

Christmas is in the air as we start to receive love gifts for our clubs from several generous individuals.

For instance, we got substantial donations for the Pamalengke ng House of Hope from Club members plus an anonymous donor who gave a lumpsum cash of PHP20,000 recently.

Moreover, we received an additional PHP 100,000 as donation from DMIRIE foundation, courtesy of Dir. Gina Espejo, to be added to our Club funds.

Allow me to make another gentle reminder on The Rotary Foundation contributions. Sharing with you the connection of TRF with what transpired last November 11, 2022. The first leg of the Rotary International Global Grant Project No. 1640035 started and was completed on November 18, 2022.

This Global grant project was a collaboration with RC East, RC Adelaide, and RC Prospect, where we got a total grant fund of USD 100,000. This project touched 2 areas of focus namely (1) Basic Education Literacy and (2) Maternal and child health care. It was in partnership with DMSF Institute of Primary Health Care and the Department of Education. The beneficiaries were K1 to Grade 3 Teachers of the following schools:

- 1. Balite Marilog
- 2. Pichon Tibungco
- 3. Caliclic Samal

These donations were received by 11 patients and 13 carers:


- 11 packs of chicken thighs (1 kilogram per pack)

### Using District Resource Networks

For a long time, the incredible amount of knowledge within Rotary that could help clubs create more effective and sustainable projects was scattered and difficult to access. The creation of district resource networks has remedied that.

People can think of the resource networks as "in-house consulting firms" that collaborate with partners around the world to make humanitarian projects easier to launch and maintain, says Elva Heyge, a district international service chair in Canada. These resource networks bring together the expertise of our own members and of their connections beyond Rotary.

Clubs can get assistance finding language experts, initiating community assessments, designing meaningful service projects, acquiring funding, securing partners, or even sourcing materials or aid in the location where the project will take place. And every expert and partner in the network is carefully vetted by the district, so clubs can have confidence in the guidance they're receiving.

The next goal is for these resource networks to become essential early partners in any club's project planning. But the networks "are not well-understood in Rotary," says Roslyn Teirney, an international service chair in Australia.

"People don't yet know how magnificent it is," Teirney says, "how many subject matter experts are involved, and the opportunities for networking with other Rotary members who are extremely dedicated to international service projects."

Bill Gormont, an international service chair in the United States, hopes members come to understand the vast amount of expertise they can make use of. "You don't have to do this alone," he says. "There's an entire network here that can help. And our hope is that with access to more knowledge, clubs will be encouraged to band together and think bigger about the impact they can make."

In Italy, the resource networks have provided knowledge on projects where members worked with communities to set up clean water and functional toilets for young women in Tibet, build wells for fresh water in Argentina, and provide innovative telemedicine devices for home care during the pandemic in Italy, among many others.

## Rotary Orientation

#### Purpose of the Meeting

- Learning about Rotary
  - History, Organization, and Club Operations
- Privileges and Responsibilities of Members
  Steps in Becoming a Member
- The Rotary Foundation

#### The History of Rotary

- Chicago, 1905. Paul Harris, an attorney, and three of his friends, a coal dealer, mining engineer, and merchant tailor
- Original idea to promote fellowship among business acquaintances
- Rotated meetings among places of business
- Classification system to make club a representative cross section of the business and professional community
- Purpose expanded to encompass community service in 1907. First project to establish public comfort stations in Chicago City Hall
- Eventually became international. Now ~28,000 clubs worldwide

#### **Organization of Rotary**

- · Local clubs each autonomous having own character and personality
- Organized into Districts, for administrative purposes, each with a governor nominated by district and elected at the annual International Convention
- We are in District 3860 Cebu, Davao, Leyte, General Santos, Marbel, Caraga region
- With 100 + Rotary Clubs. Biggest District in the Philippines
- Rotary International is an association of clubs. Individuals are not members of RI, their clubs are

#### **RCWWD Club Operations**

- Officers elected annually in December. Take office July 1
- Five Avenues of Service: Club, Community, Vocational, New Generation and International
- Chairmen of each of these plus officers constitute Board of Directors: President, President-Elect, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer, and Immediate Past President
- Elaborate on Five Avenues use handout on organizational chart

