last March 27, ROTARACT RMC in partnership with RCWWD turned over milk bath soap, laundry soap, shorts for kids, used clothings and canned goods to the Davao City Coalition Group for the fire victims of Agdao. There are 1000 families affected by the fire.

In the afternoon of March 27, ROTARACT Waling Waling Davao donated cup noodles, coffee, chocolate and assorted biscuits to the Davao City Rapid Action Team of Covid 19 at Bolton Elementary School were they are stationed. The RAT group are the one in charge of picking up COVID positive patients from their homes and bringing them to the COVID facilities and to SPMC for severe cases.

RCWWD has a lot of kind hearted and generous members.

Rotary Information

At least 7 million children under the age of five die each year due to malnutrition, poor health care, and inadequate sanitation. To help reduce this rate, We should provide immunizations and antibiotics to babies, improve access to essential medical services, and support trained health care providers for mothers and their children. Our projects should ensure sustainability by empowering the local community to take ownership of health care training programs .



There are Global Grants available for Clubs to do projects in this area, and so help alleviate the suffering of mothers and their children.

What Projects Can a Club Do?

Immunizations and Antibiotics


- ° Run information sessions for pregnant mothers on the importance of immunizations.
- ° Fund information leaflets for mothers on immunizations and antibiotics.
- Provide immunizations and antibiotics for children under 5 years old.
- Fund transportation costs for mothers to get to clinics and health centres to obtain immunizations for their babies.
- ° Develop and fund a centre specialising in providing immunizations and antibiotics for mothers and children.

Nutrition

- Establish and maintain information sessions encouraging mothers to breastfeed their babies.
- Establish and maintain public awareness programmes on what constitutes good nutrition, and the importance of good nutrition for mothers and their children.
- Identify communities with prevalence of underweight children; provide food baskets for mothers and their children, establish and maintain information and support programmes.
- Fund the production of information sheets promoting different diets, as well as techniques to prepare and preserve food.
- ° Promote the inclusion of public nutrition training in community midwife and nursing education curricula.

Mother to Infant HIV Transmission

- Establish and maintain information sessions, workshops, and meetings on how to prevent mother to infant HIV transmission.
- Establish and fund a public awareness and information campaign about how to prevent mother to infant HIV transmission.



- Establish and fund a programme to give women access to free or low-cost prenatal care and voluntary HIV testing and counselling.
- Establish and fund the provision of antiretroviral drugs for mothers, and on-going support and counselling.
- Fund a sustainable Maternal and Child Health HIV response programme to strengthen health and community systems, to tackle the social determinants of health that drive the epidemic and hinder the response.



Preventing cervical cancer in Senegal through Peace Corps and Rotary

which causes cervical cancer.

Until the 1950s, cervical cancer killed more American women than any other type of cancer.

Widespread screening has drastically decreased the number of those deaths in the United States, but in the West African country of Senegal, the disease remains prevalent. Every year, more than 1,400 Senegalese women are diagnosed with cervical cancer, and hundreds of them die from it

To Andrew Dykens, a professor of family medicine at the University of Illinois at Chicago (UIC), the situation is especially galling given how easy this form of cancer is to catch.

"Cervical cancer develops very, very slowly," Dykens says.
"There are five to 15 years from the first cellular changes to the actual cancer development. So you've got time during that phase to do something about it."

That's exactly what he's doing, with the help of the Peace Corps, Rotarians, and UIC.

Dykens – who is a member of the Rotary Club of Chicago, the director of the Global Community Health Track at UIC's Center for Global Health, and a former Peace Corps volunteer – is bringing together those organizations and Senegal's Ministry of Health and Social Action to reduce the number of women who die from this highly treatable disease.

A bit of background: In 2010, Dykens launched Peace Care, a nonprofit that helps communities and organizations work together to bring resources where they are needed. "It dawned on me that the Peace Corps should be working more closely with, for example, academic centers, because these centers have technical expertise but don't have a footprint in local settings," he says.

"Meanwhile, the Peace Corps has people who are extraordinarily knowledgeable about the local context."

And Rotary?

"Rotary loves to build capacity," he says. "If we can build the capacity to implement evidence-based solutions that already exist, we don't need fancy tools like MRIs or robotic surgery. Not that those tools aren't good, but there's a basic level of access to primary health care that doesn't exist."

After hearing from Peace Corps staff in Senegal about the need for cervical cancer screenings there, Dykens and Peace Care started training health workers in the Kedougou region of the country to detect abnormal cervical cells via a simple but effective method. A vinegar solution, dabbed onto the cervix, reveals abnormal cells that can be killed immediately with a cryotherapy gun and CO2tank – no electricity required.

This is far easier and less expensive than the standard Pap test, which requires looking at cell samples under a microscope to identify abnormalities. Dykens says. "This technique has been around for decades, and it costs so little and saves women's lives. So how is it that in this day and

age, in Senegal, there are 10 rural regions that have no access to

Part of the answer is local influence. "In some cases, the local opinion leaders are very conservative on women's issues, and they are reluctant to help the women go for consultation," says Manuel Pina, an obstetrician/gynecologist and member of the Rotary Club of Dakar-Soleil who is working with Peace Care. "But Rotarians are also opinion leaders. We have already done local talks on the importance of this project, to help end all of the rumors and bad information linked to cervical cancer." Pina notes that they also encourage families to have their daughters vaccinated against human papillomavirus,

Rotarians and Peace Corps volunteers have a long history of working together on projects, and in 2014 the two organizations began a more formalized partnership.

The cervical cancer screening project demonstrates how a grassroots effort can benefit from the combined strengths of the two organizations.

The Rotary clubs plan to apply for a Rotary Foundation global grant to help expand cervical cancer screening services to the Tambacounda region. "Not just for the purpose of building capacity, but also to build a training center for cervical cancer screening," Dykens says.

Eventually, that center could also train health workers to screen for and treat other diseases, such as diabetes, hypertension, and other types of cancers, he adds.

Dykens says support of Rotarians in the United States and in Senegal will continue to be key.

"Rotarians do things right," he says.

"They work systematically and always engage local voices and perspectives, and that is what ultimately creates success. Rotary has worked a long time on polio and done an amazing job. And in my mind, access to primary care is the next polio."
