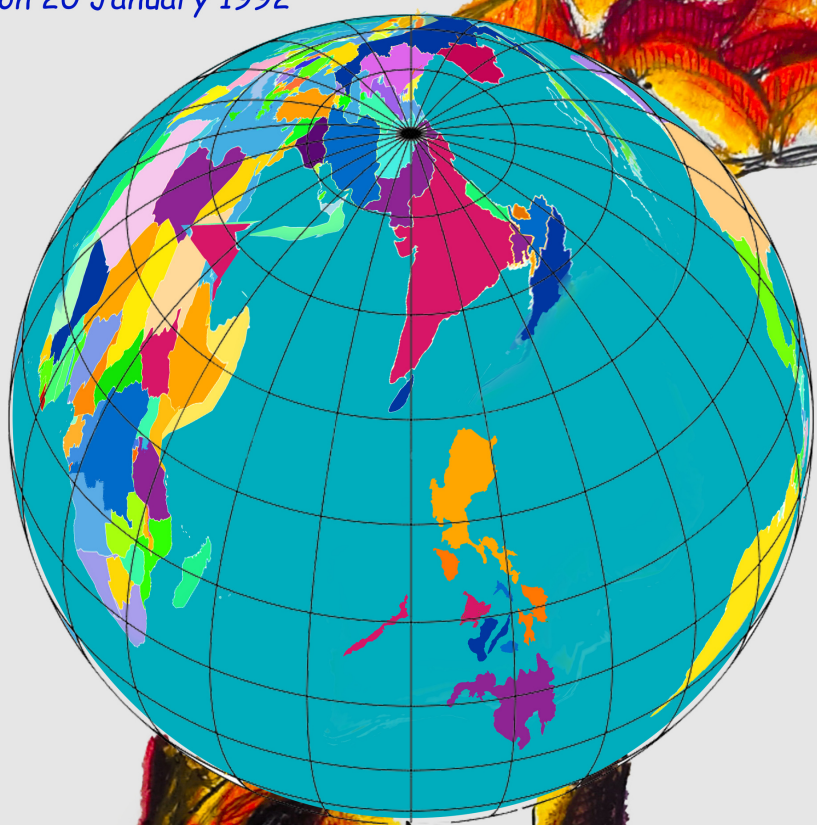

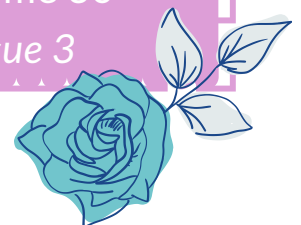

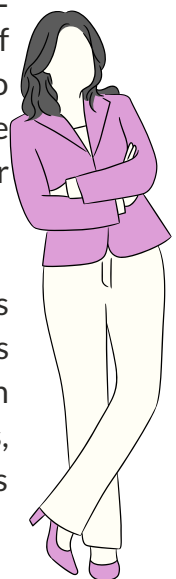

ROTARY UNLOCKS “CAPACITY TO DO” AND “CAPACITY TO BE”

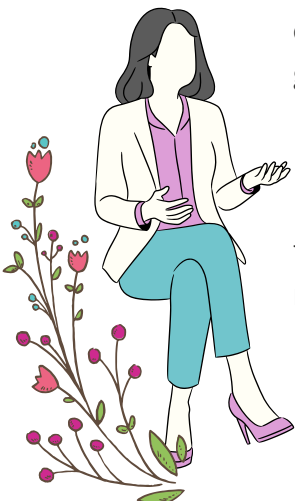
My scholarship journey to the world’s largest water education facility - the IHE Delft Institute for Water Education in Delft, The Netherlands - started with just a dream. As a public servant of a water utility, it is my earnest desire to contribute in building up with the capacity of the Davao City Water District (DCWD) to provide gender-responsive water and sanitation (WaSH) services.

My 17 years with DCWD in various capacity exposed me to the ins and outs of its operations. I have served DCWD in multiple roles such as customer service assistant, public relations officer, learning and development facilitator, community development practitioner and legal professional with numerous management committee assignments (i.e., public procurement, gender mainstreaming, safety standards, human resource mechanisms, among others) on top of the core functions.

With the experiences, I have come to know DCWD more and I have a high regard in its capacity to address gender issues related to WaSH as its contribution in the attainment of Gender Equality and Women Empowerment (GEWE) consistent with the Gender and Development principle.

As such, I applied for admission in Master of Science in Water Management and Governance in IHE Delft, The Netherlands. I would like to develop my competencies in this field being an employee of one of the largest and leading government water utilities in the Philippines.

