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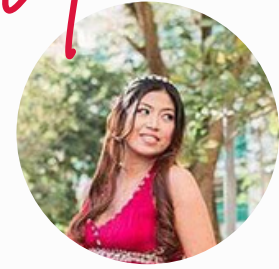

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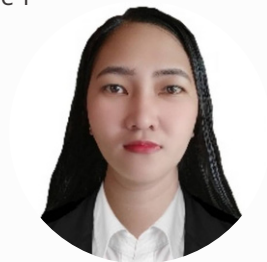

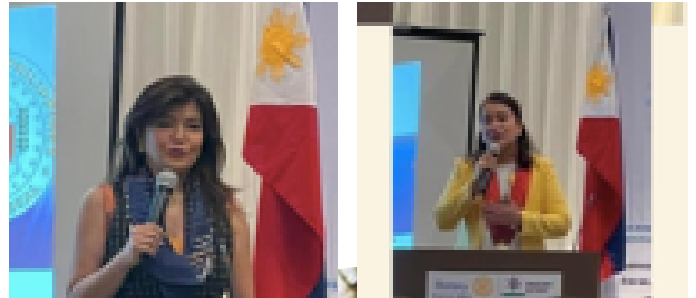
Distribution of Medical Kits

The 160 gallons (or 600 liters) steel drum can accommodate rain water and provide needed water to the kids and carers while they are in transient here at HOH. 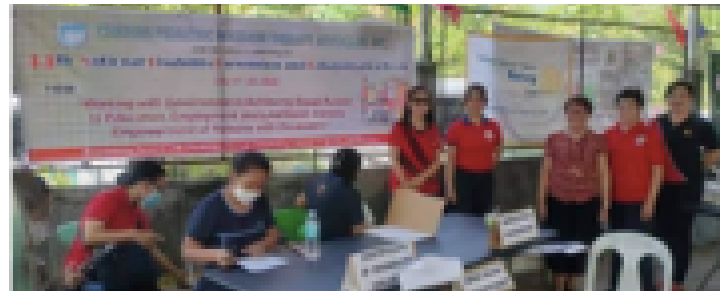

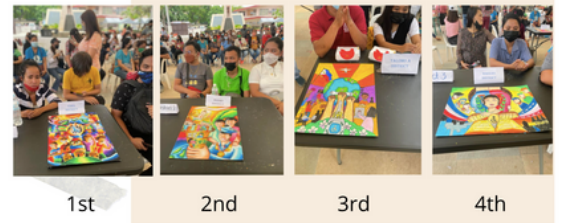
NATIONAL DISABILITY PREVENTION AND REHABILITATION WEEK POSTER MAKING CONTEST • JULY 22, 2022

Rotary Responds: Support for Ukraine

This story originally appeared in the July 2022 issue of Rotary magazine

The Rotary Foundation and Rotary clubs around the world have hurried to provide funds, supplies, and services to Ukrainians displaced by the war.

The Rotary Foundation has raised more than \$15 million in contributions that are already helping provide people in Ukraine with essential items such as water, food, shelter, medicine, and clothing. Donations made to the Disaster Response Fund after 30 April will be available to all communities around the world that need assistance recovering from disasters.

A FAMILY THAT STANDS BY YOU

Soon after Russia invaded Ukraine, Iryna Bushmina fled her home in Kyiv and journeyed to Vienna, Austria, staying with Rotary members along the way. Their generosity inspired Bushmina, a member of the Rotaract Club of Kyiv-City, to organize a larger-scale relief effort — and now, she works with Rotaract Europe to find shelter for thousands of refugees through a website called United for Peace.

"I used to just say that Rotary International is a big family. Now I really believe it," Bushmina says. "And I am convinced that this is a family that will stand by you."

MUSIC FOR PEACE

Olena Bondarenko Hiraishi grew up in the city of Dnipro in eastern Ukraine. Her father is Ukrainian, and her mother is Russian. At the age of 21, she moved to Hiroshima, Japan, where she met her husband, Masashi, a member of the Rotary Club of Hiroshima Southwest. When the war against Ukraine broke out, Satoshi Saginaw, then governor of District 2710, invited her to talk with the Hiroshima Southwest club. Bondarenko Hiraishi connected the Japanese club with Rotary leaders in Ukraine to assist in the relief work...

