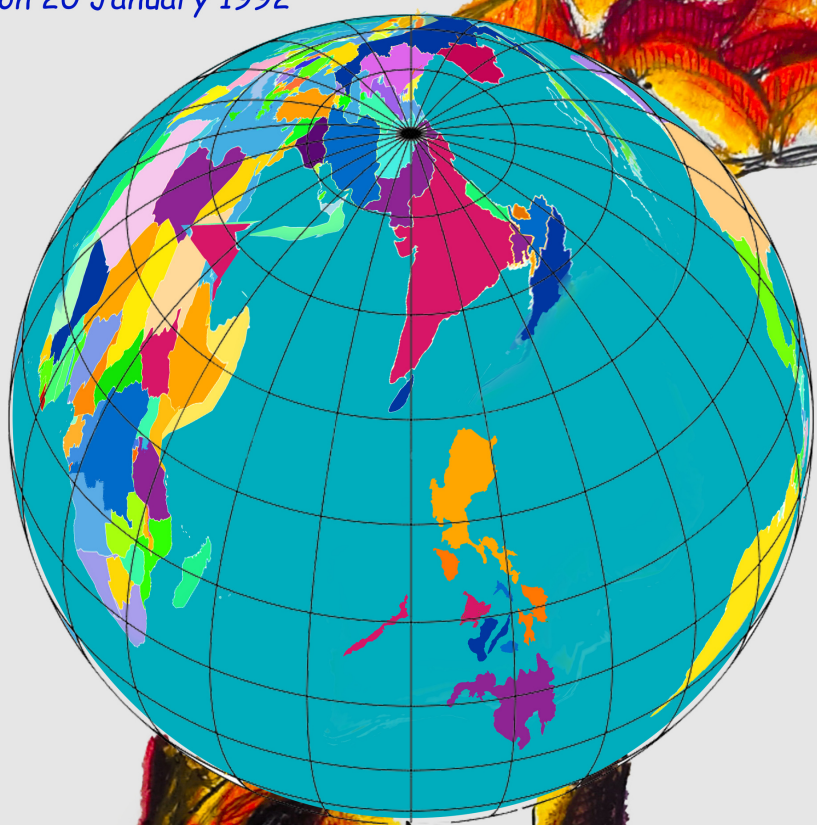

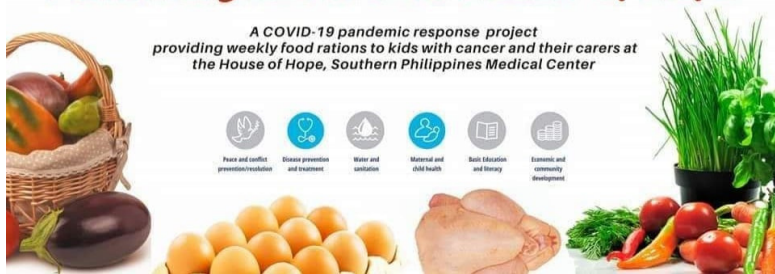

DISTRICT PUBLIC IMAGE SEMINAR

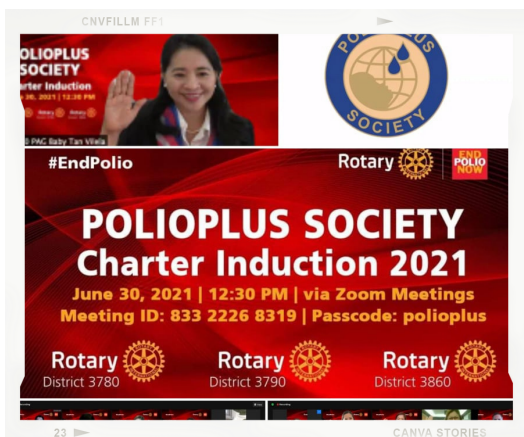

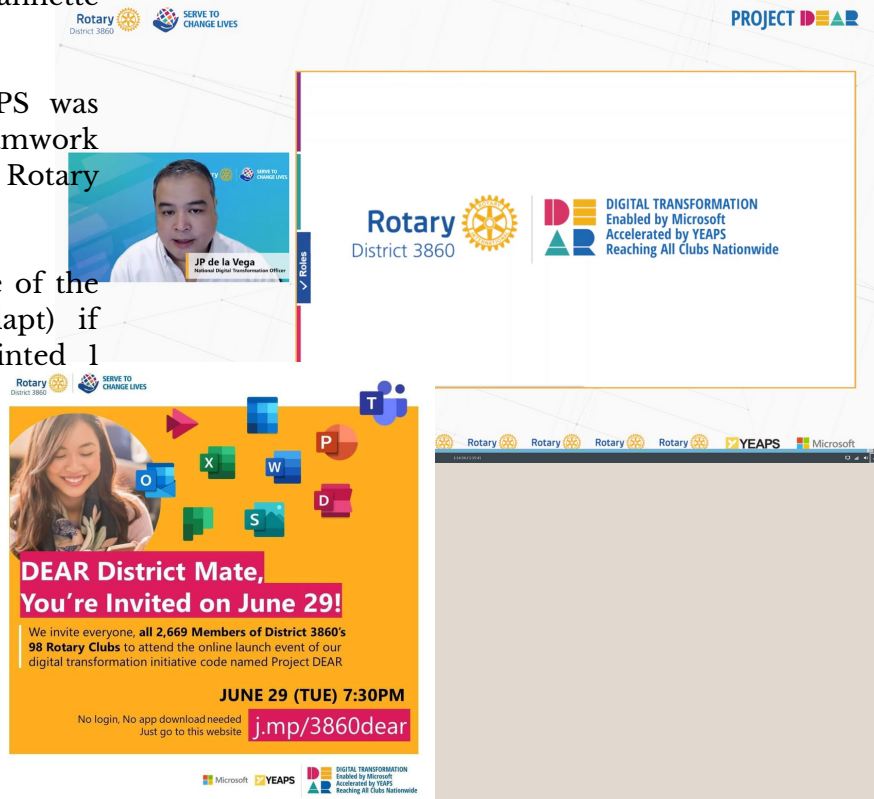
Secretary's Report

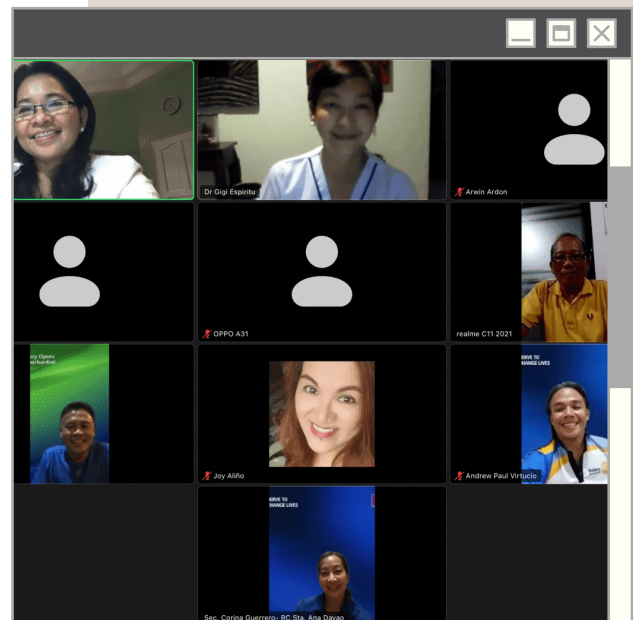
PROJECT 'DEAR'

The project will be headed by clubs under Area 2B from July 26 to 30, 2021, in partnership with the Philippine National Red Cross.

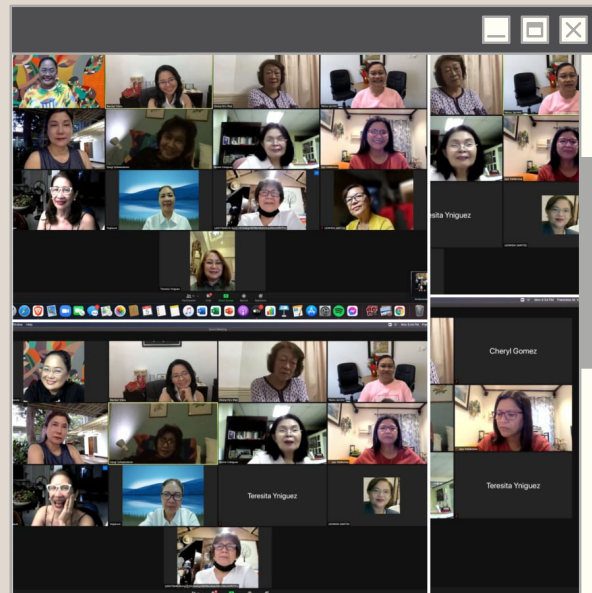

POLIO ERADICATED IN THE PHILIPPINES

"Polio, or poliomyelitis, is a paralyzing and potentially deadly infectious disease that most commonly affects children under the age of 5" (<https://www.rotary.org/en/our-causes/ending-polio>, n.d.). It is recommended that children in this age bracket be vaccinated to prevent the poliovirus from infecting and spreading to other individuals. This virus attacks the nervous system and is typically transmitted from person to person through contaminated water.

For the last 35 years, Rotary International (RI) has been working on eradicating this virus entirely, and as the founding partner of the Global Polio Eradication Initiative (GPEI), polio cases have greatly reduced to about 99.9% since vaccinating children in the Philippines back in 1979. Since that year, over 2.5 billion children have been vaccinated.

