
We are anticipating an influx of out-of-town visitors in Davao, so let us be guarded and maintain safety and hygiene protocols still.






1st RCWWDFI Meeting

Rotary Fellowships Amplify Ukrainian Relief Efforts

In the festive atmosphere of a gala dinner, Rotary members raised glasses in toasts and kindled friendships in Lviv as they welcomed a group of Ukrainians to the International Fellowship of Flying Rotarians. The next day, the Ukrainian members showed visitors former Eastern Bloc aircraft at a military base that had become a general aviation field.

Just a few months later, Russian forces invaded Ukraine — and the new friendships became critical connections for support and supplies.

Rotary's global network has sent millions of dollars' worth of relief and medical supplies to help the people of Ukraine. Rotary Fellowships, which bring together members who have a shared interest or hobby, have amplified the impact of these efforts.

Members of the flying fellowship leapt into action to help their fellow pilots as soon as the war began. George Chaffey, then-world president of the fellowship, says he and other members quickly contacted the Ukrainian members, who have been instrumental in identifying the most effective ways to channel the assistance.

One of them has been Olha Paliychuk, a member of the Rotary Club of Cherkasy, Ukraine. Paliychuk, who is a doctor and working toward her pilot's license, has helped coordinate response plans through both the flying fellowship and the International Fellowship of Healthcare Professionals.

"Within a week we raised more than \$12,000 and a large volume of medical supplies, all cleared through Olha," Chaffey says. "We collect what the Ukrainians tell us they need and direct it to exactly where it is needed."

Chaffey says the fellowship members based in Hong Kong have arranged the delivery of more than S25,000 overall in medical supplies. At one point, they raised more than S10,000 in just four days for urgently needed medical equipment. Fellowship members worked out the details of the shipment in a message chat that spanned multiple time zones.


The theme is a special one: the theme graphic was designed by an Australian Indigenous artist to link with the Melbourne Convention in 2023.


Some of the symbolism includes: Circle connections to one another Dots around it - our people There are 7 Dots for Rotary's 7 areas of focus Circle + dots around it - a navigation star, our guiding light Green solid line - digging stick (used when doing hard work); for us it's People of Action, represents the tools for getting things done The colours purple, green & white - celebrate diversity, equity and inclusion Freedom to express ourselves differently but still with a special onnection Purple is also the colour of Rotary's Polio campaign Green represents the Environment White stands for peace; it also represents Empowerment and Newness and also the colours were utilised for the women's movement, highlighting the opportunity to errow our female membershin.

Rotary's new DEI Code of Conduct

- Use respectful language
- Be supportive
- Foster a welcoming and inclusive environment
- Celebrate diversity







Nothing Else Matters -- Rotary is a Membership Organization And Our Product is Service. If you get Membership right, pretty much everything else takes care of itself. If you don't get membership right, everything else is a struggle for the whole year. Work on membership first, get your membership committee up and running first, and then attend to other priorities. Make sure your membership chair is 100% committed to membership growth, and to getting started in April or May (the April or May before the next Rotary year). And that the Membership Chair has a committee. NOTE: A committee cannot be one member!



Attrition is Real -- Membership organizations lose members, most at alarming rates. I know, you're thinking "Nobody would quit our great club". Wrong. The 5-year <u>average</u> attrition rate for Zone 33 clubs is **fifteen percent (15%) annually**. Half of those leave for reasons you can't control. A handful of clubs have long-term attrition rates below 10% and **none** lower than 8%. Build your membership plan around the assumption that 15% of your members will leave During this next Rotary year, and have a plan to replace them. Count your blessings (and your membership gain) if that doesn't happen.

Retention is Important for the LONG Term -- Retention rates can be changed over time, not quickly, and <u>you can't retain your way from 20 to 30 members.</u> Work on retention strategies, but don't count on moving the needle quickly. Find out why people leave through exit surveys, and fix those problems. | **Hint:** Most attrition casualties have been members less than 1, 2 or 3 years (<1 year = highest attrition). Focus your retention strategies on those members.

Clubs <u>need</u> membership growth every year -- It doesn't have to be dramatic. 4% annual membership growth will double the size of your club in 18 years. What you want to develop is a **membership growth culture** -- the fundamental belief that the club grows a little every year and avoids huge declines along the way. It's not a series of "membership drives", but a consistent, sustained effort. We have examples of clubs doing just this, with <u>only one</u> <u>year of decline</u> (by 1 member) along the way. Set your goal at 10% net membership growth (plus an estimate of 15% attrition).



It takes Intentional Strategies -- Discard generalities like, "Ask members to bring guests to meetings." Change that to, "Ask "x" members to bring "y" guests to a meeting about <u>Rotary</u> <u>membership</u> on mm/dd/yyyy", and you might have something, if the rest of the plan for reminders, follow up, etc. is in place. Lather, rinse, repeat. Likewise, financial and other incentives for membership recruiting are surprisingly <u>ineffective</u> -- you can't make the prize big enough to be "worth the effort" after a member thinks about it for awhile. It's a nice "thank you", but don't count on incentives alone.

Remember the 10:3:1 Rule -- It takes about 10 names or referrals (suspects) to get 3 prospects to a Rotary Information Hour or Rotary club meeting, to get **one** new member proposal. Lack of sufficient "lead generation" is a root cause of low rates of new member flow. Zone 33 (thanks to Terry Weaver, PDG of D7750) has a list of **24 Intentional Strategies** that are **proven to work.**

If you **understand** and **believe** these truths, your year as President will be successful, rewarding and perhaps legendary in the life of your club.




