






SPEAKS Gordon McInally Turns Ethos into Action

A young bagpiper parades out of a hotel banquet room playing the familiar refrain of "Scotland the Brave." Behind him, carrying a plated ceremonial haggis and wearing blue, green, black, and yellow Gordon Modern tartan, is 2023-24 Rotary International President Gordon McInally.

It's Burns Night, celebrated every January with folk music, drams of Scotch whisky, enthusiastic renditions of the songs and poems of Scotland's greatest poet, Robert Burns, and, of course, haggis with neeps and tatties (turnips and potatoes). It is quintessentially Scottish, and McInally is in his element with friends as he marks the occasion in Galashiels, a town in Scottish Borders close to his home in Yetholm.

Heather McInally, his wife of 42 years, is wearing a sash of tartan — checks of green, light blue, and dark red — created for the 1997 Rotary International Convention in Glasgow. A classically trained former professional opera singer and music teacher, she belts out songs by Burns learned from childhood.

Contented wi' little, and cantie wi' mair / Whene'er I forgather wi' Sorrow and Care / I gie them a skelp as they're creeping alang / Wi' a cog o' gude swats and an auld Scottish sang.

Now the haggis is something else.

It is made of a sheep's pluck — the heart, liver, and lungs — minced with onions, oatmeal, suet, salt, pepper, and other spices, mixed with stock and then, originally, boiled in the animal's cleaned stomach. It sounds like a culinary nightmare, but on their travels the McInallys have been spreading word of haggis's appeal throughout the Rotary community.

Heather McInally explains how, on their visits to the States, they have sourced local supplies of haggis and even warmed up the Scottish delicacy in their hotel room microwave. "The smell of haggis lingered in the room the entire week," she recalls. "We served it to other RI Board members while in Chicago.

Everyone seems to love it, even though they were not quite sure what they were eating."

Rotary Protocol & Decorum

Every Rotary Club has to organize many functions and meetings.

There is certain protocol to be observed to recognize dignitaries, to show them love and respect of the organization.

A proper observance of protocol enhances the prestige of the concerned and also brings decorum to the function.

Below are certain hints as to how one can observe this protocol:

· All Rotary meetings hosted by a club (including Seminars, RYLA, etc.) and/or a regular meeting of the Club should be presided over by the President of the Club. The meeting will be called to order by him /her and not by the Master of Ceremonies or such other functionary. A Rotary meeting hosted by District or District Committee will be presided over by the serving District Governor. [They] will call the meeting

Whilst calling the meeting to order, the gavel is first gently banged on the table and then the Presiding Officer says, "This meeting is called to

• Similarly whilst adjourning the meeting the Presiding Officer announces, "This meeting is adjourned" and thereafter gently bangs the

gavel o the table.

• The protocol to be observed in order of precedence for greetings is as under:

As a general rule,

Present functionary will precede past, and past will precede future. Serving District Governor, Past District Governors starting from senior most, DGN, serving President, District Officers, Past Presidents, President-Elect and so on.

If the Mayor or the first citizen of the town is present in a Rotary meeting, they should be invited to the Presidential Table (if any) and should be recognized first.
Once protocol is observed in a meeting initially, the subsequent speakers need not repeat the protocol but get down to business by addressing "Fellow Rotarians and Guests."
This will help save time and not to say the least avoid possible foul up

Whichever may be The Rotary meeting, hosted either by the Club or by the District, the serving Governor, if present and as the Chief Guest, will speak last.

After the speech of the Governor, there should be no further speeches

or for that matter summing of the speech.
The only item on the agenda will be acknowledgements and a vote of

During the official visit of the Governor to the clubs, there should be no additional Chief Guest, the Governor being the only one. Clubs are discouraged to have more than one chief guest at the

installation function or such other Rotary function or during Governors Official Visit.





MANDATORY GOALS

- 1. Achieve the \$100 per capita club contributions to the Annual Program Fund (APF) and Every Rotarian Every Year (EREY)
- 2.2 Club contributes a minimum of \$200 or \$10 per member to the PolioPlus program whichever is higher; and,

ACHIEVE 3/6 GOALS

- 1. Campaign for New Polio Plus Society Member with at least (1) one member commits to contribute \$100 to the PolioPlus Fund every year;
- 2. Achieve having at least one (1) NEW Major Donor or Major Gift Giving;
- 3. Achieve having at least one (1) NEW TRF Benefactor by contributing \$1,000 to the Endowment Fund (District or Club);
- 4. Achieve having at least one (1) NEW Paul Harris Society Member with a contribution of at least \$1,000 to Annual Fund or PolioPlus fund or combined (PHS Members commit to contribute \$1,000 every year);
- 5. Achieve that Club President and TRF Chair become a Paul Harris Fellow (PHF) or next level PHF; and,
- 6. Participate in Rotary Foundation Programs by availing of the Grant Program of the Rotary Foundation (District Grant or Global Grant). The District Grant Project must be sustainable).

DISTRICT SPECIAL CITATION

- 1. Achieve the RI challenge of Count Down To End Polio Initiative recognizing clubs with a contribution of \$1,500 or more to the PolioPlus Fund (Individual giving or Club's total giving). *for those who contributed more than \$10 have already subscribed to the #2 goal; and,
- 2. Special Citation/Recognition for establishing a new endowment fund, Individual or Club (minimum of \$25,000).