I would like to be a channel for the transference of knowledge to influence DCWD in transforming into a water utility promoting gender inclusive access to and control of the water resources among stakeholders, especially the marginalized groups.



ROTARY VOICES

The absence or the lack of WaSH services as basic human rights magnifies poverty and perpetuates gender-based violence. Thus, water management and governance are crucial to address water challenges to mitigate, if not eliminate, the social, economic and political inequities attached to water quantity and quality.

I applied for admission in February 2021. Three weeks after I got a reply that I was admitted to IHE-Institute for Water Education which is a requirement in applying for a scholarship. I pursued in finding a possible sponsor and found the program of the Rotary Scholarship District 1600 for Water and Sanitation with Philippines as eligible recipient.

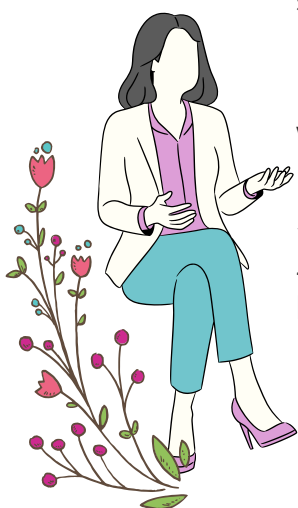
At first, I was reluctant to continue with the scholarship as this requires hierarchical process of nomination. This means that I should scout for a local Rotary Club to nominate me which at the same time treated as an applicant to the scholarship program.

I was worried that answering the eight (8) essay questions plus the counterpart of 10,000 USD will discourage a Rotary Club from nominating me. However, I just tried my luck. I have nothing to lose so I did approach Director Ma. Luisa L. Jacinto, who is a GAD advocate, WaSH partner, and a Delft scholar herself, and key officer of the Rotary Club of Waling-Waling and one of the Directors of the DCWD Board whose competence and leadership is an inspiration.

Early on, Director Jacinto apprised me of the financial challenge of the Rotary Club and I said that it is sufficient that I will be nominated sans the financial pledge. To my mind, if it is meant for me, then the universe will find a way to make it happen. Honestly, having admitted to IHE Delft- Institute for Water Education is already something for me.

True enough, God gave me favor. The Rotary Club of Waling-Waling Davao submitted the application and able to raise the fund counterpart for the scholarship.

I was so moved how President Armi Geralyn “Gigi” G. Espiritu and Dir. Jacinto went out of their way to produce the fund. President Gigi convinced the District 3860 to give 5,000 USD while the Rotary Club Waling-Waling for the 5,000 USD in which 4,000 USD was personally contributed by Sir Mario Luis J. Jacinto whom I have been considered as my public service figure when I was in high school.

I have known and worked with Sir Louie during his stint as the head of the City Environment and Natural Resources Office (CENRO) sometime in late 90s. In his professional and personal capacity, Sir Louie have planted an environmental leadership “seed” in me as one of the key council officers of the Junior Ecologist Movement (JEM). Sir Louie have helped and mentored JEM members to be responsible and conscientious environmental youth leader. This seed has flourished which was the reason why I joined CENRO and later on DCWD which are both environmental agencies to unleash my full potential.

I was amazed how God rekindled my connection with Sir Louie after 25 years, more or less. I was really thinking that he won't recognize me at all. But I was wrong, he did still know me up until now through Dir. Jacinto who is the connector in this opportunity.

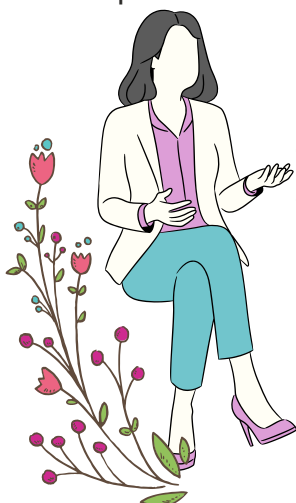
This scholarship application made me realized how I gravitated to the mission of the Rotary Club. During my high school days in Sta. Ana National High School, I was the president of the Interact Club and was a finalist in the Rotary Youth Leadership Award administered by a Rotary Club.

This scholarship opportunity redirects me to my core which is public service. I have been influenced by the best public service figure through the Spouses Jacinto and the Rotary Club which a world leader in humanitarian service. It seems so bizarre, the actors in this scholarship journey have interwoven lives and mission.

