I was requested to be one of the panelists during the Rotary Community Corps Expo last November 6, 2021, and assigned to the entry of District 3850, The Red Moon Project, which was all about the concept of creating reusable, washable menstrual pads. Here I am, sharing my reaction to it.

In the age of women empowerment, gender sensitivity, and the No One Left Behind projects, one such project emerged that seemed to have it all.

The Red Moon's goal was for young girls among the "poorest of the poor" communities (as indicated in The Moon Catcher website) to be informed about the use of reusable and washable menstrual cloths. Knowing about it, they can use it and wouldn't have to miss school (caused by the stigma of having their menstrual cycle). It was well-received in parts of India and Africa.

The project is laudable because it promoted the tenets of raising environment-friendly adolescents and the idea of "savings" by using washable and reusable cloth as sanitary pads.

However, I must say this project takes us back perhaps a generation or two -when our grandparents (or even great-grandparents) used the pasador, made of sackcloth or a similar fabric. That version was devoid of waterproof barriers compared to the Red Moon model. Instead, the pasador was fastened to underwear with safety pins instead of a waist tie.

In Philippine culture, however, even among the lowest economic classes, the monthly period does not spur as much of a stigma, enough for young girls to miss out on going to school.

The evolution of sanitary pads, from the **pasador** to disposable sanitary napkins, is astonishing. The prototype design of the Moon Catcher project, adapted by the Red Moon Project, seemed novel in its design because it took into consideration the scenarios where young girls may not even wear underwear. However, what works in one culture may not always be received the same way in another.

Online shops nowadays sell variations of reusable sanitary cloth pads, designed to prevent unsteadiness, overflow, and leaks, using snap buttons instead of adhesives. However, I think that the Red Moon project remains faithful to the idea of reusing and reducing waste and reducing monthly expenses. More importantly, the Red Moon reusable pads come with a kit to promote awareness of the menstrual cycle, the "safe" and "unsafe" days, the significance of hygiene and sanitation, and debunks the myths surrounding menstruation.

The Red Moon project is a worthy undertaking, with the certainty of achieving its objectives by making the sanitary cloth concept more culturally sensitive and convenient.