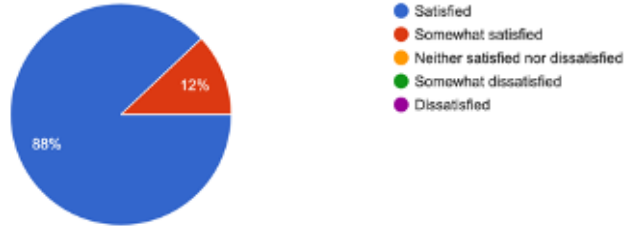

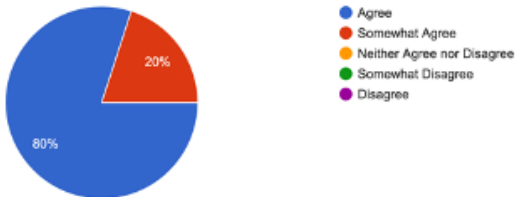

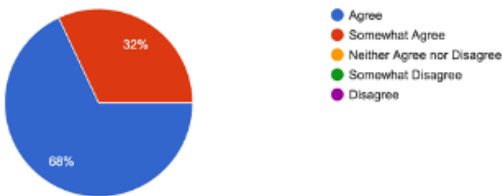

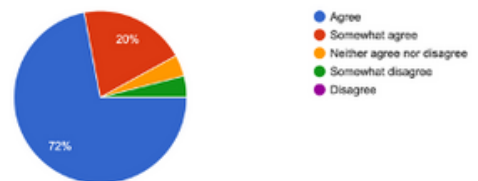

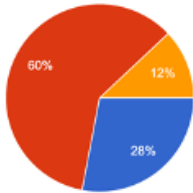

14 TIPS FOR HAVING A PRODUCTIVE MEETING

Here are some practical tips for how you can enhance the quality, productivity and outcomes of the meetings you choose to hold.

1. THE PURPOSE

Before calling for a meeting, think about its real purpose and define what you want to accomplish. If you don't feel the purpose or likely outcomes are adequate, then don't hold the meeting.

2. HAVE A SOLID AGENDA

Develop a solid agenda in advance, and ensure each item on the agenda supports your defined purpose and helps move you toward the desired outcomes.

3. BE PREPARED

As the meeting leader, be prepared. Treat your meeting time like the precious commodity it is, and that means no winging it!

4. INVITE THE RIGHT PEOPLE

Invite only those who need to be at the meeting and can contribute. You want to have the optimum (not maximum) number of appropriate people. Make sure the right people are there and the wrong people are not. Note that fewer people typically means more engagement and ownership.

5. ALLOW PEOPLE TO LEAVE

Allow people to enter and leave any portions of the meeting that are relevant to them. It's possible that only a certain part of your meeting will be relevant to a specific person at a given time. If so, then invite them for that part of the meeting, and allow them to go when not needed.

6. FIND THE RIGHT BALANCE

Balance out involvement to ensure everyone participates, everyone is heard, and no one dominates the meeting. Don't allow anyone to drift or mentally check out.

7. ENGAGE PEOPLE

Engage people and their unique perspectives, drawing out their individual and collective gifts and wisdom.

8. INTERACTIVE

Focus on interactive conversation and collaboration, not just information sharing and data reporting.

9. ONE PERSON AT A TIME

Only one person speaks at a time. Eliminate interruptions and don't allow unnecessary "sidebar" conversations, tangents, pontification, and other fillers, distractions and time-wasters. Ask everyone in the meeting to help each other stay on track with the central topic and get to the point when talking. If a good idea or question emerges outside the core topic, capture it in "parking lot" notes for future reference and follow-up.

10. ACTIVE LISTENING

Promote active listening, and ask each person to agree to key discussion points only if it makes sense for them to do so.

11. HONEST FEEDBACK

Encourage honest feedback and constructive disagreement, all while maintaining a spirit of mutual respect. Participants should feel comfortable in freely sharing their thoughts, while always remembering to challenge topics, positions, and information, not people.

12. MEETINGS AS OPPORTUNITIES

Use meetings as opportunities to build relationships and enhance trust. Be open-minded in order to engage different perspectives and explore all possibilities. Seek collaboration and joint decision-making as much as possible.

13. MANAGE TIME WISELY

Manage your meeting time wisely. Make sure everyone is on time (especially the leader), start the meeting on time, monitor the meeting's length (shorter is better) and always end on time.

14. FOLLOW-UPS & ACTIONS

After-meeting follow-up and action are critical. Identify and discuss the specific actions to be pursued as you wrap up the meeting. Anticipate possible challenges and discuss ways to overcome them. Check for each person's commitment to their action plan. Document and review next steps and assign to people to own and follow-up on them. Who will do what and by when?

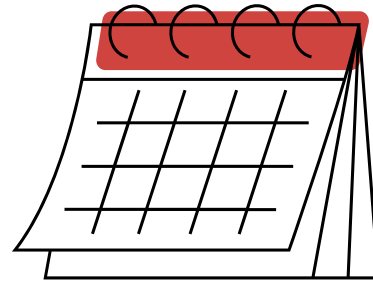
