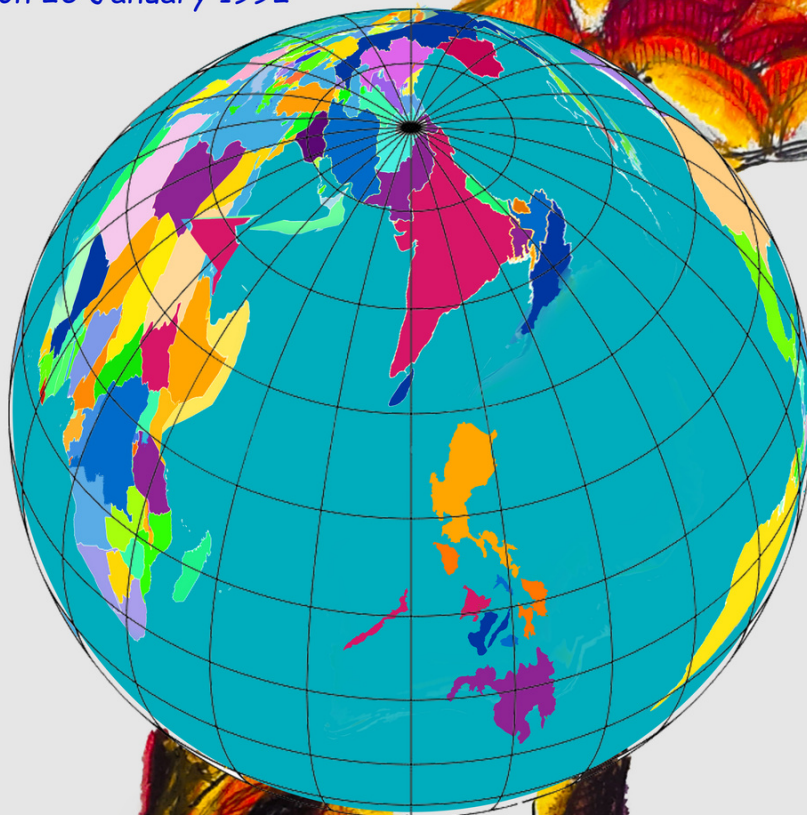

The COVID-19 has changed everything. It has affected day-to-day life and is slowing down the global economy. There's no way to tell how long the pandemic will continue.

The Davao government's campaign, which started in March 2021 after repeated delays, has faced hesitancy from the people of Davao.

Vaccine hesitancy is a nationwide problem in the Philippines. There are many reasons why, including rampant misinformation passed by word-of-mouth and many preferring western brands.

Before, thousands would line up for several blocks in designated government centers and shopping malls to get the vaccine, at times sparking arguments and complaints and snarling traffic. Lately, there has been a decline in people going to vaccination centers. And, we had a first-hand experience of it during our Resbakuna activity last September 25, 2021. From a confirmed pre-registered list of 1,140, the number of people who were vaccinated was only 419.

There's a need to educate the public to build trust in the decision to offer vaccinations, without which, the world will not be able to overcome the pandemic and return to "normal" life.

GROUNDBREAKING & MOA SIGNING OF THE MATINA PANGI COMMUNITY CENTER

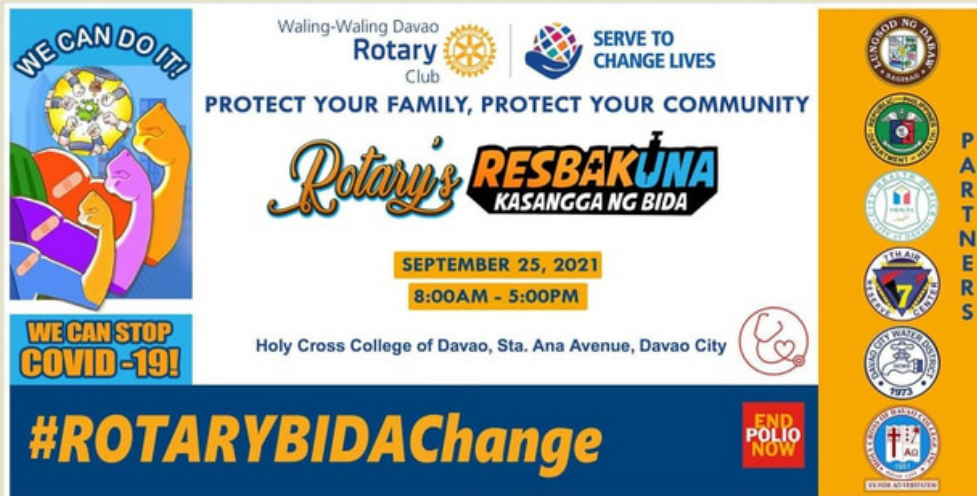

District Governor Anna Louisa Abanes-Bumagat is the first and youngest Lady Governor from Area 3, and the third member from the Rotary Club of Ormoc to become Governor.

She graduated [with] a degree in Bachelor in Secondary Education (Cum Laude) from the University of the Philippines Diliman in 1992, and completed her Master's in Educational Leadership (With Distinction) from De La Salle University-Manila in 2009.

Currently, she works as the School Director of Saint Paul's School of Ormoc and serves as Secretary on its Board of Directors. She is also the Finance Officer of Trophy Farm.