Last May 16, 2021, we received the best news ever. We were selected by the Rotary District 1600 out of the 45 great applicants for the Rotary IHE Delft Global Grant Scholarship. On June 12, 2021, the Rotary Foundation approved the application for the global grant scholarship as submitted by the Rotary Club of Waling-Waling (Davao) and District 1600 with an award amount of US\$55,725 to cover for the tuition fee, living allowance, travel, and other expenses.

I cannot contain my joy upon receiving this twin great news. God answers prayers. The only requisite is to manifest the desires of your heart consistently.

This scholarship grant is surreal. This is a life-changing opportunity coupled with a great responsibility as I will be joining a distinguished group of Rotary scholars striving to make a difference in WaSH.

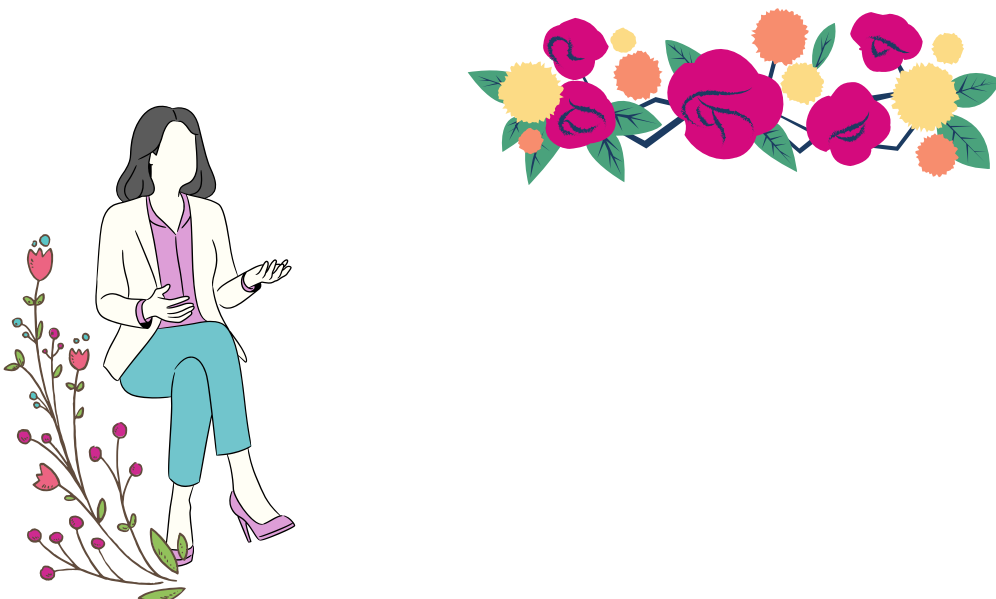
I am thrilled to be in The Netherlands this October 8, 2021 for the scholarship program. I cannot wait to learn with the multi-disciplinary fresh solutions that would aid in coping with the water challenges in Davao City in partnership with the DCWD and the Rotary Club of Waling-Waling Davao.

With the program, I will be a renewed and equipped public servant with all senses recalibrated to see the inequities; listen to the clamors; taste the bitterness; smell the injustice; and empathize with poverty arising from the absence and / or lack of water. With this, responsive and inclusive framework in water management and governance shall be applied to humanize water service delivery aligned with the values of the Rotary Club.

Studying in Delft, The Netherlands would not be a walk in the park considering the coursework, language barrier, cultural difference, and my personal circumstances. But I am hopeful that all is well. I shall overcome the adversity that will come my way with God's grace and mercy. I might be foregoing local opportunities, but surely, I will gain learning and life-long experiences that money cannot buy as I embrace a student life anew to be a water professional.

I am forever grateful to the Rotary Club of Waling-Waling Davao, The District 3860, The District 1600, The Rotary Foundation, President Gigi Espiritu, and to the Spouses Mario Luis and Maria Luisa Jacinto. God chose them as instruments to realize this one-of-a-kind chance that will unlock my capacity to do and capacity to be both in personal and professional level.

I will then keep moving to keep my balance as life is like riding a bicycle according to Albert Einstein. Literally, I will have a crash course in biking to cope with the way of life in Delft, The Netherlands. I still have few months left. I am hoping that I can keep my balance.

THE OBJECT OF ROTARY

The Object of Rotary is to encourage and foster the ideal of service as a basis of worthy enterprise and, in particular, to encourage and foster:

THIRD. The application of the ideal of service in each Rotarian's personal, and community life;

FOURTH. The advancement of international understanding, goodwill, and peace through a world fellowship of business and professional persons united in the ideal of service.