Back in 2000, the Philippines was declared polio-free, together with other countries found in the West Pacific Region. However, on September 19, 2019, the Department of Health (DOH) announced another polio outbreak. Since then, the government, together [with] WHO, UNICEF[,] and partners scaled nationwide polio campaigns to stop the spread of the virus" (<https://www.who.int/philippines/news/detail/11-06-2021-who-unicef-laud-end-of-polio-outbreak-in-the-philippines>, n.d.).

But, a light shone on the Philippines once again. On June 3, 2021, it was announced by WHO (World Health Organization) that polio had been completely eradicated in the Philippines, reporting that in the last 16 months, it had not been detected in a child or in the environment. This was due to comprehensive outbreak response actions which included increased immunization and surveillance activities in the country.

"The success of the polio immunization in the Philippines is proof that when we come together for children, great things happen," reported UNICEF Philippines Representative Oyunsai Khan Dendevnorov. WHO has given recommendations to the DOH for making sure that systems are in place to prevent another polio outbreak in the Philippines.

Indeed, when people with a common goal come together, anything can be achieved.

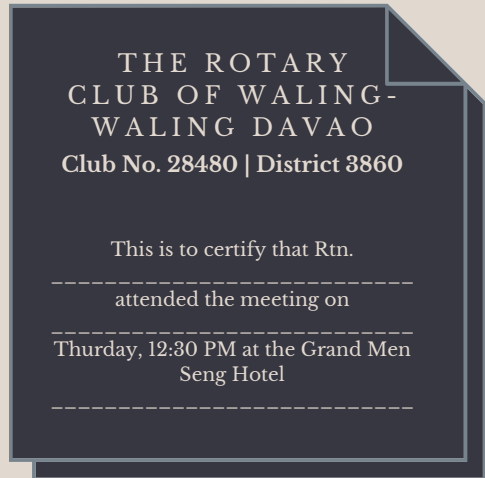
