Happy new Rotary Year!

We opened the new Rotary Year on July 1, 2022, Friday, with a bang!

In the morning, we had the "One District, One New Year Children's Party" at the Home for Girls and Women, at Ma-a, Davao City. Together with Rotarians from 12 other clubs in Davao City, we had a forum on proper dental care and distributed hygiene and bath kits to residents of the facility. For their part, the children of the facility entertained us with dance and song numbers. It was a happy occasion where Davao City Rotarians worked hand in hand in doing service to the community.

After a quick lunch, the RCWWD ladies proceeded to the RCWWD Day Care Center at Tibungco, Davao City to distribute medical kits to residents of the Tibungco Relocation Community. The medical kit distribution is part of the Global Grant Project 1640035 implemented jointly by the RCWWD, RC Adelaide, RC Prospect, and RC East Davao. It was heartwarming to be receiving sincere appreciation from the beneficiaries of the Global Grant Project.

The first two weeks of the new Rotary Year also has been delightful and inspiring for me as I have been attending several Induction and turn-over Ceremonies of several clubs in Davao City. I got acquainted with our Mother Club, RC East, as well as with RC Sta. Ana and RC Matina. I am truly blessed to be learning new things from each club, and they each make me imagine more possibilities for our advocacy.

The month of July will be busy for all of us as we continue with the distribution of the medical kits to other communities. I am also looking forward to another District activity- "One District One Bloodletting"- on July 16, where I am a regular blood donor. Other activities lined up are the launching of the District Grantfunded "Rainwater Harvesting Project" at the House of Hope and the annual celebration of the National Disability Prevention and Rehabilitation Week on July 17-23.

Lovely and committed ladies of RCWWD, we are off and running this RY 2022-23! Let's all enjoy ourselves as we continue to *imagine* the different possibilities on how we can serve, and make them happen.

Secretary's Bird's-eye View







Ever wondered why 1 July is the beginning of the Rotary year? Initially, our conventions played a key role in determining the start date of our fiscal and administrative year.

Rotary's first fiscal year began the day after the first convention ended, on 18 August 1910.

The next August, the Board of Directors ordered an audit of the International Association of Rotary Clubs' finances. The auditors recommended that the organization end its fiscal year on 30 June to give the secretary and treasurer time to prepare a financial statement for the convention and board, and to determine the proper number of club delegates to the convention. This also allowed for changes to the schedule for reporting club membership and payments. Even The Rotarian changed its volume numbering system to correspond to the fiscal year (beginning with Volume 5, No. 1, in July 1914).

Happy New Rotary Year for all Rotarians around the world! We celebrated our first day with New Year Children's Party for the One District, One Rotary which was participated by all 14 clubs of District 3860. The Rotary Club of Waling Waling Davao from Area 2B was tasked to give out bath materials such as towels, soaps, toothbrush and toothpaste; and a white tshirt. These were distributed to 50 beneficiaries who are girls ranging from 6 years old to teenage years at Home for Girls and Women, Maa Jail Road, Maa Davao City. This center is the home for abused and abandoned children and girls who came from Regional areas with funding from the National DSWD.

A second activity for RCWWD was held on the same day, July 1, 2022 at 2pm for the Distribution of Medical Kits for Beneficiaries of Rotary Foundation Global Grant (1640035) for Tibungco Day Care Center at Tibungco, Davao City. A Global Grant Project with RC Adelaide and RC Prospect in partnership with RC East Davao and RC Waling Waling Davao, we started this movement at Tibungco Day Care Center.

For donations, RCWWD continues to support House of Hope with Trays of Eggs, Vegatables and Chicken from the year 2022 of May 17, May 25, May 31, June 8, June 15, and July 6. We are grateful for the donation of Mr. Ruben Santos of P50,000 to the HOH and for the weekly donation of PP Vegloure Maguinsay, HM Dave Vilela and the Vilela Family.



ROTARY VOICES

Jennifer Jones. Rolary Vilernationals first female president. is the perfect leader to spread the word about the good Rotary does in the world, and inspire its members to keep

going

At a training seminar for Rotary club presidents-elect at a Dallas-area hotel in February, sergeants-at-arms wearing yellow vests and Stetsons lead participants, grouped by Rotary district, into a small room for a photo op with 2022-23 Rotary International President Jennifer Jones. As the groups enter, the club leaders mob Jones – the room a flurry of handshakes, fist bumps, hugs, and the occasional squeal. For each photo, the Stetson-clad Rotarians (nicknamed "Rangers") give instructions on who should stand where, then Jones, who is seated front-row center, stands up, turns around, and warms up the crowd. "Is this the best district?" she asks one. She challenges a district to dance, busting a groove on the tan and gray patterned hotel carpet. Another, she teases, is the best looking. And then there's the "party" district, whose members give a raucous

Click. Click. Click.

The groups file out. More than a few people linger to get selfies with Jones and her husband, Nick Krayacich. One young woman, dressed in cobalt blue, shouts, "Congratulations and thank you for being a leader for women in Rotary!" More cheers. She and Jones bump fists as she departs.

"She's just amazing. She's a rock star," says Rhonda Walls Kerby, past governor of District 5890, who has been observing the scene.

When the photo session is finished, Jones signs several Star Wars collectors' helmets that will be auctioned at an upcoming district conference in Houston. She pulls on a Stormtrooper helmet. The phones of the Rotarians still in the room shoot up in unison to capture the moment.