A second-generation Rotarian, she joined Rotary in 2005 and served as Club President in Rotary Year 2009-2010. Beyond the club level, she assumed various district positions - Assistant Governor; District Secretary; Internet and Communications Officer; Deputy for Special Projects; Community Service Chair; Stewardship Chair; Grants Chair for three years; and as Chief-of-Staff.

To her, the theme "Serve to Change Lives" embodies her passion and purpose as a Rotarian to make a difference. She envisions growing membership in all levels of the organization and is a firm believer of The Rotary Foundation in its enduring mission to "Do Good in the World." With her brand of leadership, she endeavors to empower her fellow Rotary volunteers to learn more, to grow more, and do more for the communities they serve.

She is married to Troy, also a Rotarian, and they are blessed with four children - fraternal twins Angela and Amanda, Athena and Tristan.

STORIES OF TWO YOUNG LADIES: JOURNEYS THROUGH PEDIATRIC CANCER

It was easy to invite Jovhen and Nemia to talk before RCWWD. I [had] known them and their families since they were kids. We had a fun time going through background questions reminiscent of slum books and teenage journals of my youth. The topic of our messenger conversation was quite intense, but it seems like a distant memory and both young ladies were upbeat and inspiring.

September is International Childhood Cancer Month. Every year, about 5,133 children with cancer below 14 years old are expected to be diagnosed in the country but only half get to see a doctor. Childhood cancer is highly curable when diagnosed early and treated promptly. The program for pediatric cancer started in 2004 at Southern Philippines Medical Center, the country's biggest public hospital and end referral center in Mindanao. RCWWD helped build its transient home for children with cancer and their families in 2007 that became a sanctuary for Jovhen and Nemia along the course of their treatment.

Nemia was seven years old when she was first diagnosed with acute lymphoblastic leukemia, a type of cancer involving the white cells of the blood. She is the eldest and only girl among three siblings and she was closest to her father, a soldier in the Philippine Marines. She [was] feisty and strong willed as a child who would bite, kick[,] and pull hair during IV insertions and blood taking - antics that would make her smile with chagrin whenever she remembers, now that she is all grown up. Her father needed to be reassigned to Davao because she was such a Daddy's girl and would only calm down when he was around. Her journey through cancer must have impressed her a lot because she [liked] to watch medical dramas and documentaries. She also chose the STEM stream and is currently Grade 12 at San Pedro College on a PRRD scholarship. She is 20 years old [now] and dreams to be a doctor one day after a preparatory course either in Medical Technology or Biology. She likes [the] Arts and Sciences, and her favorite subject is Anatomy. She also likes to paint and to draw. She hopes that one day she would have a family of her own, and maybe kids.

Nemia said, "The time I knew I was sick, I cried. As a 7-year-old kid, *naisip ko po na my life won't be normal like the other kids or my life wouldn't be the same anymore. May mga bagay na hindi ko pwedeng gawin tulad ng pagpasok sa school.* But I held God's word that he [would] heal me with the help of the doctors and nurses although *masakit po talaga ang injections and treatments!* God's love and the love of [the] people around me kept me strong and made me stronger everyday. I see life as an abstract painting, sometimes I don't understand what's happening or why it is happening. But if I just look closely and understand every corner and edge, I learn something because life has no meaning if we don't continue to learn."

Jovhen, on the other hand, is a middle child with a brother and three other sisters. Her younger sister was a baby when she was first diagnosed with acute lymphoblastic leukemia at the age of six. She [came] from Barobo, Surigao del Sur. Her parents were farmers and it was mostly her father who would look after her in the hospital because her mother had to breastfeed her younger sister. They had to stay at the hospital's kitchen for months because they had no family nor knew anybody in Davao. They are one of the families that inspired [the development of] House of Hope as a transient home. She stayed at House of Hope for almost a year during her treatment.

Unlike Nemia, Jovhen is more reticent and quiet. She was often mistaken as a boy when she lost her hair and her voice was so deep that one time during Mayor Duterte's visit she was given a toy for boys.

She always [said] that her younger sister never grew taller because she was mostly at the hospital when Jovhen was getting treated. She said that "Being diagnosed with cancer is a blessing in disguise. The process of surviving is tormenting. However, in the end, it made us more courageous, strong, grateful and connected as a family. My journey in this battle led me to where I am now and I am not certain that I could reach where I am if I was not diagnosed with cancer and treated. What kept me strong was my family who earnestly prayed and rooted for me to have a long life."

I can personally attest to this. I have had many conversations with her parents over the years and I can see where she gets her strength and her admirable spunk.

I remember a few years ago [when] she came to me saying she wanted to study in Davao; that she [was] smart and she work[ed] hard. I was very impressed by her candor, her determination, and tenacity. She wants to be a corporate lawyer and wants to attend the best schools. She asked me to help her find a scholarship. PRRD agreed to fund a portion of her education. Being a pediatric cancer survivor, she stays at House of Hope in Margarita Village to continue her studies in Accounting at Ateneo de Davao University. She is a consistent Dean's lister and even garnered a spot [on] the President's list. She is [also] one of [the] few women who loves Mathematics. She enjoys watching movies and playing table tennis. I asked her whether she wants to get married and have a family. She said that is up for consideration.

When I asked her what her perspective in life [was,] she said, "Every day is a blessing for me. Aiming and achieving goals not just for myself but also for others who matter would make my life worthwhile."

Spoken like warriors and true heroes. We thank Nemia and Jovhen for sharing their powerful stories and inspiring us with their lives.