### Privileges and Benefits of Membership

 Serve Community by various activities –Lingap, SIR, Tibungco Day Care and Grants Projects, RCC, fund raising, and liaison with other community agencies such as DSWD, CSSDO, TESDA, DOH, Disabled Foundation, etc. Shared by PP Evangeline Schwendener Past President | Bloomscoop Adviser

## Rotary Orientation

- Promote international peace and understanding by partnering with foreign Rotary Clubs through projects with clubs national or international;, or Grants co-sponsoring with international clubs
- Fellowship with members in other businesses and professions
- Meet other Rotarians at other clubs

#### **Responsibilities of Membership**

- Serve on committees see handout on description of the committees
- Attend at least 60% of meetings can be made up by attending other clubs and certain other events; leave of absence available for good cause (must pay dues).
- Propose new members
- Pay entrance fee
- Pay semi-annual dues
  - Pro-rated for those joining at other times
- Encouraged to be a Paul Harris Fellow or Sustaining Member (TRF discussed later)

#### Steps in Becoming a Member (according to M.O.P.)

- 1. Sponsor fills out proposal form and submits to Club Secretary.
- 2. Secretary sends to Classification and Membership Committees.
- 3. Classification selects appropriate classification (which may or may not be as proposed)
- 4. Membership investigates "suitability for membership" (i.e. not a criminal, etc.)
- 5. When passed by those committees, proposal goes to Board of Directors.
- 6. Board either approves or sends back to committee (very seldom happens).
- 7. If Board approves, sponsor is notified to arrange orientation with prospect.
- 8. Prospect and sponsor expected to attend Orientation meeting
- 9. Prospect tells sponsor "yes" or "no".
  - a. If yes, sponsor advises Secretary to post name in bulletin.
  - b.f no more than five written objections received, sponsor nominate prospect at regular meeting.lf no more than ten objections, prospect is elected.
- 10. Sponsor brings new member to first available meeting for introduction.
- 11. Prospect attends 2 more meetings.
- 12. Prospect gets inducted.

#### The Rotary Foundation

- A separate membership corporation with one member RI
- The fund-raising and spending arm of RI.
- Programs: Scholarships, VTTS, Volunteers PolioPlus.
  - Global/District grants available
  - TRF does not spend Annual Fund contributions for three years. Interest used for operating expenses
  - Permanent Fund (Endowment)
- Contributions through Paul Harris Fellow or Sustaining member

## Rotary Orientation

#### Wrap Up

- Orientation should be an ongoing process, even after joining. Can't cover all details in short time at a meeting.
- New members encouraged to observe and ask further questions of sponsor and other Rotarians.
- Reminder to say "yes" or "no" to sponsor
- Sponsor to notify Club Secretary for publication

#### Avenues of Service and Areas of Focus

For years, Rotary's commitment to Service Above Self has been channeled through the Avenues of Service, which form the foundation of club activity.

The Rotary five avenues of service are:

- 1. Club Service focuses on strengthening fellowship and ensuring the effective functioning of the club.
- 2. Vocational Service encourages Rotarians to serve others through their vocations and to practice high ethical standards
- 3. Community Service covers the projects and activities the club undertakes to improve life in its community.
- 4. International Service encompasses actions taken to expand Rotary's humanitarian reach around the globe and to promote world understanding and peace.
- 5. New Generations recognizes the positive change implemented by youth and young adults through leadership development activities

Rotary clubs serve communities around the world, each with unique concerns and needs. Rotarians have continually adapted and improved the way they respond to those needs, taking on a broad range of service projects. The most successful and sustainable Rotary service tends to fall within one of the following seven areas:

- 1. Peace and conflict prevention/resolution
- 2. Disease prevention and treatment
- 3. Water and sanitation
- 4. Maternal and child health
- 5. Basic education and literacy
- 6. Economic and community development
- 7. Environment

Rotary International and The Rotary Foundation recognize these seven areas of focus as organizational priorities, and there are countless ways that Rotarians can address these needs locally and internationally.

Train-the-Trainers Workshop for the Rotary Year 2023-2024