Click. Click. Click.

"She makes everyone feel special. That's why everyone feels like they are best friends with Jen," says Eric Liu. Liu met Jones at the International Assembly in 2016, when he was an incoming district governor and she was the incoming RI vice president, and they hit it off.

And that she's the leader Rotary needs right now.

The laughter in the room grows to a warm buzz as Jones jokes around with her friends. But it's been a long day after an exhausting trip. Jones and Krayacich spent nine hours in the airport the previous day due to weather delays, then had to solve logistical issues with their travel to Dallas. They are in bed by 11, a brief respite before the pre-presidential duties start all over again the next day.

Jones, 55, was born in Windsor, Ontario, and – save for a few post-college years working in the Turks and Caicos Islands and Manhattan — has lived there her whole life. The oldest of three children, she'd run lemonade stands to earn money to give to charity, and recalls organizing a carnival in her family's yard to benefit kids with muscular dystrophy. "Growing up, my parents had given us wings to do service in our community," she says. Today, her mom, dad, and one of her brothers and his wife are Rotarians. Her other brother created a painting that inspired Jones' presidential-theme ties and scarves.

Both Jones and Krayacich are originally from Windsor, but the two met in the Caribbean. Burned out after finishing university and working in the newsroom at a radio station, Jones took time off and worked at a resort in the Caribbean, while Krayacich, a physician, had just finished his internship in Toronto and went to the islands to go scuba diving. They struck up a friendship, and when they both eventually moved back to Windsor, they started dating and got married shortly thereafter.

In many ways, Krayacich, the governor-nominee of District 6400, is the opposite of Jones. He's quieter and more serious, preferring one-on-one conversations, traits that are suited to his vocation. "Jennifer is definitely an Energizer Bunny. She's outgoing and very much a connector," he says. "We complement each other very well."

Jones started her own television production company when she was in her late 20s, wowing bank officials with her business plan, negotiating a lease, and investing in hundreds of thousands of dollars' worth of equipment. "I've always wanted to carve my own path," she says. "Sometimes that's meant taking risks and making yourself open to new experiences."

Dear Rotary member,

We are dedicated to enhancing your Rotary experience by supporting what is important to you, our members. You have consistently told us that you want Rotary to be a place that celebrates diversity, that fully represents our communities, and that offers all members equitable opportunities to thrive.

You also recognize that embracing diversity, equity, and inclusion (DEI) will allow us to do more meaningful work while engaging with people who know they'll be valued for the qualities that make them unique. These sentiments were reinforced last year by the more than 31,000 members around the world who responded to our first DEI survey.



DEI Director

To ensure that the principles of diversity, equity, and inclusion are ingrained in everything we do, the RI Board of Directors, guided by the DEI Task Force, has strengthened our commitment to DEI and is taking action in response to the survey findings.

OUR DEI CODE OF CONDUCT

What we say and how we behave matter. Although free expression is important, we must take responsibility for how our words and actions may affect others. The Board has approved a new DEI Code of Conduct to help Rotary members create and maintain an environment that is collaborative, positive, and healthy for everyone.

Simply put, the DEI Code of Conduct asks you to:

- Use respectful language
- Be supportive
- Foster a welcoming and inclusive environment
- Celebrate diversity

All Rotary leaders, from club presidents and district governors to directors and trustees, are expected to apply the DEI Code of Conduct uniformly to help members recognize the impact that their words and actions can have on other people.

If you experience behavior that does not align with the DEI Code of Conduct, you have ways to respond:

- If the situation can be resolved through discussion, please talk to the person directly. Often, the person who said something or acted in a way that made others feel excluded, marginalized, or targeted did not do so intentionally. Although there might be mistakes, missteps, and uncomfortable conversations along the way, having this dialogue will lead to a better and stronger Rotary.
- If a discussion is not possible or the situation involves someone in a leadership role or another club, contact Rotary's Club and District Support staff, who will review the information and follow up appropriately.
- If you are in danger or your safety is in doubt, contact local law enforcement officers and notify Club and District Support staff.

As an organization, we are stronger when we embrace the diversity found in our clubs and communities. We are more effective when we offer a valuable, inclusive experience that provides equitable opportunities for people to serve, to lead, and to participate with us. To grow Rotary and become a more dynamic organization, we must take DEI seriously. And with your support, we are doing that.

Rotary Protocols Club Issues



Etiquette & Decorum

CLUB MEETINGS

The weekly meetings are primarily fellowship meetings and should not be used to make decisions on club problems, financial matters, the details of club projects and plans.

The Manual of Procedures (MOP) is clear in stipulating that the Board of Directors is the governing body of the club and decides on those issues in meetings separate from the weekly fellowship meetings.

If the Board needs to consult the members, it may call for a Club Assembly.

Rotary Invocations

Rotary Invocations should be short and simple, acceptable to any religious denomination. Even when members are predominantly Catholic, Protestant or other, the Rotary Invocation should be inter-denominational (no need for the sign of the cross).

<u>Visiting Rotarians and Guests</u>

Welcoming of Visiting Rotarians and Guests should be explicitly recognized.

When recognizing, mention first the name of the Club, classification or profession, designation in the Club or District and finally name in a sentence as follows:

"Fellow Rotarians, ladies and Gentlemen, please, help me welcome, (Title, their name and name of their club)."

Then lead in the applause.


